Police Department under veteran Chief Ray Laney's direction, doesn't have a lot to do with keeping things "peaceful" in our town.

As Bill plies the lonely allies, he's just a flip of an electronic switch from communication with the roving patrol car, manned in the early part of the night by Patrolman Neil Seabourn.

Mr. Businessman, did you forget to lock the back door to your store last night? If you did, Partin will discover it as he checks the doors, front and back, on his rounds. He'll call you so you can check the store—and lock the door.

Have you ever really thought about how dark a night can be or how quiet an alley is at 3 or 4 in the morning?

Tell you one way you can find out. Walk a piece with Partin and you'll know. (Better be very sure you're with him, and not try it on your own, because remember, that's his job—to find out about people in places where they're not supposed to be.)

I walked a piece with him one night recently, and as he made his rounds—which are always altered, so that he doesn't set up a pattern to be observed and taken advantage of—and learned that Eastland is indeed a quiet town.

"But," according to Partin, "when anything happens, it happens in a minute, and it's usually over in about three."

That doesn't give much time for second guessing, so you have to be on your toes.

Restaurants and service stations that stay open all night sure appreciate Partin. "Just to have him drop in occasionally, sure helps us when we have some toughs around," one man told us.

About midnight Patrolman Clyde Fisher comes on duty, relieving Seabourn, and the coldest, quietest part of the shift begins.

The night we visited, the rain began falling about 2:15 a.m. and fell steadily until 7. The temperature patterned the rain and fell too. Ranging from the mid-40s, it slipped down to a nippy 40, and insulated underwear sure felt good.

A car zips westward on Main St.

"That boy's in a mighty big hurry," Fisher said to Partin, who had joined him in the patrol car to avoid as much rain as possible.

"Let's see if he has a good reason," his partner answered. Well, he really didn't have a good reason, but his identity and licenses were in order, and he was apologetic for his oversight in speed. He promised to "watch it" in the future, and issued him self a ticket.

The patrolmen have a joke among themselves. What is the reason for a meal that's eaten anytime between 2 and 4 a.m.

Regardless of its name, it's always welcome, and the hot, steaming coffee is like a life-line to a friend.

And the patrol goes on. And then, finally, not so suddenly, it's six. Another shift has ended.

The day crew shift Chief Laney and Patrolman Howard Bradford come on.

Actually it was a quiet night for the night people.

A passerby checks of doors and walking the streets.

We were in the 99 per cent column last night.

Tonight will be Thanksgiving night. Suppose the one per cent will come in tonight.

Let's hope not, but if it does, the night people will be on duty.

Dear Mr. Editor
I personally, with the help of L. E. Sublett and Johnnie Holmes presented the Fire Department's proposal for the C.B. base station to the Eastland City Council Monday night at their regular meeting. This was a proposal passed on in the Fire Department by a vote of 14-4.
It was truly believed by the department that this base station would improve the efficient operation of our Fire Department. We offered to install this station at no cost to the city, although the efficient operation of the Fire Department would benefit the city directly. It would seem to me that a city that claims to be so broke would welcome the initiative of the volunteers in wanting to improve themselves without asking help from the city.
We ask to use these radios as the Fire Department seemed necessary for the most efficient operation, with the privilege of the City Commission suggesting changes in procedure if it did not prove satisfactory to their judgment. Only one commissioner, Don Pierson, wanted to extend that privilege to the Fire Department. Does the City Fathers think the volunteers are incapable of deciding what steps to take to improve themselves in better serving the tax payers.
How much initiative can be expected from the volunteers if they vote and approve something beneficial to the Fire Department and the City Commission can't even find enough in favor of it to get a second on the motion to approve it. I would highly urge any interested citizen to visit the Commissioners meetings and see how our city is making its decision.

A PROCLAMATION

For a Day of Thanksgiving, Praise, and Prayer.

It has pleased Almighty God to hearken to supplications and prayers of an afflicted people, and to vouchsafe to the Army of the United States on the land and on the sea, victories so signal and so effective as to furnish reasonable grounds for augmented confidence, that the Union of these States will be maintained, their constitution preserved, and peace and prosperity permanently secured; but these victories have been accorded not without sacrifice of life, limb, health, and liberty, incurred by brave, patriotic citizens. Domestic affliction in every part of the country follows in the train of these fearful bereavements.

It is meet and right to recognize and confess the presence of the Almighty Father and the power of His hand equally triumphant and these sorrows.

