Soil Testing Will Be Topic Of Union Meet

Joe A. Lemmons of Mexia, commercial specialist in the use of lime, phosphate, and other soil additives, will join a representative of Texas A&M College in discussing proper soil testing and how it can improve the farmer's net income at a meeting of the Eastland County Farmers Union Thursday evening in the Gorman High School Auditorium.

The meeting, scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m., will stress the importance of soil testing. Soil testing is being recognized more and more as an essential tool in determining the types and amounts of fertilizer needed for a particular farm in enabling the farmer to reach maximum production per acre. Obtaining the proper representative soil sample will be discussed as well as how to get the results from the tests and apply the findings.

Wayne Eaves, president of the Union, urges all members and directors as well as the general public to attend this important meeting.

Band Boosters Member Drive Now In Progress

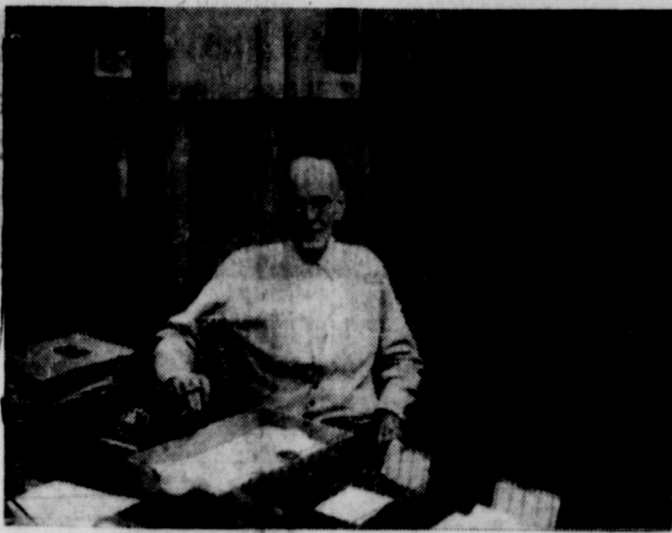
A membership drive has been launched by members of the Eastland Band Boosters Club, which is now in the process of being officially organized.

Christmas Has Begun At Post Office Here

Postmaster Mrs. Art Johnson said today, "Right now is the time to start your Christmas cards and gifts on their way. The calendar says Christmas is less than a month away, but here in the Post Office it will be Christmas every day from now on."

The Postmaster went on to say that getting into action now, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the full Christmas rush begins. For example, don't take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, heavy paper adhesive tape and strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be fully stuffed with tissue or old newspaper to cushion the contents.

If you have articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them—the limits on size and weight of packages vary, depending on

where you mail them from. As an extra precaution, it's always a good idea to place an extra label carrying both your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package.

The Postmaster also suggests, "Be sure to send your Christmas cards by First Class (Continued on Page 5)"

A damage suit in 91st District Court in Eastland, brought by Nancy Pennington against Mrs. John T. Roberson, was dismissed Friday by Judge T. R. Collier at the request of both plaintiff and defendant.

The action resulted following a two-car collision Feb. 8 involving both Mrs. Robinson and Mrs. Pennington, both of Ranger.

Antique Collection Enhanced by Organ

Many things grow more valuable with the passing of time. This little slogan means quite a lot to Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Poe, owners and managers of Poe Floral in Eastland, since they collect antiques although Mrs. Poe states that the project belongs mainly to her husband.

Auctions are the main source of the Poes' collection, although many are family heirlooms. Mrs. Poe stated that many of their items are for sale.

Of the collection, one of the most prized possessions is a journal written in 1861 by Mr. Poe's great-grandfather, James T. Poe, while being held prisoner during the Civil War.

The journal contains a map of where Mr. Poe was captured, a record of all letters he wrote to his wife, his father

and his sister, a list of all soldiers serving under him, and a record of all men taken prisoners and where they were set.

Among the collection, Mr. Poe has a combination knife, spoon and fork which his great-grandfather carried through the Civil War.

In connection with the War, he has Confederate bills in the following denominations; \$500, \$50, \$20, \$10 and \$5.

Mr. Poe also prizes his 1927 Star touring car, which is in A-1 condition. All front and back up lights are in working order. The car features a floor gear shift and emergency brake, wooden wheels, and black leather rolled cushioned seats.

