## Funeral Is Monday For Local Wreck Victim

A 19-year-old O'Brien man was killed, and two Olden men injured in a one-car accident in the city limits of Ranger about 10:55 p.m. Saturday.

Billy Wayne Cate, former resident of Olden, died in Ranger General Hospital at 12:10 a.m. Sunday of injuries received when the car he was driving went out of control and crashed into a light pole and apartment house about a half mile from downtown Ranger.

Two other passengers in the car, William B. Griffith, 20, and Jimmie Doyle Norton, 20 both of Olden, were slightly injured but were not admitted to the hospital.

City policeman Bill Bollinger, who investigated the accident reported that the car driven by Cate failed to make a sharp curve on the Caddo highway skidded and hit the light pole. After hitting the pole and throwing Cate out of the car, it spun and hit the Terry Place Apartments with the rear end of the vehicle.

Mrs. Temple Wheat, who was asleep in the bedroom about one foot from the point of impact was not injured but was suffering from shock and required medical attention.

Funeral services were held Monday at 4 p.m. in the Harmony Baptist Church, Morton Valley, with Rev. Leon Blevins, pastor, officiating. Burial fol-

lowed in Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Hamner's Funeral Home, Eastland.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Cate of O'Brien; three brothers, Benny of Kule, Jackie of O'Brien and Jerry of Eastland; and one sister, Edith of O'Brien. Mrs. Cate is the former Wilma Skinner of Carbon.

# Petitions Circulating For Legal Liquor Sale Voting

Another attempt is being made to legalize the sale of intoxicants in Ranger. An application for petitions was presented to the County Clerk's office Monday and ten petition forms were issued during the afternoon.

The application asked for

petitions to call an election to legalize the sale of all alcoholic beverages within the corporate limits of the city. About a month ago a move to legalize the sale of beer and wine was defeated at the Ranger polls.

The application for the new

election petitions were signed by the required ten persons and the clerk's office validated the qualifications of the signers. Ten petitions were issued and based on past calculations, a total of 284 qualified petition signers will be needed to call the new election.

Since the application did not spell out the matter of "off" or "on" premise consumption, it is understood that the matter would be for both causes, as was the last election.

On June 9th, 927 Ranger residents voted in the beer election. Only 83 votes separated the wets from the drys. There were 506 against and 423 for. And like the last election, this one will affect only those persons living within the city limits of Ranger. In the last vote, 318 names appeared on the returned petitions.

The June vote was the first election to legalize the sale of beer and wine in Eastland county since 1948, according to courthouse records. In that 1948 vote, the Ranger precinct voted 760 against the sale of beer and 517 for.

Ranger voters favored beer, 537 to 218 in an earlier county-wide vote in 1938. Ranger's local option record goes back to 1930 when 40 persons voted for beer and 38 voted against it.

The "Citizens for a Better Community" committee, opposed the sale of beer and wine, during the immediately prior to the June vote.

The application for the June vote petitions were submitted on April 5th and the petitions were returned on April 27th, with the required number of signers.

Assuming that enough signatures will be obtained, it would appear that voting on the new proposal might be held in early September.

## Soaking Rain Improves Farm Outlook For Eastland County

A soaking rain drenched Eastland County and much of this West Central Texas region Monday to brighten the outlook for fall crops, improve pasture conditions, fill farm tanks, and add water to area lakes.

The rainfall measured from half an inch at Moran to a high of 3.4 inches at the city hall in Cisco and 5.3 inches at Morton Valley.

County Agent J. M. Cooper described the rain as "worth a million dollars to our farm operators." Virtually all of the county's 30,000 acres of peanuts were planted late in June due to dry weather, and time for the maximum good, in time for the maximum good, Mr. Cooper said.

Grain sorghums, orchards, pastures and fall hay crops also were materially improved.

The outlook for a good peanut crop was described by Mr. Cooper as unusually good for this time of year. The acreage in peanuts this year is believed to be the largest since soon after the war when a record 65,000 acres were planted one year.

The rain came from the northeast and fell most of Monday morning.

