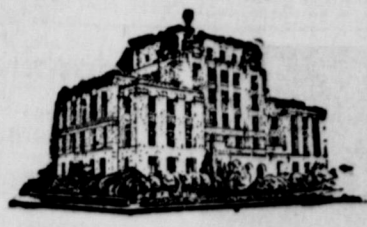

## Flag Day Celebration To Begin at 10 a.m.

Mayor Virgil Seaberry will give the welcome address and the introductions at the Flag Day Celebration set for 10 a.m. this morning on the Post Office lawn.

Dean Johnson of Abilene will present a flag which has flown over the capitol building followed by a color guard.

The six flags of Texas will

be presented by the following Explorer Scouts: Larry Goldston, Mike Siebert, Jim Wright, Ray Edwards, Larry Early and Bill Horn.

The Flag Day theme will be emphasized in a program in which all four branches of the Armed Forces will participate.

Mr. Walter Clement, the Village Blacksmith of Cisco, will present a program of reading and poetry at the noon luncheon scheduled for the Lone Cedar Country Club. Guest speaker for the luncheon will be J. R. Martin, regional controller. Subject of his talk will be "Management-Personnel Problems." Bill Crocker, Jaycee president, will give the welcome followed by introductions by Cyrus Frost.

Postmasters from throughout this area have been invited to attend along with civic leaders.

Mrs. Art Johnson, local Postmaster, is in charge of planning for the affair.

## Lions Invited To Flag Day Celebration and Luncheon

Eastland Lions Club members were invited and urged to attend Flag Day ceremonies and luncheon to be conducted on Thursday, June 14 (today) during the Lion meeting held at noon Tuesday at the White Elephant Restaurant.

Eastland Postmistress Marlene J. Johnson appeared at the meeting and issued an invitation for all to attend the Flag Day celebration at 10 a.m. Thursday, June 14, at the Eastland Post Office, followed by a Flag Day luncheon at the Lone Cedar Country Club at 12 noon.

Mrs. Johnson stated that the

regional controller from Dallas would speak at the luncheon on problems that Eastland encountered. She stated, "Every person's problem is our problem," and the controller will definitely be of benefit to your protection.

The well-known postmistress added that a number of out of county people will attend the celebration and luncheon in what is a successful effort to bring attention to this city. She said that, "We have an interest in Eastland's patriotism... Tomorrow is the day when your little ones will grow up and be patriotic or not be patriotic; meet their challenges or not meet their challenges."

She added that the flag of flowers growing on the post office lawn had meant a great deal to Eastland in terms of patriotism and publicity. She urged the Lions and other Eastlanders to do something about bringing other people and industries to their city by being present at the Thursday ceremony and luncheon.

Lion President Bill Walters recognized long-time Lion H. R. (Pop) Garrett as recently being elected 1st vice-president of Lions International Councils Association of the State of Texas. Mr. Garrett attended the District State Convention which was recently held.

Also recognized was Lion Glyn Gilliam who was named zone chairman of the Governor's cabinet and James McCracken of Cisco, also named to the Governor's cabinet.

Mr. Garrett stated that Eastland was a member of a fine district, and the Lions were always ready to help anywhere they could.

The club made and seconded a motion to contribute as a body to the Homer Latham Fund by sending personal and club contributions to the Eastland Telegram.

It was stated that Lions' Club officers and sweetheart had been elected and would be announced at a late date, with installation ceremonies to be held Tuesday, June 26, preceding assumption of offices on July 1.

## Bonds Set at \$15,000 For 3 Men, Woman At Eastland

Three men and a woman were being held in the Eastland County jail early Wednesday under bonds totaling \$15,000 each after charges of armed robbery, assault with attempt to murder, and theft of an automobile had been filed against them, according to a report by Sheriff Lee Horn.

The men were Tommy Davis, James Stine and James Oliver, all 25 years of age, and the woman was Glenda Tidwell, 21. No home addresses were given for them.

Sheriff Horn said they were arrested Sunday night in Andrews after Jimmy Lancaster, 30, San Angelo, was discovered

as the victim of the crimes for which the four were charged. Lancaster was beaten with a 2x4 board, his mouth and hands taped up, and left for dead at a Lake Leon cabin Sunday morning.

Three other girls were with the men and all of them left with Davis in charge, the sheriff said. All of them were returned here by the sheriff's office in two cars Monday. Three girls were released.

Lancaster, the injured man, regained consciousness at the cabin sometime Sunday and was able to get outside. Occupants of a neighboring cabin brought him to the sheriff's office. He was taken to the Ranger General Hospital for treatment and later released to his wife who moved him to a Fort Worth hospital. It was understood that he was badly injured.

Sheriff Horn said bonds for the three men and one woman were set after charges were filed in Justice of the Peace Charles Owings' court at Eastland. He reported that a Fort Worth attorney had contacted him about two of them, and he expected that they might make bond this week.

