The try for extra points failed and the score stood at 6-0.

The Lions charged thru, blocked the kick with Charles Gilbert scooping up the ball and crossing the goal for Dublin's only T. D.

JUDGE JOHN H. HART

John S. Hart, 72, county judge of Eastland County for 16 years and a prominent citizen of this region for more than 60 years, died at 9:30 p. m. Thursday in a hospital at Temple about a month after undergoing major surgery.

Funeral services for Judge Hart were conducted at 2 p. m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church in Cisco with Dr. P. D. O'Brien of Big Spring, a long-time friend, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Jesse E. Cassie, pastor. Judge Hart was a long time member of the Cisco church.

Burial followed in Corinth cemetery, midway between Cisco and Eastland, in a plot near the graves of his late parents, I. N. and Katy Hart. Hamner Funeral Home of Eastland was in charge of arrangements.

Judge Hart had gone to Temple with his wife last Wednesday for a checkup. Death was attributed to complications from abdominal surgery.

The veteran county official was born Nov. 28, 1890, in Bell County. He moved with his family to Eastland County as a boy eight years old. In his early manhood, he taught school for a time before entering politics. He was elected county tax collector in 1919 and served three terms.

In 1926, Judge Hart was elected sheriff of Eastland County and it was during his term of office in 1927 that the famous Santa Claus bank robbery took place in Cisco. After one term, Judge Hart joined the Texas Railroad Commission's proration forces in East Texas and spent several years in the employ of the state, working also at Midland.

In 1941, Judge Hart ran for sheriff of the county and was elected. After two terms, he was elected county judge. Last spring, he won re-election over two opponents without a runoff and was to have started a new four-year term next January 1.

Judge and Mrs. Hart were married Dec. 1, 1912, and planned to observe their golden wedding anniversary this year. The family home has been a rural residence on their farm six miles northeast of Cisco on the Breckenridge Highway for many years.

Besides his wife, Judge Hart is survived by three sons, John L. Hart of Abilene, N. O. Hart of Odessa and Bill daughter, Mrs. Wayne Brock of Olden; 12 grandchildren; three brothers, I. N. Hart, Jr. and Gus Hart of Cisco and J. B. Hart of Midland; and four sisters, Miss Rosa Hart and Mrs. J. E. Norris of Cisco, Mrs. Joe Mathis of Eastland, and Mrs. T. A. Thompson of San Angelo.

Judgeship Succession Questions Answered

The death Thursday evening of County Judge John Hart has naturally brought forth speculation in the county as to who will become the new head of the County Court.

Charles Freyschlag was appointed Special Judge by the county practicing attorneys about a month ago when Judge Hart went to Temple for surgery.

The current 60-day session of court expires on November 12th, and Freyschlag's appointment also expires on that date.

In the opinion of County Attorney Earl Conner Jr., the Commission Court will need to appoint a person to complete the unexpired term of Judge Hart, effective with the Nov. 12th session ending date.

More involved however, is the determination of the name to appear on the November general election ballot, to be elected for the forthcoming full term which will begin on January 1.

According to the statutes, the party's executive committee, comprised of the county chairman, and the precinct chairmen, must appoint a nominee and have him certified to the County Clerk 20 days before the general election.

This committee is to meet in Eastland next Thursday.

Alvin Crawley of Ranger was elected county chairman in the May primary and assumed that position immediately after the election.

\$7,300 UF Budget Okayed by Directors

Another agency has been added to the Eastland United Fund this year and a request from another agency was turned down when the board of directors approved a \$7,300 budget this week.

Newest member of the Eastland Fund is the Eastland Little League which will receive \$1,200.

The screening committee did not recommend the addition of the Teen-Age League to the Fund this year.

The Teen-Age League, which is made up of boys from 12

to 15 years old, asked \$900.

Two other agencies' requests were pared.

The Boy Scouts of America asked for \$2,200 and \$1,400 participation was approved.

The Y.M.C.A. asked \$1,500, the same as last year, and had \$1,200 approved.

