





Eastland schools' board of trustees approved a \$288,155-47 1962-63 budget, accepted the resignation of one of its members and ordered a revision of graduation requirements during a long, long session this week.

Grass Seed Crop Is Good; But Be Careful of Grazing

This is a most critical period as the seed heads in the dough stage are very nutritive and palatable to all types of livestock and much seed is lost each year in this manner.

UPPER LEON SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

The good rain we received fell just right to insure another native grass seed crop perhaps equal to the one made last year.

Our better tall grasses such as Indian grass, little bluestem, sand love grass, and purpletop are now in full bloom and after the rain we have moisture to mature seed.

The rain was several weeks late to increase the fill on sideoats grama and cotton top which are already shedding.

It is only through natural reseeding of the better grasses that most of our native grassland can reach the potential of production of which it is capable.

Best natural seed crops are made when pastures in this area are rested from summer until frost. Early summer rest allows the better more palatable grasses to gain leaf surface, deepen the root system, and gain vigor during July and August.

Discussions of graduation requirements took up over two hours during the Tuesday meet, and Supt. Wendell Siebert was finally asked to work out the wording on the change to be considered by the board when it meets again, Tuesday, Sept. 24th.

New budget is somewhat below last year's when \$282,596.220 was spent. Last year \$30,705.39 of the total budget went into the sinking fund debt service, as will \$30,638. this year.

The board accepted with regret the resignation of Member Rev. W. E. Hallenbeck Jr., who recently resigned the pastorate of an Eastland church, and who plans to do evangelistic work.

No action was taken on appointment or election of a replacement for the school post. In other matters the trustees:

Renewed a contract with the tax consultant consulting firm of Pritchard and Adams which cost the school about \$1,000 a year (at the rate of four cents on every \$100 valuation which the firm handles—primarily railway and utility accounts).

Authorized the Jaycees to handle their own seating arrangements at Maverick Stadium for their annual Peanut Bowl game.

Renewed the school insurance program and passed a yearly motion that all athletes, varsity and intramural, must be covered.

Discussed elementary school opening times and agreed that pupils should be admitted into the buildings by 7:45 on bad weather days, but should not be let in until starting time at 8 a.m. on warm, drydays.

The tardy bell at both elementary rings at 8:15. Pupils are not to be brought to school until 7:45 it was agreed.

Heard a report on teacher loads and assignments: Distribution is as follows: Thornton, 19; and Smith, 20. 2nd grade—Fraser, 23, Farnsworth, 24; and Hughes, 27.

3rd grade—Young 26; Green, 26; Cooper, 27. 4th grade—Durham, 20, Grimes, 21; and McKinnie, 30. 5th grade—Hern, 27; Turner, 25; and Green, 24.

6th grade, 78; 7th grade, 74; and eighth grade, 59—total junior high enrollment, 211. 9th, 80; 10th, 60; 11th, 43; and 12th, 35—total high school, 218.

There are 757 white students and 35 Negro for a total enrollment of 792. (A complete report of the adopted budget will appear in the Sunday Telegram).





Hints Offered on Peanut Drying

Curing peanuts by artificial means to prevent quality damage requires careful operation procedures on the part of the dryer operator. The proper use of heat is one of the most important factors, points out W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer.

If the peanuts are cured too rapidly, their milling quality will be reduced and if the peanuts are exposed to excessively high temperatures, off-flavor may occur, he adds.

Research engineers recommend that the air entering the peanut drying bin not exceed a temperature of 95 degree F with the relative humidity not less than 55 percent. To prevent over drying, only enough heat should be added to the curing air to reduce the relative humidity to a minimum of 55 percent, explains Allen. The fan should be started, he says, as soon as the air distribution system is uniformly covered with peanuts. Operate the fan continuously and move air up through the peanuts until the moisture content of the kernels in the top layer (six inches) of peanuts is reduced to 10 to 12 percent.

After the moisture is reduced to this level, turn off the heat, but continue to run the fan until all the peanuts are cool. Peanuts cured with heated air will lose about 2 percent kernel moisture to the dry hulls after curing. Additional information on curing peanuts by artificial means is available from local county agricultural agents, says Allen.



