Eastland fans are counting on the Mavericks to put the frosting on this season's football cake Friday night with a victory over the long-rivaled Ranger Bulldogs.

The game will be played in Maverick Stadium beginning at 7:30 p.m. and is expected to attract rooting spectators from both towns in standing-room-only capacity.

The Eastland fans have had an exceptional year.

After a lack-luster year last season with ten starts and ten defeats, the fans were doubled in spades at the beginning of this season.

Four straight victories put the Mavericks in the number one spot with everybody in town.

Then, as is the case with just about any team in any season, the Mavericks began to lose.

DeLeon handed them their first loss in the last non-district game of the season.

When district play got underway with Baird the following week, Eastland not only lost, but also lost the services of its clicking quarterback, Tommy Beck.

Even though a few fair-weather fans began to sing the blues, the majority were true, and stood firm behind the Mavs, expecting no easy going with such teams as Baird and Albany.

The fans had the wind knocked out of their sails last week when Cross Plains laced one on the locals.

Some have said that over-confidence got the best of the boys.

But this is the week. About four out of five fans would probably tell you, that the season will be a total success, if Eastland beats Ranger. It's the last home game of the season.

## Bailey Sweeps County Judge Race; Demos Carry County With Connally

## AFTER JAN. 1 Hussey Murder Trial Not Due This Year

Nathan Curry will most likely have Christmas dinner at Gatesville.

It will probably be after the first of the year before this area once again becomes the focal point of the state with the unfolding of the Hussey murder trial.

Questions concerning the trial are almost as numerous as those surrounding the murder of the church secretary in Cisco last year.

A grand jury isn't expected to be called to consider the case until sometime in December.

Earlier it had been believed that the grand jury would convene in November.

Indictments coming out of the grand jury hearing in 91st District Court here, and the ensuing proceedings are open game for speculation.

The body of Mrs. Florence Hussey, 53, was found face down in a pool of blood on her living room floor in Cisco on June 29, 1961. She had been beaten and stabbed 14 times.

Nathan Curry, a 16-year-old neighbor boy, was tried shortly after the murder by a closed-door juvenile court and declared a delinquent child by reason of having committed an act of burglary on or about June 28, 1961, at Mrs. Hussey's home.

Young Curry has since been at the Gatesville School for Delinquent Boys, where he celebrated his 17th birthday in July.

The State has the right and could, if the prosecution so elected, leave the youth at the state school for four more years. He will be 21 in that many years.

Delay in conveying the grand jury is believed to stem from several reasons.

Not the least of which is the understanding that should the youth be indicted, he could be brought back to this county on a bench warrant, and thereafter released from custody on bond.

Bond would likely be in the neighborhood of from \$5000 to \$10,000, since the case is not of a capital nature due to the boy's age at the time.

A murder charge was filed against Curry in Eastland County in July, and the youth made a statement concerning the murder at that time.

The charge was later dismissed and replaced with the burglary count.

Public officials are reluctant to have him free on bond because the case drew so much publicity last summer, and it is feared that there might be some type of incident before the trial could be held.

It has been suggested that the boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pete Curry of Cisco, might attempt to get the boy back into school in Cisco should he be released on bond.

The family, long-time operators of a grocery store on Ave. D in Cisco, have engaged John Watts, an Odessa lawyer, to represent the youth, it is reported.

Watts has been in Eastland County recently and is reported to have had a special investigator at work.

The Curry's have closed their Cisco store.

A request for a change of venue is considered to be among one of the certain pleadings.

## Annual Barbecue Dinner Saturday

Women of the First Baptist Church (colored) will hold their annual barbecue turkey dinner and bake sale Saturday in the annex of the church on North Lamar.

Democratic Nominee Scott Bailey carried every voting box in the county except his win in opponent's home town, to write the county judge's position by almost a three-to-one victory.

Bailey, a school teacher and former state representative, polled 3,495 votes against former publisher O. H. Dick of Olden, who got only 1,196, according to unofficial returns.

