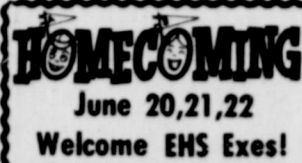

## Commissioners Discuss Plans For Future

Eastland Volunteer Fire Department officials met with the Eastland City Commission Monday evening and discussed plans and projects for the future.

Attending were Volunteer Chief Jack Graham, Johnny Grimes and Steve Haines. All commissioners were present and voted to increase the city's contribution to the Volunteer Dept. from \$30 to \$50 per month to be used in the purchase and maintenance of equipment and supplies.

The City also agreed to assist in a training program which will initially make eligible for certification ten volunteers. Some 15 others will be given training for certification in about a year. Training will be local, and the program is expected to benefit the department's efficiency.

In other business the city agreed to pay the monthly contractor's estimate of \$18,479.83 for sewer plant construction work. It was reported that the plant is presently being tested and that the plant completion is due soon.

A payment of \$1,900 in engineering fee was approved for Yeatts & Decker on the same project.

During a lengthy discussion of parking and traffic control, with Police Chief John Morren and City Attorney Jim Wright among other things, it was agreed to erect stop signs at the intersection of N. Lamar and Moss St. stopping the east-west traffic there. Chief Morren recommended the stop signs stating that there have been several accidents there recently.

A brief report was given on developments for the improvements to the Eastland Airport and/or possibility of an alternate site.

Chairman H.V. O'Brien named Commissioner Mike Siebert to be in charge of the city's long-range plans for the modernization and development of the City Park. The City has recently finalized the purchase of the remainder of the park land from the T&P Railway and has requested that the State Parks and Wildlife Dept. return to Eastland to update the master plan drawn in 1972 by that agency.

Commissioner W.H. (Bill) Hoffmann and Commissioner Dale Bakker reported on the purchase of a second police car which has been put into service. A used vehicle, formerly used by the county sheriff's department, was purchased.

Commissioner Charles Marshall brought up the idea of a citizen's study group with a view toward the possibility of revising and bringing up to date of the city charter. No action was taken.

The Commission authorized a payment of \$50 to the Eastland Bicentennial Commission for incidental expenses.

Commissioners received the audit report for the year ended Sept. 30, 1974, from Accountant E.J. Johnston.

The report showed in brief opinion: "...the accompanying balance sheets, statements of revenue and expenditures, and statements of changes in financial position present fairly the financial position of the City of Eastland...and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year."

"Furthermore, our examination of Revenue Sharing Funds and the accompanying statements revealed no exception in financial data and no areas of non-compliance under the provisions of Public Law 92-512 and the Revenue Sharing Regulation.

