FROM FAR & NEAR

Eastland Medical Facilities Attract Thousands Yearly

Over 4,000 out-of-town patients are treated by Eastland physicians, surgeons and specialists in a years time, results of a recent survey reveals.

Actually, 4,056 persons who live in other towns in this area were treated by doctors in Eastland.

And even as amazing as figures are, they are certainly short of the total amount, because the particular survey in question, checked only three of the seven practicing physicians, surgeons and specialists in this city.

And tabulations from Eastland Memorial Hospital reflect the same condition.

A check of nine days of patients at the hospital revealed that there are almost as many out-of-town patients as local ones. On two of the nine check days there were more out-of-towners.

And there only 35 more local patients than out-of-towners in the shown in the cumulative totals for the nine days.

The hospital survey showed:
Jan. 16, 1962 — 22 locals, 15 out-of-towners;
Jan. 25, 1962 — 20 and 18;
Feb. 9th — 19 and 16;
Feb. 16th — 15 and 18;
Feb. 25th — 20 and 12;
March 5th — 18 and 15;
March 13th — 16 and 17;
March 27th — 22 and 13;
and
April 3rd — 22 and 15.

Where did they come from? Well, surprisingly enough, from far and near, and from cities and towns that also have hospitals.

On the checked days, there were patients from Abilene, Baird, Breckenridge, Brownwood, Carbon, Cisco, Comanche, Cross Plains, Gorman, Graham, Moran, Putnam, Ranger, Rising Star and Strawn.

What about who came here for medical diagnosis or treatment, but who were not hospital patients?

The three physicians checked these findings during the six-month checked period:
Abilene, 17; Abilene, 25; Baird, 110; Breckenridge, 262;

Carbon, 152; Cisco, 361; Clyde, 4; Comanche, 6; Cross Plains, 28; DeLeon, 30; Dublin, 8; Gorman, 212; Gorman, 141; Graham, 4; May, 8; Mineral Wells, 2; Mingus and Strawn, 128; Moran, 36; Putnam, 10; Ranger, 378; Rising Star, 106; Stephenville, 4; and Woodson, 2.

Besides the modern 40-bed Eastland hospital, there are two major clinics, B&W Clinic in the Petroleum Building and

Eastland Medical and Surgical Center at 404 W. Commerce St., which attract patients to this city.

If you were to pilot on a map the cities from which patients come, and drew lines into Eastland, you would find that this city is the hub of a large wheel spanning into eight counties, outside our own.

There are four drug stores in Eastland with six pharmacists.

New Club Prexy Asks Scout Troop Emphasis

Renewed emphasis on the development of Scout Troop 6 is one of the projects for the coming year of the Eastland Rotary Club.

Incoming club president Jack Germany assumed his duties Monday at the regular meeting of the club, replacing Mike George.

Germany, the club's 40th president, outlined six projects which he hopes to accomplish in the new year.

He named recognition of classifications, particularly of guests, and the development of the membership of the club, as first items.

He suggested a practice of having club visitors identify themselves before the meal so that members can better get acquainted. The club's membership now stands at 30, and this could be increased, he said.

However he placed particular emphasis on the development of Scout Troop 6, which the club has sponsored for many years. The troop was recently re-organized and Charles Williams is Scoutmaster. Germany asked for cooperation and encouragement from the

Architectural Representative Talks on School Construction

Edward Guice, Consulting Architect, Texas Education Agency, spoke to members of the Eastland Independent School Board at a meeting held Friday evening at the High School.

A representative of the Collaborative School House Architects of Dallas, Guice spoke to the group on the responsibilities of an architectural firm and discussed services rendered in connection with school construction.

Guice was with the architectural plant school division of the Texas Education Agency for four years prior to moving into private practice in 1961.

In an announcement made by Supt. Wendell Siebert, he stated that the board plans to meet with several other firms before making any definite decisions.

He told of a proposed plan to meet with another architectural firm during the second week of July. The name of this firm was not disclosed in the announcement.

AT EASTLAND NATIONAL

Deposits Top \$4 Million; Loans, Discounts at Peak

Bank deposits in Eastland topped the \$4 million mark according to the second quarter statement of condition.

On June 29th, date of the call, the Eastland National Bank reported \$4,049,855.12 on deposit, with over a \$1 and a half million in loans and discounts.

Current loans and discounts amounted to \$1,606,469.80.

The current deposits are \$243,282.30 more three months ago, at the March 26th call, when \$3,806,562.82 was reported.

Compared with totals a year ago, the current deposit reflect continued financial health for this area. Current figures are \$214,652.31 above those of June, 1961.

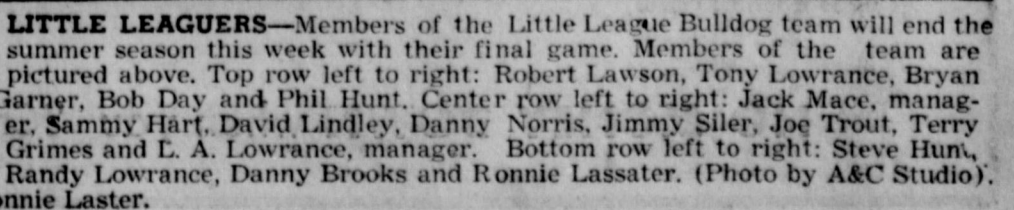

What Do You Think?

