## Eastland Observes Flag Day With Ceremony, Luncheon

The citizens of Eastland, joined by the military services, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, citizens of surrounding towns and a number of out of county visitors, observed Flag Day on Thursday, June 14, with ceremonies at the Eastland Post Office and a luncheon at the Lone Cedar Country Club on Lake Leon.

The dual program was spearheaded by Eastland Postmaster Marene Johnson, originator of the Flag of Flowers on the Eastland Post Office lawn, which has been featured in Flag Day festivities this year.

The Hon. James R. Martin, Regional Controller, Post Office Department of Dallas, addressed audiences at the morning and noon ceremonies, stating that "we in the postal service are proud that the American Flag marks the place where we work, and we are especially proud of the splendid job that Mrs. Johnson and the Eastland postal employees have done in developing this floral replica of the flag. This is not a flower arrangement. It is a glowing, growing tribute to America... done as a result of the sincere patriotism and Americanism of these fine people."

Martin added: "This is not a postal celebration. This is a day which every American should celebrate, because the American Flag stands for all that we hold dear — our past, our present, and our future."

Martin closed by reading an ode to the flag by Charles C. Crellin, excerpts of which follow:

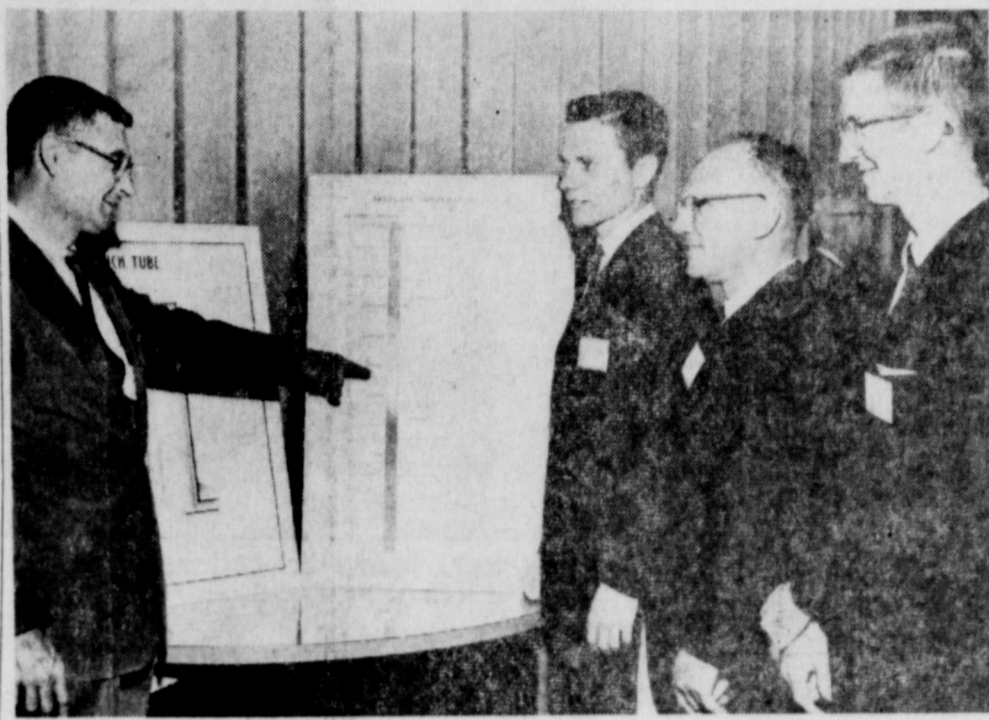
"Stars of the early dawning, set in a field of blue;  
"Stripes of the sunrise, splendor, crimson and white of hue;  
"Given for God and freedom, sacred, indeed the trust  
"Left by the countless thousands returned to the silent dust.  
"Flag of a mighty nation

"Kissed by the sun of heaven, carried by the winds of the world."

Martin's speech was preceded by the appearance of the Color Guard, including representatives from the Eastland Explorer Scouts, six military representatives, and one civilian, who presented nine flags, including the six that have flown over Texas.

## Scientific Frontier Is Discussed At Symposium

A scientific frontier as vast and challenging as space itself was described in Austin this week to some 400 selected high school science students and teachers from over the state who attended the second Texas Nuclear Science Symposium.

Among those attending were Eddie Dry, EHS science student; Charles Marshall, EHS principal; Wayne Brock, science instructor at Olden High School; and Rodney Pattor,

Olden High School student. The three-day symposium ended at noon Wednesday after a series of talks and discussions by outstanding state and national nuclear scientists. It was sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas.

