Bicentennial Recital To Be Given At Rising Star Saturday

"A Bicentennial Recital of American Music" will be presented this Saturday night, June 5, in Rising Star by Mrs. Frank (Kay) Gray, soprano, and James Steel, accompanist. The recital, to begin at 7:30 p.m., will be held in the sanctuary of the First United Methodist Church in Rising Star.

The American musical tribute will begin with a group of sacred songs, by classic sacred composers. A section of Early American Hymn Tunes and a group of Negro Spirituals will be included. Following a brief intermission, Mrs. Gray will sing a group of classic popular

numbers, followed by a section of tunes from the Broadway musicals, including selections from "The Sound of Music", "Fiddler on the Roof", "Oklahoma" and "Carousel". The recital will conclude with a medley of patriotic music, appropriate for the Bicentennial. This medley is entitled "Patriotic Fantasy" by George M. Cohan. Interspersed throughout the program will be narration concerning the music being performed, giving some of its history and importance to American culture. The public is extended a cordial invitation to attend the recital, which is free of charge.

E.L. Graham Hospital County's First To Offer Practical Experience For RN Students

The E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital is to be Eastland County's first hospital to offer practical experience for registered nurse students. Tarleton State University and E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital signed a contract recently whereby Graham Memorial Hospital will offer in-hospital training and experience to students enrolled in the registered nurse program at Tarleton State University. Graham Memorial Hospital was one of five hospitals requested to participate in this program. The other four are Brownwood, Mineral Wells, Weatherford, and Clifton. This distinct honor was extended to Graham Memorial Hospital because of the hospital's fully accredited

status and patient care. Such hospital training can only be offered by law in fully accredited hospitals, including J.C.A.H. approval. Aubrey Allen, Graham Memorial Hospital Administrator, said, "The hospital staff is most delighted at this opportunity, and we look forward to working with these students." The hospital was already serving under similar circumstances with the Licensed Vocational Nurse Program in cooperation with Cisco Junior College. Mr. Allen also reported that he hoped the hospital would be cooperating in a similar program for lab technicians in the near future. CJC is currently looking into a study on such a program to be

offered through their facility. Should such a program become available, and it is believed that such will be the case, area students will then have a wider range of medical professions training available.

Mr. Allen also pointed out that these programs prove that small rural hospitals can and do offer equivalent care as those hospitals of the urban-metropolitan areas. He thanks all the fine citizens who have written letters to their legislative representatives protesting public law 93 - 641. He also added that it would help to forward similar letters to Governor Dolph Briscoe's office requesting his support and endeavor to repeal PL 93 - 641. At the Texas Hospital Association Convention last week, the THA house of delegates passed a resolution requesting repeal or amendment of PL 93 - 641. The Texas Medical Association passed a similar resolution several weeks ago.

The Kitchen Almanac

What foods do people eat that come from cattle? Meat, of course, but also: margarine, chewing gum, marshmallows, candy, ice cream, gelatin desserts and bakery products.

All of these items utilize by-products from cattle - either as an integral part of their composition or in their manufacturing process.

Are you a "breakfast skipper"? Food surveys reveal breakfast skippers seldom make up for the loss of nutrients during the rest of the day. Breakfast should supply from 1/4 to 1/3 of the nutrients needed for the day.

Tips For Safe Bicycle Riding

Nearly one million bike riders sustain serious injury or are killed every year. Most of them did not follow the "Rules of the Road" for safe bike riding.

"Anyone riding a bicycle should know and obey all the same traffic laws as a motorist," says Wayne Lindemann, a traffic safety expert at CNA Insurance. "Parents can do a lot to help their children learn and use safe bike-riding practices." Lindemann comments, "For one thing, children learn from observing... how do you drive your car or your own bike?"

He offers these tips for safe bike riding: • Be sure the bike is in good condition. Many local police departments provide a free bicycle inspection - often coupled with a safety program and riding skills test. • Make certain the bike and its rider can be seen and heard. Reflectors visible from all four sides, a good headlight and a loud bell or horn should be standard on all bikes. At night, the rider should wear light-colored clothing with reflective strips on the arms and legs.

