A matinee Sunday afternoon, Feb. 23, at 2 p.m. will conclude the four performances of "An Evening of One-Acts" presented

at Bell Hurst Theatre. The fun began for those who attended Friday of Saturday's performances to the strains of music from the twenties as the curtain opened on the hotel lobby setting of Booth Tarkington's "The Trysting Place." And it continued through all three plays, interrupted only by audience applause.

Tania Sanders, who had her first major role with the theatre in "Seventeen" back in 1967, was the only actress to appear in tow of the plays, and appropriately received show-stopping applause as the rather shabby, but pushy, Mrs. Zooker in George Kelly's "The Flattering Word."

Don Wery, as both narrator and actor in the adaptation of Oscar Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest" set a pace for the crisply-British, highly-stylized play which the rest of

the excellent cast was able to maintain. Costuming for the plays, as with other ECT productions, was given to creative touch of Annette Pierson and Nettie Wilson.

The audience loved Carol Church and Earl Brakley in their knickers after golfing in the twenties, Billie Bradley in her authentic '20' chiffon, the Rev. Steve Church in spats and with a cane, and the bustle-back style of English ladies at the turn-of-the-century worn by Sherry Phillips and Peggy TheBerge of Ranger.

Director of the plays, Virginia Russell, was presented a bouquet of yellow roses from the cast.

The bouquet, concealed in furniture which was onstage in the last play, was presented by James Reid.





Combine margarine, artificial sweetner, vanilla and eggs. Ksift cocoa, flour, salt and baking powder. Add the liquid mixture. Stir in nuts. Pour into greased 8 inch square pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 20 minutes. Cool and cut into 16 squares. 1 brownie equals 1/2 bread exchange or 1 fat exchange.



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History Of A Club And Street

Not only did Happy and I watch what was going on, we helped Sam cook his fare and in appreciation of our efforts, or could it be that we hinted too hard for him to refuse, Sam always gave us a good helping of barbecue to take home to our

families. This barbecue was so good that it would make at least one good meal for both families. And the sauce Sam used on barbecue was so larding that Happy and I used to use it on breakfast cereal as long as it lasted. These Juneteenth celebrat-

ions at the tennis club were all day affairs and club members left the club to them for the day. As far as I am able to find out, the club never made a change to anyone for use of its facilities. According to the minutes of the club the first regular meeting of the Eastland Tennis was held May 24, 1919. There was no way of knowing how long it was between formation of the club and the date playing commenced on one of the

courts. But it would be safe to say that these courts were used for approximately 20 years. Although the tennis club was dissolved before the depression set in, the courts were used until as late as 1939. Long after the clubhouse was sold and moved Eastland tennis fans kept the courts in fairly good repair and played on them from time to time.

It used to be a fairly common sight to see George Bogdon, Neil Day, Scott Key, Jr., Melvin Lobough, and a host of others taking turns rolling and watering the playing surface of either one or both courts.

I have been asked which was considered the better of the two courts and I find that as well as I can remember I didn't have a favorite one. I had just as soon play on one court as the other. They were both excellent courts, and as a matter of fact I don't know of a tennis court around here now that was better playing surface than either of these.

After the demise of the club as a non-profit organization, the club sold the clubhouse, to Charles Robey who then lived just east of the courts in the house now occupied by Vernon Humphrey. He, with Happy Hightower and I watching ever move, had the building moved into his back yard, which was a distance of about 50 yards. I think Mr. Kimbrough was the mover, but it didn't take but just about a day to move the clubhouse and the two locker rooms to their new location in Robey's backyard, where the main clubhouse and one of the locker rooms are today.

Mr. Robey made a garage apartment out of the clubhouse and a storage room out of one of the locker room, that is the small square building out of one block south of Judge Grissom's garage located just east of the alley which is a continuation of Lamar Street.

Charles Robey, the attorney who moved the clubhouse into his backyard was a remarkable man in his own right. He not only was an attorney at law he was an accomplished musician who could play both the flut and piccolo well enough that had he not been a professional man in the law he could certainly have made a living as a professional musician.