Among the earlier conveniences, the car also features a motor-meter, an instrument to detect radiator temperature.

The Poes also own a Crown Organ, which was made by George P. Bent Manufacturers of Chicago, Ill. in the late 1800's. It features 13 stops, four sets of reeds and the original bellows. The organ belonged to the late Mrs. R. P. Barber, who had owned it since she was 14 years old.

Of additional interest is an old time punch clock used in the coal mines in Strawn before World War I.

Other items include the following: An Edison disc victrola; an old fashioned waffle iron; used on a wood stove; a 36 Colt revolver which was made at the New York factory before it burned; a tobacco cutter from the Cupples Co. and one from the American Tobacco Company of Ranger; a camel saddle; wash bowls, pitchers and stands; an 18th Century medicine scale; a coffee mill; a hitching post; old telephones.

A school bell from Elks Horn, Wis.; iron skillets and kettles; a broad Ax used in splitting rails; a matched set of creamer, sugar bowl and vegetable dish made in England; a New Home drop-top sewing machine made in 1895; railroad lanterns from the Atchinson, Toneyka and Santa Fe and the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railways; and a child's toy dresser which was purchased for 1.50 at Romey, Tex. in 1912.

The Poes also have many other interesting items which have not been mentioned.

The complete statement read: "The City Commission has accepted the resignations of James Young, Gene Cox and Rowena Hart. The Commission will endeavor to fill the vacated positions on a permanent basis as soon as possible. In the meanwhile, temporary help will be employed to fill these positions."

Mrs. Roy Young has also been employed temporarily by the commission for work in the city hall offices.

Neither Seaberry nor any of the other commissioners would comment further on the resignations.

Mr. Tanner, a native of Wisconsin, came to Eastland in 1919 and has had city management experience here.

He served this city as city manager from 1943 until 1947. He lives alone at 311 N. Daugherty St. He was a school board member for 19 years.

His wife is deceased and he had two sons killed in World War II.

A daughter, Dolores Tanner, is a professor at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth.

Bollinger Resting Well In Hospital

Harley Bollinger, 63, of Ranger, is reported as "resting well" in the Ranger General Hospital after accidentally shooting himself in the face Wednesday and spending seven hours wandering around in the woods before being found. Mr. Bollinger was deer hunting alone before going to work, when the accident occurred.

Mr. Bollinger will be transferred to a Fort Worth hospital as soon as possible for plastic surgery, it is reported.

Mr. Bollinger told his son W. R. "Bill" Bollinger, also of Ranger, that he was hunting on the Thompson lease north of Ranger in Stephens Co. about 7:30 a.m. Wednesday when the accident occurred. He was hunting with a .35 Winchester semi-automatic rifle. Mr. Bollinger told his son that he was standing beside his pickup truck when he spotted a deer and reached into the pickup to get his rifle. The son said that he took the rifle by the barrel to take it from the truck when it discharged. The .35 slug hit him in the lower chin and came out his cheek, according to attending physicians.

Mr. Bollinger began wandering in the woods and wound up on a country road about 3 p.m. where Joe Stuard of Ranger found him and rushed him to the Ranger hospital.

Mr. Bollinger told his son that he "walked a while and then rested a while" during his seven hours in the woods.

A search for Mr. Bollinger was started about 9 a.m. by W. J. Van Bibber, when he didn't report to work at Lone Star Plant 108. Mr. Bollinger is assistant to Mr. Van Bibber at the plant.

Holiday Safety Tips

CHRISTMAS TREE
Before you set the tree up, make a fresh, diagonal cut at the base. Place it in a stand which has a container for water and keep the water level above the top of the cut.
Put the tree where it will not be near radiators, fireplaces, etc., and also where someone can't brush against it and knock it over.
Use only Underwriters' Laboratories approved wiring and lights. Check them carefully each season before stringing on the tree for frayed cords, broken sockets, loose connections, etc. Do not overload your circuits. NEVER use candles on a tree. Do not plug and unplug tree lights underneath the tree.
Decorations made of metal or glass are nonflammable. Do not use flammable decorations around the base of the tree or on it. If you use metal foil leaves or tinsel, see that no piece of foil is touching a

light, socket, or cord.
When you trim or dismantle the tree, use a step stool or ladder to reach the upper branches. If children are to help trim it, reserve the lower branches for their contribution to the artistic effect. Do not smoke while trimming the tree or taking it down.
Turn off lights before you leave the house and when no one is going to be within sight of the tree for a length of time.
Take the tree down when the needles start to fall.

