

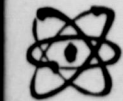

## Board Hires Dallas Firm To Study School Finances

The Eastland school board has hired the Dallas investment banking firm of Almon and McKinney to assist in planning for the construction of a new elementary school building here.

The architectural firm of Boone and Pope of Abilene has already been engaged by the board to plan for the building.

Surveying is underway this week of the 30-acre tract of

land owned by the school, on which the proposed school will be built.

County Surveyor Tommy Magnus is doing the plot work. Board President M. H. Perry has announced that a major planning meeting will be held Monday, Dec. 3rd to discuss the program.

Recommendations from both the designers and financiers are expected to be aired at that time.

Tentative consideration is being given to including the construction of a new gymnasium and an agricultural building in the building plans.

Modifications of one of the two present gyms may be undertaken, Perry said.

School officials will compare air conditioning and un-air conditioned buildings for the proposal plan.

The system now uses two ancient, inefficient grade school buildings located on opposite sides of town.

## Invitations Extended To All Pecan Growers

Pecan growers in both Eastland and adjoining counties are being invited to enter exhibits at the 10th annual Eastland County Pecan Show, to be held in Ranger on Dec. 14-15.

Richard E. Henderson, president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, is issuing a special invitation for growers to enter pecans in the show. The two-day affair will be held in the Joseph Building on Main Street, Ranger.

"We are planning to make this the biggest and best Pecan Show ever held in the county," W. T. Eaton, chairman of the agricultural committee, said in commenting on plans for the show that has attracted attention throughout Texas. Bill Herington, is co-chairman with Eaton on the arrangements committee.

Growers are limited to one entry of each of the improved varieties of nuts. For example, they may have one entry of Burketts, one entry of Mahans, etc. There is no limit, however, to the number of entries of native seedlings.

The National Pecan Shellers and Processors Association of Chicago, Illinois is expected to again furnish trophies for the grand champion paper shell and native seedling winners, as they have done in the past three years. Parking meters will be sacked by the Chamber of Commerce on both days of the show for the convenience of spectators and visitors to the show and the city, it was explained by Col. Roy Plumley, Chm. mgr.

Members of the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse will sponsor a dance to be held Saturday evening beginning at 8 p.m. in the Eastland County Livestock and Posse Barn, north of the city.

Tickets are on sale in advance for \$1.50 per couple. The public is cordially invited to attend.

Judging in the contest will be done on the following basis: Appearance, 40 points; poise, maximum of 20 points; Personality, maximum of 40 points, according to Mrs. Ratliff.

Every community in the county will be asked to enter a representative as soon as possible after which each will be mailed details of the contest.

Jan Nixon of Cisco, was elected queen of the 1961 show and will surrender the crown on the night of the contest to the winner of the 10th annual contest.

Judging in the contest will be done on the following basis: Appearance, 40 points; poise, maximum of 20 points; Personality, maximum of 40 points, according to Mrs. Ratliff.

## CONTRACT LET Highway 6 Re-Construction To Cost County About \$20,000

Eastland County will contribute about \$20,000 toward the re-construction of Highway 6 between Carbon and Eastland.

Total right-of-ways costs will be in the neighborhood of \$40,000, County Auditor C. H. O'Brien said, and the state and county will share the expense, with the county to pay the recording fees.

The county has already issued checks amounting to \$32,350.03 and about \$6,000 in right-of-way payments are yet to be approved.

A contract for 9.7 miles of construction of the state highway was awarded to the Amarillo firm of Cooper and Woodruff Inc., which submitted the low bid of \$533,283 on the project.

## Leon River Flood Control Is Re-Considered By Corps

How bad are the flooding conditions of the Leon River?

Well, certainly not as bad as they have been in the past and not as good as they could be—but the exact extent of flood danger seems to be pretty much anybody's guess.

A team of four Army Corps of Engineers from Fort Worth were in Eastland Tuesday to

examine the Leon situation.

The team didn't come prepared with much information because they lack files on this project, they said and the local citizens could supply but very little.

There was devised in the mid 1940s a general river flood-control program for the Leon, the plan was approved,

but funds were never available for the work.

There are funds now. Work projects for the Leon were among the package of money bills appropriated for river and harbor work by the last Congress.

But the conditions appear to need re-evaluation at this time.

A Corps of Engineers map filed at the local city hall does spell out four avenues of river work called for at that time.

The map is dated December 1945, and lists these four projects:

1. Install drainage structure and fill embankment openings

2. Strengthen abandoned railroad embankment (the old Eastland, Wichita Falls and Gulf, or Ringling Road, line)

3. Construct storm sewer ditch, install drainage structures and fill embankment openings; and

4. Clear, enlarge and straighten existing channel of lower north fork, where required.

Acting City Manager K. B. Tanner said that part of these projects have been done, and the flooding conditions "aren't what they used to be."

