



## Almost 700 Entries In For County Stock Show

A record number of entrants in the Eastland County Live-Stock Show will be competing

for a record prize total when the show unfolds on March 30th and 31st.

Almost 700 entries have already been signed and this is far above past years participation. Last year there were approximately 500 entries.

Prize money this year will be right at \$2,000.

Break-down by classes of entered stock is as follows:

Fat lambs, 264; breeding sheep, 95; goats, 67; fat hogs, 129; breeding hogs, 54; dairy cows, 39; breeding beef, 48; and fat steers, 27.

## Farmer's Union To Be Chartered Thursday Night

The Eastland County unit of Texas Farmers Union will be chartered at 7:30 p.m. in the Gorman High School Auditorium, Thursday, February 22. All members and prospective members are invited to attend this important meeting.

What is Farmers Union? A lot of people in central Texas are asking that question these days. It is paradoxical that they are asking this since Farmers Union was organized in Texas almost a half century ago.

Ten men got together in a little town in Texas, to be more specific, Point, and founded the Farmers Educational Co-operative Union of America. The date was Aug. 28, 1902. Point, has disappeared from the map but its legacy in Farmers Union has remained. Today Farmers Union has over half a million voting members. It has cooperative enterprises with a net worth totalling \$50,000,000 and is operating in 22 of the 48 states. In some states like Indiana, Farmers Union is relatively new. In others like Oklahoma, it is older than the state itself. Oklahoma boasts the largest membership in Farmers Union with some 70,000 family

Editor: Under our City Charter, and more particularly the section titled "Budget" in Article 3, I would like to quote the following:

"The City Manager shall prepare and submit to the Board of Commissioners an annual budget—recommended for the ensuing year, and shall be printed in one of the City newspapers for two weeks before submission by the manager to the commission . . ."

To the best of my knowledge, this has not been done since the present administration has been in office. Naturally, the public has the right to know how, when, and where their tax money is spent. That is the purpose of this article.

Also, under Article 3, sub-heading "Accounts", I quote the following: "The City's accounts shall be kept in such a manner as to show fully at all times the financial condition of the city . . . and this shall be published quarterly."

And to the best of my knowledge, this has not been done since the present administration has been in office.

Also, under Article 3, sub-heading "Monthly Reports", I quote:

"The City Manager shall make to the Board of Commissioners a monthly report in writing showing in detail the receipts and disbursements for the preceding month. These reports of the City Manager shall be published in some newspaper published in the City each month."

And, also, to the best of my knowledge, I cannot recall seeing financial statement of the City published in this prescribed fashion since the present administration has been in

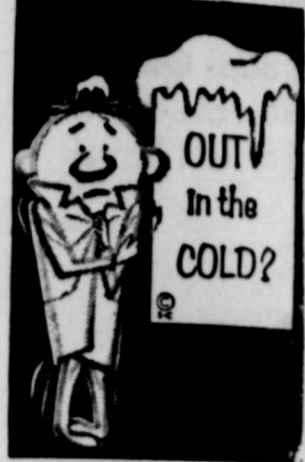

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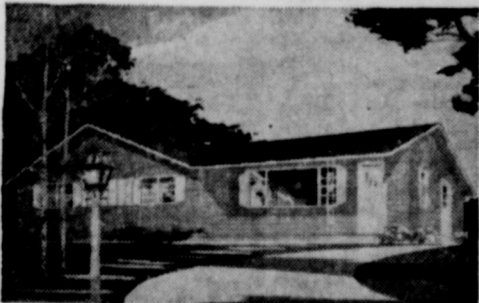

Mrs. Phil Hewitt, Mrs. J. P. Morris, a teacher from Ranger Junior College, brought a very interesting program about her experiences in London University during a 1960 summer of study there and of travel of Great Europe.

Mrs. Morris is a very well-known and liked book-reviewer of this area, but she chose to tell the group about her experiences at London University instead.

Mrs. Morris' course at the University which is located in the heart of the city in Bloomsbury was at Bedford College. Bedford College was established in 1878 and is thought to be "devoted to women" in that it was the first to award degrees to women.

The University was established in 1828 and is considered "modern" in relation to other schools in Great Britain" Mrs. Morris explained.

Mrs. Morris said that the food in the dining hall was unbelievably bad in that everything tasted alike. She could not understand why the cooks would completely destroy the flavor of even a simple can of peaches, etc. Access to an English mustard made Mrs. Morris able to tolerate the food for the time she was there, however.

Mrs. Morris saw her tutor or proctor once a week although there were lectures every day she could attend although one is not required to go or stay if the lecture seems uninteresting or dull. She remarked that it is not considered bad manners at all to rise and leave.

A "tea with her tutor", a

common custom, was described vividly by Mrs. Morris after which he presented her credit for her course.

Mrs. Morris traveled some 3,000 miles around the British Isles seeing such places as Wordworth's "River Y" and the Scottish Highlands.

Mrs. Morris delighted in telling the club of the Shakespeare plays which she saw at the Stratford Theatre. She heard lectures each morning following a play on some aspect of the theatre.

Cataloging in the London libraries was described very slowly by Mrs. Morris. "Most are behind 30 years", she declared, "except the English Museum; they are only 10 years behind".

The fact that Londoners are ahead of America in their theatres in that any play can be enjoyed for only \$1.25 was brought out by Mrs. Morris.

Mrs. Morris told of her tour of Europe last, but concluded that her most cherished time was spent at London University.

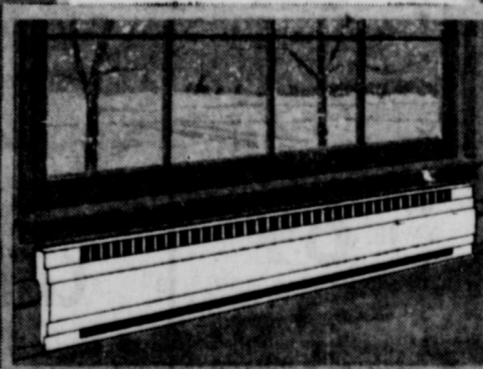

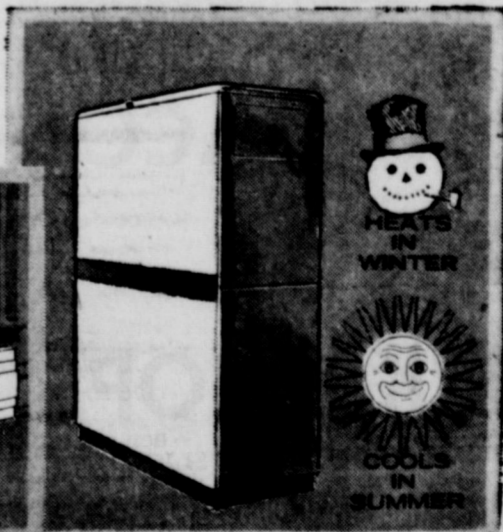
