'Kind Lady' Expertly Presented By Texas Players To Small Audience

"Kind Lady" didn't get precisely kind treatment at the hands of Big Spring Thursday night, in the way of an audience; but in turn, the few who were at the municipal auditorium were given a kind treatment in the way of a dramatic undertaking.

Presented by the newly-organized Texas Players, a group of college dramatists headed up the road of professional stage careers, the production was ably and smartly staged. The pity of it is that, if reception in other towns, they are discovering early that the theatrical row is a tough one to hoe.

Credit for the smooth performance here last evening must go to Lawrence Carra, a Texas University department head who is guiding the destiny of the young players. There wasn't a hitch, from prologue to epilogue; timing and interpretation rated favorably with work you'd see on any stage.

Outstanding were the settings, makeup and costuming, all adding immeasurably to the tone and spirit of the play, a psychological drama of suspense.

The acting was definitely on a professional basis. Virginia Lipscomb, who carried the major role, was completely expert throughout in a different characterization that called for transition from a sophisticated young lady to a woman bewildered in mind and subdued in spirit.

There wasn't a rough performance among the entire cast of 13. Even minor character roles were handled by these young people as if they were playing a stellar part in a Broadway production.

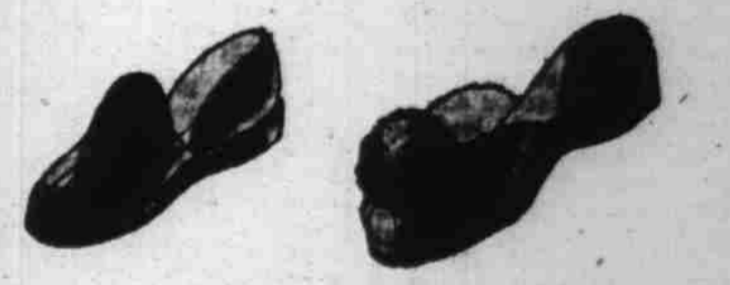
If there was a weakness, it was in the choice of a vehicle. The play itself, a Broadway run of 1935, dealt in atmosphere rather than in plausible plot, and could not be regarded as one which an average audience would be chattering

about for days after the presentation. The Texas Players undoubtedly will turn to more popular types of plays for their future efforts. Their circuit originally included Big Spring for future presentations. It is to be hoped that the organization would see fit to give this city at least one more opportunity to witness honest, capable efforts at drama, because it needs a fair reception from towns such as ours, and our town needs such moments of good theatre as this organization can provide.—B. 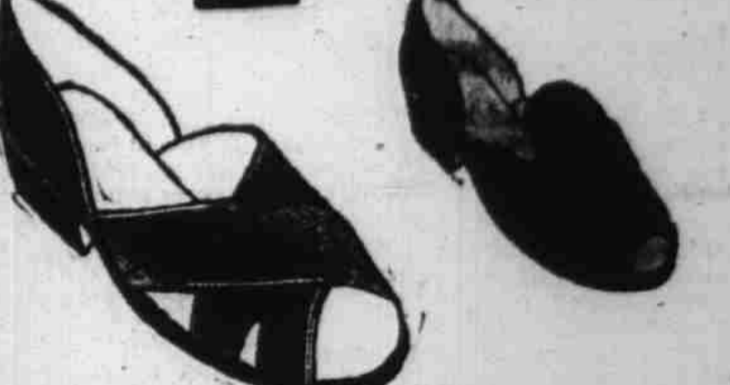

British Charge Visits Russian Reception
MOSCOW, March 22. (AP)—Frank Roberts, British charge d'affaires, visited the Soviet foreign ministry for 90 minutes last night in the midst of a diplomatic reception at the Afghan embassy. There was much speculation among Roberts' foreign colleagues, but no official explanation of the visit.

(Roberts was instructed by his government on March 4 to "make inquiries" of the Soviet government concerning the Russian failure to withdraw Red army troops from Iran. Russia thus far has not answered a British note requesting an official explanation of the failure to withdraw the troops.)

Vishinsky Renamed
MOSCOW, March 22. (AP)—Andrei J. Vishinsky was reappointed deputy minister of foreign affairs today by decree of the council of ministers. Other deputies in order of rank, reappointed by the council, were V. G. Dekanozov, Solomon A. Lozovsky and Maxim Litvinov.

Sadler Answers Demo Questionnaire Sent To State Candidates

DALLAS, March 22. (AP)—Explaining that today was the deadline given him for answering the Democratic state executive committee's questionnaire, Jerry Sadler, who has filed as a candidate for governor in the Democratic primary, released the following letter addressed to the committee in Dallas:

"In answer to your questionnaire may I say that my loyalty to our democracy has never been questioned.

"As to the writer's activities referred to in your questionnaire, I am sure my orders, which are available in the War Department, cover my assignment for this period.

"Your questionnaire refers to my loyalty to our state commander-in-chief, the immortal Franklin Delano Roosevelt. My loyalty is of official record, first in the oath that every enlisted man takes upon entry into the service and the oath an officer takes when he is commissioned. Both of these matters are of record in the War Department."

Yank Troops In India To Be Reduced

NEW DELHI, March 22. (AP)—US Undersecretary of War Kenneth C. C. Royall, who stopped here today en route to Cairo on a world tour, said American troops in the India-Burma theater would be reduced to 500 by May 21. Those still here are engaged in turning over 500,000 tons of Army surplus to the Indian government.

Royall is studying the disposition of Army surplus in theaters throughout the world.

BEAUMONT, March 22. (AP)—The body of a sailor listed on company records as Alfred S. Holmes, 35, of Lake Arthur, La., was recovered last night from the Neches river about seven hours after he was believed to have fallen from a Higman barge at Sun Oil Company docks at Nederland.
