## Boy Scout Week Begins Wednesday

The 52nd anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America will be observed here beginning Wednesday and continue through February 13.

Members of the 50 Scouting units in the Noreast District of the Comanche Trail Council have planned a full program of activities, including their parents, community leaders and heads of local institutions that sponsor the groups.

The observance has as its theme "Strengthen America... Character Counts," with a special emphasis on Scouting's new program of national purpose through which 5,235,000 boys and adult leaders pledge, "I will do My Best to Build, to Serve, and to Achieve."

"This year Boy Scout Week will focus on the Boy Scout family," said Frank N. Sayre of Eastland, District Chairman of the Noreast District of the Comanche Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America.

"Each of our units will recognize the part that American families play in furthering the work of Scouting," said Mr. Sayre. "We have many families in our 3 and 1/2 county area who have been involved in Scouting activities now for two and three generations."

"We feel strongly that Scouting contributes to American family life, and in turn, strong families are, indeed, a tremendously important facet of America's strength."

Sayre pointed out that when a boy in scouting attains a higher rank his mother wins the privilege of wearing a miniature pin of that rank.

Parents of Scouts will be guests at Boy Scout Week meetings of their units, taking part in Courts of Honor or in "pot luck" dinners.

## WHERE THE MONEY GOES Most Spending Is for Food, Cars, In This County, Report Reveals

How are Eastland County residents spending their money these days?

What part of it is going for the standbys, such as food, clothing, automobiles and household operations?

What changes are taking place in local buying preferences?

The reports point to definite shifts in consumer tastes. As a result, some of the products that were popular yesterday have given way to new ones. Flashy cars with big fins and powerful engines, for example, have been displaced by simpler models that feature economy of operation.

On the other hand, greater emphasis is being placed on personal services, education, recreation and travel.

The facts and figures are brought out in the new consumer market study released by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It details, for communities all over the country, just how the local retail dollar was apportioned in the past fiscal year.

Breakdown of the spending pattern in Eastland County shows that retail business was good for most types of merchandise, despite the unusual amount of unemployment.

Purchases of food and of automotive equipment and supplies attracted a major part of the consumer dollar locally. They accounted for 63 percent of all retail spending.

Sales of these products in the year amounted to \$16,345,000, compared with the previous year's \$15,862,000.

Stores selling food for home consumption garnered \$6,454,000 of the total.

## 4,185 Poll Taxes Sold In County; 2,110 Here

There will be approximately 5,000 qualified voters in this county when voting time rolls around.

A total of 4,185 poll taxes were sold, the County Tax Assessor, Collector, J. C. Allison, reported this week.

The city of Eastland led all others in the county in sales with 2,110.

Other towns reported the following sales:

Cisco, 970; Ranger, 578; Gorman, 438; and Rising Star, 89.

There were 277 exemption certificates issued, Deputy Ott Horn, reported, with a possible 1,000 eligible persons not picking up their certificates.

The Eastland Jaycees were responsible for 200 of the Eastland poll tax sales.

Chamber of Commerce Secretary Nancy Pryor was deputized by the tax office and sold taxes through last Wednesday night (the deadline).

Fifty-eight of the Jaycees-promoted taxes were sold at their poll-tax party at the chamber office from 6 to 9 p.m. Wednesday.

President Grover Hallmark expressed thanks to everyone who had helped the club with the poll tax promotion.

## Noreast Scouting District Makes Big Gains in Strength

The Noreast district committee of the Comanche Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, learned that the District has grown during a regular session Thursday night at the Texas Electric Community Room in Eastland.

The meeting was called to order by Frank Sayre, District Chairman of Eastland. Claud Boles, District Commissioner, gave the opening prayer.

Special guests were Fireman Smith, Comanche Trail president, and Joe Galbraith, Council Executive.

Answering the roll call were 15 men from Breckenridge, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman and Stephenville.

Frank Sayre gave a report of the January meeting.

Aaron Kupperman of Breckenridge gave the organization and Extension report showing the district had made a 8.7% gain in units and a 3.9% gain in total boys. The present membership of boys is now 994.