• One of the most dangerous practices is to ride a bike while listening to "earphone" type radios. This prevents the bike rider from hearing both auto and pedestrian traffic. • Tricks and "daredevil" type stunts should be done only by the professionals on bikes that are built specifically for this purpose. A bike can be easily damaged by stunts and result in a serious accident at a later date. • Yield the right-of-way to everyone... including pedestrians. Even though you must obey all traffic laws, a bike is no match for a car, truck or bus. • Contact your local school, police department or bike shop for illustrated brochures explaining the many safety rules pertaining to bikes. "Bicycle riding is popular with all age groups," Lindemann points out, "and everyone who rides a bike, from pre-schoolers to grandparents, should be familiar with the safety rules."

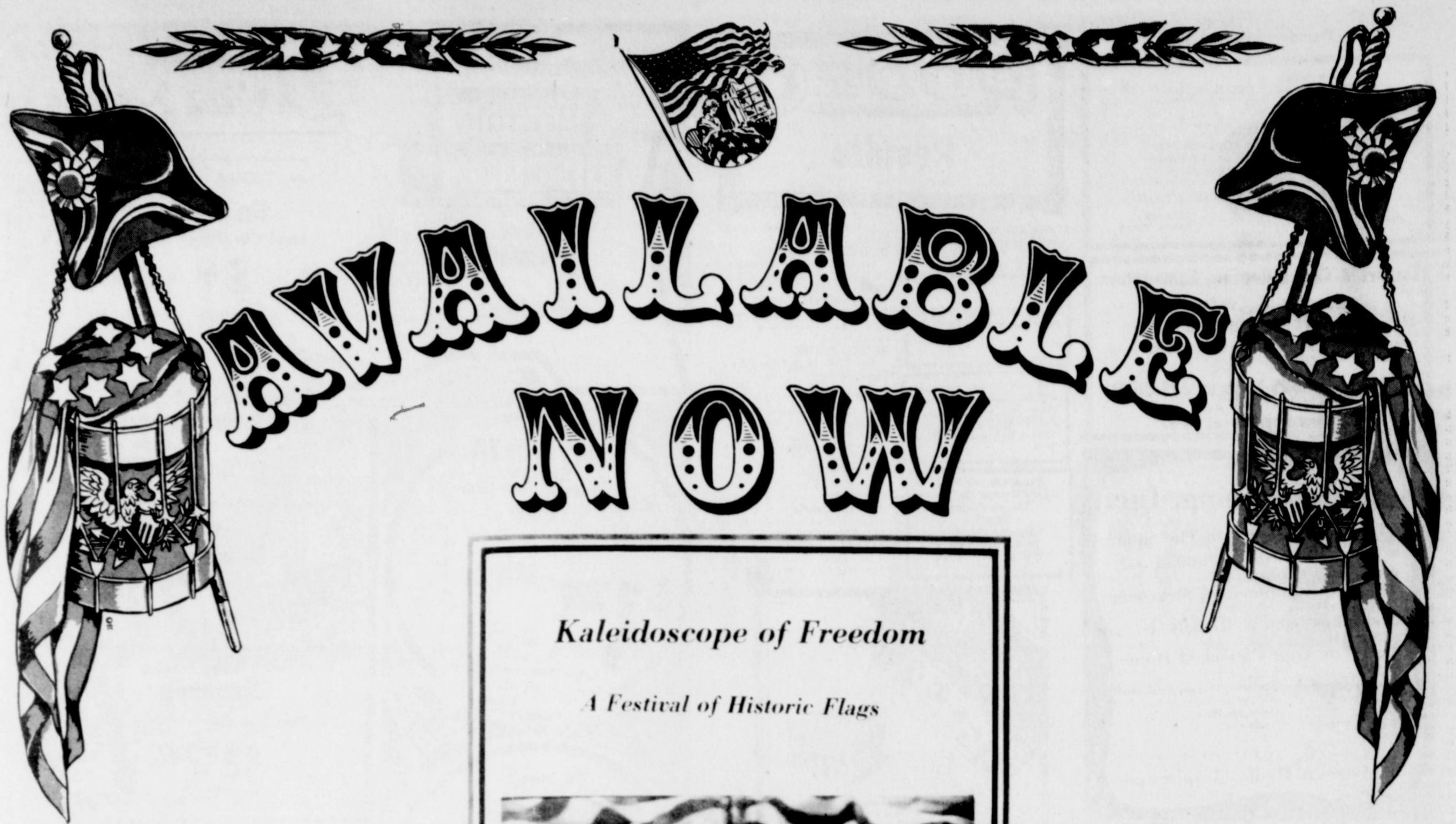

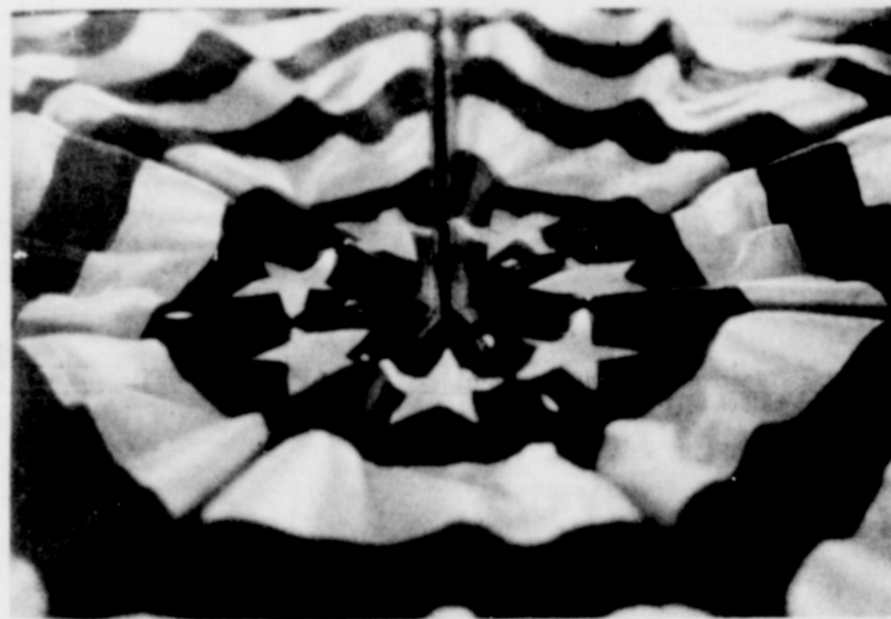

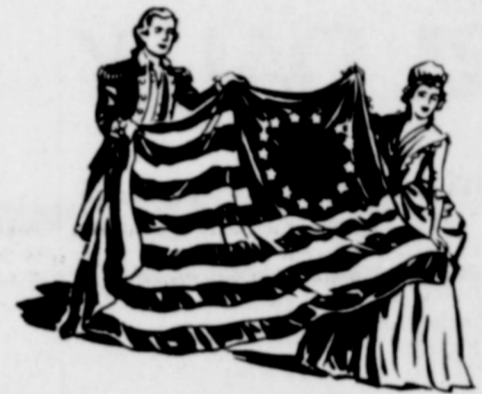


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A Tribute To A Country Doctor And His Wife

Just a note to thank you for your nice letter.

I am for Pioneer history being preserved. My grandparents, who reared me, settled in the Jewel Community just prior to the Kimble's arrival. They remained close friends through life. At that time Cisco was a trading post. My grandfather hauled his cotton overland to Belton for ginning.

So you see I was reared listening to Pioneer stories from my folks, the Kimbles and many others such as the late Clyde Garrett's mother.

As to information you need about Kimble children may I say John's only child John Edward lives in Abilene. He married Sara Beth Greer of Gorman. Her grandparents were banking pioneers here. They have one child.

On the McGlowery side I will give you Mildred's address. She came to see me when John died. She had lived at this address then for several years so I feel sure she still lives there. She is very much like Linnie - very interested in her heritage.

