Fumbling Mavericks Drop Another; Buffaloes, 12-0

A near epidemic of "fumble-itus" plagued the Mavericks Friday night as they dropped the ball repeatedly and their third district game to the Cross Plains Buffaloes, 12-0.

The Mavericks saw five of their eight fumbles pounced on by hustling Buffaloes.

At least one of the fumbles cost dearly. A power push that netted four first downs put the ball on the Buffalo one in the fourth quarter.

Quarterback Joe Cooper alternately used fullback Jimmy Moylan, Gary Graham, and Gaylon Griffin, to pick up

yardage in 6, 10, 5, 10 and 4 spurts to get in speaking distance of the goal line.

But the previously winless Cross Plains crew apparently had paid less heed to pre-game press clippings, and was on its toes to stop the drive cold, by snapping up a fumbled ball.

The Buffaloes controlled the ball in 72 plays, compared to Eastland's 51.

Cross Plains broke a 7-game losing streak with the victory and Eastland had its season record evened up at four wins, four losses. The Mavs have yet to win a district game.

The Buffaloes registered their first touchdown when fullback Jim Hargrove skirted right end for nine yards with 1:20 left in the first quarter. Hargrove's score climaxed an 85-yard drive in 16 plays.

In the second quarter, with 8:23 remaining, quarterback Darrel Wyatt tossed a 5-yard aerial to back Charles Barr for the score to put the Buffaloes ahead 12-0.

Eastland threatened late in the first half, moving to the Cross Plains five, where Buffalo end Leela Nunn recovered a Maverick fumble.

Cross Plains was threatening to score as the game ended, moving to a first and goal situation.

Weather Affects Peanut Harvest

The ideal moisture level at which to combine peanuts is about 25 percent, but weather more than the moisture level, may determine harvest time, says Henry O'Neal, extension agricultural engineer, Texas A&M College.

If the producer has to combine the peanuts between rainy periods he may have to harvest at a higher moisture level than is desirable, O'Neal adds.

Normally combines will harvest peanuts with moisture levels up to about 30 percent but the farmer should check the operating instructions for his own combine and not exceed these recommendations.

Peanuts that must be harvested at this high level of moisture should be artificially dried and cured to preserve their quality, he says.

For more information on combining, contact your local county agent, it is suggested.

October Rains Up; Mercury Varies

Rainfall in October was 3.48 inches, which is well above the average for the month in this county.

Average is 2.74. Official Weather Observer James Smith reports.

Heaviest rain during the month was near the end, on the 28th when 1.48 was measured. Another inch-plus soaker came on the 8th when 1.10 was measured.

Oct. 1st saw a scant .02;

.67 on the 9th; and .12 on the 13th totaled up the rain for the month.

By any standards, a mild month, it began to cool toward the end, and last Monday night the temperature dropped to a crisp 36 degrees.

However it bounced back up to 73 Tuesday, making for a wide spread between high and low—but affording superior fall weather.

Questions On Military Obligations Answered

Since President Kennedy's proclamation of arms quarantine around Cuba, some men who have no legal obligation for draft registration or military service have been asking the local draft board about their "obligations", according to Mrs. Jewel Reeves, Selective Service clerk in Eastland.

"If you were born on or before August 30, 1922, you are not registered with a draft board and you have no legal obligation to register", Mrs. Reeves stated. She added, "Furthermore, you have no responsibility to keep a draft board advised of your current address."

If you were born after August 30, 1922, you are legally required to be registered, unless you are not yet 18 years old. If you are registered and have reached the age of 35, you are no longer liable for military service under present law; but you are still obligated to keep your local board advised of your current address.

Some men are no longer liable at ages 26 and 28. At these ages, where a man is no longer liable for service, he is classified V-A, and the little classification notice he is required to carry in his pocket is so marked.

As increasing number of people are asking draft boards for the meaning of the Selective classifications. These follow:

I-A: Available for military service.

I-A-0: Conscientious objector available for non-combatant military service.

I-C: Member of the armed forces, Coast and Geodetic Survey, or Public Health Service.

I-D: Qualified member of the armed forces reserve, or student taking military training, including ROTC and accepted aviation cadet applications.

I-O: Conscientious objector available for civilian work contributing to maintenance of the national health, safety or interest.

I-S: Student deferred by law until graduation from high school or attainment of age 20, or until the end of his academic year at a college or university.

I-W: Conscientious objector performing civilian work in the national interest, or who has completed such work.

I-Y: A man qualified for military service only in time of war or emergency.

II-A: Occupational deferment, other than agricultural and student.

II-C: Agricultural deferment.

II-S: Student deferment.

III-A: Extreme hardship deferment, or a man with child or children. Any man who prior to August 25, 1953, has a child or children and lived with them in his home, and so advised his board, is eligible for Class III-A. Any man who acquired a child or children on or since August 25, 1953, is not eligible for Class III-A because of them unless military

service would result in extreme hardship to them, or certain other dependents.

IV-O: A man with sufficient prior active service, or who is a sole surviving son of a family of which one or more sons or daughters already have died in line of duty in the armed forces.

