BEFORE PACKED HOUSE

Local Schools Praised In Consolidation Talks

30 for One, 90 for Other; Here's Why

Spectators at the school consolidation debate Thursday night may have wondered about the difference in speaking times for the two sides.

The proponents, Dr. James Whittington and Mrs. Joseph Perkins, took only 30 minutes, whereas the opponents, Mayor Cyrus Frost and Supt. Wendell Siebert, took an hour and a half.

This arrangement was worked out and agreed upon by both parties during a special huddle Wednesday afternoon.

The Jaycees, sponsors, suggested an equal, 30-minute time limit, but Frost declined, saying he did not want to be restricted to anytime limit.

Dr. Whittington agreed to the 30-minute restriction.

Frost later consented to limiting his talk to an hour and a half, and Dr. Whittington okayed it, but insisted on only 30 minutes for himself.

Dust and sand were whipping around Eastland High School auditorium Thursday night during a pro-spring dust-

Inside, words for and against school consolidation filled the air.

A capacity crowd of school-interested Eastland countians heard over three-hours of facts, figures, challenges, rebukes and a good dose of sarcasm.

On stage from 7 until 10 a.m. were propo- and opponents to the school consolidation move.

Mrs. Joseph Perkins, chairman of the 6-district Better Education Committee and Dr. James Whittington, spoke for consolidation, and Mayor Cyrus Frost and Supt. Wendell Siebert defended the present school system.

It was a regular meeting of the Eastland Jaycees and President Grover Hallmark presided as moderator.

In his opening remarks Hallmark announced that the proponents (Mrs. Perkins and Dr. Whittington) were to have 30 minutes to speak, and the op-

ponents (Frost and Siebert) were to have one hour and a half.

This brought bits of laughter from the packed house, and Mayor Frost to his feet, to tell the moderator that the proponents could have as long as they wanted. Hallmark corrected that the agreed time was 30 minutes.

Mrs. Perkins spoke first and outlined a great deal of history of education in this state and area, and called the evening's event a most exciting thing, in that the number of people who had turned out interested in education.

"Consolidation is coming," she said, and you hold in your hands the when." Since 1945, nationally the number of school district has been cut in half, she pointed out.

"Once we didn't have a hospital—now we do," she said, and added that women have often been called upon to assist in these programs.

She called consolidation "inevitable" and closed her talk by saying that the committee for better education had no "gripe" with the present qual-

ity of education, but only wanted more.

Dr. Whittington depended almost entirely on Dr. Bascom Hayes' report on the proposed 6-district consolidation, for his segment of the 30-

minute proponent's time.

He said the reasons why some are against consolidation—1. administrators, 2. trustees, 3. false pride, 4. misconceptions, 5. legal problems, and 6. financing.

The eye, ear, nose and throat specialist called the six-district reorganization a more efficient plan with an elementary school in each district. (Eastland, Ranger, Carbon, Olden, Gorman and Desdemona would be involved).

Taxes, which he said are already too high in Eastland, would be increased if the move isn't out, according to Dr. Whittington.

Transportation would be no problem, he said, and better education would be offered.

"We have proven that we can't play together or work together, so maybe if some old soreheads will die off, maybe we can grow together," he said.

He closed his talk by warning the audience against possible attacks by Mayor Frost. He listed personal attacks on himself, Dr. Hays, facts and figures, teachers, financing plan, drop of DA (average daily attendance), first year operation, and lack of national authority to back statements.

Mayor Frost began his interrogation of Supt. Siebert at 7:55 with the school administrator on-stage backed by a half-dozen giant charts, and graphs.

Speaking from down in front of the stage, Frost asked the audience to join him in some games.

He asked them to repeat mentally, the question which he said has been repeatedly asked around the square in Eastland—"We must do something about our schools."

Then he asked them to ask "Why?"

Frost first asked Siebert about the local system's faculty, and he reported that there (Continued on Page 7)

In junior high school there are six teachers, three of whom have masters, and with a 20-year teaching experience. In Southward there are seven teachers, four with masters, with 17 years experience. In Westward, there are sev-

en, three with masters, with 22 years experience. Referring to the first chart, Siebert discussed possible forthcoming state curriculum requirements compared with what is now being offered in Eastland.