A TRIBUTE TO A COUNTRY DOCTOR AND HIS WIFE
Chronicler Miss Ozella Pulley

Once upon a time there was a young man who played a banjo rather well, and he had three or four friends who likewise played musical instruments. There was a gay, pretty young school teacher planning to have a dance at her home near Eastland. Mary Shelton employed these itinerant musicians led by banjo player Edward Kimble to play at one of her parties. This was a particular success, for from it the friendship of Mary and Edward developed into love and culminated in marriage. But right here I must tell you that Mary always referred to her husband as "Mister Kimble" until she sent him to school and made a doctor of him. Don't let this mislead you, either, for "Doctor", as she henceforth referred to him, was also a person of strong character. He was proud of his father having been a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence and worked hard at living up to this pride. Mary insisted on spending her money

to send him to school, and Doctor insisted on repaying her every penny of it. And so it was that a full fledged young doctor brought his wife, ambition and indebtedness to the Jewel community where she kept house in a log cabin with goods box furniture, and he practiced medicine with his little black bag that he carried on horseback.

Famous is his story of his deadly fear of doctoring his first patient. He said he just simply didn't know what was wrong with the man, but he knew that if he was to be a doctor, he must give the man some medicine. Well, Doctor Kimble gave the man some medicine that couldn't hurt him, and when the patient lived, Doctor said he had all the confidence in the world that HE was a GOOD doctor. So he must have been, too, for soon his patients were numerous.

Some two years later Dr. and Mrs. Kimble moved to what is now the town of Gorman, and soon built a two story frame home on Roberts Street. People came to know and trust Doctor well, and many a night he came home weary only to find a lighted lantern hanging on the horse lot gate. This was a signal for him not to unsaddle his horse, for "Mama", as Doctor always called her, had the name of another patient who needed help immediately. As time went by, the country doctor and his wife became well known and respected citizens in a growing community. Doctor came to be sought as much for his wise counsel as for his pills. He took time to listen to his patients' troubles as if he hadn't another thing in the world to do, and the advice he gave was wise and carefully thought out. Mama, too, gained in stature, for when women "talked", as women do, Mama didn't make inane remarks. When she conversed, her remarks were intelligent and worth paying heed. Mama had become a Christian and no longer approved of gay dance parties, and Doctor was becoming a politician. So Mama helped build the Methodist Church and ruled it, and Doctor built the Democratic Party and ruled it - except for Mama. Their home on Roberts Street was a mecca for local, county, state and national candidates, for any candidate was "made" in this area if Doctor or Mama "backed" him. Doctor would sit for hours studying the good and bad points of a candidate and his platform and would slowly stroke his chin and say, "Now I think", and proceed to exert his influence on his listener. He was an expert at drawing the candidate out on his plans and objectives without ever committing himself. If Doctor's faction lost, it was to an opposing faction ruled by Mama, for probably the only times Mama and Doctor ever agreed on a candidate was when Doctor was nominated for Mayor. Doctor served as Mayor for 12 or more years, and the only time Mama may have voted against him was after he made her pay a fine when the constable issued her a ticket for illegal driving. This hurt Mama most because she was generous with her money only to the church. It's hard to believe, too, for only a short time had elapsed since Mama had flatly refused to ride in one of "those things". Well do I remember the first car

Doctor bought; an Overland, it was, and brand new. On Sunday morning it was a familiar sight to see Doctor and son, John, ride slowly through the main thoroughfare to the church, while Mama walked. The occasion of her first ride was a trip to Wichita Falls to visit their married daughter, Linnie. Doctor and John were going. Mama was fully convinced they'd never return alive, and she wanted to be with them. She prepared herself by having her lawyer draw her will and put her affairs in order. Little did she think then that in the years to come she would be driving all over town in her own car.

People who knew this couple will always remember the dry wit and humor of the Doctor and the stern propriety of his wife. Once a year Mama was not seated in her front row pew, for Doctor had put her on the train bound for whatever town in which the Methodist Conference was convening. Doctor always rushed from the depot straight down the street to his drug store and right to the cigar counter. For the duration of the conference he puffed smoke like a locomotive, and since there was no danger of Mama catching him, he could actually lean back and enjoy a cup of coffee. If conference just happened to be at a time when a tent show was playing town, Doctor felt doubly blest, for this, too, was a forbidden joy.