John Schoolfield, District Scout Executive, gave a run-down on work to be accomplished during the next 30 days, and work done in the past 30 days.

Claud Boles gave a report on the commissioner service, and showed how the District Committee could help in this area. Fireman Smith complimented the men of the District for the work of the past year. The cost of electricity at Camp Billy Gibbons was also discussed by Smith.

Announcements were made of district and council events and the meeting was adjourned by Sayre.

Attending the meeting from Eastland were Sayre, Boles, W. L. Garner, Bernard Hanna, representing the Eastland Rotary Club, and Grady Pipkin.

## Engineers Survey County Shelters

A report is expected to be forthcoming as a result of a survey of existing fall-out shelters in this county.

The survey was made this past week by representatives of the U. S. Corps of Engineers, and the results probably will be turned over to County Judge John Hart in the near future.

Judge Hart is Civil Defense Administrator for the county.

Checking existing structures which might be used for shelter in the event of nuclear blasts were Daniel E. Walker, head of the Contract Administration Union, Fall-out Shelter section, Fort Worth, District Corps of Engineers, and Jerry Rosser, structural engineer with Associated Architects and Engineers of Abilene.

The entire county was surveyed for number of masonry buildings, particularly those with adequate basements, and the crew even looked for caves which would be large enough to accommodate as many as 50 people.

Caves in the county are believed to be few in number.

## 14 County Burglaries Solved With Arrest

Fourteen Eastland County burglary jobs were solved during the past week as James Hugh Leggett of Abilene, arrested recently for robberies throughout Texas, confessed to authorities in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger. He was brought to the county by two Texas Rangers and visited the three towns.

In Cisco, Leggett pointed out the following firms he had entered: Cisco Lumber & Supply Co., Graham Motor Co., Dr. C. H. Ballew's Clinic, Boswell Milk Co., and Thornton Feed Mill. The only sizeable loot was taken at Cisco Lumber where two safes were blown open and more than \$300 in cash was taken. This included a coin collection that Charles S. Sandler, owner, had acquired over the years. Leggett said he dumped

the old coins in with the others. Six firms in Eastland were burglarized by Leggett and associates, including Blevins Motor Co., McGraw Motor Co., Sig Faircloth Feed Store, Fullen Chevrolet, Borden Milk Co., and Foremost Milk Co. There was no sizeable loot taken, officers said.

Ranger firms burglarized by Leggett were the El Rancho Cafe, which lost about \$100 cash, the Labor Temple and the Tip Top Feed Store.

Leggett told Chief S. E. Parkinson in Cisco that the police car prevented him from robbing the safe at Thornton Feed Mill. The car flashed a light at the building during frequent rounds, he said, and he finally gave up and left. The police car's alley tours prevented them from breaking into Farm & Ranch Supply in Cisco, he added. He entered Graham Motor Co. but owner Charles Graham was there and called police as he escaped.

Sheriff Lee Horn accompanied the Rangers and Leggett on their tour of Eastland and Ranger.

Local authorities said that charges would be filed against Leggett in Eastland County. It appeared doubtful that he would face trial in this county, however, as it was expected that a "habitual criminal" charge would be filed somewhere, and this carries a life sentence on conviction.

Leggett appeared cooperative during his tour of county cities, officials said. Rangers indicated that he may have set some kind of record for burglary jobs without being caught.

Seeking the Justice of the Peace post in Ranger are M. L. King, L. T. (Lem) Rushing, Encumbent Ruby Springer and M. D. Underwood.

Seeking Bennett's vacated commission post from Gorman are Glenn Justice, Dick Foster, Charles Underwood, Aubrey A. Bennett M. E. (Buck) Foster and L. E. (Lonnie) Capers.

J. E. (Ed) McCantles, a former county commissioner, is opposing Carl Lamb for the Cisco commissioners post.

Un-opposed thus far are County School Superintendent H. R. (Pop) Garrett, Eastland Justice of the Peace C. E. (Pop) Owen, County Clerk Johnson Smith, Treasurer Ellen Justice, and Precinct Justice W. L. Lewis of Rising Star.

