Regular Field Project Set Near Pioneer

A regular field project has been staked two miles north of Pioneer in Eastland County. It is slated for 2,700 feet with rotary.

The venture is Williams & Wagner Construction Co., Inc., Dallas, No. 1 Webb. Site is 330 feet from the south and 6,256 feet from the east lines of George Click Survey 871.

Daily potential was 38.19 barrels of 40 gravity oil, pumping from 20 perforations at 1,680 to 1,706 feet. Casing is set on bottom at 1,726 feet.

Tommy McCoy Wages Fight For Life

Last Rites Held For Victims Of New Year's Day Auto Crash

CISCO (TNS) — A Graham Hospital spokesman reported the condition of Tommy Baltimore McCoy, 23-year-old Eastland bakery employee, as "just about the same" this morning. McCoy is waging a fight for his life after a head-on collision early Saturday morning claimed the lives of the four other persons in the two death cars.

McCoy is listed as in critical condition. Three other persons died instantly in the head-on smash-up New Year's Day and a fourth died nine hours after the accident.

The dead are: Harold Francis Mannke, 26, Eastland Hotel, Eastland.

Larry Neil McCannies, 16, Route 4, Cisco.

John Dale Cook, 20, Cisco.

Last rites for three of the wreck victims were held Sunday and Monday. The fourth will be held in Boston, Mass.

Funeral services for Larry Neal McCannies was held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the Cisco First Methodist Church. Rev. E. H. Lightfoot, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Survivors include his mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. Herschel Penn; a brother, Jerry; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jake Courtney and Mr. and Mrs. Ed McCannies, all of Cisco.

Larry Neal was born Oct. 15, 1938 in Cisco and had lived there all his life. A sophomore at Cisco High School, he played halfback on the grid team.

\$106,448.63 IN RECEIPTS IS REPORTED

Eastland postal receipts set an all-time high in 1954. Postmaster E. E. Layton announced Tuesday. Layton said final tabulations show that Eastlanders spent \$106,448.63 on postage stamps during the past year.

The figure was an increase of \$13,450.80 over the 1953 record, which was the all-time previous high. The 1953 total was \$92,997.83, Postmaster Layton said.

Layton completed his fifteenth year as postmaster here this year. During those years the postal receipts have each year exceeded the previous year's total. In 1952 receipts were slightly over \$86,000. Thus the increase this year exceeded the 1953 increase. The \$13,450.80 gain represents a 14 1/2 per cent increase over 1953.

Layton said that this year's Christmas business slightly exceeded the 1953 rush period. He credited most of the gain with an increase in mailing here, although postal rates increased slightly.

Layton said the increase was spread over the entire 12 month period, and not just a sudden jump.

Good Reason To Slow Down

Know what the busiest stretch of highway in Eastland County is? The newest State Highway traffic volume map shows that it is the two mile stretch between the Eastland city limits and the turn off to Lake Leon on Highway 80.

The map shows that 5,240 vehicles travel over the section of highway each 24 hour period. The flow of traffic drops considerably at that point.

Traffic flow to the east of Eastland averages 4,780 daily. West of Ranger the daily average is 4,960 vehicles daily and east of Ranger the traffic flow drops to 3,760.

East of Cisco the average traffic daily is 4,580 vehicles and west of that city the average drops to 3,890 vehicles over a 24 hour period.

Pros Believed Responsible For \$2000 Burglary

Sheriff J. R. Williams said Monday that the burglary of Nichols Cleaners in Rising Star apparently was a "professional job."

Burglars broke into the cleaners either Wednesday night or early Thursday morning, robbing the store of suits, shirts and slacks with a loss placed by C. B. Nichols, owner, at between \$2,000 and \$2,500. Nichols said the stock carried no burglary insurance.

Included in the loot were 20 suits retailing at \$50 each; 150 pairs of slacks and several dozen sport shirts. Nothing else was taken and the cash register was not molested, Nichols said.

The burglars gained entrance to the store by prying open the front door with a crow bar or similar instrument.

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Commissioners Review Constables' Salaries

A deficit of \$22,708 between the amount of fees turned in by the six constables of Eastland County and the salary paid them during the past 45 months was pointed out by County Judge John Hart Monday to Eastland County commissioners.

Meeting for the first time in 1955, the Commissioners Court heard Judge Hart explain that "I am not trying to blame any constable for not turning in a lot of fees. If there isn't anything to do, we can't expect them to do it."