Some of the prettiest sounds even heard in our neighborhood were the chamber music sessions he and some of his friends used to have in their regular musicals in the Robeyliving room.

And Mrs. Robey was outstanding too. She was a legal secretary for both her husband and Judge Stubblefield, who officed in the building that houses the Eastland Telegram now. The composing room of today's telegram was the old Stubblefield office. And Mrs. Robey not only was a legal secretary, she studied law on the side and became the first woman lawyer I ever heard of. She was licensed to practice back in the 20's and long after her husband was gone she was an attorney for one of the state agencies in Austin until she retired.

She also was a remarkable stenographer and taught shorthand in her spare time. One of her former students who studied some court reporting under her was Judge Earl Conner's young brother, Sam, who is now a court reporter.

Watching these high-paid tennis players brings back fond memories of the days when we used to fling the rackets on the old Eastland Tennis Club's courts.

I notice there is a little difference in the way a big-shot professional score than the way we did. After the score of deuce we used to refer to the advantage as "advantage in" or "ad in" if the point was the server's. If the point went to the receiver it was "advantage out" or "ad out".

I don't recall ever hear the score called as advantage to Mr. so and so as they do in professional tennis, which of course, is the right way to handle it.

All in all, thinking about the old days at the tennis club, makes one think about how times do change as time goes by. I guess there is nothing so certain, things will change.

Advocate

Although he has officially retired, Arthur Vaughn of 1605 Garland doesn't plan to let his knowledge of the electrical power industry go to waste.

Vaughn retired Dec. 31 from Southwestern Power Administration. He was a power system operator (dispatcher) at the local SPA substation for the last six years.

But that was just the last post he held during his career which started in 1926, when he worked part-time for Texas Power and Light while attending engineering school.

Now that energy is in short supply, and its use must be regulated closer than ever before, Vaughn says that he wants to play the role of a citizens' advocate during retirement.

That won't be a new role for Vaughn either, because he has been talking, working, and writing letters to the responsible persons in the public power industry for years. One of his favorite keepsakes is a personal letter from President Franklin D. Roosevelt, thanking him for his contributions to the operation of Tennessee Valley Authority during its early years of operation.

He plans to offer his consulting services to municipal and cooperative power distributors in Northeast Arkansas, because of his deep concern about public power and its availability to the power customers.

★★★

Retired

Vaughn, who is 64, retired at the end of 1974 after 30 years in electrical power operations, 25 years of that time with the federal government in public power.

His retirement came about somewhat earlier than he had planned, Vaughn explained. Dispatching duties were taken out of the Jonesboro office and changed to an SPA facility at Springfield, Mo., earlier this year. Rather than make the transfer, Vaughn and his

wife Olga decided to make Jonesboro their permanent home. The other two dispatchers transferred to Missouri.

The Texas native, who is an electrical engineer, spent six years with SPA, a sub-division of the Department of the Interior.

In the simplest terms, SPA is one of several such agencies throughout the country which are responsible for sale and distribution of electrical power, generated by hydroelectric dams constructed by the Department of the Army (Corps of Engineers). The power is sold to local utilities for resale to the final consumer: homes, businesses and industry.

Jonesboro's municipal utility, City Water and Light, is only one of many customers of SPA.

★★★

Pioneer

During his 19 years with the Tennessee Valley Authority, Vaughn helped pioneer "state of the art" operation of large power systems through interconnection and power pooling. Also, he helped develop the first training program for dispatchers.

When Vaughn starts explaining distribution of massive amounts of electrical energy, it doesn't take long for the layman to become thoroughly confused. He seems very knowledgeable about the mysterious, invisible energy which most Americans take for granted.

And he plans to use that knowledge to see that public power is getting used by the people, the priority customers of public system."