The county joined the majority of the rest of the state in helping elect Democratic Candidate John Connally over Republican Jack Cox.

Connally got 2,683 votes in this county compared to Cox's 2,108.

The county judge's race was assured for Bailey throughout the vote count as Dick failed to show strength from any box, except in his own small Olden box throughout the evening count.

Bailey announced near the end of the count: "This victory truly belongs to the people. I am deeply grateful to all who have helped me to gain the honor of being the next County Judge of Eastland County. I accept this honor in the name of every citizen. It will be my sincere desire to prove worthy of the Democratic Party and of the American way of life that we are privileged to enjoy."

Dick has not announced his plans for the future.

Election workers in this county, as over the state, had problems in multiples of 14—specifically with the 14 constitution amendments which were a part of this General Election ballot.

Working way into the night, the vote counters in many cases decided to call it a day and come back later. This was reflected state-wide in the slow returns from the Texas Election Bureau.

Total vote strength for Eastland County appeared to be somewhere near 4,700 in this off-year election.

Eastland showed almost 1,100 votes; Ranger about 800; Cisco about 1,300.

**Acreage Allotments, Marketing Quota Vote Set for Peanut Growers**

The national peanut acreage allotment, less one-tenth of 1 percent reserved for new farms, is apportioned to states, and the state allotments to individual peanut-producing farms within the state, in accordance with provisions of the governing legislation. The 1963 acreage allotment for Texas was set at 356,282 acres compared with 1962.

Peanut marketing have been in effect since 1949. The referendum was held in November 1959, and 95 percent of the voters approved marketing. Information regarding referendum from local Agricultural Extension Service office in the area.

A national marketing quota of 1,006,250 tons and a national allotment of 1,610,000 acres for picking or threshing for the 1963 peanut crop have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. December 11 was set as the date for a growers referendum on quotas for the 1963, 1964 and 1965 crops of peanuts. State quotas haven't been announced. Emmett Powell, Eastland ASCS representative, reported.

At least two-thirds of growers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to be made effective. Whether or not quotas are approved, the 1963-crop peanut acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support. A favorable vote (two-thirds) would keep quotas effective in each of the next three years.

If more than a third of the voters oppose, quotas and penalties will not be in effect for the 1963-crop peanuts. Price support available to growers who comply with their acreage allotments will drop to 50 percent of parity, and another referendum would be held in 1963 for the following three crops.

In determining the marketing quota for the 1963 crop of peanuts, a "normal" yield of 1,250 per acre was used. This yield multiplied by the 1,610,000 acres, the minimum national acreage allotment, results in the 1963 national marketing quota.