The Engineers met with Council Chairman Virgil T. Seaberry, and Member Jack Germany, Tanner, and Herb Turner, long-time chamber of commerce manager here.

Plans call for the Corps to do aerial photography of the river as well as core-drilling of the area to determine the conditions and needs of the flood prevention program.

Seaberry stated that complete cooperation will be needed from Eastlanders in reporting their recollection of flood conditions for the past ten years, so that the Corps will know just how bad current problems are.

Also land-owners adjoining the river will probably be asked to donate right-of-way to the city for use in core drilling.

It will be to the owners' benefit to do this, it was pointed out, because additional work on the river will be beneficial to the entire area, especially to those with land near by.

Citizens are asked to report their remembrances of flooding and high-water conditions to the city hall, where they will be recorded and passed on to the Corps of Engineers.

Most area residents can remember when the river flooded horribly south of here, especially in the area where the Leon crosses Highway 6, between

Retires

## Lone Star Vice President To Retire

M. L. Bird, vice president of Lone Star Gas Company's General Division of Distribution, retires December 1 under the firm's insurance-pension program. A 37-year Lone Star employee, Mr. Bird directs general operations for some 400 cities and towns in Texas and Oklahoma, and he has played a major role in building Lone Star distribution properties.

He began his career with Lone Star in December, 1925, at the beginning of an expansion program which resulted in the building of more than 200 town distribution plants within a five-year period. Throughout this construction program, Mr. Bird held important engineering and supervisory assignments which equipped him for increasing responsibilities handed him from time to time by Lone Star.

He held the position of construction engineer on his first job with Lone Star. This was at Honey Grove during construction of the gas distribution system. He served as an office engineer in the Dallas head-

quarters for a year and in 1928 was placed in the field as superintendent in charge of construction of distribution plants in the General Division. This was at the height of the company's five-year expansion program.

The following year he was named general superintendent of Lone Star's West Texas distribution territory. In 1935, upon resignation of Lone Star's operating territory, the Abilene Division of Distribution was formed and he was appointed superintendent. It was during this tenure of service that he covered much of his territory by private plane to earn the title of Lone Star's "flying superintendent."

Fourteen years later he returned to Dallas as operator manager of the General Division of Distribution and on January 1, 1954, was elected vice-president in charge of the division.

Before joining Lone Star, Mr. Bird was employed in ranching in New Mexico and subsequently served in the engineering department of the city of Fort Worth, his birthplace and where he was graduated from high school. He attended Castle Heights Military Academy at Lebanon, Tennessee.

During World War I, he enlisted in the Second Texas Cavalry which later became a part of the 36th Division. He was in active fission service with the 111th Field Signal Corps attached to the 134th Machine Gun Battalion. In World War II he was commander of Group 19, Civil Air Patrol, assisting in the pre-flight training of Army aviation cadets. His organization also furnished planes and men for patrol duty on the Mexican border, ferry service between Army camps, and conducted submarine observations on the Texas coast. The organization was an auxiliary of the Army Air Force and Mr. Bird held

the rank of captain. He tended his resignation at the end of the war. He lists machine lathe and woodworking as hobbies and fishing as his hobby.

An active participant in natural gas industry affairs, Mr. Bird is a member of the General Management Committee of the American Gas Association and is a committee member of the Distribution Home Study Course drafted by the Southern Gas Association. He has also been active in the Texas Manufacturer's Association since 1947 and he is now a member of its State Affairs Committee. He was one of the original 28 members of the Texas United Defense Fund, and later served as a regional chairman for the United Fund. He is now on the board of directors of the Texas United Fund.

Mr. Bird is a member of St. Luke's Episcopal Church, and the Dallas Athletic Club. He is a master mason and recently

received his 25-year certificate from the Lions Club of Dallas. He and Mrs. Bird reside at 9023 Broken Arrow in Dallas. Their son Donald, a process engineer for the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation resides in Dumas. The Donald L. Birds have four children.

Mr. Bird's successor is Louis B. Huley who will assume his new duties December 1. Mr. Huley was formerly Lone Star's General Superintendent of Distribution, General Division of Distribution.

Leon - (Continued from page 1) here and Carbon. The north fork of the river has never emptied as it should, Tanner said, although it does better now than in the past.

The south fork runs about 24 hours later than the north, and in most recent years, water from the north fork has been 'out of the way' before the south fork water comes down.

Last flooding here is remembered to be in 1955 shortly after the completion of Lake Leon, when an 11-inch rain fell.