★★★

Problem

Unfortunately for Jonesboro, SPA notified the city last fall that after the present contract for base power expires in 1984, it will not be renewed. The CW&L Board of Directors is faced with the perplexing problems of finding replacement power in the next ten years.

Vaughn has taken great interest in this problem.

and has some solutions in mind to cope with the energy problem.

For the time being, he suggests that CW&L build a 50,000 kilowatt generating unit, to supplement the present 12,500 kw unit. With some revisions in state laws, the city could then sell its extra power until sometime in the next decade when it needs the whole load. This plan should pull the city through the next 20 years or so, he said.

Meanwhile, he feels it would be advisable for the city to obtain an interest of at least a 150,000 kilowatt generating station on an interest basis with a private power company, TVA, or a major cooperative. CW & L has been contemplating such a joint purchase agreement with Arkansas Power and Light for a share in AP & L's White Bluff power plant. Construction on that plant is not expected to be complete until 1979 or 1980.

★★★

Mistake

"These power problems and the energy shortage are old hat to the power industry," Vaughn explained. "The power industry, both public and private, has not kept up with the demand for electricity in this country."

The biggest mistake in the power industry was not adhering to former Interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel's idea for a national power grid, Vaughn explained.

Electricity, in the massive amounts which emanate from the generating source, can be sent thousands of miles over high line wires. Although numerous interconnections presently exist, under Hickel's plan the connections would have been more numerous. Thus, for example, if fuel was short for generating plants in New York, and reservoirs were full on the Tennessee River, the gates could be opened and generated power sent to New York. During dry spells opposite could occur.

"The present system does not have the adequate generation or transmission lines to pull the existing load at the present time," Vaughn continued, as he explained how the power grid could have evened out the electrical distribution. Interconnection exists to an extent throughout the country, but not to an adequate extent.

On the local level, Vaughn complemented Jonesboro's distribution system as one of the finest, because its design leads to great reliability for the consumers.

★★★

Challenges

While at Jonesboro, Vaughn has had some challenging moments. Just this past summer, on a hot July day, every bit of generating equipment throughout the United States was running at full speed, trying to cope with the load. One mistake by an operator somewhere could have plunged huge areas into hot darkness.

And in September of 1973, when a multi-inch rain dumped hundreds of thousands of gallons of water on Jonesboro in a short period of time, the switching station at the SPA facility was knee deep in water for some time while a small dam of sandbags was built around the building and the water was pumped out.

10th Century Viking Village Built for "The Island At The Top Of The World" Thurs. - Sat. 2/27 - 3/1 At The Majestic

Eric the Red would have felt right at home during filming of Walt Disney Productions' "The Island at the Top of the World."

Set in 1907, the multi-million dollar screen adventure takes four explorers to a mysterious arctic valley, warmed by volcanic heat and inhabited by Vikings. The Old Norse settlement was a masterly recreation, right out of the 10th century.

"We went straight to the textbooks for it," said production designer Peter Ellenshaw.

"We used hand-hewn lumber for the houses and built a temple of lava rock. We used 850 feet of coconut fiber rope, hand-made in Egypt, to hold up a suspension bridge.

"We found a half-finished Viking longship in a Danish boat yard, took over its completion, added a few decorative touches and moved it to our location at Balestrand, Norway.

"We reproduced hand-carved furniture, sledges and other Viking artifacts. Then, when the village was ready, we populated it with

Scandinavian actors."

Among them were Lasse Kolstad, Rolf Soder, Gunnar Ohlund, Niels Hinrichsen, Sverre Ousdal and Torsten Wahlund, star names in Scandinavia. Besides playing a Viking farmer in the picture, Norwegian actor-singer Kolstad served as technical adviser. He translated portions of the script into ancient Norse, the language of the Vikings.

"The Island at the Top of the World" is based on speculation that there were survivors from the 14 ships lost during Eric the Red's expedition to Greenland in 985 A.D. Seafaring colonists could have drifted to a place such as Iceland, which is volcanic, there to live and propagate until their discovery centuries later.
