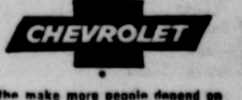

COURT ACTION EMMETT CISCO SCHOOL BOND

A contest of the recent \$700,000 school bond issue approved by taxpayers of the Cisco Independent School District appeared imminent today after an action was filed late Monday in 91st District Court at Eastland by Park P. Plambeck, a stock farmer living south of Cisco.

The action, which was interpreted by school officials as a notice of intention to contest the election, was filed by Scarborough, Black and Tarpley, Abilene law firm, in Mr. Plambeck's name. All members of the board of trustees were personally served with a copy of the action by Mr. Plambeck over the weekend.

The court action noted that Mr. Plambeck "hereby contests this election and as grounds therefore would show:

"1. That there were more than 167 people who voted in favor of said school bonds who were not qualified taxpayers within the meaning of the statute.

"2. That there were more than 167 people who voted in favor of said bonds who had not properly rendered their property for taxation before August 14, the day said election was called.

"3. That one of the election clerks left the polls at 4 p. m. and openly solicited voters to vote in favor of the school bond election.

"4. That active electioneering was done at the very door to the polls by people in favor of school bond election.

"5. That the voters were never legally tallied, but by voice vote were supposedly declared cancelled by accepting the tally sheet figures."

The action asked the school to file a reply within ten days "as required by law under Article 9.04."

The election was held last Sept. 9 with a total of 1,224 ballots being cast. There were 675 votes in favor of the bonds and 508 against them.

Mr. Plambeck was also reported to be circulating a petition attempting to hold another election to void the bonds before they are sold. At this time the sale has not been completed as the school board is in the process of issuing advertisements and invitations to bid on the bonds to all interested purchasers.

This action could result in a considerable savings on the interest rate, President George Brown of the board said. R. A. Underwood & Co. of Dallas is acting as agents for the board in negotiating the

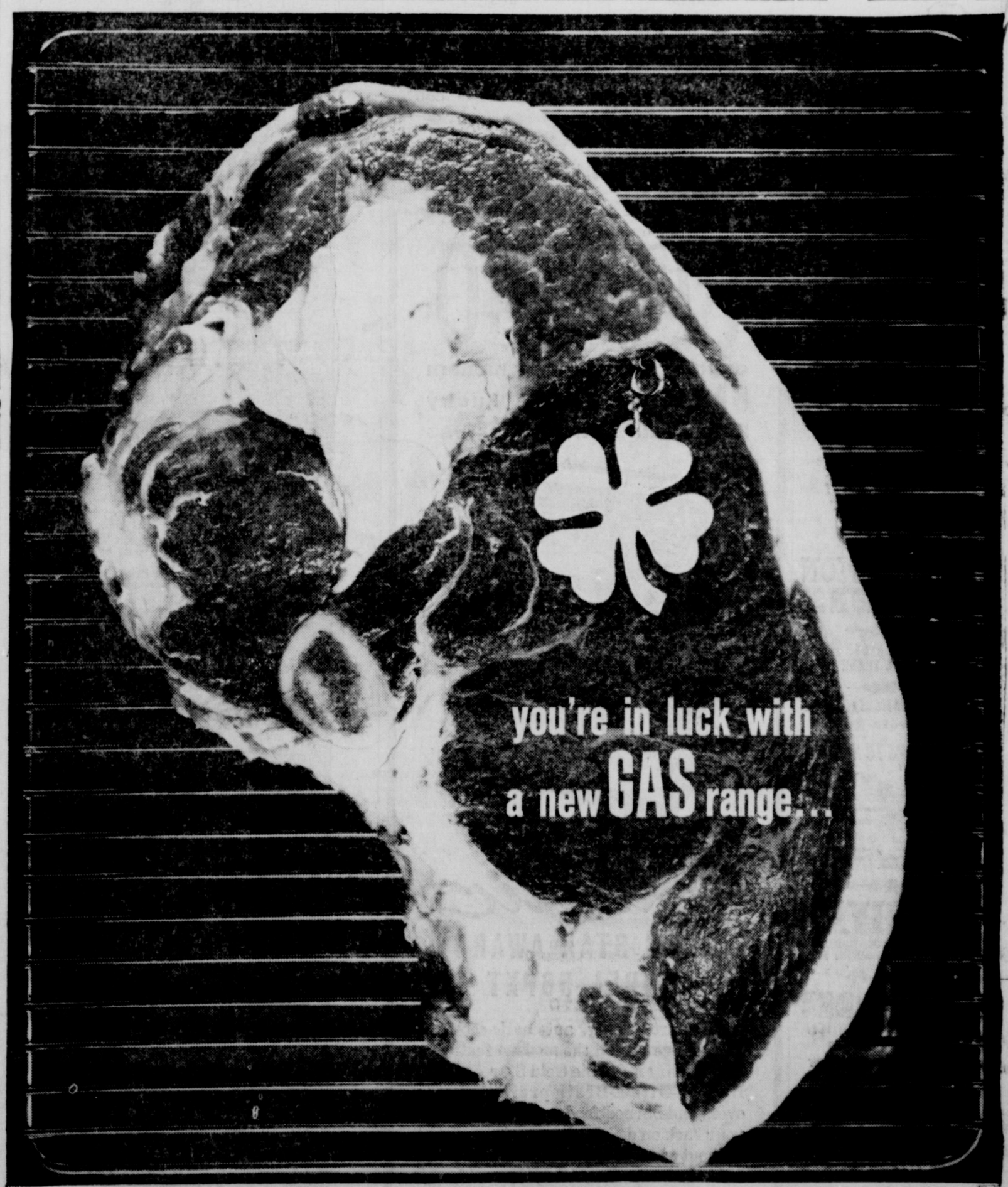

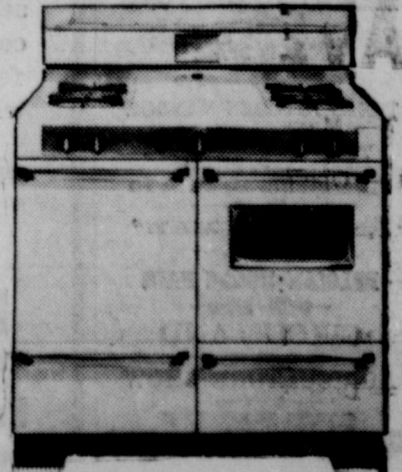