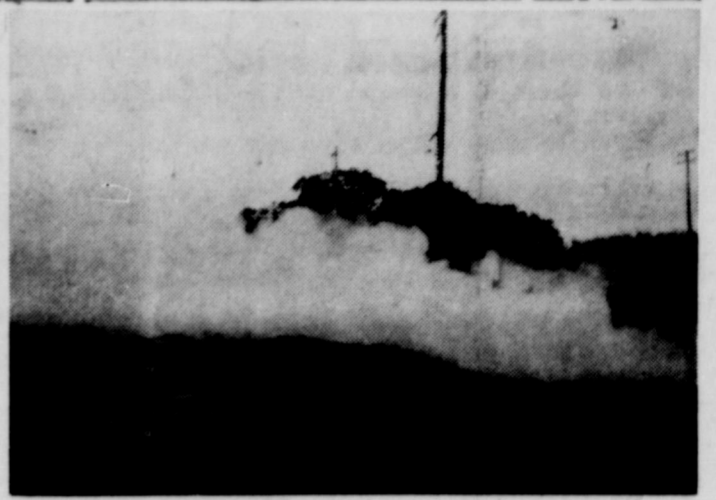

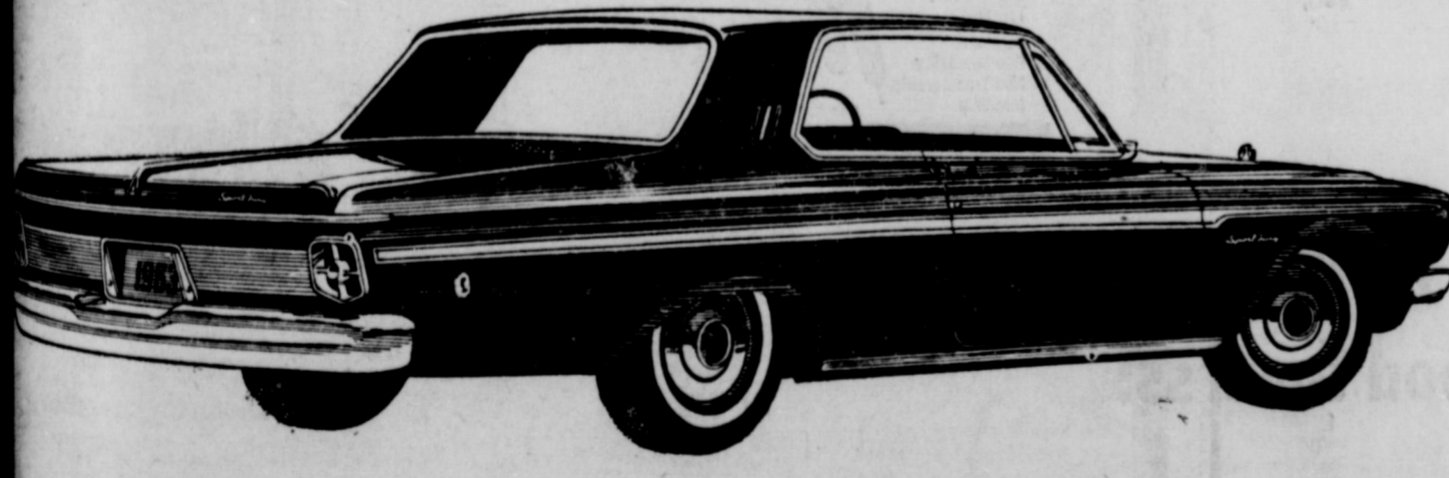

 AUSTIN — Tourists interested in visiting Texas industries need wonder no longer which plants have the welcome mat out and how they may arrange to tour them.  
 The information is contained in a first-of-its-kind booklet, Visitor Tours of Texas Industry, published by the Travel Division of the Texas Highway Department.  
 It lists 324 tours in 70 Texas cities. The first section of the publication discusses 77 regularly-scheduled tours. The latter portion is devoted to 247 additional tours that can be arranged by appointment.  
 Each listing offers the name of the industry, its address or telephone number, name of plant contact, the products it produces, days and hours of tours, their approximate duration and whether linguists are available for the foreign visitor's benefits.  
 The data was supplied the Highway Department, Texas' official travel promotion agency, by chambers of commerce.  
 Need for such a guide was manifest by the increasing numbers of visitors, as well as Texans, who asked the Travel Division about industrial tours. Attempts to refer them to satisfactory existing material came to naught. So the decision was made to prepare a booklet in cooperation with the state's chambers of commerce.  
 The result is believed to be the most complete industrial guide ever produced in Texas.