At the Junior high level, 1,816 clock hours are being given, and the requirement will be for 1,400. Only place where a "pinch" might be felt, he said, would be in physical education, but pointed out that there would be "loop-holes".

On the high school level, he showed that Eastland offers 13 more courses than was reported average by a Texas Research League survey. "It would take a student 8 1/2 years to take all the subjects we offer," Siebert said.

With a chart showing average offering for high schools with from 201 to 500 enrollments (Eastland category), it was pointed out that there are six more courses offered that is reported average.

Chart four showed high school requirements now and what will be required later. Locally 16 are required for graduation, with 18 set for later.

Asked by the mayor if any of the graduates have ever had difficulty getting into the top colleges and universities, Siebert, answered that if one graduates from a Conference institution tops, then no student should ever have to worry about acceptance. "No high school graduate has been denied college, if he is academically capable," he said.

It is true, the opponents of consolidation said, that the local system has been on the Texas Education Assoc.'s warning list, due to the inequalities of the dual schools systems. (The dual system was abolished recently with an integration election.)

Frost and Siebert then produced charts which showed results of tests given in this system. This information was heretofore unenclosed and showed that students here rank exceptionally high compared with others tested through the same programs.

In an elementary test last spring Eastland students were among the 67 percentile of 109 taking the test nationally—meaning that this school beat 670 schools out of 1,000.

Other results showed 90, 85, 83, 77, 93 per centages, and that a seventh grade here was among the top one per cent in the nation.

Individual scores were revealed including some extremely high ones in the upper 90s.

The Eastland faculty was introduced by Frost, and each stood in the audience. The mayor asked if "masculine, Christian faculty" wasn't responsible for lack of juvenile delinquency here.

Texas' 49th Division On Field Maneuvers

The 49th Armored Division culminates 14 weeks of intensive combat training Feb. 13-15 with the largest field maneuver in its 15-year history — Operation Anvil. Many men from Ranger will participate in the maneuvers.

The former National Guard division, called to federal service at the height of the Berlin crisis last fall, will move to the field with some 15,000 well-trained, fully-equipped soldiers, most of whom are Texans.

For them, Operation Anvil will be the pinnacle of a rigid training period that has brought the division from a partially-trained National Guard unit to a combat-ready Army fighting machine.

This Southwest Louisiana fort will literally "burst at its seams." Thousands of additional acres have been leased in this pine forest area to accommodate the large armored division and its support units.

Proceeding the maneuver will be a two-day command post exercise—a "war paper" designed to test the various sections.

The CPX, slated Feb. 10-11, will help prepare the unit for the actual maneuver.

Maj. Presley Garrett, an assistant in the G3 Section which has charge of training said, "A command post exercise is one in which all moves are made on paper. No one will be driving a tank, digging a foxhole or handling a rifle."

But each individual will be involved, just the same. He will be a figure on paper to be manipulated by the commander.

Following the CPX, the field work begins. The entire division pulls out to test the ground what was worked out on paper. Its units will stretch to all areas of spacious Fort Polk.

Since the division arrived at Fort Polk during the latter part of October, the men have been trained progressively.

Maj. Garrett explained that "they trained first at individual and small section levels, then at platoon and company and on up through battalion and combat command."

"Now they're ready to put all this together for the division's first full-scale maneuver," he said.

"During this problem the men will eat and sleep on the run 24 hours a day a simulated combat situation to test the readiness of the division," he added.

The entire division has moved to the field on several occasions during annual summer encampments at Ford Hood, Tex., as a National Guard unit, but not on a division-wide maneuver of this size.

Operation Anvil doesn't end the division's training. Following the initial training period, operational readiness training goes into effect.

Lt. Col. Karl E. Wallace, the division's general staff officer in charge of training, said, "They'll start over on their weak points and retrain."

Plenty of familiarization on weapons firing, battlefield tactics, camouflage and concealment procedures, medical evacuation practices and proper processing of prisoners is slated for the Lone Star Division.

Plans are also in the mill to familiarize each man with the Army's new M-14 rifle and the machine gun.