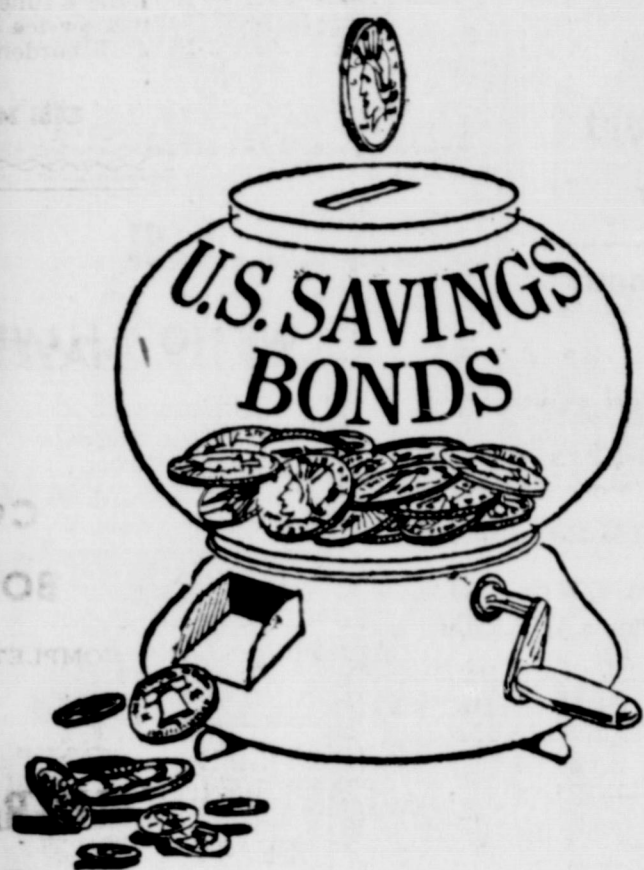

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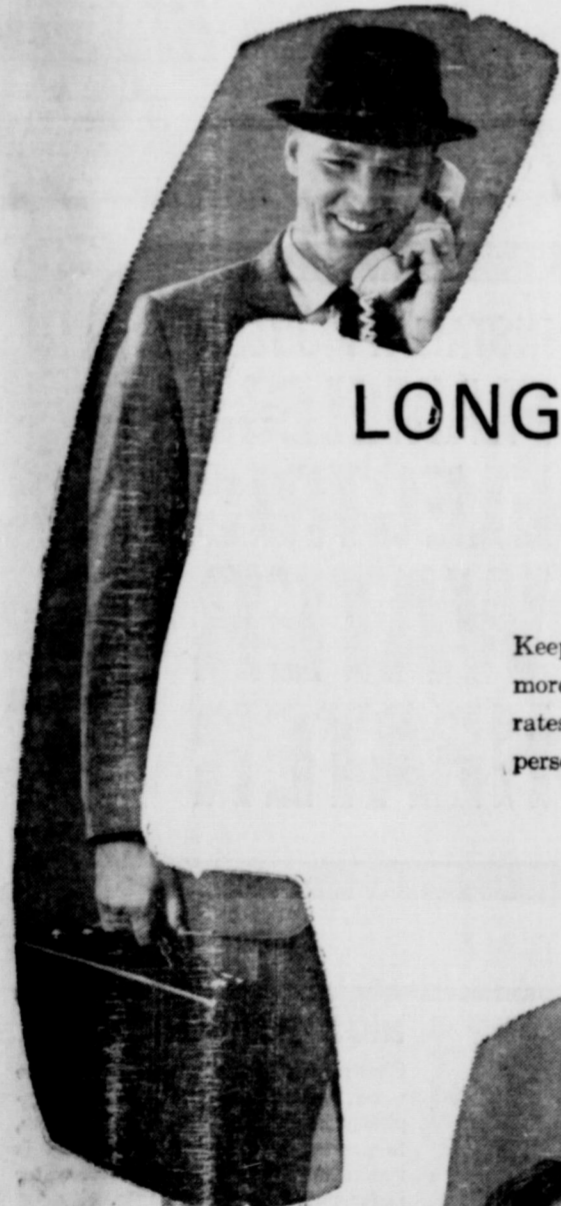


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