The America Red Cross allocated \$1,500; the Salvation Army, \$1,000; the Camp Fire Girls, \$100; Texas Rehabilitation Center, \$250; Texas United Fund, \$450; and campaign expenses was again estimated

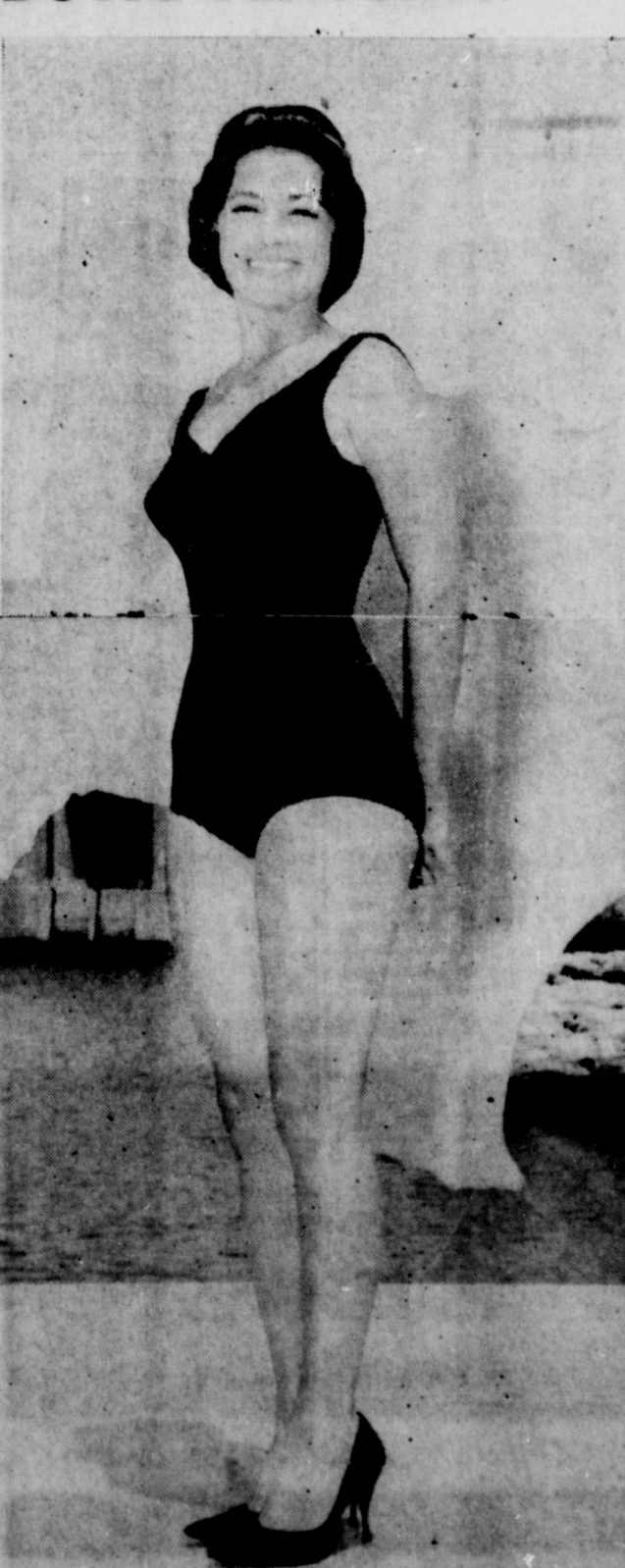

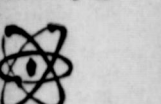

Demise of a Public Servant

County Judge John H. Hart was buried yesterday in a cemetery in the heart of the county which he loved and served for the biggest part of his life.

An elected employe of Eastland County for almost 40 years, he had at various times been its tax collector, its sheriff, and for the past 15 or so years, the county's highest elective office.

A 24-hour-a-day official, Judge Hart was a favorite and swept the May primary for Democratic nomination for re-election.

Eastland County voters gave him 3,071 votes to his opponent's 1,855.

Practicing in the old-school manner, the door to Judge Hart's office was open to everybody.

Few loved to swap stories better than he, and few can do the type of deep reasoning and thinking "inside" while at the same time, spinning a yarn for the delight and pleasure of the listeners.

Friendliness and fairness seemed to be the Judge's hallmark.

Criticized by some for his "give-away" practices, Judge Hart reasoned that it was the county's place to help its own people.

With the Judge, it was "Charity begins at home."

The number of youngsters he has counseled, and perhaps scolded in a "favorite uncle" manner is legendary, and there are probably hundreds who can remember the Judge starting out a conference with "Now young man, I can remember when your old daddy and me use to..."

He came from a big family of boys, and raised a good crop of his own. He knew boys backwards and forwards.