Judge Hart told the Court that since March of 1951 the county has paid out \$24,700 in salaries to the constables while only \$1,992 has been turned in by the six constables.

He told the Court that a check with the County Judge of Brown County revealed that that county has only one constable with salary of slightly over \$190 a month. Stevens County also just has one constable and his salary is only \$125 monthly. Callahan County has three constables, Judge Hart said, but they are paid only \$1, \$10 and \$50 a month respectively.

Comanche County has two constables and pays them \$25, and

Commissioners visited both the sheriff's office and jail following the meeting. No definite action was taken.

Discuss Hospital Commissioners also discussed the County Hospital setup. Ranger General Hospital is now being used as the county hospital. The group discussed cost and service of the hospital and also discussed the possibility of using the Gorman hospital as the county hospital.

Also falling under discussion was the Farm-Market road situation. The need for more F-M roads was expressed by all members of the court.

All commissioners were present and County Judge John Hart presided.

Annual Physical Urged By State Health Officer

AUSTIN — If you have not had an audit made recently of your physical assets and liabilities, go to your doctor now and have it done is the advice of Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, to all grown-ups in Texas. "It is quite as important," Dr. Holle said, "to check up on your physical resources as it is to look into the state of your financial possessions. By regular care under your physician's direction, you can conserve your physical assets and avoid the accumulation of destructive liabilities."

Each of us starts with a certain amount of physical capital. Merely as a business proposition, it is worthwhile to conserve it to the best of our ability. In infancy and childhood our physical resources, as a rule are safeguarded for us. As we grow older, the responsibility for doing so rest upon the individual. The critical period may come in middle life with the sudden realization that the physical capital is yielding diminishing returns in the way of physical well being. A large number of the deaths reported each year in Texas is due to the degenerative diseases of middle age.

"Nearly all of these diseases have slow beginnings, and their onset can often be recognized in the course of a thorough physical examination before they have gained serious headway. In the majority, early detection of menacing conditions with a readjustment of physical expenditures and a better budgeting of activities, under the physician's direction, will help to shift the balance from unfavorable to the favorable side of the ledger."

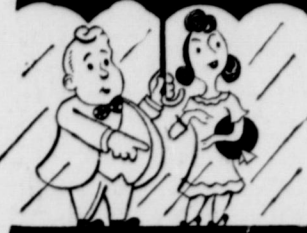

Your New SOCIAL SECURITY



(Editors Note: This is another in a series of informational articles prepared by Raleigh R. Tuley, Jr., Manager of the Abilene District Office.)

The extension of coverage under the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act, effective with 1955, includes the following:

The largest group of gainfully-employed people in the nation not heretofore covered by social security has now been brought in—the 3.6 million self-employed farm operators. Commencing January 1, 1955, these farm operators will be covered on the same terms as other self-employed people, except for a provision which simplifies the reporting procedure for farm operators with low annual incomes. The first social security tax will be paid early in 1956 on 1955 income.

Abolishing the old requirement that farm workers be regularly employed by one employer means that over two million additional farm employees will have social security protection for themselves and their families. The new provision simply requires that the farm hand be paid \$100 cash wages in a calendar year by one employer.

About 200,000 more domestic employees in private households will be covered by the law because of the removal of the former requirement that the domestic employee work 24 days in each calendar quarter in any one household. Here the requirement now is the payment of only \$50 cash wages by one household employer in a calendar quarter.

About 3,500,000 employees of

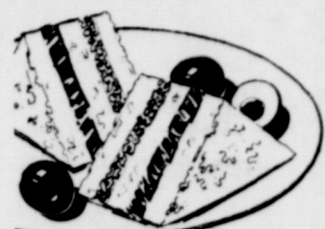
State and local governments, excluded up to now because they are under a retirement system, may now be brought under social security subject to a referendum.

Ministers, whether employed or self-employed, may come under the law as if they were self-employed persons. Included in this provision are Christian Science practitioners.

Other self-employed groups to be covered by social security as of January 1, 1955, are professional engineers, accountants, architects, and funeral directors.

