Atlas Missile Projects Explained for Lions

The role of the mighty Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile in defense and space exploration was the subject for the Lion's club luncheon Tuesday.

Guest speaker Gregg Thomasson, communications chief for General Dynamics—Astronautics, Dyess AFB, told the club of the missile's development and its performance.

He outlined how the missile was set for use in the orbital flight scheduled for Wednesday, and the manner in which it was to lift the astronaut into its flight around the earth.

Atlas missiles will be placed in 12 underground silos circling Abilene, as a strategic defense weapon to be used in retaliation, if our country were ever attacked, he pointed out.

There, he said, the missile which uses liquid oxygen and a kerosene-like fuel, is a stage and a half rocket, in that all engines are ignited before it leaves the ground.

Chances of a serious mishap are about one in a hundred, Thomasson said about the space probe Mercury project.

Atlas has been developed under a compressed time schedule.

Demonstrations on pruning will be shown on the Herman Schaefer orchard, about a mile east of Nimrod; Raymond Wood orchard, about half mile east of Pumpkin Center; and the Terrell Ranch (John Thurman) in the Staffs Community.

After lunch at Tom and Jenny's Cafe in Ranger, the group will assemble at the Ranger High School in room 34 at 2 p.m.

Chairman of the Ag. committee will introduce J. M. Cooper, County Agent, who in turn will introduce the speakers. Discussions will include the use of Herbicides in Orchards and orchard culture and management.

The afternoon part of the program will be a joint cooperative affair between the Horticultural Planning Sub-Committee and Ranger Chamber of Commerce. Tom Denman, Horticulturist of the Agricultural Experiment Station, Stephenville will be a guest.

At 3:30 p.m. a pruning demonstration will be held at the orchard of L. N. Bryan of Ranger.

Bootlegging Charges Filed Against Four

Officials of Eastland County Sheriff's Department were successful in apprehending four bootleggers in Ranger and Cisco during a raid Thursday, Feb. 6.

Two places were raided in Eastland but no liquor was found, Sheriff Lee Horn said.

Jack Denison of Cisco was charged with possession of whiskey and vodka for purpose of sale in a dry area and is free on \$1,000 bond.

Gus Orman, also of Cisco, faced charges of possession of whiskey and wine for purpose of sale in a dry area in County Court. Bond was set at \$500.

Will Cook of Ranger was held on charges of possession of whiskey and vodka for purpose of sale in a dry area and was freed on \$1,000 bond.

Lola Wilcox, also of Ranger, faced two counts in County Court Wednesday.

Charges included possession of whiskey for purpose of sale in a dry area and possession of beer for sale in dry area. Bond of \$500 was set for each count.

Federal Reserve System Is Rotary Club Subject

The value of a dollar today is 47 cents, a Federal Reserve bank official said in Eastland this week, and that value may sink some more.

Speaking before the Eastland Rotary Club, Harold N. Faulkner, field representative for the Dallas Federal Reserve Bank, said that inflation is a cancerous growth, and that the reserve system is dedicated to fighting that growth.

In the program, arranged by Henry Pullman, Faulkner, who joined the system in 1922 and became a field representative in 1947, outlined the background history and the "behind the scenes" work of the system.

He called the system the banker's bank, and explained its purposes.

There are 12 regional banks, of which the Dallas bank is fifth in size, and 24 district branches.

The system was set up under the Federal Reserve Act of 1913, and "needs to be constantly changed to meet the

needs of the times," he said.

Its services to member banks are many, including, he said, providing a better collecting system (a check can clear from any where in the nation in two days); providing an ample amount of currency for every part of the nation at all times; and serving as a buyer and seller of government securities and lender to member banks.

The tools the system uses include power to raise or lower the per cent of reserve requirements (anywhere from 7 to 14 per cent, with the current figure standing at 12); discount rate (cost of money to banks); and the system's open market committee (a program of constantly checking the pulse of the nation's economy, to determine what tools need to be used for balance.)

"We're not always popular, but our purpose is to provide a sound economy for our country," he said.

The commissioner's regular meeting was held Monday morning in the Eastland Courthouse.

Also during the meeting, commissioners voted to increase the purchase of school bonds.

Eastland County purchased from C. N. Burt & Co. \$10,000 Pasadena Independent School District 3% Bond due Feb. 10, 1984 with an option in 1970 in exchange for \$10,000 Graham I.S.D. 2.75% Bond due April 1, 1972.

Municipal bonds of the Eastland County Permanent School Fund were sold to C. N. Burt and Co. Sold were "2,000 Water Work and Sewer 3% Bonds due Oct.

15, 1967 and Oct. 15, 1967 at \$1,040 per thousand, \$2,000 and \$1,000 Carbon I.D.S. 4 per cent due April 1, 1962 at \$1,000.

They also decided to purchase from C. N. Burt and Co. as an investment of the Eastland County Permanent School Fund \$5,000 Jacksonville I.S.D. 2.90 per cent Bonds due March 1, 1977 with an option in 1971 at \$925 per \$1,000 or \$4,625 plus interest.

the wheel and his hand in God's hand, and pray like a lost sinner while he totes the barges and lifts the bales. "You can't recognize a Jaycee just by looking at him. To thousands of poor children at Christmas time, he looks like Santa Claus. To millions of citizens who see him sweating in the summer heat to get out the vote, he looks like Uncle Sam in a limp shirt. To the forgotten people in the polio wards and the TB hospitals who depend on fellows like him to gather the money that saves human life, he looks like an angel. And to the political crooks and demagogues who creep into the local governments to pull down the wool curtain of secrecy, close the open doors of public office, and steal away the people's liberties, he looks like the hangman.

"And even if you know a Jaycee today, you won't know him tomorrow. Today he may be an obscure clerk; but after a while in the Jaycees—after getting into bloodstream of community affairs—he'll be hiring and firing clerks by the dozen. Today he may be a follower; tomorrow he'll be a leader. But in the meantime he'll spend time on committees, or running around on cold nights helping on some kind of improvement project, or standing on the street corner with a loud speaker telling people to give, and vote, and go, and come, and listen, and be concerned.

And he'll start getting public respect, and people he doesn't know from Adam will call him by name on the street; and he will be on speaking terms with hundreds he never knew before; and his boss will begin to realize what a valuable employee he is; and his fellow citizens will be turning to him for leadership. And he'll be lucky if his wife loves him enough to gripe like the dickens because he doesn't spend more time at home.
