Cowtown Anglers Seek Leon

The Fort Worth Anglers Club wants to return to Lake Leon for their semi-annual fishing tournament.

Negotiations are now underway between representatives of that club and Eastland County officials concerning the project.

Eastland Chamber President Frank Deaton expressed gratitude that the local facilities are held in such high regard by the Fort Worth fishermen, and added that he hoped that arrangements can be worked out satisfactorily to all concerned.

A request has been made with the Eastland County Water Board for fishing rights to the lake, and Member Charles Freyschlag said this week that the board is scheduled to meet again on Monday, Aug. 13th, and probably will consider the request of the club.

The group has asked that the two towns furnish trophies, and arrangements have been worked out between Eastland and Ranger to provide the necessary trophies if plans are finalized for the fishing tournament.

Tentative dates being requested are September 29th, which would coincide with Eastland's annual Peanut Bowl Festivities.

The anglers fished Lake Leon waters two years in a row, some three years ago — the first time that they had returned to the same lake on successive years.

CITY OFFICIALS REQUESTING WALNUT-ROUTING OF HIGHWAY 6

Eastland city officials went before Texas Highway Commissioners Wednesday morning to re-assure them of local support of a state plan to change the location of State Highway 6 from the city's south limits to the north end of town.

Walnut St. is the proposed highway site. Cyrus Frost Jr., chairman of Eastland City Commission when the plan was first set out by the Highway department, said the Walnut St. route was acceptable to both past and present city commissions, service clubs and business men. "We know of no opposition except from the residents of Walnut St.," Frost said.

Highway Commissioner Herb Petry Jr. remarked that he could understand objection from the street's residents "but often we must move ahead with what is best for the overwhelming majority of the people."

Connecting the state highway with Walnut St. would involve 2.3 miles of street construction plus grade separations at the T&P Railroad crossing and at the Leon River.

Frost said about two people have been killed each year at the railroad crossing where there is no grade separation.

The project would cost the state \$305,000. Frost assured the commission that local authorities are prepared to assume their share of financial responsibility.

He placed it on a business basis, giving estimates that 80,000 individual visits each year would be made in the town of 3,500 if its business locations were accessible.

The state highway department first proposed the re-location in 1960 but held up on construction plans when funds ran low. Petry said the project will be studied anew.

Frost was accompanied by Eastland City Commission Chairman Virgil Seabury and City Commissioner Jack Germany.

Average Texas Farm Valued At \$64,950, Economist Says

A study by USDA's Economic Research Service shows the average value per acre of farm real estate reached a new high of \$123 per acre in the U.S. in 1962, 5 percent higher than in the previous year. The average farm has 336 acres, and is worth \$41,000. About \$32,000 is worth \$41,400. About \$32,000 land, and the balance, \$8,600 by farm buildings, Bates said.

The average value per farm in Texas increased from \$48,378 to \$64,950 between 1959 and 1962, according to C. H. Pates, economist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In this same period, the average size of farms increased from 631 to 710 acres. This year the land on the average Texas farm is worth \$59,302. Buildings worth an additional \$5,648. The average value for land and buildings is about \$91 per acre, he said.

The rate of sales of farm land accelerated some during the last year also. The number of farm title transfers in Texas rose from 51.8 per 1,000 farms in 1960-61 to 58.2 in 1961-62.

Rev. Ed Hart of Beirut, Lebanon will be the guest speaker in the First Methodist Church tonight (Sunday) at the 7 p. m. services. Rev. Hart is a loan teacher of Physics from the United States to the Hailguzian College in Beirut for an indefinite period.

Maigazian College was established for the purpose of training teachers for high and grade schools throughout the Middle East. It is an Armenian Evangelical Synod College for Armenian Middle East communities. The teachers training there are Arabs, Armenians and all other Middle Eastern people.

Rev. Hart was graduated from Eastland High School and Texas Tech, then took his Theological work in the college of Theology of McGill University in Montreal, Canada. While in school in Canada, he served a church in upper New York State.

While in Eastland, Rev. and Mrs. Hart and son, David, are visiting with his mother, Mrs. L. W. Hart, and other relatives. They will leave Tuesday for a speaking engagement in the East and will sail for Lebanon the second week in August. The public is cordially invited to attend this service.

George Hull Graduate Of CBR School

Staff Sergeant George B. Hull, 10-year employe of Texas Electric Service Company of Eastland, graduated from CBR School at Fort Polk, La. in exercises held at 9 a.m. Saturday morning, July 28.

This was the fourth session of chemical, biological and radiological warfare conducted at Fort Polk since last October. Hull, with 34 other students, received certificates for 80 hours of instruction in procedures and techniques to be applied during CBR Operations on individual, unit and divisional level. chemical and biological agents, detection and protection, explosion and effects of nuclear weapons, shielding and decay, dose and dose rate, radiological monitoring and a d survey, plus decontamination.

The men chosen for this school were selected by their commanding officer, Sgt. Hull was the only man chosen from C. Battery.

Guardsmen Due Home Tuesday After 10 Months Active Duty

The "49'ers" will be home this week. After 10 months of active duty at Fort Polk, La., Eastland County National Guardsmen attached to Battery C at Cisco, and Service Battery at Ranger are due home Tuesday. Both units are components of the 3rd Rocket Howitzer Battalion, 132nd Artillery.

Approximately 65 men will be returning to the Cisco unit, some 45 to Ranger and about eight men from Eastland. After being released from active duty they will return to their state-commanded status as National Guardsmen. Due to being leaving Ft. Polk Monday by convey, the men who've been away are expected

to arrive at their home armor-ies about 2 p.m. Tuesday. There will be 13 vehicles in the Cisco-bound convoy. Officially the men won't be released from active duty until Thursday during ceremonies at their respective home posts. Welcoming home celebrations are planned at both Cisco and Ranger.