In June of 1958, Cong. Omar Burleson forwarded a letter from Brig. Gen. J. L. Person, then assistant chief of engineers for Civil Works, to the Eastland Telegram, concerning the Leon flood control project.

The letter, from the paper's files, reads. "Reference is made to my letter of 1 April, 1958, on the status of the authorized flood protection project at Eastland on the Leon River.

"At that time I indicated that consideration was being given to reclassifying the project to 'inactive', due to the failure of local officials to furnish the necessary assurances of local cooperation. I further stated that if local interests would arrange with us for compliance with the provisions of cooperation, no further action would be taken toward placing the project in the inactive category.

"Since then our District Engineer has been in contact with local officials on this matter, and the Mayor of Eastland has advised him that the City Board of Commissioners has accepted the responsibility for required cooperation under the project.

"I am pleased to inform you that, in view of the revival of local interest and acceptance of prescribed cooperation requirements, the Eastland project will be retained in our active program of projects eligible for consideration for future budgeting and funding."

II. Thou shalt not sign thy good name to any covenant without making certain all figures have been correctly entered beforehand, nor shalt thou leave any blank spaces to be filled in later, or thee and thine shalt surely end thy days as paupers.

III. Thou shalt question all insurance charges so as to thwart thine enemies, the unscrupulous lenders, in the making of fatted profits.

IV. Thou shalt determine to whom thy hard earned money is owed for installment purchases and what be his reputation amongst men, or thou mayest discover thou art obligated and in servitude to strangers other than thy own merchant.

V. Thou shalt scan the terms of all notes and contracts to seek out hidden forfeits for

late payments so thou shalt not line the pockets of dishonest usurers.

VI. Thou shalt read all fine print with due caution; so that thee and thy wife and thy children shalt not be held in bondage by the unrighteous lender.

VII. Thou shalt note the words regarding repossession of thy goods in each covenant, for the usurious lender surely shalt not show thee any mercy, yea, even though thou weep with great tears of sadness.

# P-TA County Council Hears Telstar Story

The potentiality of a future in which "machines will talk to each other" at the rate of 30,000 words per second was explained to members of the Eastland Parent-Teachers Association and the Eastland-Calahan Bi-County meeting at Eastland High School Monday.

Speaking to the organization was Glenn Scott, public information supervisor for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.

"Within a short time, we in America will be able to dial a number as far away as Japan and have the call completed in a matter of minutes," he said. He described how machines are already automatically rerouting calls when several circuits are busy, all within minutes.

On display during the talk was a replica of Telstar, a first satellite, was shown in its exact size, operating on solar batteries as it does in reality.

"This satellite, which so embarrassed us by its tiny size compared to the Russia's larger one, has been up since

1958 and is expected to circle the earth for 200 years," Mr. Scott said.

For those who worry about the vast outer space being overcrowded, he added that work is moving ahead on a device called a laser which will remove debris from above the earth.

Plans are already formulated and meeting dates set for the organization of a company to equip the world for outer space communication. The government will set up controls for its organization, and no one company will be permitted over a certain percentage of stock.

Mr. Scott explained that he would be in Washington later this week to attend one of the organization meetings.

Mrs. Alvin Pierce, vice-president, presided during the meeting and introduced the speaker.

