'CONTRACT SIGNED'

Old City Hall To Be Razed By Big Spring Man for Salvage

Eastland's 49-year-old city hall building continues to be the center of controversy, in even what appears to be its last days.

The City Commission condemned the building, declared it unsafe, and took steps to move into a different building.

They bought the McGraw Motor Co. building on S. Seaman St. and it is now in the process of being refurbished for the city's use.

Naturally, the question came up: "What to do with the old building?"

Since it was considered unsafe, the only logical thing, reasoned the Commissioners, was to have it torn down and convert the site, at the corner of West Commerce, and S. Daugherty St. into a vacant lot.

How to dispose of it? Well, first offers weren't encouraging. One man offered to tear it down and clean the lot for \$9,000 and the materials. The Commission didn't want to be on the paying end of any such deal.

Commissioner Milton Fullen recommended a man from Big Spring, whom he thought might be interested.

Psst! Is Yours An Alias?

If you are using a legally assumed name and plan to continue to do so, you're going to have to re-register it.

And too, if you're using a legally registered alias, chances are you'd better check on that too.

County Clerk Johnson Smith has announced that in accordance with new state statutes, all registered, assumed names become null and void on the last day of this year.

Purpose of the re-registering is because the books are filled with registrations and many of them are for persons who are not even living.

So the legislature acted to clear the books and start over. The same was done with cattle brands several years ago, it is reported.

You have until December 31st to re-register your assumed name, or alias, with the County Clerk's office. Fee is \$1.

If you don't re-file your preferred alias—somebody else may be using it next year, you know.

200 Eat Farm Bureau Barbecue And Learn 'All About the Bees'

Approximately 200 Eastland County Farm Bureau members and guests ate their fill of barbecue and all the trimmings in Eastland City Park Friday night, and heard "all about the bees."

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, president emeritus of Hardin

Simmons University and noted historian talked to the Bureau members in their own language.

Stating that he himself is a farmer, he said he didn't farm for a hobby either—no one can afford to farm for a hobby anymore.

Standing atop one of the picnic tables, in a relaxed manner for which he is famous, Dr. Richardson told the farmer

"We are a minority", and the warned that the more "assistance we accept, the more controls we are going to get."

Times have changed, he pointed out, and today farmers, of farm connected interests, control only about one-quarter of the total vote, and he lauded the Farm Bureau for its conservative stands and support of the farm families' interest.

He cited France as a country where farmers have been "controlled" completely.

Finishing what he called his "two-minute" speech, Dr. Richardson launched into his well-known, at least to everyone who has ever been associated with H-SU, "bee" talk.

It begins with "Ring", back of his old hound, "Ring", back when the doctor was living on a "way out" farm in nearby Stephens County.

The bee talk is given each semester as a channel talk, and has become as traditional as the "six white horses" at Hardin-Simmons.

The narrative, in the historian's particular style of slow-gaited, well-chosen words, tell of Ring's "listless wool" and his treeing a bee tree.

Dr. Richardson called Ring "but" dog—he was a squirrel dog, but he chased rabbits. He was a coon dog, but he was just as likely to take off after a cricket.

The find of the bee tree caused the then-budding educator (he later was principal at Cisco for a year) to become deeply interested in the lives

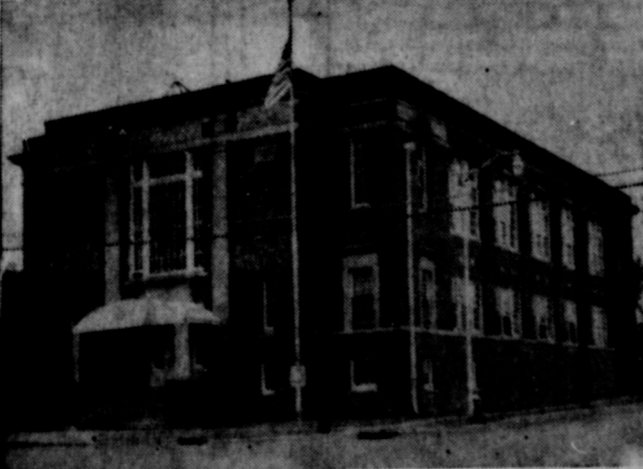

Pre-Registration Begins For College Students On Monday

Pre-registration of students for the 1962-63 school year will begin Monday at Cisco Junior College, according to an announcement by Dean E. W. Mince, registrar.

About half of the students who will attend CJC this fall are expected to take advantage of the pre-registration period from August 20 through September 8, Mr. Mince said. By pre-registering, students may arrange a convenient class

schedule, enrolling before classes become crowded or closed.