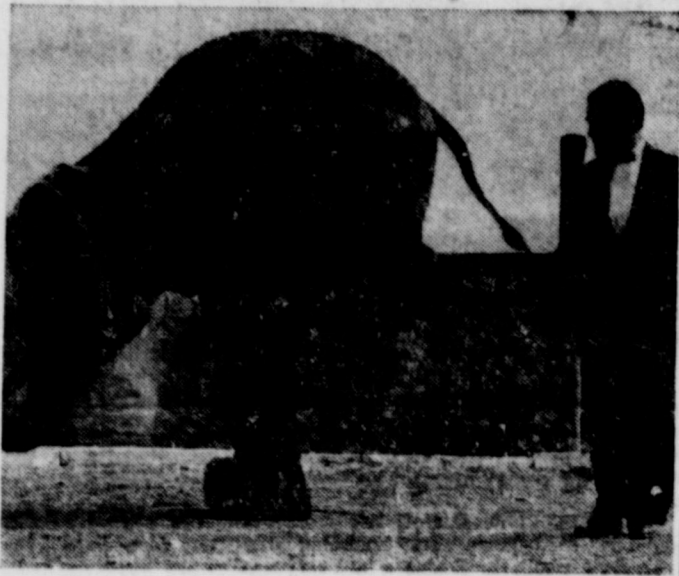

## Burns To Be Fatal To 465 In 12 Months

Burns will take the lives of 465 Texas men, women and children during the next 12 months. The injury toll will total 70,215, with 1,860 of the injuries being of a permanent nature.

This forecast is based on figures for recent typical years compiled by the Texas Safety Association.

"Fifty-six per cent of the victims," Lone Star Gas Company Manager Gordon Goldston said today, "will be children under five years of age or senior members of our family in the 65-and-over age group."

Lone Star is sponsoring a home safety program in Eastland for the second straight year. Co-sponsors are the Texas Safety Association and Eastland Telegram.

"Almost 100 per cent of the common fire hazards responsible for this terrible toll can be eliminated if the homeowner will give 10 minutes a day of the family's time to the problem," Goldston said. "A quiz prepared by the National Board of Fire Underwriters offers a room by room, attic to basement checklist by which the safety of the home can be measured. By using this quiz as a safety blueprint and as a training guide, the homeowner will go a long way toward the elimination of home fire hazards."

The quiz appears below: Kitchen and Dining Room

1. Is the gas or electric range clean — the broiler, oven and burners free of

grease?

2. Have you hung curtains and towels so they won't blow over burners?

3. Are members of the family forbidden to start fires with kerosene and other flammable liquids?

4. Have you made sure that several electrical appliances, such as the toaster, waffle iron and coffee percolator, are not connected to one outlet?

Living Room, Bedroom and Bath

1. Is there enough space around your television set for proper ventilation?

2. Has a lightning arrestor — preferably one listed by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. — been installed on the antenna lead-in?

3. Is your television set UL-labeled?

4. Are worn lamp and extension cords immediately replaced with new ones?

5. Have you removed extension cords strung around the room — under rugs, over nails?

6. Is there a wood-burning fireplace and, if so, is it protected by a metal screen?

7. Is the fireplace chimney cleaned and inspected periodically?

8. If a portable heater is in use, is it turned off before you go to bed?

9. Is the portable heater placed where it cannot be tripped on or over turned?

10. If you use portable gas heaters or appliances, are shut-off valves installed in the metal gas pipeline?

11. Do you make it a rule never to smoke in bed?

12. Have you put the radio or any other electrical appliance out of reach of anyone bathing or clutching a water faucet?

Storage Space

1. Have you cleaned out accumulated rubbish?

2. Have you thrown out those old clothes, toys and magazines you "hate to part with"?

3. Is your heating equipment clean and in repair? Is it inspected each fall?

4. Are you careful never to store paints, turpentine, rubbish, or kindling near your central furnace?

5. Is the inside basement door at the head of the stairs tightly fitted and kept closed a night?

6. Are all stove pipes and chimneys clean and in good repair?

7. Are walls, ceiling and partitions near boiler, stove, burner and heating pipes protected by non-combustible insulation — or is a adequate clearance provided?