The Foundation, which is composed of 11 investor-owned electric utility companies, including Texas Electric Ser-

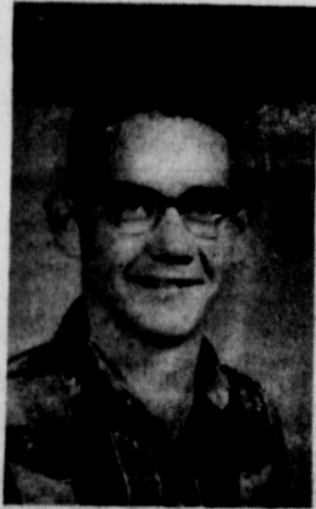

## Meazell To Get First Lone Star Farmer Degree

Danny Meazell, senior student at Olden High School, will be awarded the Lone Star Farmer Degree for his work in Future Farmers of America, as the first member of the Olden FFA Chapter to receive the degree. He will be honored at the FFA state convention to be held in Fort Worth on July 18 through 20, according to a report here.

Danny is the seventeen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Casey Meazell of Olden.

Danny, his vocational agriculture teacher, Gib Copeland, and one other Olden boy not yet named will attend the Fort Worth state convention.

The Lone Farmer Degree, highest award presented to an FFA worker, is being given to Danny following four years of FFA projects, including showing livestock at the county show for the past three years.

Danny's projects include breeding beef cows, feeder steers, and shetland brood mares. He has served as chairman of the chapter conducting team, on the father-son banquet committee, and on the Sears Foundation committee.

## Fire Damages Ranger Peanut Company Friday

T. C. Wylie, owner of Ranger Peanut Company, has estimated damages at \$7,500 as the result of a fire in a hull storage building early Friday morning. He said that losses were partially covered by insurance. The building is located at 440 Melvin St. Reno.

The fire was discovered at 1 a.m. Friday by a passing motorist. Ranger Volunteer Firemen fought the blaze until 5:30 a.m. before bringing it under control.

The 50 by 140 foot sheet-iron building is located next to the mill building. Wylie said that approximately 900 tons of hulls were stored in the building.

There was no damage to the mill building and over \$10,000 worth of seed peanuts stored in the building, Wylie said. He said that business would continue as usual.

No immediate cause of the fire has been discovered, Wylie said, but firemen discovered that the back door of the building was open when they arrived.

## Don Pierson Enjoys Cruise Aboard Aircraft Carrier

A four-day cruise aboard one of the U. S. Navy's mighty aircraft carriers was enjoyed recently by Don Pierson, prominent Eastland resident. He was one of seven guests of the Secretary of the Navy for the June 4-7 cruise aboard the attack carrier USS Forrestal (CVA 59), in the Atlantic off Norfolk, Va.

Mr. Pierson, head of Don Pierson Investment Co. of Eastland, was invited on the guest cruise by Rear Admiral F. B. Warder of New Orleans. Purpose of the cruise program is to give prominent civilian businessmen a first hand opportunity to see the Navy and the work it is doing and to familiarize representative civilians from throughout the country with the defense of the United States and the keeping of peace.

The USS Forrestal, a 78,000 ton superstructure 25 stories high, is a post-war built aircraft carrier for jet bombers and fighters which cruises primarily in the Mediterranean Sea off the coast of Africa. During the guest cruise, the ship sailed from the Naval Operating Base at Norfolk, Va. into the Atlantic as part of the Sixth Fleet on a CarQual (Carrier Qualification) run for the benefit of new pilots practicing landings on the carriers.

Engines on board the Forrestal are rated at 280,000 total horsepower to accommodate jets which land at 150 mph. The jets must land within a 400 feet space, catching their hooks in the ship net, according to Mr. Pierson, who was a sergeant in the U. S. Air Force in World War II. He stated that he had never been on board a ship before, and added that he thoroughly

enjoyed the trip, experiencing no seasickness in the rough water.

Planes land on a hanger deck large enough for several football games, said Mr. Pierson, and the deck is often set up for volleyball, baseball and other games, at the same time, for the recreation of men on board.

Mr. Pierson noted the tremendous radar defensive system on the ship plus the television system. The latter is built into the deck to provide complete sight of all landing planes.

The Forrestal is one of the few Navy carriers with its own TV station, according to Mr. Pierson. Station WFOR

TV films regular first-run movies which are broadcast within the ship and to other ships which often anchor within a five mile radius of the Forrestal. Mr. Pierson added that the ship occasionally such as a change of command ceremony, which occurred during his stay when Captain L. R. Geis, USN, relieved Captain D. M. White, USN as Commanding Officer of the Forrestal, Flag Ship of Rear Admiral R. D. Hogle, Commander, Carrier Division Four.

Mr. Pierson observed the day and night air operations of the 4,000-man carrier and was given guided tours of the

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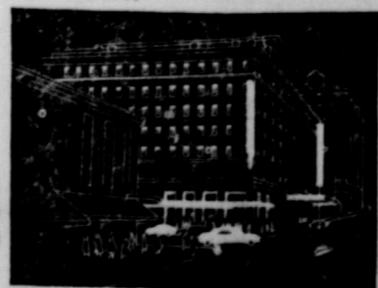

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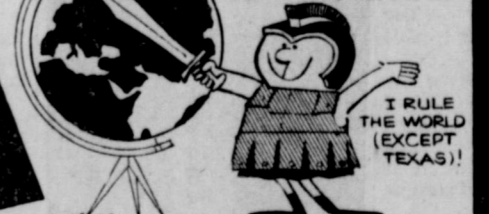

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cedings to prepare them for active duty on board the larger ship.

