Many people in Eastland County may not be famaliar with the use being made of the fourth floor of the Eastland County Courthouse.

Others may be well acquainted with its use.

The fourth floor of the courthouse consists of dormi-

tories for jury members who are required to remain overnight during the course of a trial. Accomodations for male jurors have been present for many

years. Only since the female species began to have a voice in public trials, about seven years ago have accomodations been made available for them. The women's dormitory is

located on the east side of the building. It includes six beds, rest room facalities, tables and

Me 's facalities, located on the west side of the building, have basically the same fix-tures, however, 13 beds are available instead of the women's six. Also, tables chairs are present for pastimes

of dominoes and cards.

The dormitories are used for jury members only. Upon failure to close certain trial cases in one day, jurors are required to remain overnight in the dorms. They must continue to spend nights there until a verdict is reached and the jurors dismissed.

While staying in the dormitories, jurors are allowed no outside contacts and use of the telephone is limited. Also, discussion of any case with anyone other than jury members is forbidde 1.