Ranger averaged about 3 inches over the city: Rising Star 3.2 inches, Putnam 1.4 inches, Eastland 2.0 inches, Seranton 1.1 inches, Lake Cisco 2.8 inches, Lake Leon 3.6 inches, Olden 2.7 inches, Morton Valley,

5.3 inches, LaCasa Community 4.0 inches and Cheaney Community 3.5 inches.

Cisco officials reported that Lake Cisco was up about six inches with some runoff continuing. The rain in the lake watershed to the north-west, however, was light. Battle Creek's watershed had practically no rain. Lake Bernie, just northwest of Cisco, was nearly full.

Lake Leon, which stood at 72 feet at the dam, was up six inches and was expected to gain new water for several days. The lake capacity there is 75 feet at the dam.

In the Morton Valley area, several residents reported over 5 inches. Jesse Reynolds, stock farmer there, measured 5.3 inches for the most reported.

# New City Hall Site Being Considered

There was talk of a new city hall building and purchase of an emergency rescue vehicle for the city was okayed by city fathers as they rushed through a brief agenda Monday.

A bid was also accepted for the lease of grazing rights at Ringling Lake, but a "go-slow" attitude was taken concerning donating an additional court-house-side parking space for the Highway Patrol.

The commissioners have been talking with Mrs. L. E. McGraw concerning the purchase of the property on S. Seaman St. which housed the McGraw Motor Co., owned and operated by her late husband.

Although there was no motion made this week, there appeared to be unanimous approval around the commission table to purchase the property.

Purchase price has been set at \$15,000 and commissioners and City Manager Jimmy Young are to work out interest rates, payment schedules and disposal of the present Commerce and Daugherty St. site, which has been condemned, and is termed "dangerous".

Guesses are that it would take from three to four thousand to convert the Seaman St. site.

Manager Young reported that he had had one "offer" from a demolition firm. They offered to raze the old building for \$9,000 and all the salvaged material — with the city doing the paying, rather than vice versa.

Another representative walked off, Young said, when Young explained that the city expected to be paid, rather than pay, for the demolition

of the structure.

Commissioner Bob Perkins was to call a Fort Worth firm for an appraisal.

"You bet it's dangerous. We know it is," Young said, speaking of the building.

Fire Chief Guy Robertson appeared and requested the emergency unit to carry the some \$2,000 worth of rescue equipment owned by the department. This equipment is now carried by him, and usually gets soaked on every call.

A 1953 Ford half-ton panel truck will be purchased from Hood King Motor Co. for \$370 the board agreed.

The city will re-lease the grazing rights at Ringling Lake to O. J. Treadway who submitted the high bid of \$325 a year.

Young reported that Commissioner Don Pierson, who was absent Monday night, had called, requesting another parking space for the highway patrol, to be located on the east side of the square.

The sheriff's department now has two on that side and the highway patrol has one. The Department of Public Safety contingent here have three vehicles.

The city police do not ticket any government vehicle or any vehicle bearing exempt license plates, Young said, therefore the highway patrolmen are able to park anywhere in town without cost.

Commissioner Milton Fullen said "We're fortunate to have them here so, let's keep them here."

## BUSY BOARD Grade Teacher Hired; Look-Trip Is Planned

The Eastland public school teaching staff gained another teacher this week — but still lacks three.

The board hired Mrs. Ruby McKenzie, a native of the Commerce area, and she will teach in the elementary grades.

Supt. Wendell Siebert said probably in the third, fourth or fifth grade.

cent cheaper here than in Abilene, where most of his work has been done.

He guessed that the cost might be in the neighborhood of \$9.50 per square foot, with a need for some 16 units for about 400 students, making the cost run somewhere in the neighborhood of \$300,000.

He explained how his firm, for the standard six per cent commission, provided personal service and close supervision of construction.

"We are not a large organization," he said, "and we work together closely, both with the superintendent and the board."

Castle is the son of the late David S. Castle Sr., prominent West Texas architect, who also built the present Eastland High School and Junior High school buildings.

