"JUSTIN WILSON, you was right. there is a Cajun - land." But I'm not sure that Wilson, an oil company safety expert, does his South Louisiana home land justice. It's even more unique, more fascinating than even he, in all his comic dialogues on records and in person, indicates...It's a great place to prowl the American scene, and the people are fun. Former Eastlander Dale Trout, who mimicked Wilson word for word, first introduced us to the Cajun brand of humor. Donald Kinnaird is a devotee, as was Ben McKinnis, John Foster, F.L. Bond and many others. Many can recite the record comedy verbatim...Today, progress (?) has probably changed a lot of the Cajun lore, but not much. There's always the bayous, source of food, recreation and transportation and very much a vital part of the Cajun life...Headquartering at Lafayette on Int. 10 east of Orange and Lake Charles you can circle down to New Iberia, St. Martinsville, Abbeville and see the Cajuns. Yes, crawfish are in abundance and delicious. (As a kid we'd eaten fried "craw-dad" tails, and in school dissected "crayfish", but the Cajuns do tasteful things to the little shrimp-like creatures, raised on farms and taken from the swamp. With the Cajuns, there's always the "bisque". In New Iberia in a little French cafe, we got the recipe for the best tartar sauce you can imagine: chop or blend the following: sweet white onion heads, celery, radishes and bell pepper, and mix with commercial or your own mayonnaise. That's it: delicious). The little Cajun waitress told our kids about her children, in French and that's a language of beauty...The Tabasco Sauce factory at New Iberia is interesting and made us appreciate that food enricher...Moving on down toward the Gulf we found boom town conditions at Morgan City and followed a bayou down to Houma. Enroute, we by chance encountered and had a long visit with a Cajun of first caliber. At Lockport we had occasion to visit at length with a native car salesman, and talk, whew, that man could talk. We'd hit him with questions, any questions, and it was just like turning on a faucet, but it was melodious, and he was proud, proud of his background, his heritage and his Cajun home life. He's the father of 14: seven boys and seven girls; by two wives...And the stories he spun would be material enough for Justin Wilson for years to come.

If you've been exposed to the Wilson humor you know it's not so smooth in spots, but he's fair, and the Cajuns use many and very expressive words, punctuated with exclamations. One in particular they use a lot, when they say it comes out sounding much like what we use for that which falls from the sky: "hail; yes, or no, or I reckon."

### Chamber Manager Attends Texas First Meet

James T. Wright, Manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, attended a Texas First Meeting in Stephenville Thursday. The purpose of the Texas First program is to expand economic development in Texas.

The program includes in its goals the development of 4,000 new, permanent and unsubsidized jobs, and the expansion of 160 businesses and industries. This effort is expected to generate an additional \$277 million annually for Texas economy.

Four State Agencies, Texas Industrial Commission, Texas Education Agency, Texas Employment Commission, and Texas Department of Community Affairs are pooling their expertise to help companies expand wisely. Training tailored to meet the needs of the employer is also available.

The Industrial Commission has been designated prime contact agency, and Texas First headquarters are in Austin.

The Chambers of Commerce throughout Texas have been asked to coordinate local efforts by serving as an information source. It will work with local companies to identify barriers

to their expansion and direct requests for assistance to the State Agencies.

Chamber Manager James Wright urges every local

employer to take advantage of the many facets of this program and bring Eastland some of the profit anticipated through making Texas First.

When the Department first mapped the Park Master Plan in 1972, there were no estimates made for "big ticket items" like renovation of the Firemen's

The city began negotiations with the T&P Railway Co. back in '72 to purchase that land on Park Hill which it did not own, and has only since the first of this year been able to finalize the purchase: so inflation added costs while the land-purchase deal lagged.

Biggest items on the recommended lists are bringing the pool up to standards with a filter system for a cost of some \$38,000; making a bathhouse out of the east rock building at a cost of \$25,500; and making a community center out of the west rock building at a cost of \$36,300. (The P&W suggests removing the wooden second floor).

Anticipated is a program in which the state would pay half of the renovation project and

the city could provide its half "in kind" services, donated work and other means.

Commissioners Mike Siebert has been named chairman for the park development.