The sheriff indicated that there might be more to the case than was indicated by the charges on file.

## Amputee Club of Fort Worth To Play Little League Dads

The Fort Worth Amputee Club will play a softball game against the fathers of the Eastland Little League Clubs in a benefit match to be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, June 16 at the league field.

All profits from the game will go to the Little League of Eastland, according to an announcement here. All Eastland's league organization will provide the players for their team and their own gloves.

The Amputee Club will pay their own expenses, furnish their own equipment and balls, and play without participating in the gate receipts.

The club is well known throughout the country and has played in various parts of the Southwest since 1950, after being organized by Barney Capshaw, who lost a leg in a train wreck in 1948. Mr. Capshaw, an engineer on the Texas and Pacific, recently received a citation from President Dwight D. Eisenhower for the team's contribution to the handicapped.

In the past 13 years the club has played organizations that had a special fund for the money to go to — among them a fund to purchase some 200 legs and arms for unfor-

tunate men, women and children.

The four infield players have only three legs; short, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd basemen each have one leg and the first baseman has no legs. Capshaw is the catcher.

The club is sponsored by the Fort Worth Elks Lodge, which buys uniforms and equipment and pays other expenses. Their only reward is reportedly, the publicity they receive that feeds the slogan, "Hire the Handicapped," and keeps it before the public.

Players on the team include the following: Capshaw, 1 leg; Eugene Dutton, 1 leg; Bill Sausage, no legs; Red Hodges, 1 leg; Charlie Adkins, 1 leg; Gene Alexander, 1 arm; Dan Morris, 1 arm; Thomas Fuller, 1 arm; and Kenneth Cooper, 1 arm.

A half dozen other amputees are now seeking to qualify for positions on the team, according to Capshaw. Two assistants, both with complete facilities, accompany the team to make plans and handle the business, Barney Capshaw, Jr., and Joe W. Pace.

## Annual 4-H Club Dress Revue To Be Held Friday

The annual 4-H Club Dress Revue will be held at 8 p. m. Friday, June 15 at the Eastland American Legion Hall with 50 county girls modeling dresses made as 4-H Club projects in the last nine months.

"Fashions From out of This World," will be the outer space theme of the dress review, which will determine three county junior winners and three senior winners, all of whom will participate in regional contests, according to 4-H county home demonstration agent, Mrs. Beverly Nicholson of Eastland.

Mrs. Nicholson stated that the 50 participants under 20 leaders have been constructing their garments since last September in once a month meetings.

The girls will model different types of clothes from skirts and blouses to dressy dresses in the county contest.

The public is invited to attend the revue, and no charge for admission will be made, according to Mrs. Nicholson. Judges and commentator for the program have not been named yet.

## Area Boys Leave For Salvation Army Camp

More than 2,200 youths, including 650 young boys from 239 Salvation Army Service Units in Texas cities, towns and rural communities, will enjoy a full week of camp activities at The Salvation Army's Camp Hobbittzelle near Dallas.

Thirteen camps will be conducted this summer, with each camp lasting one week and accommodating about 175 campers.

Chief Ray L. Laney, camp chairman for Eastland, has been busy for weeks selecting four area boys to attend the camp. Local campers are Danny Lee Hudson, John Stiffler, Jimmy McGough and Joe Stephen Trout.

They will be met at the bus station in Midlothian or Waxahachie, towns near Camp Hobbittzelle, and taken to the camp grounds by representatives of The Salvation Army, or driven to and from the camp by Greyhound.

Camp Hobbittzelle, located on a beautiful wooded tract of

340 acres, is seven miles south of Midlothian, eight miles west of Waxahachie and within an hour's drive of Dallas. The camp has well equipped playgrounds and recreation areas for all boys sports including a swimming pool and lake for fishing and boating. Organized sports are conducted under the supervision of experienced coaches and counselors.

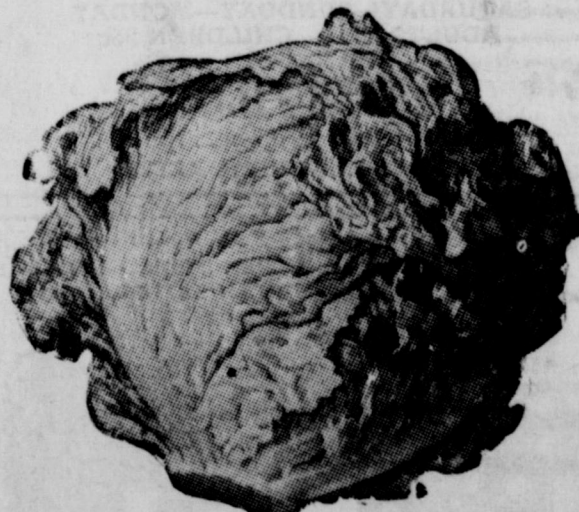

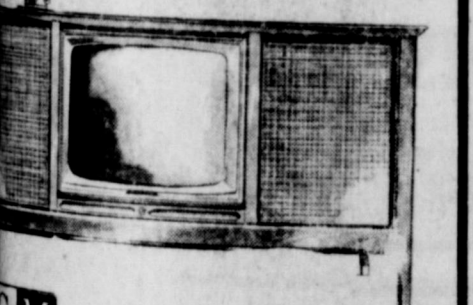

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**  
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis, but the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parent's consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid — but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot grant consent for a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Children cannot do this.

