Eastland County Wins State Pecan Show Title

Eastland County won top all-around honors with 178 points in the annual Texas State Pecan and Horticulture Show Jan. 5-6 at Texas A&M College.

Always a consistent high scorer, Eastland edged out San Saba County, another steady champion in past shows. San Saba scored 174 points.

Ordinarily, Eastland County would name its county pecan queen as Texas State Pecan Queen, but rules of the show say that no county can have a state queen twice in a row. Therefore, the honor goes to the second place county.

Reigning during 1962 will be Miss Patricia Renfro of San Saba, a senior in San Saba High School. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Edwards.

Miss Renfro will be officially crowned during the annual meeting of the Texas Pecan Growers Association in July at Austin.

Third overall county winner was Bell County, with 129 points. Travis County scored 123 points for fourth place.

Dr. J. Benton Storey, secretary-treasurer of the association and an associate professor of horticulture at A&M College, said the show is sponsored by A&M College in co-operation with the pecan growers.

The show featured 425 entries representing 64 counties, Dr. Storey said.

In the individual classes, the grand champion named variety was exhibited by B. B. Freeman of Ranger, a pecan producer since the late 1920's. His Burkett and Eastern Schley cross contained 40 nuts per pound of which 60.9 per cent were kernel.

Freeman was reserve champion winner in this category in 1958 when he exhibited the Ranger variety.

Rising Star's C. E. Smith came in with the reserve champion named variety. His Success pecans were 34.8 nuts to the pound and contained 52.7 per cent kernel. Smith has been in the business for 14 years.

Both the grand and reserve champion seedling, or native, pecans were shown by Nelson Hander of Belton. His entries measured 62.9 nuts per pound and 55.6 per cent kernel for the grand champion, and 75.6 nuts a pound and 57.8 per cent kernel for the reserve.

Hander's name isn't new to the show. His entries have frequently won blue ribbons, and in 1958 he had the grand champion named variety and native pecans. He's been rising pecans since 1930.

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Jan. 15 Deadline For Filing Tax Estimate

Deadline for paying the final installment on estimated federal income tax returns for 1961 is Monday, January 15, 1962, Ellis Campbell, Jr., Director, Internal Revenue Service, Dallas, reminded taxpayers today.

"If you have previously filed an estimated return and events occurring in the last quarter of 1961 indicate that your income will be substantially more or less than your original estimate, you should file an amended declaration on January 15," he said.

This declaration, he added, should be marked "amended" and filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue in Dallas. A blank

Eastland Science Students Attend Symposium Saturday

Science students from Eastland High School attended an atomic energy symposium for high school science students from an eight-county area of North Central Texas held Saturday on the campus of Midwestern University at Wichita Falls. It was announced Wednesday by F. M. Sayre, Manager of Texas Electric Service Company.

The symposium was sponsored by Texas Electric and Midwestern University, and was expected to draw some 400 students and teachers from 24 high schools in the area.

Students attending from Eastland were Pat Armstrong, Melvin Brown, Marvin England and David Millican. They were accompanied by their teacher, Jimmie Hughes.

The program was arranged by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, a research organization made up of 11 inventor-owned electric utility companies in Texas, one of which is Texas Electric. The Foundation is engaged in a joint research program with General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation aimed at controlling the nuclear fusion reaction for the generation of electric power.

Nuclear fusion is the process which provides the power for the hydrogen bomb, and is the energy process of the sun and stars. The research project is the world's first and largest privately financed program in the field of nuclear fusion.

Two foremost nuclear scientists from General Atomic appeared at the symposium. They were Dr. R. S. Stone, head of experimental operations, high temperature gas-cooled reactor program and Dr. F. R. Scott, a group leader in the fusion project.

Through its participation in the research program of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, Texas Electric was able to bring Dr. Stone and Dr. Scott to Wichita Falls," Sayre said. "It is our hope that this program, featuring two of the nation's leading scientists, will prove to be extremely informative to our high school students, and also will be an inspiration to those students who may be considering science as a career."

The symposium was held in the auditorium at Midwestern which had made its facilities available for the day-long session.

Speakers in addition to Dr. Stone and Dr. Scott included Dr. Travis White, president of Midwestern, who delivered an address of welcome; and H. R. Drew of Fort Worth, executive vice president of the foundation, who described its program.

The program also included a panel discussion on science careers during which Dr. Stone, Dr. Scott, Dr. Carl Gray, associate professor of chemistry at Midwestern, and O. S. Hoozaday, Fort Worth, personnel consultant of Texas Electric, discussed opportunities available to science students today and answered students' questions on the subject.

The program also included a film, "Reaching for the Stars", that showed the progress of fusion research at General Atomic.

