Presently located in Ranger, Co, is increasing its capitol a d sought a larger building for expansion.

The young firm, which makes fiberglass coolers, asked help from Eastland in paying rent for a five-year period. Negotiations are underway between E. H. Everett, of Olde, chief executive of the company and designer of the cooling unit, to secure Pipkin Wholesale-Retail Grocery, located near the T&P railway in Eastland.

The board of directors of the industrial committee voted eight to one in favor of an agreement, the details of which are to be legally drawn, in which the chamber would subsidize the rent for the company, based on the number of full-time employes working at the Eastland plant.