Doctor usually seemed to agree with Mama on what was sinful, but sometimes he just wouldn't take the word of someone else. For days after one of his business trips to the city, he told a select group of his trip to a burlesque theater. He advised that it would probably be just as well not to mention that part of his excursion to Mama, for she certainly did not approve of such worldly places. Of course, now, he realized the sinful nature of such places, too, and he ought to know, for he saw the show through to the very end.

Of course Doctor was fair in judgment when he helped Mama pick a Methodist preacher, for they DID pick the preachers. Only once can any Methodist remember ever having a preacher who smoked or went to the picture show. Mama just didn't know this until it was too late, and when she called him onto her parlor carpet, he was perhaps the only man, except for Doctor, ever to stand up against the wishes of Mama. Later it was obvious that Doctor and Mama had more regard for this preacher than perhaps any other Mama had ever picked.

Doctor and Mama celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary with open house. The same home on Roberts Street they had built so many years earlier was cleaned and polished with care for this occasion. The dining table was spread with the lace tablecloth Mama made and won first place with at the St. Louis World's Fair and the Texas State Fair. Her best set of silver, the one she had had made from the silver dollars her father hid from the Yankees during the Civil War, was polished gleaming bright. A beautiful old home reflecting the dignity and character of Doctor and Mama, and it was filled with people from all over the state who had come to pay their sincere respects to a country doctor and his wife. The old home must have seen times of trials and troubles, for they came to all, but if this fine old couple had had troubles, none ever heard of them. Their marriage is a pattern toward which all young lovers strive. The unbounded love and regard they had attained for each other through the years was so very obvious, yet theirs was a marriage unique, indeed, for each had retained his individualism and independence.

Doctor's political influence will evidently be obvious for many years yet, for although he has been gone several years now, people still consider "what would Doctor do" before they cast their votes. Quite a few go even farther - they ask Mama "what would Doctor do?", for during the summer she still is physically able to hold sway over the community from her home on Roberts Street.

During the summer, too, "Amazing Grace" is sure to be the featured song at the Sunday morning service at the Methodist Church, for it's Mama's favorite, and Sunday morning still always finds her seated in her front row pew.

EPILOGUE: December 20, 1959

And then the bell tolled. It was the only time anyone can remember the bell in the First Methodist Church tower being tolled. It is customarily rung on Sunday to remind residents of church time - a comforting, peaceful sound in this modern world of noise, of hurry, and of tension. Today, Sunday morning, December 20, 1959, the bell tolled. Mama was dead. And the sound of the bell was of hope; of reassurance; indeed, of "Amazing Grace". Today the Lord surely heard the bell toll.

HD News

"Versatile" is the word for milk - and since June is Dairy Month, this is a good time to check the family's milk drinking habits.

Adults and children under nine years of age need two eight-ounce servings each day. Children aged 9 to 12 and pregnant mothers over 19 need three or more servings a day, while teenagers and nursing mothers require four or more servings daily. How do you rate?

Milk is an excellent source of calcium to help form bones and teeth and keep them strong. It's hard to get enough calcium in the diet without consuming milk in some form daily.

The protein in milk builds and repairs body tissues, helps the body fight infection and supplies energy. Milk is also rich in riboflavin, a B-vitamin that helps keep skin healthy and vision clear.

To give family members their recommended amount of milk each day, serve it as a beverage, in products made with milk such as ice cream and cheese or use milk in preparing main dishes, soup, sauces and pudding.

Do you have a surplus of green beans or can you buy them at a reasonably low cost? Try canning them so that you can have summer goodness in the middle of winter.

You haven't canned green beans before? Here is how.

Prepare the beans just as you would for cooking - by snapping or cutting them into 1 or 2 inch pieces - or you might leave them whole. Pack them tightly into clean jars to 1/2 inch of the top of the jars with boiling water leaving 1/2 inch space at the top of the jar. If salt is desired, add 1/2 teaspoon canning salt for a pint and one teaspoon for a quart. Wipe off the sealing surface of the jars and close according to the type of lid being used, following the manufacturer's directions.

Place the closed jars of hot beans in a pressure canner, which has 1 1/2 to 2 inches of boiling water and a rack to hold the jars off the bottom of the cooker.