David Lawrence writes, in U. S. News and World Report: "Our tax system is today a hodgepodge of political chicanery. It defies the basic principles of fairness.

Above all, it undermines individual initiative. Those citizens who risk their funds and give their energies to enterprises that create jobs are discouraged by tax rates that result in virtual confiscation of their earnings.

The demagogic cry is raised that the lower-income groups should pay less and less. This is not enlightened self-interest even for the Treasury.

For it means killing the goose that lays the golden eggs. The overhauling of our whole tax structure is long overdue. The citizens are willing to pay their just share of the Government's expenses. But they cannot long tolerate unequal and discriminatory rules and rates of taxation.

For this is taxation without justice."

Fishing Safety

Don't let an accident spoil the fun of fishing. Fishing is one of the nation's favorite outdoor sports. It offers relaxation, mild exercise and a welcome change from the everyday routine. But, as every fisherman knows, there are several built-in hazards to fishing—that bear watching.

"Sidewinder" (fishermen who swing their arms in a wide arc on the cast) are responsible for many of the hook accidents. If you are a sidewinder, be sure your field is clear of other fishermen before casting.

In removing a hook from a fish, hold the fish under the gills so only its body, not its head, can flop and wiggle. Trying to grab a slippery fish and remove the hook at the same time is an easy way to get hooked.

Lures and hooks left lying on the floor of a boat or on the dock are inviting trouble.

Never try to pull a hook out if one becomes imbedded beneath the skin. Your physician will snip off the back end of the hook and push it through the wound. If necessary he will administer antibiotics and tetanus toxoid.

Save your muscles from strain by avoiding excessive rowing or exercise. Protect yourself from sunburn and heat prostration.

Commission in Austin this week. Work on all types of highways are included in this program. The project is part of District 23's four million dollar allotment for this program.

The project will be almost all new location and the construction will be under the supervision of R. P. Haun Jr., Sr. Resident Engineer in Eastland County.

The 14.3 mile project will include purchase of a new right-of-way, grading of the roadbed and draining structures. Estimated cost of this work is \$380,000.

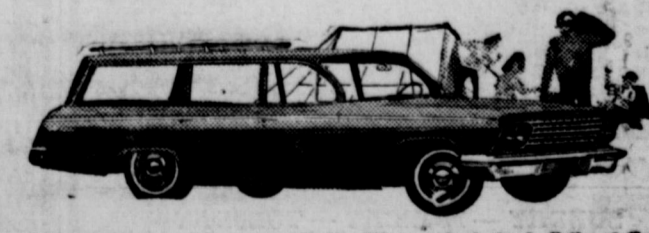

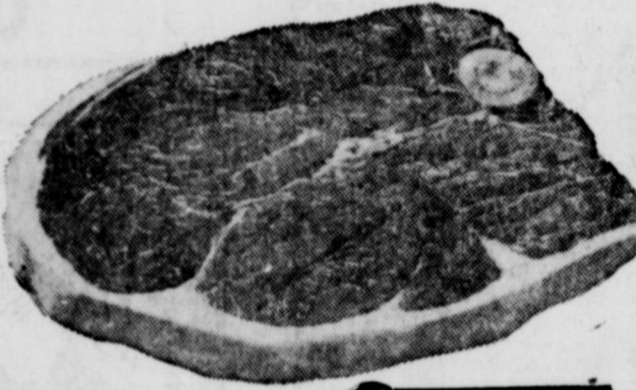

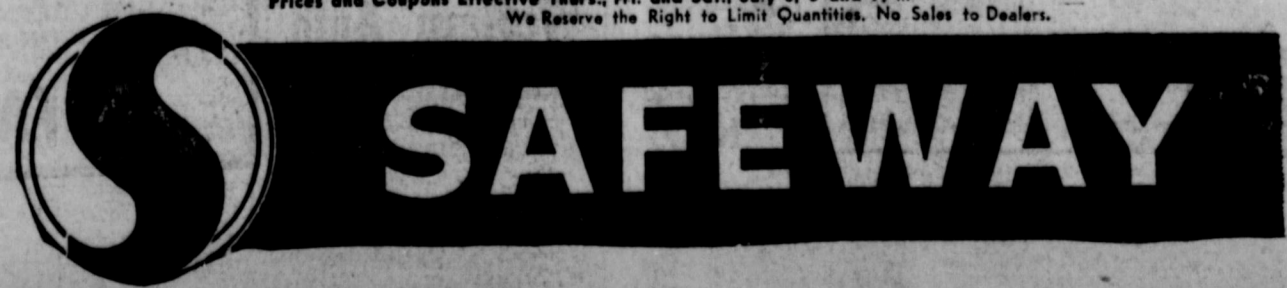