James S. Watt, head Local Assistance Branch, stated in his report to the city:

"As you will note, the total allowance is quite a bit higher than originally supplied. This is due in part to construction cost escalation since July of 1972 and more specifically, to the inclusion of a possible allowance for the renovation of the existing Firemen's Hall into a bathhouse and community center (\$61,800).

"The attached cost allowances represent Statewide averages for equivalent type construction. Experience has shown that in several cases specific local costs could vary downward as much as 25%.

What is the home economics newsletter? It contains items of interest to homemakers such as sewing hints, nutrition information along with some recipes, housing hints, etc. The newsletter is mailed once a month.

The Extension Office is receiving many requests for pickle recipes. You might like to try this one:

### SOUR GHERKINS

2 1/2 pounds 2 inch cucumbers  
1/2 cup pickling salt  
2 quarts boiling water  
2 quarts white vinegar  
4 1/2 cups sugar  
1/4 cup mustard seed

1 Tablespoon celery seed  
2 Tablespoons whole all spice  
2 (3 inch) cinnamon sticks  
Wash cucumbers. Dissolve salt in boiling water; add cucumbers. Soak 24 hours; drain. Heat vinegar to boiling; pour over cucumbers; let stand 24 hours. Drain, retaining vinegar. Combine vinegar, sugar, mustard, and celery seeds.

Tie allspice, cloves, and cinnamon in cheese cloth bag; add to mixture. Boil 5 minutes; remove spice bag. Pack pickles in hot sterilized jars. Cover with boiling syrup to within 1/2 inch of top making sure vinegar solution covers cucumbers. Seal each jar at once. Process jars in boiling waterbath 5 minutes. Makes 4 pints. \*Note: Pickling cucumbers that measure less than 2 inches are called gherkins.

To prevent the formation of scum in pressure canners and waterbath containers, place one (1) tablespoon of vinegar in the water. The result--outside of jars will be scum free and canning equipment will be easier to clean after use.

Mineral Exploration Co. of Arlington will drill No. 3 Gage as a proposed 3,100 foot wildcat in Eastland County.

Location is five miles north of Rising Star on a 100 acre lease. Drillsite is 330 feet from the north and 670 feet from the east lines of the southwest quarter of Section 36, Lavaca CSL Survey, A-350.

STEPHENS - C.B. Hazel of Ranger completed No. 3 - A C. Speer Estate in the Little Cedar (Strawn) Frild 13 miles east of Breckenridge.

Location is 450 feet from the south and 1,400 feet from the west lines of the northwest quarter of Section 20, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Daily potential was 151 barrels of 41 gravity oil, flowing through a 24 - 64 inch choke with 600 pounds casing and 134 pounds tubing pressures.

Production is from perforations at 2,906 - 50 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid. It was fractured with 60,000 pounds of sand and 1,000 barrels of water.

Operator set the 4 1/2 - inch casing at 3,045 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 3,050 feet and plugged back to 3,041. Gas - Oil ratio was 750 - 1.

Sigmor Production Co. of San Antonio completed No. 1 John T. Hawley in the Lake Necessity (2,900) Field 11 miles southeast of Breckenridge.

Location is 1,680 feet from the south and 179 feet from the west lines of Section 19, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of 110 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 16 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 2,879 - 94 and 2,902 - 16 feet. The pay was treated with 500 gallons of acid and fractured with 90,000 pounds of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2 - inch casing at 3,006 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 3,050 and plugged back to 3,006.

Two wildcats and three field projects have been announced for Stephens County.

Southwestern Gas Pipeline Inc. of Dallas No. 1 R.L. Greenlee is a planned 4,200 - foot wildcat for the area two miles northwest of ayland.

Drillsite is 467 feet from the north and 867 feet from the east lines of Section 5, BAL Survey. It spots one - half mile

northeast of an oil producer.

Other wildcat is C.B. Hazel of Ranger No. 1 S.L. Harris Estate, slated for 2,000 feet. Location is 12 miles southeast of Breckenridge on a 272 acre lease.

Location is 330 feet from the north and west lines of the southwest quarter of Section 38, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Site is 2,550 feet southeast of oil production.

Same operator staked two locations 13 miles east of Breckenridge in the Little Cedar Field. Both are slated for 3,000 feet and located on a 141 acre lease.

