It was a hot time in this old town last night! The Eastland Mavericks plastered the Double-A district-picked Comanche Indian team 20-14. Rated low and picked to sweep the cellar of their own single A district, the Mavericks showed local fans what hard work, good football training and the will to win can do to the old scoreboard. Mighty happy with the outcome were the fans that packed Maverick stadium on an unusually hot September night and every fan got his money's worth in football action. Eastland drew first blood only six plays and less than three minutes after the Indians kicked off, when Quarterback Tommy Beck handed off to Jimmy Moylan who found his hole and looped 54 yards for the first TD. Superb downfield blocking paved the way for the galloping fullback. A jump pass, used later in the game very effectively, for extra points was no good.

The rest of the first quarter was the Mavs' but the Indians scored within 45 seconds after the second quarter opened when Comanche King Pins, Quarterback Norris handed off to Fullback Todd. Maverick Moylan dropped a trial run for extra points for the Indians. So the score through the half and passed the third quarter was a tied-up ballgame. But with less than one minute gone in the fourth, the Norris-Todd duo clicked again when Todd eased over from about the two to pick up six more points. Another Indian that caused the Maverick trouble all night, Rachel, ran across for two more points, and the score stood at 14-6, Comanche. For the first time in the new season the local boys got the feel of being behind, and their training from Coaches Millard Glass, Denson Moody and Harold Price apparently paid off in dividends, because they didn't let down when they got on the short end of the score. Perhaps the key to the tussle was the fact that the Mavericks took advantage of every break. It almost seemed as though the boys in the Red and Black could see them.

Liquor Vote Defeated In Ranger by 28 Votes

For the second time in three months, Ranger voters said "no" to the legalized sale of alcoholic beverages within the corporate limits of the city. The measure was defeated by a slim margin of 28 votes. Voting against the issue were 480 citizens and voting for the measure were 452. A total of 932 votes were cast. A long line of voters were on hand before polls opened Saturday morning at 8 a.m. The line extended out the front door of the City Hall and onto the sidewalk.

The first election held on June 9 of this year was for the legal sale of beer and wine. Saturday's election included beer, wine and liquor, with no stipulation as to on or off premise sale. The June 9 election was defeated by 84 votes. Voting for legal sales were 423 and against 506. Three more votes were cast in this election than in the June 9 election. Monday Will Mark CJC's 22nd Year

Cisco Junior College will begin its 22nd year Monday with good prospects for a new record enrollment, according to an announcement Saturday by President G. C. Hogue. The school is a state supported two-year college.

The new school year will open with official registration Monday and Tuesday and freshman orientation Wednesday Thursday. Classes will meet for the first time on Friday.

As the college begins the biggest year in its history approximately 400 students are expected to complete enrollment requirements. Additional dormitory space is available, and new students are still being accepted, Hogue added.

Students will be required to pay a \$20 registration fee upon registration, and \$50 tuition before classes begin Friday. Resident students may arrange \$55 each to pay room and seven monthly payments of board, for the entire school year.

Freshman students will begin orientation at a.m. Wednesday.

Examination Important For Football Players

Football time is here again. All over the land American males are tossing and kicking and running with footballs, and the way from the eighth-year-olds in the backyard to junior and senior high and college teams to the big business of the professional leagues.

Football is a rough contact sport and inevitably will produce its full quota of bumps and bruises, strains and sprains, cuts and gashes. Most of these aren't serious and the lads concerned are back in the game shortly.

A thorough physical examination is highly important for boys preparing to go out for football. Take your boys to the family doctor and ask him to make certain that he has no physical condition that should be noted before he begins the rigorous training and hard knocks of the game.

Proper physical condition harden the body and increase resistance to fatigue, this helping to prevent injury. A minimum of three weeks of conditioning are recommended prior to the first game of the season. Coaches and doctors are alert to the fact that many injuries occur when the player is tiring and thus less alert. The coaches are quick to make substitutions when a player begins to slow down.

NOTICE: All Colorado 1962 Big Game Hunters

A record elk population and a more generous allocation of hunter's choice and special permits work together to give hunters in Colorado this year possibly their best chance to bag an elk in the state's history. Last year 8,905 of the permits were allocated and issued. This year there are to be 9,330 permits, 1,000 for antlerless only in the Rio Grande area, 200 specifying antlered or antlerless in the Taryall, South Park and Cold Springs areas, the rest hunter's choice.

Neither holding hunter's choice permits in the Estes Park area who fail to connect during regular season will be eligible for a special post-season hunt Dec. 1 to Dec. 31 in the northern half of the same area.

The bulk of Hunter's Choice elk permit seasons coincide with the regular deer and big game hunting season.

Neither residents nor out-of-state hunters are required to employ licensed guides to hunt elk or deer in Colorado.

Any big game hunter holding an elk license may hunt antlered elk during the big game season in any elk hunting area.

The 9,330 hunter's choice and special permits, which—in practice—more than double the hunter's chance of bagging an elk, are issued to hunters who make application and whose names are selected in an open lottery. Fifteen per cent of these permits are reserved for non-resident hunters. Hunters must apply for a specific permit area, and their applications will be considered only in the lottery for that area.

Deadline for applications for special elk permits is 5 p.m. (MST) Wednesday, Aug. 22, at the Game and Fish Department, 1530 Sherman St., Denver 1.

The public lottery will be held Thursday, Aug. 30, beginning at 8:30 a.m., in the House of Representatives chamber, State Capitol, Denver. Complete information on elk and all other big game hunting in Colorado, regulations and detailed color maps will be available on or about July 28, without cost, from the Department upon request, or from agencies where hunting licenses are on sale.

Hunters Should Know ...

Here are a few points to remember:

Tagging — Carcass coupon from Big Game License must be detached from the license, signed and dated, and attached to the carcass in camp storage or on vehicle for transportation, whichever occurs first. You must have a carcass coupon for every animal you kill.

Transportation, Donation — Before transporting or donating game, be sure you understand regulations.

Hunting from Highway Prohibited — You must be off the road or shoulder, and shoot in a direction and manner not to endanger traffic or life.

Be a Sport, Send Your Report — Whether OR NOT you take game, return the report card which is part of your Big Game license. This is required by regulations, but more important, it helps insure good hunting for you and all sportsmen in Colorado, next year and for years to come.

So after waiting around for an hour we were transported to the other school.

Here we were presented new school supply lists which consisted of many articles that were not on the previous list and some of the articles on the other list were not on the present list.

Do you think it would be possible for the school officials to inform us of such changes in advance.

We are not new in the school here, in fact have been attending here for several years.

As for reading in the paper about the change, if you stop to think a minute you will realize the people who ride the school bus do not receive their paper until the rural mail carrier comes which is usually mid-morning.

So we leave for school at seven and the news of school changes arrives in the paper at ten.

I am quite sure that when there is an over crowding of one grade it is very handy to say we will just send the bus children to the other school, but why can we not be democratic about the matter once in a while and draw out of a hat or something the number of students that must be moved.

This way you would have an even chance with everyone else to stay where you wanted to be.

Oh, we were informed that if we wished to transfer to another school we could fill out a form giving the reasons for wishing the transfer and they would taken under consideration unless the grade was over crowded.

Since the over crowding is the reason for transferring the students in the first place, this sounds like a nice way of saving that we have transferred you and there is nothing you can do about it.

So let us be different once in a while and not take the so easy way of always making the bus children balance the classes.