"In 48 years our firm has never failed to award a contract," he pointed out, empha-

sizing the heritage which his father had left him, and which he as tried to carry on.

The board agreed tentatively to go as a group to Abilene Thursday, Aug. 2nd, to inspect buildings which he has built there, and others.

Like other architects which have met with the board, Castle stressed the importance of air conditioning, and said that air conditioned buildings are as cheap as non-air conditioned ones in Abilene.

His firm recommends hot and chilled systems, with an average of three tons per classroom, at about \$250 per ton.

He doesn't like windowless schools though, he said, because there are 151 days in a year in this area, when we need both warming and cooling, and windows are usable on such days.

His estimate includes all site work and kitchen equipment.

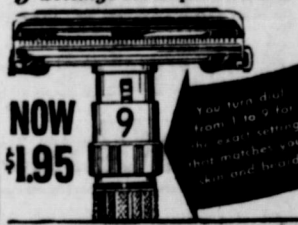

# Telstar's No 'Pie in Sky' Bell Man Tells Eastlanders

Telstar is a switchboard in the sky and it's a rousing success, Glenn Scott, Southwest Bell Telephone Co. public information supervisor, said in Eastland Monday.

Speaking before a joint meeting of the Rotary and Lions clubs, Scott said that the recent space achievement dates back to 1948, with the development of the transistors.

The Bell System microwave-in-the-sky satellite is the latest communications triumph for America arising from telephone research he said, illustrating his talk with a model of the vehicle.

Bell paid the National Aeronautics and Space Administration some \$3 million to put the satellite into orbit, using the space workhorse, Thor, Scott pointed out.

Telstar receives signals beamed to it from ground stations; amplifies them and retransmits them to another station on the ground — perhaps an ocean away from the original transmission point.

Developed by private enterprise

by new concept of transmission, and will "evolutionize" communications, he said, as he pointed out the importance of developing such a program independent of federal support.

"There's not a penny of subsidy in Telstar" he said, and the packed White Elephant Restaurant dining room audience applauded, as they had when he announced that as of Sunday, there were 36 orbiting satellites and all but three which were Russian-launched, belonged to the United States.

The Telstar achievement represents a \$55 million investment in pure research by independent stock holders, he said.

The plan calls for at least 30 such satellites, and as many as 50, as pointed out, and the dividends expected of the program include, among many other things, cheaper long distance rates for the general public, a communication boon for data storage and transmission for professional people, as well as security surveillance for this country.

It will take five years of

operations, before the company realizes any profit from the investment, he said.

