Those holding hunter's choice permits in the Estes Park area who fail to connect during regular season will be eligible for a special post-season hunt Dec. 1 to Dec. 31 in the northern half

of the same area.

The bulk of Hunter's Choice elk permit seasons coincide with regular deer and big game hunting season.

Neither residents nor out-ofstate hunters are required to employ licensed guides to hunt elk or deer in Colorado. Any big game hunter holding