No. 1 - A Swenson Ranch spots 467 feet from the north and east lines of Section 19, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Site for No. 2 - A Swenson Ranch is 1,275 feet from the north and 938 feet from the east lines of Section 19.

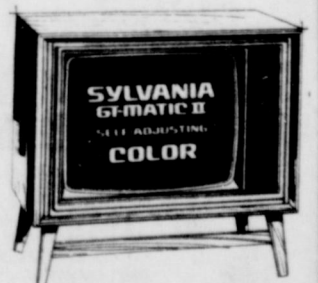

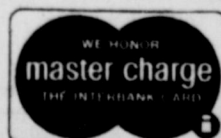

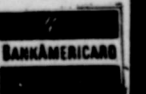

## Democratic National Telethon IV July 26-27

With pre-telethon activities in full swing, Carroll W. Schubert, Texas telethon coordinator, said that Democratic National Telethon IV is expected to be more productive—both financially and politically—than in past years for both state and national parties.

Schubert said because of pre-telethon events in Texas and other states, unofficially more than \$800,000 has been pledged nationally with over \$30,000 coming from Texas.

Before Telethon IV goes on the air, \$1.5 million must be raised in order to pay for air time and production costs.

Approximately 200 ABC affiliates will carry the 20½ hour broadcast on the weekend of July 26-27. In Texas, 15 stations will carry the show beginning at 8 p.m. (CDT) Saturday and ending at 6 p.m. (CDT) Sunday.

The program will originate live from Los Angeles, where Executive Producer Eric Lieber is now in the process of coordinating Telethon IV's production content and guests.

Texas will again have special segments during the telecast featuring Democrats from throughout the state. These special 10 minute portions will originate from the Fairmont Hotel in Dallas and will be broadcast to 15 Texas stations over a special network.

Producer of the portions is Gordon Wynne Jr., of Willis Point, an attorney, State Democratic Executive Committee member and former production coordinator of the Hallmark Hall of Fame. Wynne has served as producer of the Texas portions for the past three years.

This year's theme of "Tune In America" will provide a mix of the top names in entertainment and politics and 1976 presidential aspirants including U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Texas.

The Democratic Party of Texas will receive half the funds raised in Texas in connection with the telethon.

Telethon committees in each of the 50 states will organize 100,000 volunteers for door-to-

door and telephone canvassing and direct mail programs asking the public to watch and contribute.

In Texas, more than 1,000 volunteers will man phone banks in 15 Texas cities to receive pledges. Up to the minute Texas totals will be broadcast during the special Texas segments.

Schubert said pre-telethon activities in Texas were given a real boost recently when National Chairman Robert Strauss and National Treasurer Edward Bennett Williams visited Texas. The two Democratic leaders along with State Chairman Calvin Guest of Bryan held news conferences and attended receptions in Houston, Austin and Dallas to officially kick-off the telethon activities in the state.

More than 96,000 pre-telethon envelopes have been mailed out in Texas to Democratic County Chairmen, SDEC members, DNC members, State Senators and Representatives, Democratic Women's Clubs, Young Democrats Clubs, and other groups and organizations.

Local coordinators in more than 15 Texas cities are busy setting up phone banks, organizing telethon-watching parties, and conducting door-to-door canvassing.

"With all the new laws regarding campaign financing the past three telethons have provided the backbone for state party financing", said Schubert. "Proceeds from last year's telethon went toward state

party office operating expenses, to help with our affirmative action program, and in part to pay for our state convention. This year's proceeds will pay for continuing these programs," added Schubert.

Democratic telethons of past years have proven their ability to raise substantial funds. The first telethon in 1972 grossed \$4 million; 1973 and 1974 grossed \$4.3 and \$5.4 million respectively.

Last year Texas ranked third behind California and New York when more than \$500,000 was pledged in Texas.

Schubert said the telethon concept has demonstrated the Democratic Party's commitment to the reform of political fund-raising procedures; provided a needed and valuable unifying element; and motivated and involved thousands of volunteer workers.

"I expect this year's telethon to follow this tradition of being the most effective and positive activity in our Party's modern history", said Schubert.