Generations have come and gone since Judge Hart was first elected to an Eastland County office in 1920, and during that time his chief pleasures were seeing the courthouse which he loved so dearly, "paid off", and the financial coffers of the county grow from near bankruptcy through 'depressions and droughts, to a sound basis today.

Judge Hart was a big man, in stature, and in purpose.

There's a big, brown, over-sized leather chair on the second floor of the courthouse.

It groaned under the weight of Judge John Hart for a long, long time.

"That chair is going to miss the judge.

And so will a lot of people in this county.

Air Conditioning Factory Here Could Lead to Even Better Things

The air conditioning business is big business. And if the air conditioning building firm "gets going good" in Eastland, it could lead to even bigger and better things.

Besides the manufacture of fiberglass air conditioners, it is conceivable, according to company spokesmen, that the same basic fiberglass can be used for other products.

Roofing, siding, pipe treatment—to name a few.

But first off, it'll be air conditioners here.

E. H. Everett, president of New Line Manufacturing Co., is optimistic, to say the least, for his fiberglass air conditioners.

Everett said that the all-new air conditioner line will be made of fiber glass except for the blower wheel and the motor. The pump will be made of plastic. He said that it would be the nearest all fiber glass air conditioner that could be made.

Several types and sizes of air conditioners will be manufactured in the Eastland plant. They will include window, commercial and down-draft from 600 to 15,000 s.z.e.

Everett said that the fiberglass construction of the air conditioner was very sturdy and should last indefinitely. The air conditioner will carry a five-year warranty against rust. Weight of the air conditioner will be approximately half as much as a metal air conditioner.

He said that the fiber glass construction would cut maintenance to a minimum and also said that noise usually associated with metal air conditioners, would be eliminated.

In tests conducted by Everett, the air conditioner withstood temperatures of 110 degrees down to 8 degrees with no ill effects. He pointed out that fiber glass does not absorb heat and therefore the new air conditioner will have a much better cooling capacity than a metal air cooling.

The coolers will be manufactured in a variety of colors to match exterior house paints and will have several designs on the pad covers.

Everett indicated that several other fiber glass products would eventually be manufactured by his firm.

Born in Paris, Texas, Everett conceived the idea for fiber glass air conditioners about two years ago. After building his first model, he secured a patent for the air conditioner.

Everett moved to Olden in 1949 where he worked for Lone Star Gas Company for many years.

He served in the navy for three years in the Pacific Theatre during World War II as a first class master of arms. He was stationed at the San Francisco Naval Base for two years, serving as a secret and confidential messenger. Wounded in action in the Pacific in 1942, he was hospitalized for one year.

Everett is a member of the Panger Masonic Lodge, Moslah Temple of Fort Worth and the Gross Timbers Shrine Club.

"Browsing Important Tips On With Bev" Home Painting

Do you look for a nice bright sunny day to do your wash? Well, it's not always the woman who gets her wash out first who gets the best results. Clothes come out whitest if you wait until 11 o'clock or so to hang out the wash.

There is less fading between 9 and 11 a.m. and less bleaching in the afternoon between 1 and 3 p.m.

As for durability, the sun takes its greatest toll in the summer months. Unbleached fabrics suffer most.

Here are a couple of interesting facts: More bleaching and more fading occurs during the midsummer months. There's better retention of whiteness in your clothes in late summer.

Wire hangers used by dry cleaners are only a temporary means of transporting clothes from the cleaning establishment to your home—and should not become a permanent necessity in your clothes closet. Wire hangers are not shaped correctly for clothes to hang on them for a long time.

They cause the garment to lose shape and droop. Wire hangers also have a way of poking into garments. They may cause holes or snags in loosely woven or fragile fabrics.

Painting a masonry surface isn't difficult if you follow a few tips from experts.

First, the surface must be firm, clean and dry. If old cement or paint can be scratched away by rubbing the edge of a coin across its surface, it should be removed.

Scrubbing with a broom or wire brush works most of the time, but etching with a 10 per cent solution of muriatic acid is necessary if there is an "encrusted" skin or a white powdery salt coming from the cement.

One of the most important things in choosing a suitable paint is choosing a suitable primer. Recommended are paints which are waterproof, self-cleaning, adhere well, are easy to apply and have a short drying time.

The paint also should resist alkalies, mildew, staining and discoloration.

