At the Eastland Public Library, adult readers read 144 books in the month of May while the teens and juniors read 244 books during the same month.

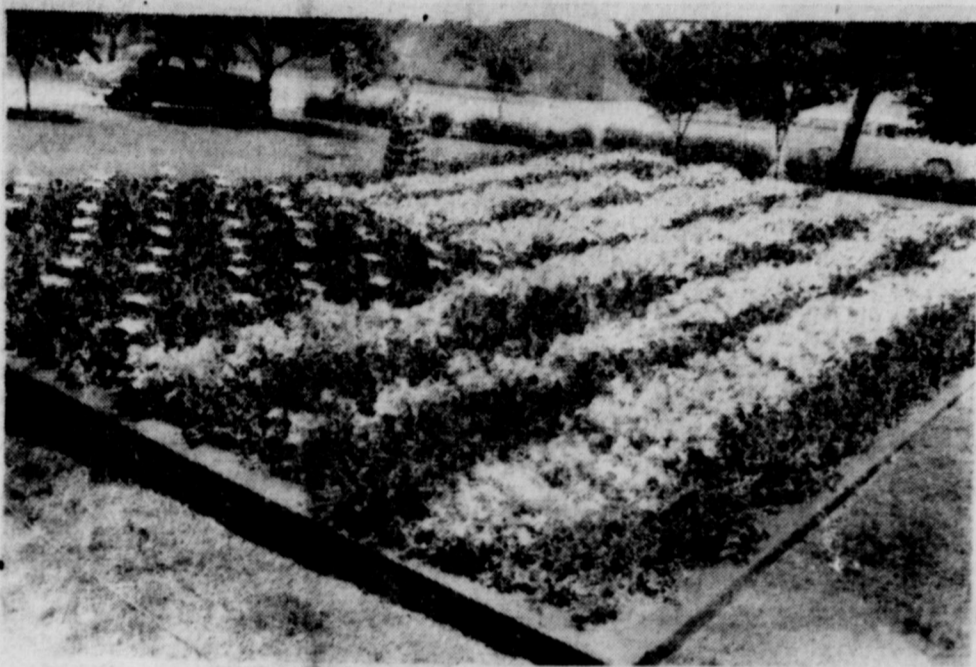

## Flag Day Celebration Set Here Thursday

An address by J. R. Martin, regional comptroller of the Post Office Department at Dallas, and a flag ceremony will be the highlights of a special Flag Day program Thursday, June 14, in Eastland.

Plans for the event were announced last week by Mrs. Marene Johnson Johnson, Eastland postmaster. A program will be held at 10 a. m. on the lawn beside the post office in view of the huge flag of flowers that has become a considerable tourist attraction for Eastland.

The program at the post office will include the presentation by Dean Johnson of Abilene, district office manager for Congressman Omar Burleson, of a U. S. Flag that has flown over the Capitol

building in Washington to Mrs. Johnson for the Eastland Post Office flagpole.

Representatives of the four branches of the Armed Forces — the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps — will be on hand at the post office for a special military ceremony that will emphasize the Flag Day theme.

Mr. Martin's address, which will be patriotic in nature, will be the highlight of a management-personnel program at a noon luncheon Thursday at Lone Cedar Country Club. Postmasters from throughout this region have been invited to attend along with civic leaders.

Mrs. Johnson, who was in charge of planning the program, invited the public to attend.

## District 17 Rally Day Is Set For Thurs.

Baptists from all over District 17 are expected to attend the Rally Day Program Thursday at the Lueders Camp Grounds. This day's program will open the summer camps to be held at Lueders Encampment throughout the summer.

This 39th annual session will open with registration at 2 p. m. The day's activities have been arranged to include the entire family. Swimming and recreation are scheduled from 2 to 4:45 p. m.

## No Fatalities Are Repted For Entire Year

For the fifth consecutive month, no fatal accidents were reported resulting from traffic accidents on Eastland County highways.

During the month of May, a total of 14 accidents occurred with seven personal injury accidents and seven property damage accidents.

Property damage for the month amounted to \$19,625.00. Cumulative totals for 1962 in Eastland County include 21 personal damage accidents; 32 property damage accidents; 32 persons injured and \$42,480.00 in property damage.

## Oil Tank Is Mysteriously Exploded

A 100 barrel oil tank exploded Monday evening on the Mathews lease, three miles south of Eastland on the former Jake Lyerla Place, with no known explanation for the explosion, according to Wiley Harbin, pumper on the lease for the past seven years.

Harbin stated that the tank, which contained 14 inches of oil, swelled up to the shape of a football before blowing up from the inside. A 100 barrel tank of oil next to the explosion was unharmed. The storage tanks are connected to the Premier Pipe Line Company and are situated on the lease owned by Marvin Bridges of Hail Center and Charlie Saigling of Plainview.

