Flag Day Ceremony To Be Held June 14

The Annual Flag Day Ceremony will be held Monday, June 14, at 9:30 a.m. at the Post Office.

Emmett Lasater, Bicentennial Chairman, will be Master of Ceremonies for the celebration of Flag Week beginning June 14. This year flags will fly for 3 weeks in observance of the National Bi-Centennial.

Mr. Lasater will introduce the neighboring bi-centennial chairmen.

Randy Frost and Robert Hallmark, will play the bugle and have a drum roll for the raising of the flag.

Eastland Jaycees will have a display of flags for the occasion.

Chamber of Commerce president, Otis Coleman will give the Welcome speech.

The Flag Raising Ceremony will be conducted by the Color Guard from Dyess Air Force Base.

Boy Scout Troop 103 led by Lee Johnson, will lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

Everyone is asked to bring a flag which they may plant in the flag of flowers in the dedication to patriotism.

This will be the 19th year of continuous celebration.

Colonel Frank J. Apel Jr., will be the guest speaker for the ceremony.

Colonel Frank J. Apel Jr., a native of Chicago, Illinois assumed command of the 96th Bombardment Wing (Heavy), Dyess Air Force Base, Texas on July 2, 1975.

Assigned to Dyess in May 1974, Colonel Apel was the Wing Vice Commander before assuming his present position.

He came to Dyess from U-Tapao Royal Thai Navy Airfield, Thailand, where he served as Vice Commander and later Commander of the 307th Strategic Wing.

Colonel Apel enlisted in the Air Force in 1951 and was commissioned through the Aviation Cadets program in 1953.

He earned his wings at Foster AFB, Texas, in 1953 and subsequently served as a flight instructor at Laredo AFB, Texas.

Colonel Apel served at Dyess from 1957-1961 as a B-47 aircraft commander with the 337th Bombardment Squadron. From Dyess, he was assigned to Clinton-Sherman AFB, Oklahoma, where he performed duty as a B-52 aircraft commander and instructor pilot, and as operations staff officer within the wing staff.

Upon graduation from the Air Command and Staff College in 1967, he was reassigned to the Republic of Vietnam where he flew more than 200 Forward Air Controller missions in O-1 and O-2 aircraft. He also served as an Air Liaison Officer with the 20th Tactical Air Support

Squadron at Quang Tri and Dong Ha Air Bases. His last six months in Vietnam were spent at Tan Son Nhut Air Base, near Saigon, where he served as a staff planner in the Seventh Air Force Tactical Air Control Center.

He graduated from the Air War College, Maxwell AFB, Alabama, in May 1972. He performed duty with the 379th Bombardment Wing, Wurtsen AFB, Michigan as the Deputy Commander for Operations for approximately 8 months and was assigned to U-Tapao in April 1973.

Colonel Apel has a Bachelor of Science degree in Social Science from Troy State University in Alabama.

A Command Pilot with more than 5,000 flying hours, his awards and decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star with 1 Oak Leaf Cluster, Meritorious Service Medal with 1 Oak Leaf Cluster, Air Medal with 7 Oak Leaf Clusters, 2 Air Force Commendation Medals, Air Force Outstanding Unit Award with 4 Oak Leaf Clusters, Vietnam Service Medal, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal, and the Small Arms Expert Marksmanship Ribbon.

Colonel Apel married the former Madeline Geiger of Chicago. They have five children, Emily, 20; Frank III, 18, Charles, 16; Madge, 14; and Kathryn, 12.

Captain John M. LeVrier To Speak To Business Men



The Full Gospel Business Men Fellowship invites you to hear Captain LeVrier of the Houston Police Department speak Saturday night, June 12, 1976, at 7:30 p.m. at the Woman's Club rooms on Plummer Street.

John M. LeVrier captain of police in charge of the accident division, Houston, is subject of the Kathryn Kuhlman book, "Captain LeVrier Believes in Miracles". A deacon in the First Baptist Church, downtown Houston, Captain LeVrier has spoken in more than 700 places, including churches, clubs, civic and prayer groups,

and has appeared on national TV both on the late Kathryn Kuhlman program and the Mike Douglas Show.

In December of 1969 Captain LeVrier learned that he had cancer. Doctors at Houston's M.D. Anderson Hospital administered all of the treatment, including an operation and a total of 58 cobalt treatments. He was originally told that he had about a year to live. He survived until February 1971 but was very weak and had no color, as the cancer had spread to various parts of his body, including the spine.

On February 21, 1971, Captain LeVrier was healed while attending a Kuhlman meeting at the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles. Since then he has not missed a day's work. He mows the yard and is normal in all respects. He has not taken any medicine since February 21, 1971.

Captain LeVrier will also preach at the Full Gospel Church Sunday at 412 N. Bassett.

5 Persons Arrested In Police Raids On 2 Cisco Homes

Five persons were arrested in separate raids on two Cisco homes about 11:45 Saturday night, June 5, after police discovered marijuana plants growing in the back yard of a home, according to officer Zane Welch.

Mario Soto, 19, and a minor, were charged with felony possession of marijuana in one of the cases and Virgil Cox, 18, was also charged with felony possession of marijuana in the second case. Marion Moody, 18, was charged with misdemeanor possession of marijuana and another minor

was charged with burglary after the raids.

The complaints were filed in Justice of the Peace Carlton Holder's court. Holder placed bond at \$1,000 each.

Police found marijuana plants growing as high as three feet in a back yard of a residence and raided two homes, police said.

Taken in the raid were marijuana plants, various paraphernalia, and some food matching descriptions of food taken in a burglary of Lit'l Joe's Drive - In Restaurant some time last week.

Cisco Police Chief Raymond Wigington and six officers conducted the raids, along with L.D. Adams of the Liquor Control Board, deputy Louis Hollywood and Constable S.E. Parkinson.

Bob Bullock Reports \$602.7 Million Collected In Revenues During April

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that the state earned \$602.7 million in revenues during April, the eighth month of fiscal year 1976, while spending \$492 million.

The April totals brought total revenues during the fiscal year to date to \$4.1 billion, the Comptroller said in his monthly financial statement, while year-to-date expenditures climbed to \$4.4 billion.

Bullock noted that his new system of depositing tax receipts directly to the Treasury resulted in a net increase of \$57.4 million in the state's cash position at the end of April.

Revenues during the fiscal year 1976 are running 17 percent ahead of fiscal year 1975, said the Comptroller, while expenditures are about 22 percent higher than fiscal year 1975 expenditures.

He said the motor vehicle sales tax is yielding 25 percent more revenue than during the same period a year ago, while the sales tax is yielding 14 percent more.

Bullock added that state and income from rents, royalties, and sales jumped 102 percent during April over April, 1975, income.