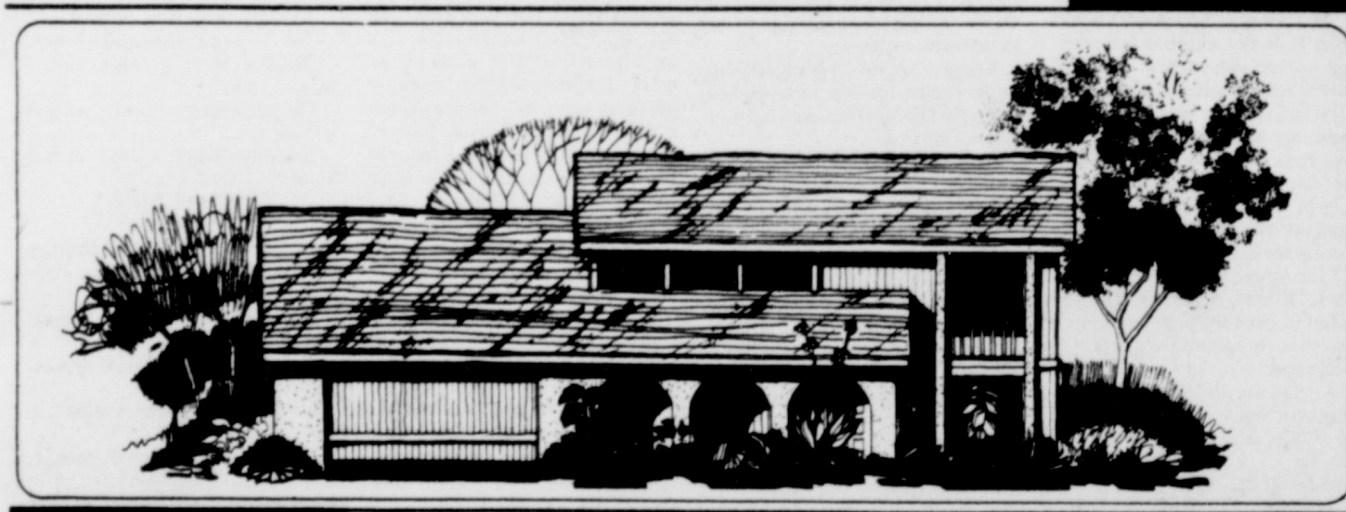

# GORDON SPOT

May 27 through May 31 should be the time to spray pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearer predicts County Agent De Gordon. This date is determined by examining the insect activity in pecan orchards and from reports from growers south and east of Eastland County.

Gordon emphasized that the insect development will vary from one part of the county to another part. Growers should check their own trees for egg deposits and feeding of newly hatched larvae to determine the optimum time to spray. When one to two percent of the young nuts have been punctured by the casebearer it is time to spray, the agent said.

Commercial pecan growers should have their sprayer and insecticides ready and make daily checks in the orchard or grove to observe egg deposit and feeding of the small worms.

Adult moths deposit small eggs barely visible to the naked eye on the tips of the pecans. Eggs hatch in four or five days and the young larvae migrate to buds below the nuts to feed. After a day or two they enter the nuts at the base. The insecticide should be applied when a majority of the eggs are hatching and before the young worms enter the pecans.

The insecticides that can be used by the commercial grower of these casebearers are Guthion, Thiodan, Malathion, Zolone, Sevin or Toxaphene. Gordon suggests that either Malathion, Zolone or Sevin be used on yard trees. Use these insecticides according to direction given on the label of the container.

Thorough coverage is essential for the control of this insect. Be sure that the spray is applied to the tree to the point of run-off. If growers wish to spray twice for more effective control the agent suggests spraying on May 26 and June 2.

Zinc sulfate should be added to the spray solution to provide the needed zinc.

A fungicide should be added to control pecan diseases. The recommended fungicides are Benlate, Du-ter, Cyprex, or Polym.

We always enjoy visiting OllenHodge, when we have an opportunity. Hodge has a small herd of cattle, south of Eastland on the road to Kokomo. He is developing a herd of Simmental cattle and also has one Maine-Anjou 1/2 blood heifer. He is particularly proud of a 3/4 blood Simmental bull calf.

It is not yet time to spray pecan trees for the control of the pecan nut casebearer. However you should get your spray materials ready.

We usually spray pecan trees about May 25 to June 1, here in Eastland County. Sevin, Malathion, Guthion, Zolone, Thiodan and Toxaphene are all effective in controlling the pecan Nut case bearer.

Zinc Sulfate is also an important part of the spray solution. This is a food that prevents rosette and die back of the pecan limbs.

A fungicide may also be added to control diseases. Any one of four fungicides will do the job—Benlate, Du-Ter, Cyprex or Polym.

We will keep you informed of the best time to spray the pecan trees.

Some 30 insect pests attack home vegetable gardens throughout the growing season, causing reduced yields and quality of produce. But losses

can be minimized with effective insect control program utilizing both cultural and chemical control methods.

The first cultural control method is to clean debris, weeds and grasses from the garden area and maintain a weed-free garden. Many insects feed and multiply in weeds and grasses. Turn under or compost spent plants, when vegetables have been harvested.

Inspect plants frequently for insect infestations. Light infestations of some species such as the tomato hornworm may be controlled by hand picking and destroying the pest.