UNWRAPPING GIFTS
When you're unwrapping gifts, have a waste basket or carton handy for the discarded wrappings and dispose of them as soon as gift unwrapping is over.

HOLIDAY DECORATIONS
If you use Christmas greens, place them where they cannot be ignited by lighted candles, a spark from the fireplace, or other source of flame. When they are dry, they are more likely to ignite, so remove them before they become too dry.
An electric candle can be used in your window; however, if you do use a wax candle, place it away from decorations, curtains, and other flammable materials.

When you buy such things as paper table cloths, cotton batting for trimming, crepe paper, etc., look for those that have been made fire resistant. Attractive decorations can be made out of nonflammable materials, too, or use figurines of clay, glass, porcelain, wood, or other nonflammable plastics.
If you are to be responsible for decorating for a party or festivity at school or some other public place, consult with your local fire department when you plan your decorations.

Judging of the large number of expected entries will begin Dec. 14 and be completed the next day, according to W. T. Eaton, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. Both Eaton and Bill Herrington are co-chairmen of arrangements. Judging will be done by horticulturists of the A&M College, B. G. Hancock and Dr. Benton Storey.
Both paper shell and native seedlings can be shown by growers, not only from Eastland, but from adjoining counties as well.
Included in the paper shell varieties will be some of the new government cross pecans including the Choctaw, the Apache and Wichita. Old varieties include such as Burkets, San Saba, Delmas, Success, John Garner, etc., will also be exhibited.

 mail, using the attractive new 4c Christmas stamps. When sent First Class, your cards are delivered quicker, and they'll be forwarded or returned, if it becomes necessary. Also, they may carry written messages along with your signature.

The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in keeping your mailing lists up-to-date. Before you mail your Christmas cards, secure free labels from the Post Office which read, "ALL FOR LOCAL DELIVERY" and "ALL FOR OUT OF TOWN DELIVERY", so that you can sort your cards into two bundles, with the address all facing one way, thus expediting delivery.

Through the fine cooperation of the public during recent years, Postmaster Mrs. Johnson reports that great progress has been made in getting the Christmas mails through on time. So is making many advance preparations to handle the the 1962 Christmas mail rush, with no extra mail clerks, or carriers.

"Mail Early and Often" is the Postmaster's special slogan for this year's "Mail Early for Christmas" Campaign. It looks like a record year for Christmas mail and that's why the Postmaster will especially appreciate your help in getting started now on your Christmas mailings.

Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points should be mailed first, preferably well before December 10th. Those for nearby points should be mailed by December 15th, or at least a week before Christmas.

Now That Election Is Over — Now to Help Your Congressman

Now that your Congressman is elected, there are a number of things that you as a citizen can do to help him do his job. A magazine article suggests in its fall issue.

Your contribution to good government should not end with the vote you cast in the General Election. says the quarterly magazine of Humble Oil & Refining Company. It lists a few simple do's and don'ts for good citizenship.

Among the do's: —Get to know your Congressman. Either in person, or by mail, take the opportunity after the election to wish him well. Let him know who you are and what your interests are.

—Write to him about matters on which you have some information and in which you are concerned. Be sure that your letters reflect real information which you know personally. In discussing issues, show specifically, from your own experience, how the proposal affects you.

—Acknowledge things your Congressman does that you approve. Let him know that you are aware of his work.

—When you have an interest in a subject inform your Congressman or Senator while there is still time for him to take effective action.

Among the don'ts: —Don't try to instruct your Congressman or Senator on how to vote on every issue that comes up. And don't nag at him if his votes do not match your precise thinking every time.

—Don't rely on pressure campaigns of petitions, mass mailing, mass telegrams on subjects that you don't know about personally. A thoughtful letter has more meaning than a sheaf of identical telegrams or postcards.

—Don't berate your Congressman or Senator, or call him names if he does not agree with you. If you disagree with him, give reasons for your disagreement.

—Don't pretend to represent more political influence than you have. Write or talk with
