
Eastland's local fund assignment (the amount eh district sends to Austin) has been increased this year from \$78,000 to \$102,000 with prospects of another big increase for the following year, and estimates of upwards of \$63,000 for the next two years.

On the other side of the ledger, based on the new weighted program of revenue of \$90, per ADA, Eastland which has been getting some \$24,000, will now get about \$60,000, so with the increases it'll all pretty well average out.

So the board is taking a "wait and see" approach, holding off tax increases as long as possible, but knowing that in the near future things will decidedly point in that direc-

Realizing that much remodeling and updating is needed at both the Senior and Junior High School plants, the board like most in Eastland, are waiting to see if a sudden influx of enrollment comes and hopes to be ready to move when the time comes.

County **Working On Land Heritage**

AUSTIN - - County Judge Scott Bailey and Texas Historical Commission chairman Mike Collins are working with the Texas Department of Agriculture in registering area farmers and ranchers who qualify for honors in the Family Land Heritage Program for 1975.

program gives recognition to those who have kept land in the family for 100 years or more, maintaining continuous agricultural operations, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White explained.

Last year over 560 families qualified for certificates and inclusion in the Family Land Registry, contains brief histories of all the farms and ranches, the names of current owners, and pictures of early settlers.

"The Texas Department of Agriculture has received many requests for the Registry from universities, historians, and government agencies. It provides an interesting record of agriculture in the early days of Texas, as well as anecdotes about members of the families.

"We also included notations on the 100 - year - old structures on the property, no matter what condition. This information can be invaluable to researchers," White stated.

A peanut disease forecasting program is now underway in Eastland County, reports County Agent, DeMarquis Gordon. The purpose of the program is to help peanut growers decide on the best timing of fungicide applications.

Two Hygrothermagraph are being used to measure and record the temperature and relative humidity in the peanut fields. One set of instruments is located in an irrigated field belonging to Gene Snider. Another set is located in a dry land field owned by D.B. Warren. Both are near Gorman.

Gordon said the development of peanut leaf spot is dependent on periods of high humidity and high temperature. The moisture must be on the leaves for several hours at a given temperature before leaf spot infection can take place. The recorded data from the Hygrothermagraphs will indicate

when a fungicide application is needed.

The instruments will be read every Monday and Thursday mornings. Radio KERC in Eastland will announce the results during the noon hour for the benefit of peanut growers. Local newspapers will also give the information to the growers.

A technician has been hired to maintain the equipment. collect and correlate . data throughout the summer. He will be working in Erath, Coman-

che, and Eastland Counties. This program has the potential for helping peanut produ-cers: (1) avoid cost of materials not needed; (2) improve effectiveness of foliage fungicides by improving timing; (3) improve yields by controlling foliage disease at critical times; and (4) increase awareness of disease occurrence and control recommendations on an area and

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





1975 Peanut Price Support Program

WASHINGTON* -- Provisions of the 1975 peanut program including a minimum national average support level of \$388.50 per ton were announced today by the U.S Department of Agriculture. Teh minumum support level for 1975 crop peanuts represents 75 percent of the peanut parity price of June 1975. The support level for 1974 peanut crop was \$366.00

The 1975 peanut program is essentially the same as the 1974 program in that (1) peanuts found to contain visible Aspergillus flavus mold will be ineligible for support, (2) producers will be required to assume a charge for storage, handling and inspection, and (3) Commodity Credit Corporation's minimum sales policy for diversion sales will be 100 percent of the loan level.

The Agricultural Act for 1949 provides for peanut support at a level between 75 and 90 percent of parity depending on the precentage which the total supply of peanuts is in relation to the normal supply at the beginning of the marketing

The national average support level will be adjusted upward at the beginning of the marketing year, August 1, 1975 if at that time a conbination of the parity price and the supply percentage results in a higher legal minimum support level.

A later announcement will list the support level of 1975 crop peanuts by type and area, as well as premiums and discounts for various types of kernels, foreign material and other

Support will be available through loans ans perchases. Loans to approved grower associations cooperating in making support available to farmers will mature on demand by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

If you are canning this summer, you will want to use the best containers possible. Standard canning jars will be what you want--those with the manufacturer's name in large letters on the side of the jar. You may also find the word MASON, which means the jar had the regular size mouth. The standard canning jar has

been tempered to withstand contrast in temperature. In other words, it does not break as easily as packers jars such as mayonnaise or peanut butter type jars do. Too, the home canning lid and band were made to fit standard canning jars---NOT THE OTHER -TYPES.

If the canning jar has a nick or rough place at the mouth, discard this jar because it will not seal. Check by running your finger around the jar mouth-this is the best way to discover a rough place. Don't overlook the seam in the jar.

Home canners prefer using the flat metal-type lids which have a red or grey sealing compound. This summer there has been a severe shortage of canning jar lids and rings.

The one-piece jar lids should NOT be used in canning. These do not allow the jar to exhaust. As the food is 'cooking' in the canner, steam is generated. If this is not allowed to escape, pressure is built up in the jar and can cause it to break or the lid to buckle. One-piece jar lids are only recommended for jelly.

Standard jar band (rings) should not be rusty or bent. If they are, they will not give a

Lids used on vacuum packed foods such as pickles can't be used in canning. These require special equipment to get the lid on the jar so that it gives an airtight seal.

An Eastland County wildcat drilled 16 miles south of Cisco has been completed as a Marble

Falls lime discovery. It is Rhodes Drilling Co. of Abilene No. 1-B J.F. Cooper spotting 1,560 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of F. Vorn Bauman Survey, A-699.

Daily potential was 24 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water. Flow was through a 12-64 inch choke with pounds casing and 75 pounds tubing pressures.

It is producing from perfora-tions at 2,911-27 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 300 sacks of sand. Operator set the 41/2 inch casing at 3,003 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,021 feet.





COLLEGE STATION What's in store for cattlemen as far as prices are concerned for the remainder of 1975?

"Although there's optimism in some circles due to current stronger market prices and an increase in cattle feeding, it's a little early for cattlemen to begin cheering," contends Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extenion Service. "In fact, producers may be in for another drop in market prices as the year moves along.

So Uvacek advises cattlemen to market or contract calves early and cullold cows as soon as possible.

What are the reasons for Uvacek's gloomy outlook?

First of all, the supply of grain - fed beef should increase during the second half of the year. Fed cattle marketings are expected to be about 9 percent larger during the last six months of 1975 than during the first half of the year.

Increased cow liquidations will also boost the total beef supply. Uvacek expects cow slaughter to increase 42 percent during the last half of 1975 compared to the first six months of the year.