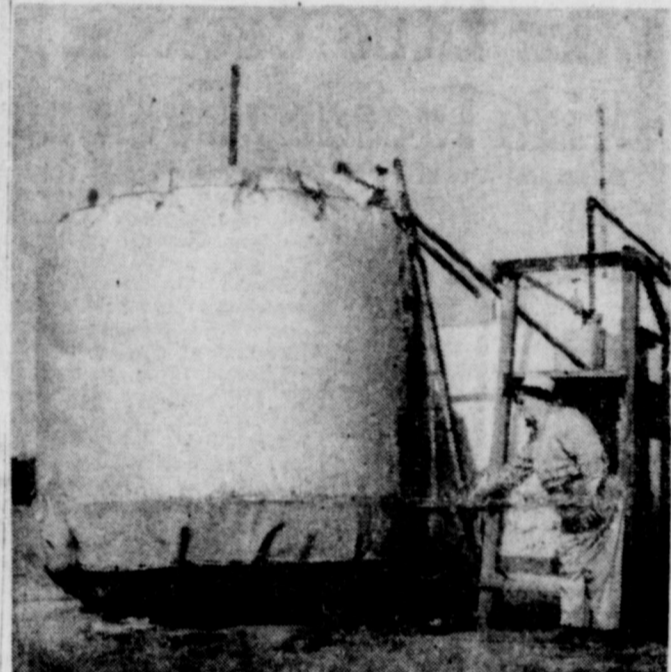
An estimated \$500 damage was suffered on the tank, which was a total loss. All connections were severed in the unusual and unprecedented explosion, according to Harbin.

The pumper stated that possible explanations for the explosion could be attributed to lightning or to a spontaneous combustible inside the tank. He added that since the time of the explosion is unknown, it is impossible to blame the lightning which occurred in Monday night's thunder storm.

Glass, who will succeed Jimmy Hughes, was graduated from Vernon High School in 1955 where he was active in the athletic program lettering in football and selected on the all district team as well as being selected outstanding lineman of the year in Vernon. He graduated from Abilene Christian College in 1959 where he lettered three years as a guard on the Wildcat football team.

He has been at the Dublin High School for the past three years where he served as assistant coach two years and a head coach for the past year. He and his wife have two daughters, Lee Ann, 3, and

Marca Gay who is one year old.

The Glass family are making plans to move to Eastland as soon as housing accommodations can be arranged.

An assistant coach is yet to be named the selection being left to the head coach.

## Science Trip Sponsored By Texas Electric

Eastland and Olden high schools are being represented this weekend at the second Texas Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas, F. N. Sayre, District Manager of Texas Electric Service Company, announced.

Attending the four-day session that starts today in Austin will be Eddie Dry, a science student, and C. P. Marshall, Eastland High School Principal, and Rodney Patton, student, and Wayne Brock, teacher at Olden High School. They will be guests of Texas Electric Company while attending the meeting.

The symposium is being jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. The Foundation is made up of 11 investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas, including Texas Electric.

Some 400 selected high school science students and teachers will attend the sessions on the University campus, at which some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists will speak.

The Foundation, which is co-sponsoring with the General Dynamics Corporation, is the world's largest privately-financed research effort in the field of controlled nuclear fusion, is also seeking, through its sponsorship of science symposiums, to contribute to scientific education and understanding in Texas, Sayre pointed out.

He said that the meetings sponsored by the Foundation seek to bring to Texas high school science students and teachers lectures on nuclear physics and nuclear fusion research by outstanding scientists, and to provide the students with an opportunity to obtain answers to their questions on scientific careers and college curricula.

Speakers at this year's symposium in Austin will include three General Atomic scientists from San Diego, Calif., Dr. D. W. Kerst, project leader on the controlled nuclear fusion research program; Dr. P. H. Miller Jr., assistant director and Dr. Theodore B. Taylor, technical associate director of the Orion project for nuclear propulsion in space and senior research advisor at General Atomic.

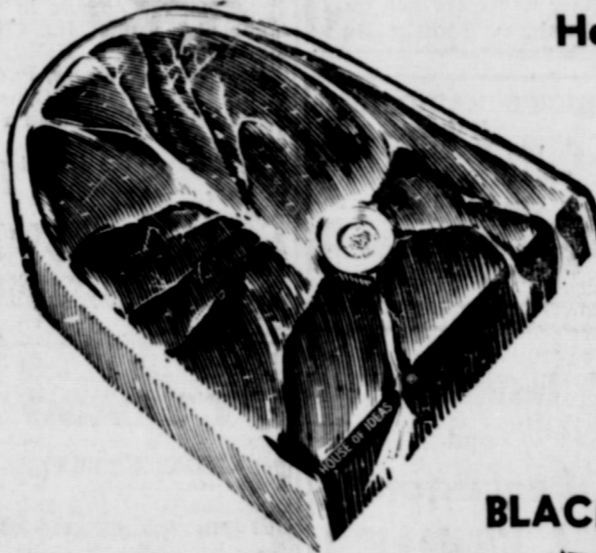

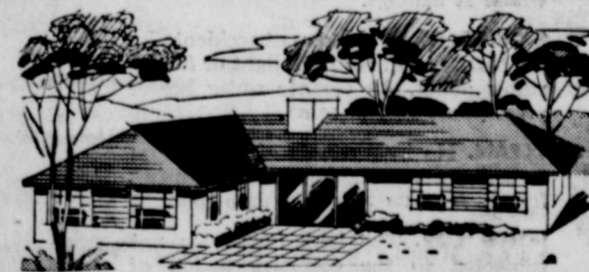

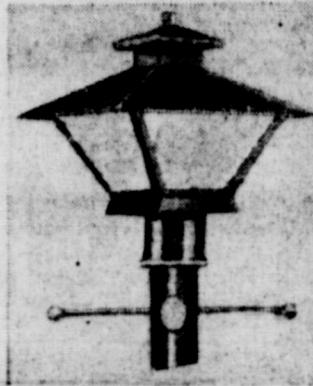