IV-B: Certain public officials deferred by law.

IV-C: Deferment of certain aliens.

IV-F: Physically or mentally unfit or morally unacceptable.

V-A: Over the age of liability for military service. If a man receives certain deferments resulting in classification in Classes I-D, I-Y, II-A, II-C, II-S, III-A, IV-B and IV-F before he is 26 years old, his liability for military service will be extended from age 26 to ages 28 or 35, depending upon the deferment received.

Freddie Tucker Student Teacher At Fort Worth

Freddie Don Tucker of Eastland is among 266 North Texas State University students serving as student teachers in Dallas-Forth Worth-Denton area schools this semester.

Included are 192 students preparing for secondary teaching positions and 74 for elementary. In the secondary group are 25 seniors who will receive a full-level certificate for both secondary and elementary teaching in music, art, physical education, speech, speech therapy or library service.

Each student teaches under one of five training plans for the semester. Some are teaching in area schools half a day for 18 weeks. Others train during the first, second or third nine-week period of the semester. A fifth plan calls for slightly more than half a day's training for 12 weeks.

Tucker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eric T. Tucker, 611 S. Walnut, Eastland, is teaching physical education at Riverside Junior High School and Oakhurst Elementary School in Fort Worth.

Some 5,700 voters are expected to go to the 12 balloting places in Eastland County on General Election Day, Tuesday.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m.

The guess of 5,000-plus is high for a non-presidential election year, but indications are that two races of prime interest will lure the voters to the polls.

The 5,700 compares with the May Democratic May primary when 5,785 were casted.

The two-party represented governor's race which pits Democrat John Connally and Republican Jack Cox, is of course causing interest statewide.

To boot, Eastland Countians are confronted with an unusual situation in their county judge's race.

The Democratic nominee, Scott Bailey, is being contested by another Democrat, O. H. Dick.

Dick has been staging a write-in campaign for the office ever since Bailey was selected by the County Democratic Executive Committee to replace the late Judge John Hart, who had been nominated in the May primary.

In a hastily-called meeting Friday morning, the County Commissioners accepted the resignation of two precinct election judges and appointed replacements.

E. E. (Ed) Layton resigned as judge of Eastland's precinct 1, and Don Pierson, Demo precinct chairman, was named to conduct the election in the county seat box.

Mrs. Jim (Gay) Everett of Olden was named to replace Mrs. O. H. Dick as election judge of the Olden precinct box.

Mrs. Dick resigned because the law stipulates that the judges not be related to candidates. She is the wife of the county judge candidate.

Since this county's population is below 100,000, over-age and other exempted voters are not required to get certificates, therefore determining the "strength" of the vote, is difficult and can only be based on past experience.

In 1958, the last similar election year in which there was not a presidential campaign involved (the total vote in the general election was only some 2,300.

Evidence of the interest this year is revealed by the comparison of absentee votes. In 1958, there were only 27 early votes cast.

At 5 p.m. Friday, deadline for absentee balloting, there had been about 125 votes.

This compares favorably with the number cast in the May primary, when 192 people voted the absentee route.

Analysis of these figures leads one to believe that the vote Tuesday will likely be as heavy as was the primary vote.

A re-vitalized Republican party in this county, with the help of conservative Democrats, is expected to report a heavy vote for Jack Cox, native of nearby Stephens County.

Throughout the governor's campaign, Cox has been labeled a "turncoat"—referring, of course, to Cox's leaving the Democratic Party under which he had run in other elections.

Cox's campaign mainly has been centered in showing that

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Vote as you please, But please vote

The election is only two days away. It is an election held in a time of national crisis. The eyes of the world will be upon this nation and its every state, and we cannot get away from our responsibility to vote.

One question the rulers of Soviet Russia, of Communist-ruled China, of Cuba and the other satellite slave states will be keenly interested in is: are Americans going to use fully the privilege of voting that is one of the rights that only free men enjoy? All the others represented in the United Nations, neutral or warring, will be watching our election returns. A half-hearted turnout of the voters will spell political apathy. Do we really value the right to vote, which they want to be extended to the people of all nations as soon as they are ready for it?

Popular elections are basic to democracy — but not what the Russians call democracy, which in their language means government of the people self chosen and self-perpetuating rulers, for what they tell the people is best for them.

Representative elective government depends for its continued existence, as Thomas Jefferson pointed out, on having "an enlightened electorate." It also depends on the right to vote being used by the most enlightened part of the electorate, who otherwise surrender their privileges of self-government.

So we say: study your candidates' ability, integrity and the platforms. Go to the polls as well informed as you can make yourself.

Go and vote as your head, your heart and your conscience tell you to do.

Even in presidential elections, few more than half of American registered voters cast ballots.

Of all crucial times, this is no time for indifference.

Vote Tuesday, and make it a red, white and blue-letter day.

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County Agents Corner

Talked to A. J. Butler, Okra, recently about causes of peanuts rotting off of the roots prior to harvest. A. J. said that his 100 acres of peanuts did not look too good. His son, Harrell, first-year PFA student under H. L. Geyer, Rising Star vocational agricultural teacher, is feeding out a beef calf for his project.

