Hints Offered on **Peanut Drying**

Curing peanuts by artificial means to prevent quality damage requires careful oparation procedures on the part of the dryer operator. The proper use of heat is one of the most im-oriant factors, points out W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer.

If the peanuts are cured too rapidly, their milling quality will be reduced and if the peaouts are exposed to excessively igh temperatures, off-flavor nay occur, he adds.

Research engineers reccom end that the air entering the ea ut drying bin not exceed temperature of 95 degree F ith the relative humidity not ess than 55 percent. To preheat should be added to the curing air to reduce the relaive humidity to a milimum

gists throughout Texas displaying the distinctive green and white I.D.L. sign. Chances are there's one in your neighborhood, ready to serve you with the finest of 55 percent, explains Allen. The fan should be started, ays, as soon as the air distribution system is uniformly cvered with peanuts. Operate the fall continuouly and move ir up through the peanuts until the moisture content of the kernels in the top layer (six inches) of peanuts is reduced

to 10 to 12 percent. After the moisture is redu ed to this level, turn off the heat, but continue to run the fan until all the peanuts are cool. Peanuts cured with heated air will lose about 2 perce it kernel moisture to the dry hulls after curing.

Additional information curing peanuts by artificial means is available from local cou ty agricultural agents, says Allen.



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
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