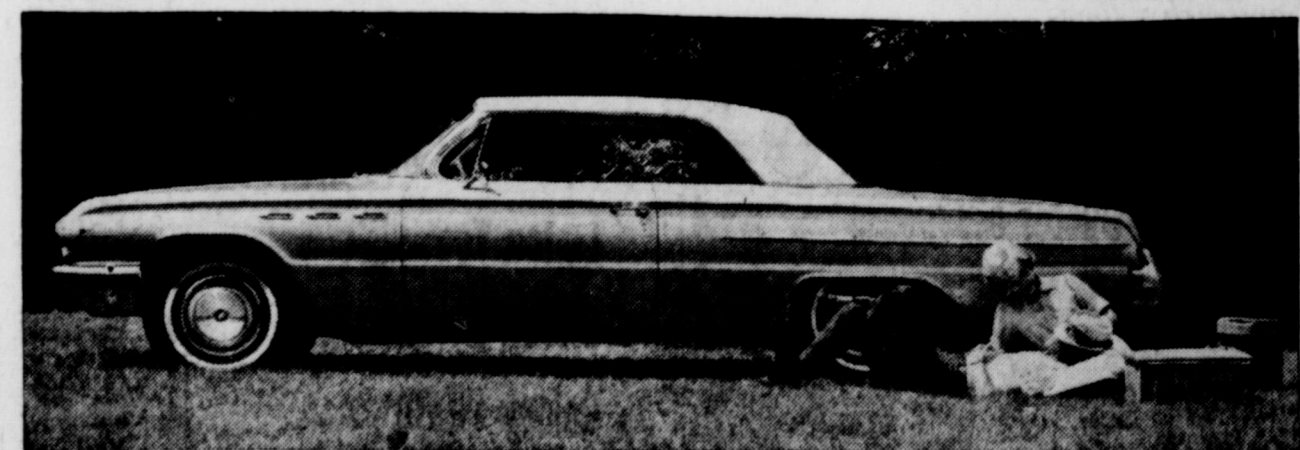

**Census Bureau Is Busy With Various Counts**

DALLAS — Contrary to popular belief, the U. S. Census Bureau does not fold its tents and fade away between the big 10-year population and housing counts, according to Director James W. Stroud of the Bureau's permanent regional field office at Dallas.

The Dallas region covers the States of Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Texas.

Mr. Stroud points out that nine major censuses will be conducted between now and the next decennial census in 1970. The first of these major censuses will be the 1962 Census of Governments which is conducted every five years. Then comes the five-year Censuses of Business, Manufactures and Mineral Industries. These will be taken in 1964 and 1969, covering business operations in 1963 and 1968 respectively. The Census of Agriculture will be conducted in 1964 and 1969.

In addition to these major censuses, the Bureau carries out a wide variety of current surveys on a monthly, quarterly, and annual basis. Topics covered in the current surveys include employment and unemployment, population characteristics, health, housing, retail and wholesale trade, manufacturing, and related subjects. The purpose of the current surveys is to supplement and keep up to date the detailed information collected in the major censuses.

The Current Population Survey, conducted 12 times a year, is probably the best known Census Bureau interim activity since it provides monthly information on employment and unemployment. Information obtained by interviews in 333 sample areas of the country is combined to furnish statistics for national estimates. Information on migration, income, school enrollment, and other pertinent subjects is collected from time to time in the Current Population Survey in addition to the facts on employment and unemployment.

Approximately 35,000 households throughout the country are included each month in the Current Population Survey. These households are selected at random under the Census Bureau's scientific sampling program to provide a representative cross-section

of all classes of the population, and all types of areas of the country — large cities, small towns, rural areas, and so forth.

**Stockmen Asked To Send Samples**

Eastland County stockmen who have cases of screw worms in their livestock have been requested to cooperate in the state-wide effort to stamp out the pests.

The county agent's office at Eastland and Rancher Sam Kimmell at Cisco have special containers for use in sending samples of the screw worms to state laboratories for testings. Boxes of sterile flies have been dropped in this region in the fight against the pests.

The containers are free and are self-addressed.

### IT'S THE LAW

#### RIGHT OF WITNESSES

By far the most vital people in our system of justice are witnesses. Everyone else in a trial exists to hear what they have to say.

Our courts need witnesses. A jury to find the facts. The judge to apply the law. The lawyer to tell his client's story.

Chances are you worry about stepping up, taking an oath, and telling your story in court.

On some rare occasions you could be called upon to testify about something affecting your

own standing in the community.

As a witness you too may have the right, for example, not to testify against yourself in somebody else's lawsuit or crime trial.

If you are ever in such a bind, consult a lawyer of your own choice on what to do. The lawyer who called you to testify has a sworn duty to protect his client, not you. But your lawyer is sworn to keep what you tell him his secret and to advise you in your own interests within the law.

Wise lawyers tell their witnesses to obey twelve rules:

1. Go to the place (say, the scene of an accident). Check

your memory before you go to court. People forget and get caught up on details. But if you check what you saw and heard you are on solid ground.

2. Visit a court. Hear how other witnesses testify. It will help you see your role on the witness stand.

3. Wear clean, conservative clothes.

4. Don't memorize your story word for word. That is the surest way to sound bad. But think of what you saw and heard.

5. Listen to the questions you are asked with care and answer thoughtfully.

6. Give a simple, direct answer in your own words. Don't be rash.

7. If you err — and people often do — correct yourself at once. If you can't remember some detail, say so. Don't bluff.

8. Tell the truth. Don't figure which side you may help. Don't identify yourself with either side.

9. Stop when the judge breaks in, and don't try to sneak an answer in before he can stop you. What you might say could end in a "mistrial."