The 49th Armored division, one of two National Guard divisions mobilized when the Berlin crisis worsened and the only one of its type ever called to active duty, had 95 units in 74 Texas towns.

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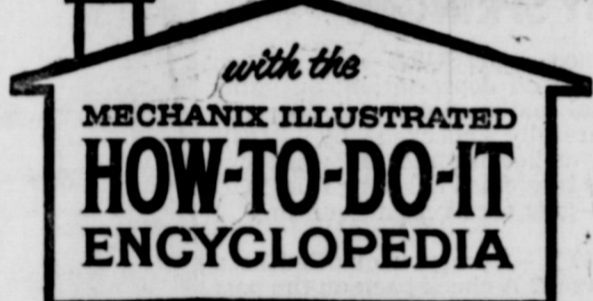

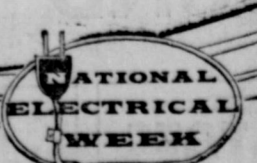
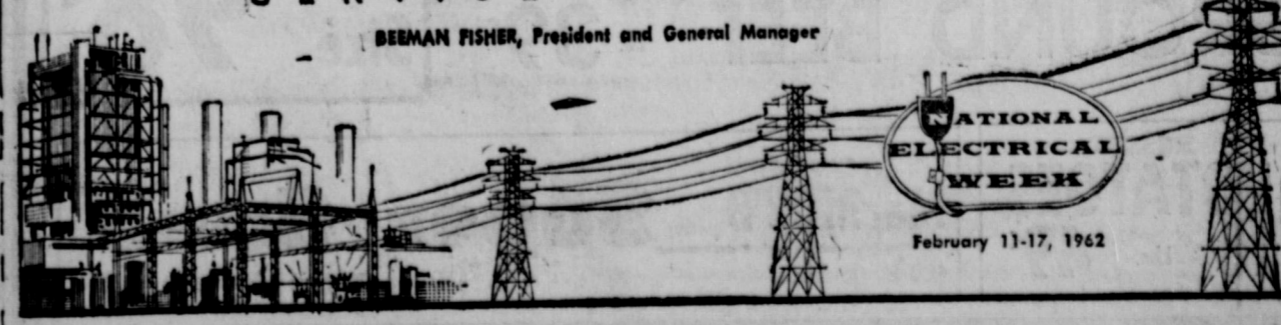

Woman Faces 4 Ranger JP Charges

Mrs. John T. Robertson of Ranger, entered a plea of not guilty to charges alleging attempted assault and murder with a motor vehicle Friday morning in Justice of the Peace Raby Springer's court. Charges resulted from an automobile accident Thursday afternoon which involved a car driven by Mrs. Robertson and another car driven by Mrs. Nancy Pennington, also of Ranger.

Mrs. Robertson waived the examining trail and was released on \$3,000 bond in the amount of \$3,000.

The accident occurred about 4:15 p.m. Thursday on Farm to Market Road 101, near the Ranger swimming pool.

Mrs. Odessa Squires, a passenger in the car with Mrs. Pennington, told investigating officers J. W. Vinson and Mac McGowan that the car driven by Mrs. Robertson sideswiped their car, and Mrs. Pennington got out to see what damage had been done. Mrs. Squires told officers that Mrs. Pennington was then struck by the other car.

Mrs. Robertson, in a telephone conversation with a Times reporter, said that she was blinded by the sun as she was driving up Eastland Hill and did not see the other car. She said that she had no reason to hit the other car and that it was purely an accident. Mrs. Robertson also related that if anyone has ever driven up Eastland Hill at that time of day they would understand how the sun can blind a driver of a car.

Mrs. Pennington was taken to Ranger General Hospital where the attending physician reported Friday that she was resting fairly well. Mrs. Pennington suffered a compound fracture of the left leg, another fracture of the same leg, two fractures of the left hand and multiple bruises and abrasions. Mrs. Pennington's two year old son, Jimmy, was also a passenger in the car with her. Three tickets were issued to Mrs. Robertson, including negligent collision, failure to stop and render aid and leaving the scene of an accident.