A. J. has two other brothers in the Rising Star Area, Fred and A. M. Another brother Lynn lives in the Gorman area, just north of D. J. Jobes pecan orchard. Lynn was one of our Starr variety peanut demonstrators in that part of the county last year.

Although it costs a little more the new sheep and goat drench — Thibenzole — that Mr. W. T. Hardy, superintendent of the Ranch Experiment Station at Sonora discussed at the sheep and goat field day at Ranger last summer, really gets the job done. Seems like the intestinal worms of sheep and goats are becoming immune to the old reliable Phenothiazine drench.

After some phone calls and correspondence we finally found out where some Guar seed could be located for O. Z. Turner of the Flatwoods Community. O. Z. wants to try growing some of this crop as a Summer legume soil improving crop next year. A decade or more ago several farmers in and around the Koko Community grew this crop for a short period of time. Guar and Okra seed look a lot alike.

W. S. McGaha, Carbon, was asking me recently about the pruning of Muscadine grapes. Seems as if he had bought a few of these grapes last winter and set them out. Muscadines are a member of the grape family but generally bears its fruit in singles or in twos or threes instead of in bunches. The leaves are much smaller than regular variety grape leaves. Muscadines are tops for eating fresh or making juice or jelly.

States in the old South and west into the piney woods of deep East Texas is the natural home of the wild muscadine grape. The tame varieties of these grapes as developed by the research stations have a much better flavor and are more consistent in production. Some of the tame varieties are known as Scuppernon grapes. Takes a male plant to pollinate several female plants though.

McGaha came to Eastland County from Alabama in 1898, first settling around Rising Star.

Enjoyed a visit with Jim Sparks, Desdemona farmer, recently. Jim was telling me about the 11 foot, 2000 lb. polar bear that his brother, Sam, who teaches math in the Anchorage, Alaska, schools, killed several months ago. Sam and party flew 200 miles out to sea for the hunt. Landed on the ice. Plane equipped with skis. Bear was spotted prior to landing. It met them half way. Bear was hunting, too. Interesting situation.

Mr. and Mrs. Felix Sparks, also of Desdemona and parents of Jim and Sam, flew up to Anchorage last June for a month's visit. Left Dallas at 9 a. m. and got to Anchorage at 9 p. m. Got fed seven times on the flight. Mr. Felix said it was sort of confusing about the sun. Went back up at 2 a. m. but never really got dark.

Saw and talked to my friend Fred Burfeind the other day. Fred used to live and farm in the old Jewel Community. Lived in a rock house almost on the banks of the Sabanno creek. Fred looked so fresh and healthy and rosy cheeked I decided he must not be working too much. I asked him about it. Said he was now helping his wife in their small ceramics plant just outside of Gorman on the De Leon Highway.

Pete Clement, who lives in the Grapevine Community, showed me some purple blooms that showed up in late October on a sweet potato plant of the Gold Rush variety on his farm. Pete made 20 bushels of sweet potatoes from 600 plants. Pete and I both agree that we have good sweet potato country but very few grow them commercially. Pete and Mrs. Clement live on their 86 acre place. He retired from his building maintenance job at the courthouse seven years ago. He farms and raises a few calves every year. Although Mohair prices are

down, the goat population continues to rise in the county. In 1930 there were a little less than 5,000 head. The late U. S. Census figure showed that there were 48,274 head of the animals.

Eating strange and somewhat exotic and unusual foods in various countries around the world has been the experience of Colonel Roy Plumley, genial manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. The Colonel is now retired. In his 26 years of service in the armed forces, he spent some time in 49 different countries.

The Colonel told me recently that he had eaten the Chemchee of Korea, the Sukaki of Japan, the Go-Hung of China, the very spicy goat meat and rice mixture that is eaten with the hands in the Middle East but he drew the line at eating the Balote dish of the Philippines. Seems like fertile hen eggs are taken from the nest just before they hatch. Boiled and dyed blue to keep them from getting mixed with the other eggs. All parts of the unhatched chick is eaten after the shell is cracked and removed. Colonel Roy said that the smell of a balote eater could be detected several yards away. Uninteresting thought.

The Colonel and W. T. Eaton said they wanted us to have another sheep and goat field day again next year similar to the one held there last summer.

SCHOOL BOARD DECLINES TO ACT ON PETITION FOR VOTE

The board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District declined to take action on a petition asking for another election on the school building bond issue at a special meeting last Tuesday night.

Mr. Wright advised Davis Scarborough, Abilene attorney and counsel for Park P. Plambeck who submitted the petition, of the board's action by letter as follows:

"The board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District held a called meeting October 30 and unanimously passed a resolution not to take any action upon the petition you presented to them on the 6th day of October, 1962.

"The school board apparently believes that the bond election reflected the will of the majority of the people in the district."

The petition, which contained the names of 906 persons, asked the board to order an

election on the proposition of canceling the \$700,000 bond issue that was approved by a 67-vote majority. The Plambeck suit in 9th District court last week in an effort to void the election decision. They plan to appeal.



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