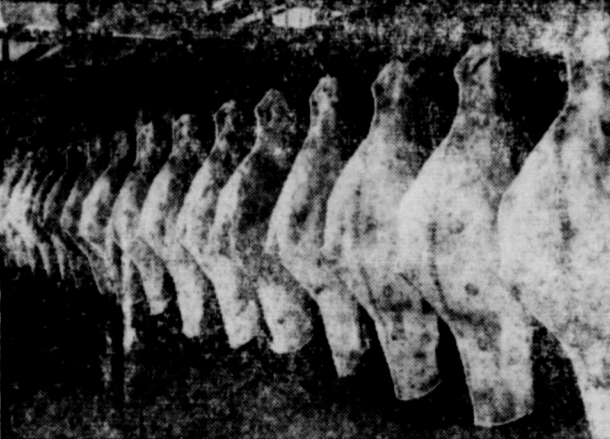

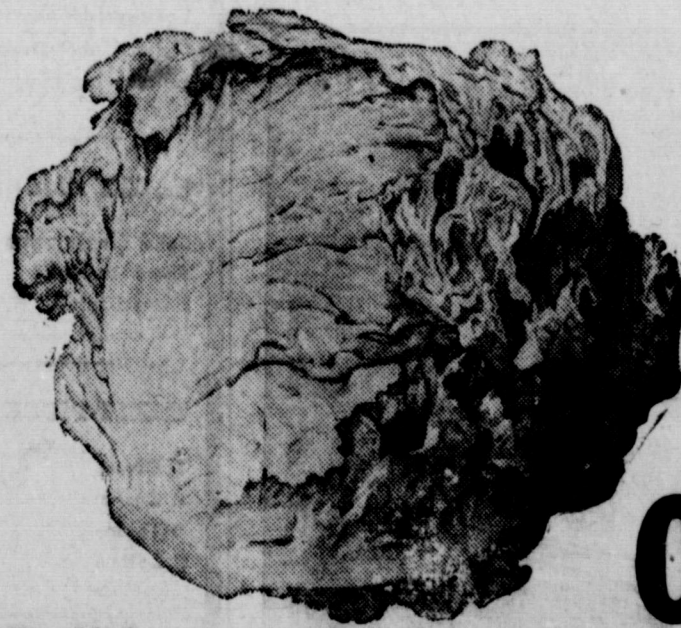

**Browsing With Bev**  
 Don't overlook the use of pumpkins, now that Halloween is past. This fall vegetable can be turned into many delightful dishes.  
 Select a pumpkin which is heavy for its size. The rind should be hard and free from blemishes. Extra large pumpkins may have stringy coarse flesh and be less flavorful than small or medium sized ones.  
 Pumpkins, with their yellow to orange color, belong to the group of vegetables famous for Vitamin A. Pumpkins also provide small amounts of other vitamins and minerals.  
 Besides using it in pie, pumpkin can also be used in breads, cookies, and nut bread. Stewed pumpkin can be mashed, seasoned with butter, salt and pepper, and served as a vegetable. It can be added to waffle batter.  
 With frozen orange concentrate so inexpensive, it's wise to use it in many ways. Here's an idea that combines two plentiful food items—frozen orange juice and salad oils.  
 Mix 1 can frozen orange concentrate with 1 cup salad oil, add 1/4 to 1 teaspoon salt and a dash of red pepper sauce. Pour over a mixed fruit salad or a scoop of cottage cheese nestled in lettuce leaves. It's mighty tasty.

**Have Ice-Free Stock Water This Winter**  
 Breaking ice on stock watering troughs or tanks is no pleasant task. It isn't necessary if an automatic livestock waterer, equipped with an electrical heating element, is installed, says W. S. Adden, extension agricultural engineer.  
 Water should be available for livestock at all times, he adds, even in the coldest weather. Tests have shown that cows watered automatically drank 18 percent more water and gave 3.5 percent more milk than cows watered twice daily. Beef cattle and hogs also need plenty of water if they are to do well during the winter months, the engineer adds.  
 Automatic electrically heated livestock waterers are available in many shapes and sizes and for all types of livestock. Basically, a unit consists of a water tank fed by pressure or a gravity water system, a float valve, a heating element controlled by a thermostat, and a housing to support the tank and exclude outside air movement around the tank.  
 Allen suggests purchasing the smallest unit that will provide ample water for your livestock. A general purpose bowl type waterer will handle up to 30 head of cattle or 60 hogs. The heating element should be immersed in the water of the tank or attached to the underside of the tank. These types, he explains, are usually more efficient than those which warm the space enclosed by the housing.  
 The thermostat is an important part of the automatic waterer and one with a 5 degree range between the "on" and "off" operating points is most desirable. Cattle or combination waterers should be insulated on the sides to conserve electricity. Covers are also recommended for reducing operating costs and as an aid to keeping the water clean. Allen says to select a unit which can be cleaned easily.  
 He says the water temperature should be maintained just high enough to prevent surface freezing. This will usually be between 45 and 50 degrees F. And finally, he suggests a visit with the local county agent

**Fires A Hazard of Nuclear Attack**  
 Should America be attacked by nuclear weapons our nation's rural citizens would be greatly concerned with the problems of fire, according to a new leaflet by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service.  
 The leaflet issued in cooperation with the Department of Defense—Office of Civil Defense, envisions each rural family as a self-contained fire protection unit.  
 "RURAL FIRE DEFENSE—You Can Survive," discusses these problems and suggests methods of meeting them. It explains that preparation is the basis for the National Civil Defense program and that preparedness in fire defense is a vital part of this preparation.  
 The leaflet is designed to be used as a training aid in teaching rural families to protect themselves and their property in a fire emergency. It describes the damage which a nuclear blast can cause on farms, woodlands and in rural communities, and lists measures to reduce this damage.  
 In a foreword to the bulletin Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman says, "Protection and survival of those living in rural areas, along with crops, livestock and other agricultural resources is vital. In addition, some rural families may be faced with heavy responsibilities for sheltering and feeding survivors, bringing fires under control