Ranger will welcome its guardsmen Wednesday with a barbecue, tickets for which are available at \$1.50 each.

Most businesses in Ranger are planning to close for a two-hour period that day for the event, at the city park.

An advance party of five men returned this past week to get the armory ready at Cisco for the main contingent's return.

In the advanced party were S. Sgt. Charles Arnett, who has been assigned to the Cisco Battery as administrative supply technician, Sgt. Buddy Aaron of Eastland, SFC Joe Zeir, SFC William G. Myers and Sgt. John T. Brown.

Arnett formerly was assigned to the Ranger Battery. Replacing him at Ranger will be Warrant Officer James O. Hendricks of Cisco.

Commander of the Cisco unit is 1st Lt. Winifred Hogan of Clyde.

Another Cisco officer is 1st Lt. Jimmy Pittman of Stephenville who will return to Cisco in November following the completion of a special officer's course now in progress at Fort Sill, Okla.

It is understood that two other officers will be assigned in Cisco later.

Cisco will host the guardsmen and their families at a barbecue and swimming party at Lake Cisco Friday evening.

The active Army made a farewell recently to the Texas Army National Guard's 49th Armored Division during a 14,000 man dismantled review — the first in the unit's history.

New Boat-Loading Ramp To Be Built at Lake Leon

Lake Leon received a healthy boost this week from the Texas Highway Commission as it received a new boat ramp.

In approving a program to build 25 public boat ramps throughout the State, the Commission gave the Texas recreation facilities a good boost.

The Lake Leon ramp will be adjacent to Farm-to-Market Road 2214 near the bridge.

Eastland County Water Board President Felton Brasler of Ranger and Member Charles Freyschlag of Eastland both expressed appreciation for the addition to the local lake's facilities.

There are two loading ramps at the lake now.

The Commission called the program "a giant stride forward in the state's tourist attraction program—a boon for Texans and recreational travelers alike." The Texas Highway Department is the official tourist attraction agency for the State of Texas.

The boat ramps will offer water lovers year-round launching spots at no charge. Each will include not only the launching ramp but also a parking area, access road, incinerator, signing, and landscaping.

The 25 boat ramps will cost an estimated \$113,000.

Locations were selected on the basis of the water area to be served and the number of boat registration fees in the area.

Funds to build the ramps come from surplus boat registration fees. In 1959 the Texas Legislature passed the Water Safety Act and designated the Highway Department as the administering agency to collect boat registration fees.

The Act stipulated that surplus funds over and above the cost of administering the program would be used to build boat ramps.

On Turtle Creek adjacent to State Highway 35.

A Visit With the New Head Coach

"We're going to win some ball games." The Mavericks' new head coach, blond jolly Millard Glass, wouldn't say how many, during an interview this week, but radiated optimism for the forthcoming football season.

"We'll probably be taking on our toughest customer first in Comanche," Glass guessed, "but it should just about be the seasoning we need."

The new chief mentor comes to Eastland with an impressive record behind him—both as a player in uniform and as the man who calls the plays as coach.

A 1955 graduate of Vernon High School, Glass played in both the Greenbelt Bowl in Childress and the Oil Bowl in Wichita Falls as post-high school outings.

Moving on to Abilene Christian College, he played four years as a Wildcat there.

After graduation in 1959, he went to Dublin as an assistant coach.

Dublin had a disastrous season that year, but used as a comparative, it speaks well of his other two years there.

That first year Dublin lost nine ball games and won one. But alas, their one victory had to be chalked up as a forfeit on the record books—one player was thought to be eligible at the time of the game, but in fact was not, as was learned later.

It was a season of a different color his next season there.

Dublin won ten and dropped one.

Glass was named head coach his third year, and racked up an impressive seven wins, three loss record.

He and his wife Ann, both natives of Vernon, are living at 514 E. Conner St.

They have two daughters, Lee Ann, 3, and Maca, 1.

Looking forward to Monday, Aug. 20th, first day of training, Glass plans to put his some 45 Mavericks through the paces, and may even drop a few pounds of himself. (He's 20 pounds above his own 205 playing weight.)

He evaluates his coaching staff highly and in Harold Price, he sees a man "who's played some mighty good ball."

Price, a Comanche native, started out at Texas A&M and played a lot of ball his sophomore year there under Bear Bryant. He moved on to Sam Houston where he graduated this spring.

The Prices have a daughter, 4, and live at 514 Oaklawn.

The other assistant coach, Denson Moody, was a freshman at ACC when Glass was a senior there.

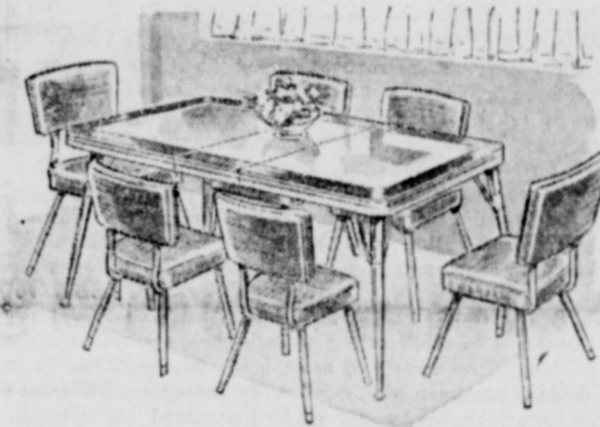
