The Eastland County 4-H clubbers are after another first-place trophy. Winners of last year's Peanut Bowl parade are already well on their way to what they hope will be another winning float. During a planning session Thursday evening at the home of Roger Blackmon, assistant county agent, adult 4-H leaders mapped out plans for their entry. Theme and details are, of course, a closely-guarded secret. Attending the session were Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Cox and David; Mr. and Mrs. Bill Claborn, Frank and Cytha; Ben Drake, all of Eastland; Mrs. Jeff Harbin of Carbon; and Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Lee of Cisco. The Junior Chamber of Commerce this week is issuing invitations to organizations, clubs and businesses in Eastland County and this area to enter floats in the Peanut Bowl Parade, in downtown Eastland the afternoon of Sept. 29. The Bowl game between Ranger Junior College and Cisco Junior College will be played on Maverick Field, Eastland, at 8 p.m. Sept. 29. Dale Troutt is parade marshal and expects this year's parade to equal or exceed the 1961 parade, which had an estimated 1,600 persons participating, including some 200 horseback riders, nearly 400 marching bandmen, riders on floats, Boy Scout Troops, Brownie Troops, and many others. The winning band in the 1961 parade was "The Marching 100" from Poly High School in Fort Worth, directed by Roger Martin, who now is band director at Ranger Junior College. An estimated 10,000 persons saw the parade, some 2,000 attended the Skydivers show at Eastland International Airport and over 4,000 attended the 2nd annual Peanut Bowl Game. Bill Crocker, president of Eastland Jaycees, said a barbecue will be held this year, in the time between the parade and the game. It will be catered. Chairman Ben McKinlin will announce the time and place. Plans for selection of the Peanut Bowl Queen are under way with Dick Dixon, chairman, making the arrangements. This year's selection of the queen will be staged with ceremony and the public is invited. Time and place will be announced by Dixon. Carol McMoy, Peanut Bowl Queen for 1961, will crown the winner, who will be selected from among contestants from each town in Eastland County.

 Mix powdered sugar and lemon juice until it will spread. You will need about 1/2 cup of this mixture. When the cake is done, spread this mixture over the cake and return to the oven which has been turned off. This is the icing for the cake, however the cake is good served without icing.  
 Here is a tip I picked up from one of the Home Demonstration Club ladies, Mrs. W. P. Edwards of Olden, Mrs. Edwards makes buttermilk using non-fat dry milk solids and one cup of commercially prepared buttermilk. She prepares the milk following directions on the package. For each quart of milk, she adds one cup of commercially prepared buttermilk and allows it to remain at room temperature overnight, then beats this thoroughly and she has buttermilk.

**Golden Year Celebration To Honor Couple Today**

An open house will honor the Rev. and Mrs. J. Henry Littleton on their Golden Wedding Anniversary in their home at 510 W. Plummer here today, from 2 until 5 p.m.

The actual date of their anniversary is Sept. 4th but since that date will fall on Tuesday the celebration will be held today.

J. Henry Littleton and Fannie Lee Lewellen were married six miles northwest of Eastland Sept. 4, 1912, in the home in which Mr. Littleton grew up. They met in Eastland when Mrs. Littleton, who was working in Waco was visiting her Grandmother here.

Mrs. Littleton was born in Frost, Texas and reared in Oklahoma and Texas.

Rev. Littleton was born and reared in Eastland.

Rev. and Mrs. Littleton were the first husband-and-wife team to graduate at the same time from Hardin-Simmons University. After five years of hard work, they finished in the same class in 1923.

Brother Littleton tells that during the graduation exercises President Sanderfer made the remark, "If it hadn't been for 'her', he would have had the highest grade of any 'littleton' in his class."

Rev. Littleton was 21 when he became a minister. His first church was at Pioneer in Stephens County. He was pastor there and at Salum in Shackelford County when they married. They moved to Crystal Falls, which was a half-time church, so he continued to preach once each month at Pioneer and Salum.

The Littletons moved to Hamlin in 1925 when he became pastor of the First Baptist Church there. They lived there until 1939 when he became district missionary. During his pastorate there the church was built in 1928 and the pastors home in 1929.

In the years before 1925 he was pastor at Crystal Falls for four years, associational missionary of Stephens County a year, pastor of the New Hope Church in Stephens County and Scranon Church in Callahan County, pastor at the New Hope Church in the Cisco Association and at Frankell in Stephens County. He went to Clyde in 1921. This half-time church went to fulltime in 1922. He continued there as pastor while he was attending Hardin-Simmons and left there in 1924. He built a church building the next year at Cross Plains.

Rev. Littleton served as District 17 Missionary for 15 years and as Lueder's Encampment Manager for 30 years. Most of the time as district missionary, the Rev. and Mrs. Littleton lived in Abilene, with the exception of two years at Anson and the past few years at the Lueder's Encampment grounds. They had not intended to move to the Encampment grounds. They just went down there for the summer Camp season and didn't move back.

He was presented a new car from the district upon his retirement as missionary in 1956. They moved to their home in Eastland in 1958 after he resigned as Camp Manager.

The couple have one granddaughter, Mrs. Virginia Adams of Oklahoma. She and her husband, Givens Adams, a young attorney, who will be present for the occasion, have two children, John and Karon.

Close friends of the couple will be house hosts for the celebration.

## General Big Game Hunting Openings This Year Are October 20 and 27

If you have a favorite deer area, you will find it in the numbered sections of the above map. The map shows the dates of the regular season and the type of hunt for each area. More information is given in the special colored map being distributed by the Game and Fish Department, which will soon be available at any licensing station or will be sent to you if you request a post card from the Colorado Game and Fish Department, Sherman St., Denver 1.

In addition to the regular deer seasons and hunting areas, the Game and Fish Department again this year has established eight pre-season, extended-season and post-season hunts, in selected areas of heavy deer population. The hunter is allowed to take either two or three deer of either sex, or hunter's choice. The earliest of these seasons opens Aug. 18, and four of them continue into December, two of them ending Dec. 31.

Special permits are not required for these hunts. One exception is the Sept. 15 to Oct. 15 pre-season hunt on the Southern Ute Indian reservation, for which access is by permit from the Southern Ute Tribal council. Permits are for three deer, and are available from the Tribal Council at Ignacio. Colorado big game licenses are also required.

All bonus deer—all deer taken other than your first—require a Second Deer license.

**MAJOR DEER SEASON**... areas are shown on the map above in large circled numbers, coded in series from 101 to 110. Small circled numbers are the regular established Game Management Units. Hunting areas ordinarily—but not always—follow Game Management Unit boundaries. Areas in solid black are closed to all hunting.