2. If the garage is attached to your home, is the door between always kept tightly closed?

3. If you store paint and varnish in the garage, are containers always kept tightly closed?

4. Have all combustible rubbish, leaves and debris been removed from the garage and yard?

5. Is trash and refuse burned in a suitable outdoor rubbish burner?

6. Is an adult always present when trash and rubbish is being burned out of doors?

7. Have weeds, dried leaves and rubbish been removed from adjoining vacant lots?

Other Precautions

1. Are ash trays kept handy — and are they always used?

2. Do you keep matches out of children's reach?

3. Do you put out all matches, cigarettes and cigar butts before disposing of them?

4. Do you hire a competent electrician to repair or extend electrical wiring when necessary?

5. Do all rooms have enough outlets so as to avoid improper use of multiple attachment plugs?

6. Have you provided special circuits for heavy duty appliances such as washing machines?

7. Do you use fuses of proper amperage for your household lighting circuits?

8. If you use an oil mop, do you keep it in a metal container or in a cool, safe, well-ventilated place where it will not catch fire by spontaneous combustion?

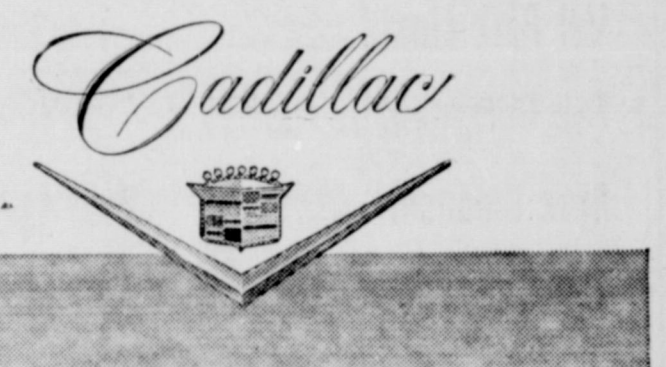

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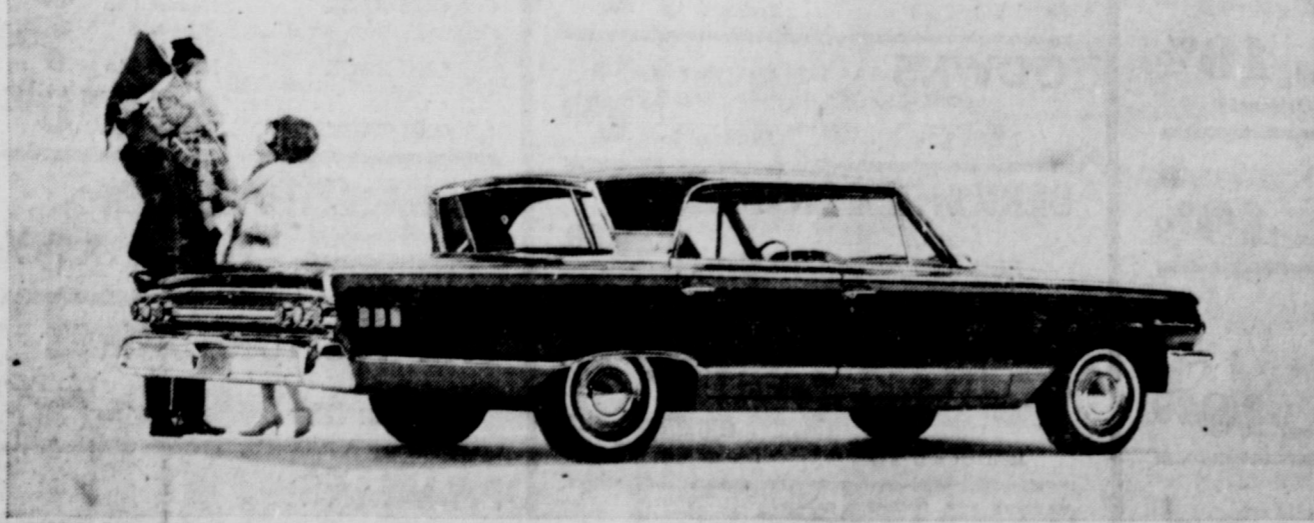