A \$20 fee will be required upon registration, with \$50 tuition to be paid when the fall semester begins Sept. 14. Students will need their high school transcript if they are registering for the first time at CJC, as well as the results of their ACT test, Mr. Mince said.

Students may register any day during the pre-registration period. Office hours are from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. on weekdays and from 9 a. m. to noon on Saturdays.

Mr. Mince said the early registration of students would benefit school officials and students.

"Browsing With Bev"

During the past couple of weeks, I have been on vacation in Jacksonville, North Carolina, visiting my brother and his family. Jacksonville is the county seat of Onslow County, a county about the size of Eastland County. One afternoon I visited the Extension Service offices mainly to visit with the Home Demonstration Agent, but before I left it seemed I had met about everyone in the building, as the people were very friendly. In Onslow County there are six agents, three women and three men. The Home Demonstration Agent told me she has 20 Home Demonstration Clubs in the county which she meets six times a year. During the time I was in the office, the Assistant Co. Home Demonstration agent was conducting a clothing tailoring workshop for the 4-Hers.

From this visit with the agents, I picked up some good tips and a lot of new ideas. We exchanged bulletins and they gave me many interesting ones. If you are ever in the office remind me and I will show you these bulletins as they are all very interesting.

This visit was of special interest to me so I have passed it on to you, hoping you have found it interesting to learn about how the Extension Agents work in another county in another state far to the East from us.

Here is a little idea I picked up while in Jacksonville that you might want to try in your own yard. One evening we had coffee in the home of the editor of the Daily News, the Jacksonville paper. They have a beautiful and very large lawn to go with the home. We were in the yard looking at the many different kinds of trees; the pines, dogwoods and holly to name a few. I noticed that in the holly tree was hanging a large pine cone so I asked why it was there. They told me that they spread the pine cones with peanut butter and hang them in the trees for the birds to eat.

"Any prospective college student is welcome to call at our offices to ask questions or to discuss anything they desire about their plans for higher education," Mr. Mince said. The college offers complete two-year courses leading to degrees in virtually every field. An associate of arts degree is conferred on graduates of the school who complete two full years of work.

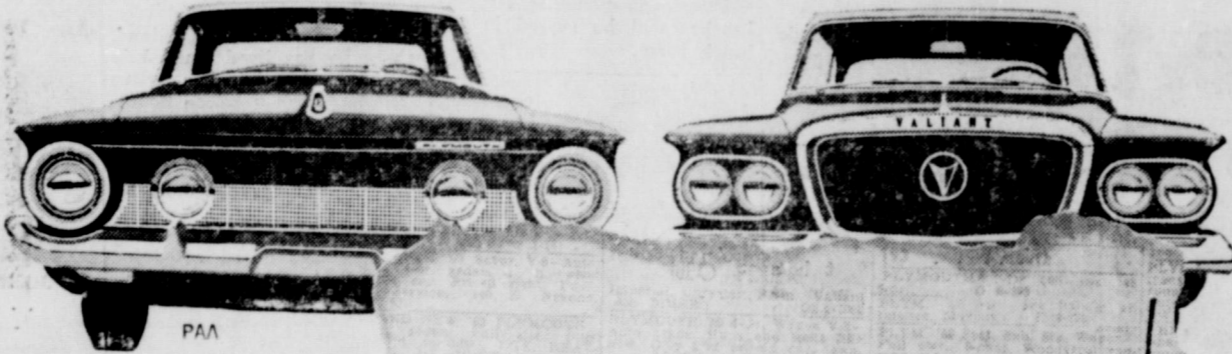

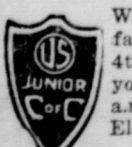

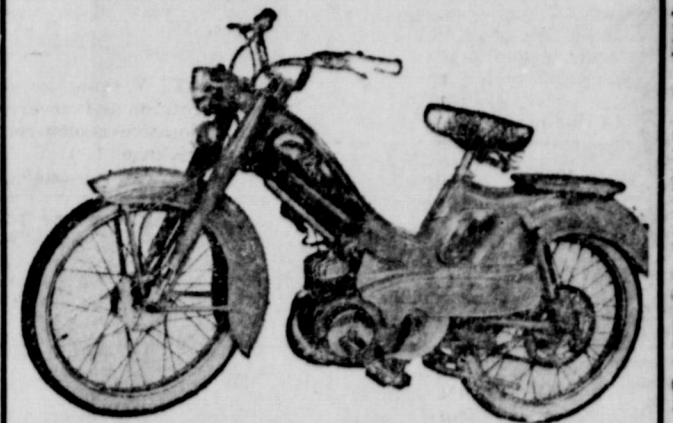