(Mack) Martin, 88, Remembers the 'Old Days'

(Mack) Martin, 88, lives on the same farm in the Long Branch community southwest of Eastland. He has lived for 61 years on the same farm in the Long Branch community southwest of Eastland. Mr. Martin tells of doing a man's work at the age of seven: plowing cotton. And he remembers the drought of 1886-87 when only one wagon load of cotton was produced on the farm. He was a youngster but tended the farm while his father cut cord wood in Carbo for the late Jim White. The wood was shipped by rail to Kansas, where there had been an unusually good corn crop, and traded for corn which was shipped back to Carbo. For months on end, the Martin family had corn bread to eat at every meal and to this day Mack Martin refuses to eat cornbread. He remembers coming to Eastland in an ox wagon and plowing with oxen. He recalls when there was only one house between Long Branch and Rising Star, and when there was only one house between Long Branch and Carbo. He remembers playing with the late Judge B. W. Patterson in Cisco, where they were both

children, and playing with Marion (Kid) Hoard, now of Dixon City and one of the few friends of his childhood who is still living. The 5-foot, 5-inch, 118-pound Mack Martin, soft voiced and silver haired, is never without his necktie. Since retiring in 1944 and moving to Eastland from his 163 1/2 acre farm, he has done odd jobs and some yard work. As recently as two weeks ago, during the extreme hot weather, he had a heart attack while mowing grass at a downtown business place. Now he says he has retired.

His dark eyes flash when he talks of old times. Asked if he ever had trouble with cattle rustlers and horse thieves, he said, "Some times." Prodded further about how he handled the situation, about how many times he had to shoot to protect his cattle and horses, he said, "About a dozen." One of his favorite stories concerns the night when horse thieves ran off his tire string of horses except one favorite cutting horse which was tied to the chuck wagon. He tells how he put his "right-hand man" on the horse with himself and they trailed the thieves to where they had fenced in the horses. The two men brought back the horses without ever seeing the thieves.

"We were ready for them but they never showed," he tells. Custom of the day was for the employer to furnish the Winchesters and each cowboy had his own six-shooter. There were 13 cowboys in Martin's outfit and he says, a bit wistfully, "I've outlived them all."

Mr. and Mrs. Martin, the former Emmar Hancock, now 81 years of age, have been married 64 years and according to Mr. Martin, "We've never had a fight." Mrs. Martin also was reared in Eastland County, living at Coyote Peak on the farm at Long Branch and in Eastland, a total of 78 years.

Mr. Martin went on his last cattle drive in 1898. He came home, telling his family he was through with the rough life of the cowboy in the trail towns along the route. He fore-sware the drinking, the gambling and general hell-raising which was the custom of the trail-driving cowboys, joined the Baptist Church at Long Branch, married, and settled down to rear his family. He tells of walking four miles to work and four miles home to be with his wife and children. The couple has five of their seven children still living. Two of their daughters, Mrs. Jack Willis and Mrs. Jim Hallmark,

live in Eastland and look in on the parents to see that they are comfortable in their own home. Another daughter, Mrs. Henry Harris, lives in Lubbock, and the fourth, Mrs. Lloyd Almire, lives in Dallas. J. W. Martin, their only living son, is in Levelland. Smoothing his handle-bar mustache, Mr. Martin said, "I've gone broke four times, signing other men's notes but not one man ever went broke because of me. I've lost all my money three times when county banks went broke, once in Rising Star, once in Carbo and once in Eastland." He has never worn glasses and still reads eye news print with ease.

Concerning his limited education Mr. Martin says he went to the fifth grade in a three-months-a-year school in Long Branch but is proud of the fact that he taught an adult mathematics class in his community. He also has a certificate for having taught a writing class, also to adults.

GARDNERS ARE EXPOSED TO DANGER

Almost 12 per cent of all home accident deaths occur in the yard, according to the Texas Safety Association.

"According to Texas Safety Association findings, Lone Star Gas Company Manager Cordo Goldston said today, 'careless handling of rakes, hoes, ladders and the power lawnmower represent the principal dangers to the amateur gardener.'"

Lone Star is sponsoring a home safety program in Eastland for the second straight year. Co-sponsors are the Texas Safety Association and the Eastland Telegram.

The Texas Safety Association recommends that hoes,

rakes and other similar yard tools be turned downward when momentarily laid aside. These yard tools, as well as ladders, should be stored properly when not in use, thus preventing falls.

These safety rules should be observed when operating the power mower:

These safety rules should be observed when operating the power mower:

1. Be sure of your footing and balance at all times.

2. Keep children and pets at a safe distance when you use the mower.

3. Do not reach under the mower to push it over obstruction. Tip it by manipulating the handle.

4. Do not use electric mower when ground is wet.

5. Do not use mower until the lawn has been cleared of stones, wires and other articles.

6. Stop engine before removing objects from reel or rotary blades.

7. Disconnect plug wires when working on underside of mower.

8. Keep fuel out of reach of children. Store fuel in closed metal container.

9. Shut off mower before leaving it unattended.

10. Keep flame away from mower while refueling.

There are other causes of fatal falls in the yard. In Dallas in 1960, for example, nine people died in falls reported as follows: stumbled over chicken wire chasing chickens; 1: slipped on patio; 1: fell down steps; 3: fell on route to garage; 1: fell entering house; 1: fell off porch; 1: and lost footing on ladder or roof.

"Vigilance," Goldston said, "is required at all times if these preventable accidents are to be eliminated."