Place the lid on the canner and fasten securely. If the lid has clamps, tighten opposite clamps moderately at first. Then go back over the whole set to tighten each pair as much as possible, with your fingers only.

Leave the petcock open until the steam escapes steadily for 10 minutes so that no air is left in the cooker then close the petcock. If air is left in it causes a vacuum and draws the liquid off the beans.

Count the processing time as soon as the pressure reaches 10 pounds. Keep a uniform pressure by adjusting the heat or by moving the canner carefully.

Process the snap beans 20 minutes for pints and 25 minutes for quarts.

At the end of the processing time, remove the canner from the heat.

Allow the canner to cool until the gauge registers zero. Open the petcock gradually and remove the cover. Leave the beans in the canner about five minutes. Take them out of the canner and place them right side up on a rack far enough apart to cool quickly. Do not place them in a draft or on a cold surface to prevent them from breaking.

Remember - no better beans will come out of the jars than went into them, so be sure to use good quality beans. If you do this and follow the directions carefully, you will come out with beans that are olive green in color and have the flavor of freshly cooked green beans.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - REMEMBER MEHITABEL, the fun-loving cat who claimed to be Cleopatra in an earlier existence.

IT SEEMS MEHITABEL WAS PERPETUALLY PRODUCING KITTENS which were promptly forgotten about. An inquiry made as to the well-being of her offspring was met by blank stares of innocence, "what kittens?"

LIKE MEHITABEL, THE CONGRESS HAS FOR YEARS been happily producing programs - health programs, education programs, energy, environmental, transportation, welfare of one kind or another - all sizes, shapes and prices.

THESE TRENDS CAME OUT OF A TIME when the horn of plenty seemed inexhaustible. Like Mehitabel, the Congress never checked very far into the success or well-being of its progeny. Each new program is sent into the world to fend for itself and grow willy-nilly. During the last dozen years the number of Federal domestic programs multiplied from 50 to nearly 1,000. The Federal budget climbed from \$158.2 billion in 1967 to an estimated \$113 billion for the coming fiscal year of 1977.

IT IS BEING RECOGNIZED THAT THE GOOD OLD DAYS ARE OVER. Vietnam, inflation and recession and all these programs have gotten the Federal budget all out of shape. There is no longer money in the Treasury to feed all the ambitions of a Congress bent on taking care of everybody and everything.

NOW THERE ARE MOVES TO LOOK INTO EVERY PROGRAM to see what they are accomplishing, rather than to continue to pour money on failures to try to make them work. Proposals are in motion to look into this vast bureaucracy; to look at performances and to try to evaluate what is being ac-

complished under them. All programs would be reviewed every three years and automatically abolished unless specifically re-authorized by the Congress. All expenditures would be brought under budgetary controls with a limit on how much could be spent. This would force the Executive Branch and the Congress to examine the total Federal effort and when an evaluation is made, the Government would apply what is called "zero-based budgeting" which is a fancy way of saying the program managers would be required to explain what would happen if no funds were provided for its continuation.

THIS LEGISLATION HAS BEEN DUBBED "sunset" meaning at end unless found justified for continuance - a concept which has the prospect of catching on across the Country.

SOME STATES ARE ALREADY IN THE PROCESS of looking at their regulatory boards and commissions for the same purpose. If they make it work it should be a pretty good signal to Washington that it better work here before this Country goes totally broke. By this it is meant, before the Nation's credit runs out.

FEDERAL AGENCIES HAVE NEVER BEEN REQUIRED TO JUSTIFY their existence and they never will unless forced to do so. When this effort is seriously underway, special interest groups with a stake in their existence will descend upon Congress to plead their cause.

One needs only to look at the protest presently underway in opposition to efforts to cut down on the food stamp program. Suits have been filed in the Courts to prohibit reforms and we will see whether the Courts will run the Country or if needed changes can be effected in this particular area.

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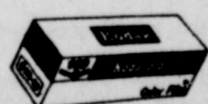
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Nancy Lee Williams And Daniel Lee Cook Wed In Garden Ceremony In Colorado

French colonists in Louisiana began experiments in growing sugarcane as early as 1725, but the industry was not permanently established on a commercial basis until a few years before Louisiana's transfer to the United States.