Dr. Stone is responsible for a major part of the development

The IRS representative said an original declaration of estimated tax for the year 1961 should be filed by January 15 on Form 1040ES by taxpayers who first become liable for filing an estimate during the fourth quarter of 1961.

He continued: "There's one exception to these rules. If the taxpayer finds it necessary to file a declaration for the first time on January 15, he need not file or pay on that date if he files his final return for 1961 and pays in full the balance of tax he owes on or before February 1, 1962."

"Many questions about your estimate and your tax return can be solved by telephoning the local IRS office," he advised.

Many Senior Citizens Qualify Under New State Medical Plan

Eastland County has 1,368 recipients on Old Age Assistance rolls who are paid a total of \$76,808 monthly from the State Department of Public Welfare. Many of these recipients qualify for two types of medical services, nursing home care and in-patient hospital care, provided by the Medical Assistance Act, Senate Bill No. 79, which was passed by the State Legislature

at the regular session in 1961 and went into effect Jan. 1 of this month.

Under the new bill, which was approved by Texas voters Nov. 4, 1958 through a Constitutional Amendment, the Texas State Department of Welfare will pay most of the costs of Old Age Assistance recipients care in a nursing home. Old Age Assistance recipients may also receive hospitalization from the Blue Cross hospitalization organization, which was purchased Nov. 15, 1961 by the State Board of Public Welfare as underwriter for the State's wide-spread program of health care for Old Age Assistance recipients.

Before Assistance recipients may receive nursing care payments or hospitalization they must have a doctor's certification that they should receive nursing home care or in-patient hospital care.

Mrs. Bernice Landers, Abilene, area supervisor for the Department of Public Welfare, stated recently that recipients' doctors may make the final decisions as to eligibility of persons who receive the nursing treatment, but added that her office will be glad to answer questions about the new program.

Recipients who need nursing care aid have been asked to contact the State Department of Welfare, and recipients in need of hospitalization should contact their family doctor.

Under the present bill the applicant for aid must be examined and approved by a doctor for nursing home care before being eligible for assistance. The State Department of Public Welfare will pay eligible applicants an assistance check not over the maximum of \$71 per month, depending upon financial circumstances of the person involved. If there is still need of assistance the state will make a vendor payment directly to the nursing home operator, under one of the three following treatment headings: minimum \$120 per month, moderate \$141 per month, and intensive (the same as hospital care) \$180 per month. Every nursing home receiving state payment for Old Age Assistance recipients must be licensed by the State Health Department, according to type and amount of facilities and the kind of staff it has.

Under the Medical Assistance Act a recipient receives a monthly OAA check. From this check, the nursing home is paid a certain amount, minus the amount

FALLOUT SHELTER SURVEY OF AREA COUNTIES IS PLANNED

FORT WORTH — Col. R. P. West, Fort Worth District Engineer, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, has announced that he has completed negotiations with a group of architects and engineers in Abilene for a contract to conduct the first phase of a Fallout Shelter Survey in the following Texas counties: Jack, Throckmorton, Young, Shackelford, Callahan, Stephens, Eastland, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Mills, McCulloch, Concho, Menard, and San Saba.

The group is composed of the following architect-engineers: David S. Castle, Jr., Jerry D. Rosser, Charles L. Landers, J. F. Strickland, Fred C. Olds, Jr., and John M. Bridges, Jr.

Signing of the contract with the Abilene firm is expected to take place within two weeks. The work will include location of existing buildings and other facilities which have a potential for use as public fallout shelters and the tabulation of basic data on these facilities to permit evaluation of their protective characteristics.

Colonel West has the responsibility for conducting a survey and marking program of available fallout shelter space in existing buildings and other protected areas in the State of Texas in coordination with State and local Civil Defense directors. He explained that subsequent phases of the program will include marking, with the owner's consent, those facilities which meet structural and space requirements for use as public fallout shelters and the preparation of plans and estimates of costs for improvement, where necessary, of those facilities which do not meet current re-

quirements but have a potential for use as a public shelter. Data developed by the survey will be provided local Civil Defense authorities for use in preparation of shelter utilization and Civil Defense plans.

needed by the recipient for personal use. The State pays the nursing home operator the balance of the nursing home care cost, minus whatever amount relatives may be able to pay. There are many variations to the example. The program was formulated by the Texas Medical Association, the Nurses Association, the State Department of Health and the State Department of Public Welfare. The law, effective beginning Jan. 1 and extending till August 31, 1963, was arranged by the State Department of Public Welfare, subject to Federal approval under the Kerr-Mills Bill. This bill states that the State of Texas pays about 34 per cent of the program's cost with the Federal government paying 66 per cent.