10. Keep cool and don't sass back.

11. If they ask you: Certainly, you have talked to other people — the lawyer, for example; and yes, you may be reimbursed for certain of your expenses incurred in attending the trial.

12. Remember, without witnesses our law would fail to do justice. If you are called, be a good witness.

### Dr. Talks With General Friend

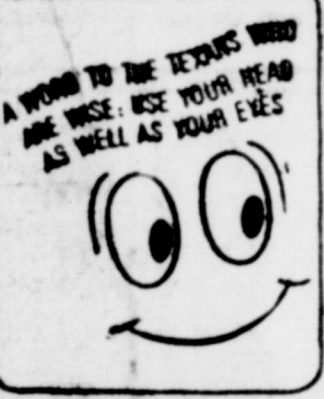
Dr. E. R. Townsend was thrilled by a telephone call last night from General Carl Spatz.

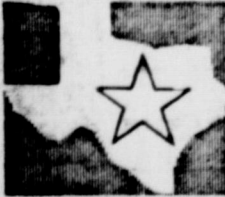

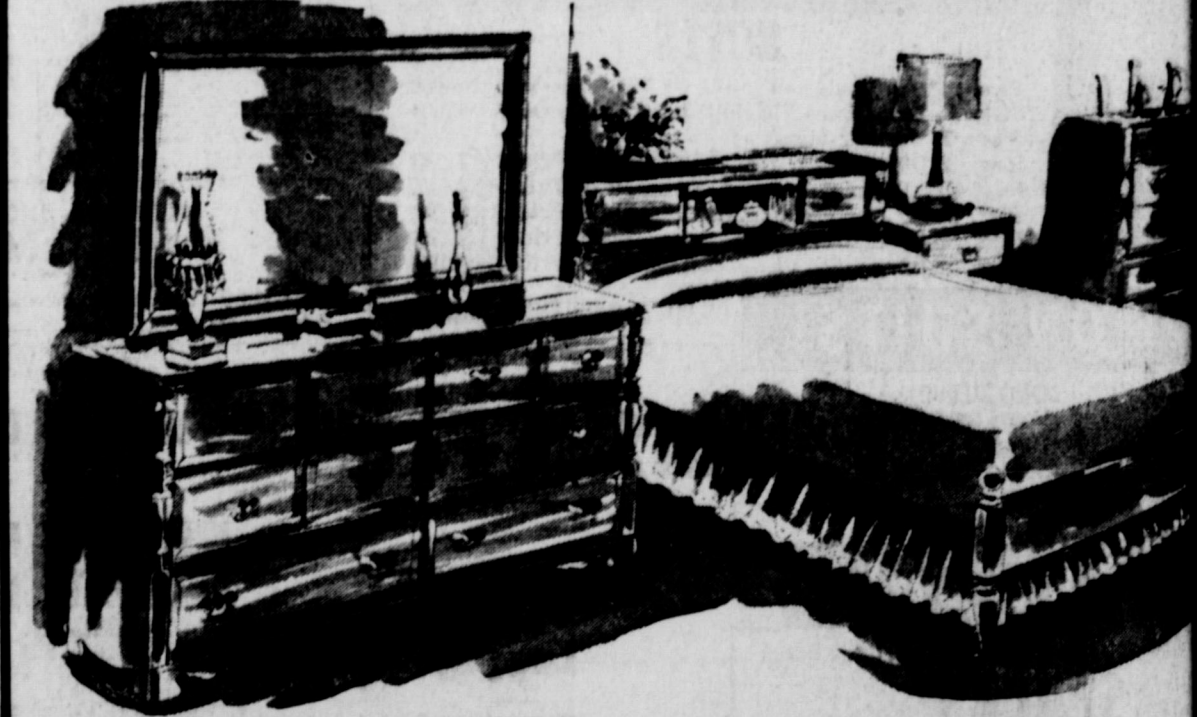