Now, therefore, be it known, that I do set apart, THURSDAY, THE SIXTH DAY OF AUGUST NEXT, to be observed as National Thanksgiving, Praise and Prayer; and I invite the people of the United States to assemble on this occasion in their places of worship, and in the forms approved by their own conscience, render the homage due to the Divine Majesty for the things he has done in the Nation's behalf, and invoke the influence of His holy spirit to subdue the anger, which has produced long sustained a needless rebellion; to change the hearts of the insurgents, to guide the counsels of the government with wisdom to so great a national emergency, and to visit with tender care and consolation throughout the length and breadth of all those who through the vicissitudes of marches, voyages, battles, and sieges have been brought to suffer in mind, body, and finally, to lead the whole Nation, through paths of repentance and submission to the Divine will, back to the perfect union and fraternal peace.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at the City of Washington this fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-eighth.

'Doors That Don't Close' Account for Hospital Costs

Your hospitals are at your service 24 hours a day, 8,760 hours a year. The doors never close; they are on guard and stand-by to protect not only your health and life, but that of your family and friends.

Fortunately for us this is true. Our lives would be in danger 75 percent of the time if a sign hung in your hospital which read, "Hours 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday to Friday only." It is impossible to imagine how seriously our every day living would be affected if your hospital was even only a few hours during the day and closed for weekends. But we do know it would be chaotic.

Yet, keeping the hospital open 24 hours every day of the year is one of the big reasons why it costs money for care. Consider the expense side of constant hospital operation.

Hospital personnel are employed like any people in business for the usual work week. They have vacations, holidays, and sick leave the same as you and I.

The 24 hour work day requires three shifts of employees because the hospital day is three times as long as the ordinary work day in most places of business.

But is more than three shifts because the service must continue 7 days a week, with personnel on duty to cover the weekend period a day time off for the reasons previously mentioned.

When the hospital is compared with a business, we must remember for every employee who works the usual work day, the hospital must have four employees.

Because the Hospital is open to serve the community at any hour of any day, it is easy to see why over two-thirds of the hospital's income for service to patients is spent on wages and salaries.

One Million May Be Eligible For SS Benefits

Approximately one million people over 65 years of age may be eligible for monthly social security benefits, but have not applied for them.

According to R. R. Tuley Jr., social security district manager in the Abilene office, many people over 65 who are still working have not applied for social security benefits. These people may be losing money every day. Just because they are earning over \$1200 a year does not mean that they may not be entitled to some social security benefits.

If a person is over 65 and earning more than \$1200 a year, he should check with the nearest social security office. If he is eligible for back payments, he may lose some of them for every month he delays in applying now, he is protected for the last 12 months.

A social security beneficiary who earns more than \$1200 in a year gives up \$1 of social security benefits for every \$2 that he earns from \$1200 up to \$1700. For every \$1 that he earns over \$1700, he gives up a matching \$1 in benefits.

However, Tuley stated, no matter how much a beneficiary earns in a year, he can still be paid a full benefit for any month in which he does not earn wages of more than \$100 and does not actively engage in self-employment. In addition, a beneficiary who is 72 years of age or older, can receive his full benefit regardless of how much he earns.



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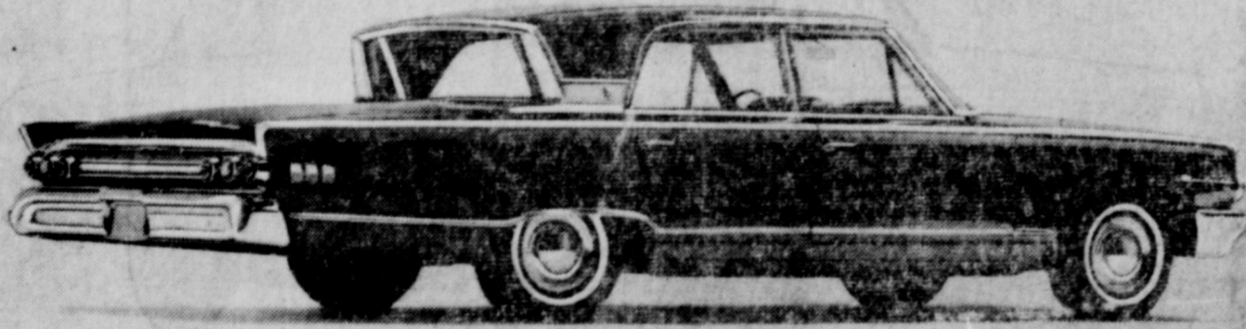