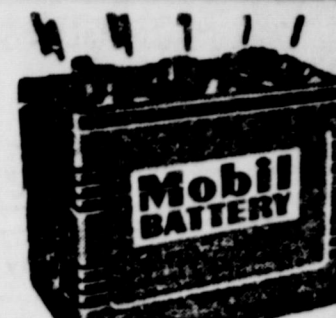

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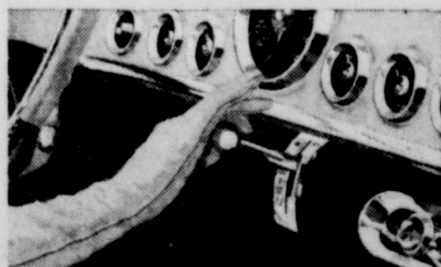

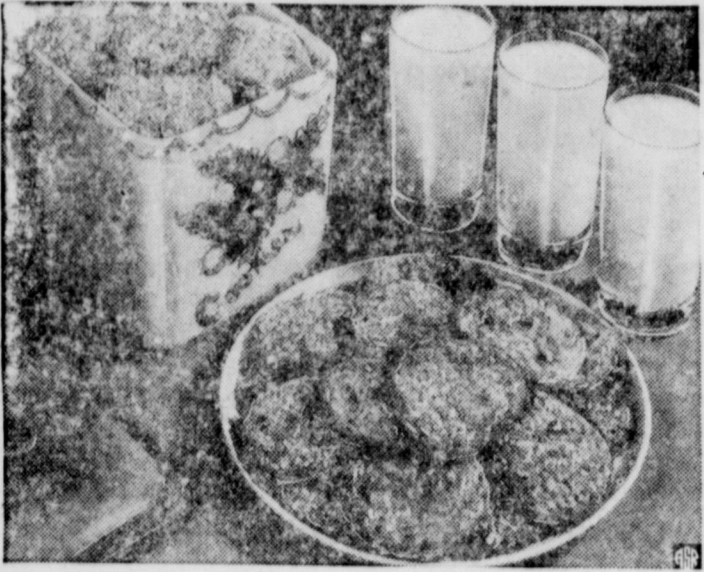

| 1/2 cup brown sugar | 1 1/2 cups rolled oats, uncooked |
| 1/2 cup granulated sugar | |

Sift together flour, soda, and salt into bowl. Add fat, sugars, egg, lemon rind, and lemon juice. Beat until smooth, about 2 minutes. Fold in pecans and rolled oats. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased cooky sheet and bake in moderate oven (375 F.) 8 to 10 minutes. Yield: 3 1/2 dozen cookies.