By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you come to a hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious, the doctor may well give you emergency care, yet later he should get your consent to further treatment.

Minors cannot consent to medical treatment, and except in dire emergencies their parents or guardians must give it for them.

The consent should not be broadly or loosely phrased, but should get your consent to furnish permit.

The principal reason for having the consent in writing is to avoid later misunderstandings. It is a protection both to the patient and physician.

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**Poultrymen Advised On Egg Shells**

Maintenance of egg shell quality during the summer is a problem that all Texas poultrymen face. Changes in feeding and management practices are required if the shells are to be kept thick and strong, says Dr. J. H. Quisenberry, head of the Department of Poultry Science at Texas A&M College.

Feed consumption falls off during hot weather, and this results in a lower calcium supply for the egg shell. Either supplementary oyster shell must be provided or the calcium content of the ration increased.

More and more poultrymen are changing to a complete ration, which eliminates the extra labor required for supplementary feeding of oyster shell, says Quisenberry. Also, when oyster shell is distributed over the feed, some birds, particularly in laying cages, tend to overeat the shell. Most poultrymen use a complete ration with 2.25 per cent calcium during the cool months, but this should be increased to 2.75 to 3.00 per cent during the summer.

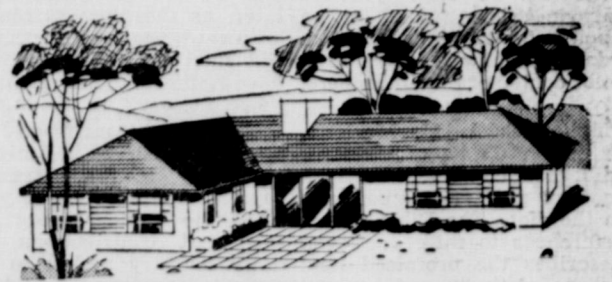
Since calcium absorption and metabolism may be reduced during hot weather, management changes that result in cooler houses and more comfortable birds generally reduce the summer egg problem. Painting the roof white, opening up the sidewalls for ventilation, planting grass around the houses to reduce heat reflection, and use of fans or spray nozzles will increase bird comfort.

An extra feeding or stirring of the feed in the troughs each day will encourage a little more

consumption, which will not only increase calcium intake but will help to keep production at a maximum level. If the production level can be kept high, remarkably good feed efficiency can be obtained during the summer months, explains Quisenberry. It is also during this time that the maximum returns are obtained from the higher protein levels generally fed birds in the

South. These practices of keeping the calcium level high and providing cool housing are the best known and most widely used techniques for keeping up summer shell strength and maximum rate of lay.

### Major Role In History Played By Milk, Specialists Reports

COLLEGE STATION — The story of milk goes back to the beginning of civilization. Prehistoric drawings, unearthed in the Sahara Desert and dating back 8,000 or more years, feature picture-stories of cattle. A 5,000 year-old mosaic frieze, found in an ancient temple near Babylon, depicts a dairy scene showing milk containers and strainers.

Down through the years, emphasizes A. M. Meekma, extension dairy specialist, milk has continued to be a food of primary importance in the diet. The Bible makes references to milk and even describes the promised land as one of "milk and honey." Marco Polo noted in his early travels that the Tartars credited much of their strength and endurance to milk.

Presently, Meekma adds that the milk industry is as modern and highly technical as any American industry. Modern dairy herds barely resemble the cattle of the pioneers. They are much more productive and more scientifically cared for than the herds of only a few decades ago.

There have also been great changes in the processing and distribution of the product. Milk today is pasteurized, often homogenized, often fortified with vitamin D, sealed in sanitary containers and, in general, improved beyond the fondest dreams of pioneer American dairy farmers. It is a food, concludes Meekma, which provides about 28 percent of our daily nutritional needs for approximately 19 percent of our food dollar.

Q — Can anyone enter the V A Hospitalized Veterans Writing Contest?

A — No, the contest is limited to war veterans who are actually hospitalized at the time their entry is written.

Q — Are all veterans with wartime service entitled to domiciliary care?

A — Not necessarily. Veterans with wartime service must have disabilities that incapacitate them from earning a living; be in need of domiciliary care; and be unable to defray the expense of necessary domiciliary care. War veterans whose disability is non-service-connected must execute an affidavit of inability to pay for their care. Peacetime veterans must have been discharged or retired for a disability incurred in line of duty or be receiving disability compensation.