Mr. Pierson reported that the fleet underwent fog, cool weather and rough water and although the destroyers heaved and moved in the waves, the size of the Forrestal presented any difference in sailing. He stated that the entire ship was air-conditioned, including the engine room, which maintained 120 degree temperature in spite of the conditioner, in contrast with the coolness of the rest of the ship.

He added that one of the interesting facts about the carrier was that it was built entirely in triplicates with three

of every part of the ship, including engine rooms, records, and decks. With this plan, two thirds of the ship could be totally destroyed and the ship would still be in operating condition, because of the seven hulls with water proof doors that may be closed. A torpedo could come completely through any part of the ship without hindering operations.

Interesting things Mr. Pierson reported included a huge gray-blue whale, blowing water through its spout; three sharks; the atomic powered submarine, Polaris, at Norfolk; and a four-story high escalator on board the Forrestal. He said that the escalator was not for the convenience of passengers but for pilots, dressed in the heavy flying gear, who previously had to climb four stories to the deck. Mr. Pierson said that the twenty-five stories of practically straight up and down stairs were probably the cause of the small waists of all men on board the ship.

About his cruise, Mr. Pierson had this to say: "I wish every person could see the extensive measures — things we never heard of — that have gone into our Navy's carriers. It certainly gives you a feeling of comfort and security, and it is easy to understand why Russia hates our carriers."

Another "first" for Mr. Pierson for the trip was a jet airplane ride. He flew by jet from Norfolk to Dallas en route home.

(Continued from page one) vice Co., is engaged with the General Atomic division of General Dynamics in the world's largest privately-financed research effort in the field of controlled nuclear fusion.

Dr. D. W. Kerst of San Diego, Calif., project leader of the research program on controlled thermonuclear reactions at General Atomic, reported on a promising new approach in the effort to tame the hydrogen bomb for peaceful purposes.

Regularly scheduled trips carrying passengers to the moon by 1980 were forecast by Dr. Theodore B. Taylor, senior research advisor at General Atomic. Mars, according to Taylor, will have been thoroughly explored by 1980 and landing parties will have explored the satellites of Jupiter and Saturn.

He told his primarily teenaged audience that by the time they are 25 years old, in 1970, manned orbital space stations would be permanently occupied and crew rotation would be routine. Men will have landed on the moon, he said, and the site of a permanently manned lunar base will have been dedicated.

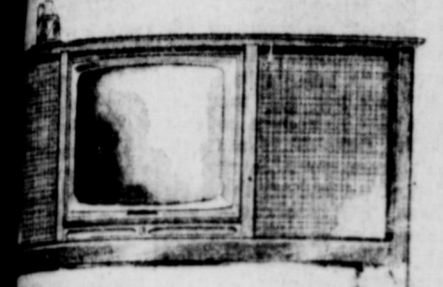

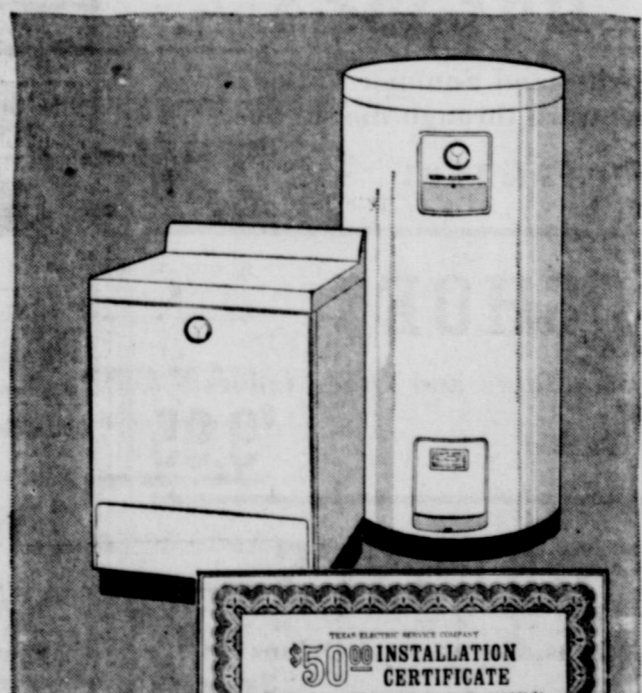

Building Problem Facing School System at Cisco

The board of trustees of the Cisco Public Schools is faced with a building problem of structural failure in its largest three-story high school building, according to information here.

Supt. T. M. Roach said that the board called in three different engineering firms that inspected the high school. They declared part of the building unsafe for occupation due to the collapse of a supporting concrete pier under the building and to separation of the brick walls from the building framework.

Representatives of the school planning division of the Texas Education Agency, including an architect, will be in Cisco this week to inspect the buildings and to confer with school officials, Mr. Roach said. Services of this agency are free to schools, he added.

Mr. Roach said the board is proceeding on the basis that the substantial repairs to the high school are economically unfeasible, as pointed out by all three engineering reports. The building was erected in the 1920s.