Budget Hints

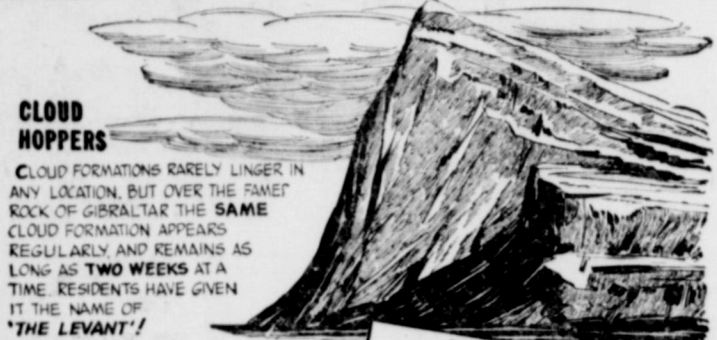

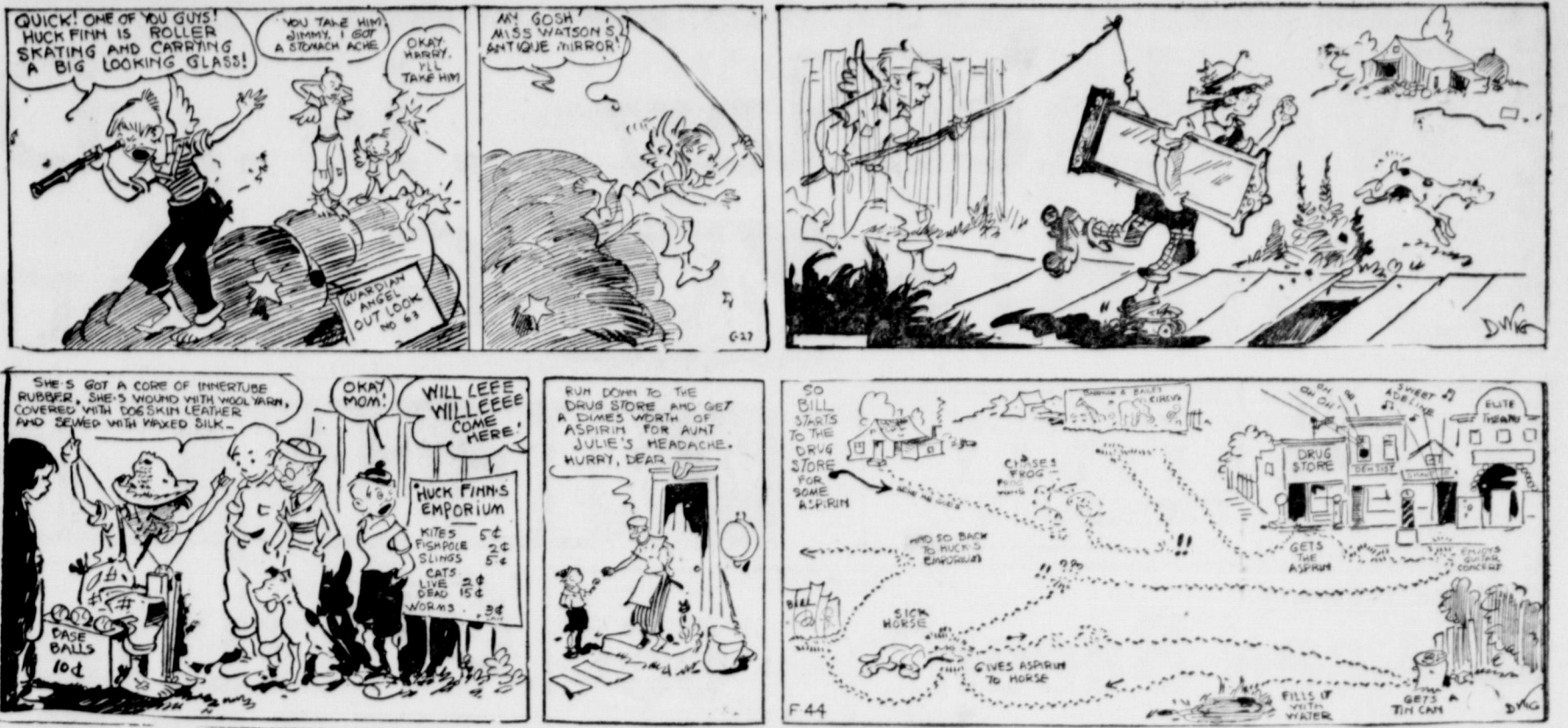

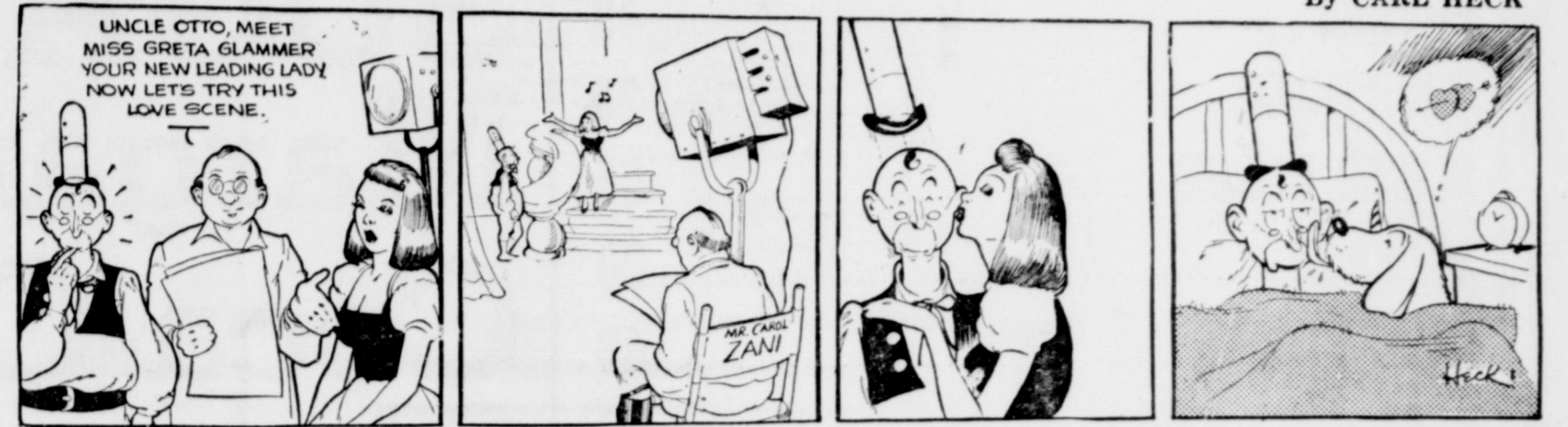