But even the best paint may peel if there are leaks which allow water to get behind the paint. To assure a lasting job, you should seal holes and cracks in mortar joints with cement, while joints around door and window frames should be caulked tight.

If the concrete block, brick, stucco or asbestos-cement shingle surface you're painting is obviously coarse and porous, you should seal it with a primer cement coat before painting.

Paint specialists say the sides of a house most exposed to the sun should get an extra coat of paint. In figuring the amount of paint needed, plan on a gallon covering about 400 square feet.

Applying paint the right way is the final step in a successful masonry paint job. Usually, the first coat is thinned up to 25 per cent—depending on the surface's condition—for penetration. The finish coat should be thinned very little, if at all.

When is the best time to paint? The west or north sides during the morning and the east or south sides during the afternoon.

The best season is spring or fall, thus avoiding extremely cold or hot weather. Avoid painting after a rain. Best time is a windless day when the air is free of dust and insects.

IMPORTANT DEEP OIL TEST BEING DRILLED IN COUNTY

An oil test of considerable interest began drilling in northwest Eastland County Thursday as the T. A. Newman No. 1 S. A. Davis Estate, a 5,700-foot project located six and a half miles north east of Cisco.

A Cambrian sand test, the project is expected to be watched with interest by operators of the region as most

land County. The firm has a 334 acre lease for the test, it was understood.

The location is 2,600 feet north of Texstar et al No. 1 Gordon Woods, a wildcat that was completed as a good Mississippi lime producer several months ago. Wells formerly produced from the Caddo and Marble Falls formations on the Davis property, it was reported.

In 1928, a cable tools test went to 5,600 feet on the Davis lease. June Davis of the family reported that the well encountered considerable water in upper formations. A cementing job failed to shut it off and oil shows that were encountered were never given an opportunity to produce, he believed. The test was eventually abandoned.

The Newman company has production in the Ranger area, and Max Anderson of Ranger will look after the firm's interests in the test, it was reported.

Oil men said it had been many years since an oil test went below the Ellenburger lime in Eastland County.

Elsewhere in the county, Tex-Star Oil Co. of Dallas spotted their No. 1 U. V. Hogg as a 3,500 foot rotary wildcat five miles northeast of Desdemona in Eastern Eastland County. The location is 3,334 feet from the north and 2,000 feet from the west lines of the William Sargent Survey.

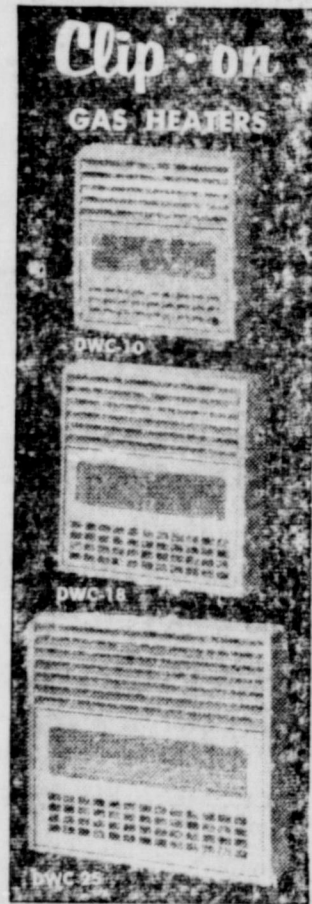

Eastland's entry in the contest will be Julie Frost, 17 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy C. Frost of 402 S. Dixie.

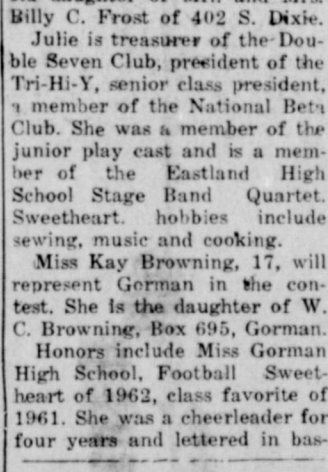

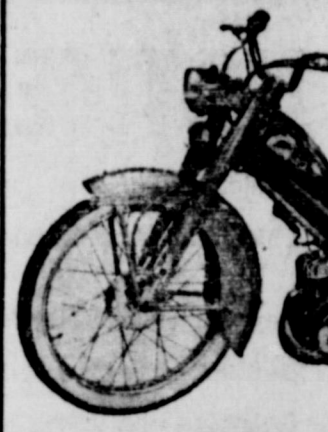