Isolated infestations may be controlled by removing one to several infested plants from the garden to prevent spread of a pest.

Anticipate insect problems and apply insecticides before insect populations become established in large numbers.

Select insecticides which are effective against a large number of pests and are registered for use on a wide variety of plants. This reduces the purchase and storage of a large number of different compounds. Read the label and observe all restrictions when using pesticides.

These guidelines should be followed throughout the growing season to keep insect numbers and damage at a minimum.

Spade Operating Co. of Abilene will drill No. 1-A-WIW F.R. Jackson in the Jackson (Strawn) Field nine miles south of Caddo.

Having a proposed depth of 1,800 feet, it spots 950 feet from the south and five feet from the east lines of northwest quarter of Section 80, Block 4, T&P Survey.

It will be a water injection well. Little Cedar (Strawn) Field 13 miles east of Breckenridge in Stephens County has gained a new well.

It is C.B. Hazel of Ranger No. 1 - A (formerly No. 3) A.C. Speer Estate. Site is 467 feet from the north and 1,400 feet from the west lines of Section 20, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Daily pumping potential was 131 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus 20 barrels of water. Production is from perforations at 2,940 - 70 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid. The pay was fractured with 60,000 pounds of sand and 1,000 gallons of water. Operator set the 4 1/2 - inch casing at 3,048 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 3,050 feet and plugged back to 3,048 feet.

### Weather Report

Eastlander's Tuesday noon hour was shrouded in dark clouds that dumped a little over a half of an inch of rain, a trace of hail, and accompanied by wind gusts estimated to be of some 50 miles per hour.

Sentimentalist or not, if you ever saw or see the traditional service at the shrine of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery on Memorial Day, you would have or see moist eyes, quivering lips, a tightening of the throat in reverent silence.

The story behind the story of the Unknown Soldier is drama without equal on any stage. It starts first with New York Congressman Hamilton Fish introducing a House Joint Resolution to have an unidentified, killed in action American Soldier returned from France for interment at Arlington. The drama continues with Admiral Dewey's famous Flagship "Olympia" commissioned to return the body to America with Marine Corp escort. In story book manner, the drama relates the car with which anonymity was made certain...how the selection was made...how an ordinary American, a Chicago orphan, as a sergeant in France was chosen and ordered to walk into a room and place a bouquet of roses on one of four unidentified caskets...how Sergeant Younker placed the bouquet and thus made a selection which he later described as God's choice.

The tomb of the Unknown Soldier is more than a symbol of sentiment. It is an American voice which gives thanks to the glory of God that we as Americans, can and do respect the honor and memory of our departed ones, soldiers and civilians alike.

**Talley's Return From Florida Trip**

Mr. and Mrs. I.E. Talley have returned from an extended trip to Venice, Florida, visiting an aunt and her children. They enjoyed being with nice folks. They have only seen these people twice in 40 years. They saw the Gulf and lots of pretty fishing boats and sailing boats.

The kitchen had 40 gallon cook pots. Bunks were swung from the ceiling with chains. The old ship had been all painted nice and fresh. The symbol of strength and dignity of our U.S.

Then they visited a submarine. It is 311' 8" length and 27' 4". 1525 tons, 72 officers and enlisted men. The torpedo room was interesting to see. Make you to be proud of men who serve our country, so we here at home can enjoy freedom and be safe.

Then they saw the Mitchell AB-25, a medium bomber for ground attacks. This bomber saw extensive service in all theaters of operation in War II. 9,000 were produced. On April 18, 1942, a flight of 16B-25s under Colonel James Doolittle U.S.A. took off from the aircraft carrier U.S.S. for the First American Air raid on Japan. President Roosevelt announced the raids came from Shangri-la. Only two came back. This bomber's speed was 275 miles per hour. Bomb load 4,000 pounds.

The Talleys got all this information from an ex-Navy Captain who served in World War II, but still works wearing Navy clothes and showing the old ships.

Mr. Talley's cousin who went with them on the trip lived his part over. He served in World War II.
