"BELIEF—UNBELIEF"
"I believe, help Thou mine unbelief"—so exclaimed one written about in the New Testament. The person who does not have something of this double mood within himself, as he faces the miracle of Christmas—of the Incarnation—has not perceived the deep meaning of this amazing assertion, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us."
Is it easy to explain how the infinite, all-mighty, eternal God became finite, weak, temporal man? Is it easy to explain how Jesus can pray to the Father, and still be God? Is it easy to explain Jesus' words that only God knew certain things, and He did not—and Jesus still be regarded as God?

Hicks, who witnessed the bailout and crash. Randolph was treated for second degree burns. An ambulance was dispatched from Dyess AFB at Abilene to transfer him to the base hospital. The pilot, with Attack Squadron 46 at Cecil Field near Jacksonville, Fla., was on a training flight to Hensley Field near Grand Prairie and to Biggs Air Force Base at El Paso. The lead plane of the two-plane flight — piloted by Lt. (jg) G. L. Holmes — circled the crash area, waiting for the pilot to be picked up, then went on to land at Dyess AFB. Dyess officials said the cause of the accident was not known. A board of officers will be formed to investigate the accident, the Dyess information service officer reported. Guards from Dyess were sent to the scene to prevent anyone from picking up any pieces of the wreckage which might be needed to complete their investigation. Rising Star hospital officials said Randolph apparently had trouble with his oxygen mask and that equipment inside the cockpit caught fire, forcing him to eject from the plane. Hicks said he saw two planes flying overhead near his farm when what looked like a ball of fire fell from one of them. He said he saw the plane crash and smoke start rising from the wreckage. Hicks and his wife got in a pickup truck and drove toward the spot where he saw the plane go down. He spotted Randolph standing in the road near a pasture and picked up the flier. Hicks said he told Randolph he didn't see anyone bail out of the plane, only a ball of fire. "That was me," Randolph told Hicks. After taking Randolph to the hospital, he helped nurses who cut off Randolph's shirt. Rising Star night watchman Bob Reeves, who went to the scene of the crash, said wreckage was scattered over a quarter-mile area in pasture land and a wheat field. He said the plane apparently exploded and burned. Reeves said parts of the plane still remaining intact were almost gutted by flames by the time he arrived. The Rising Star volunteer fire department arrived but the fire was almost burned out by that time, he said.

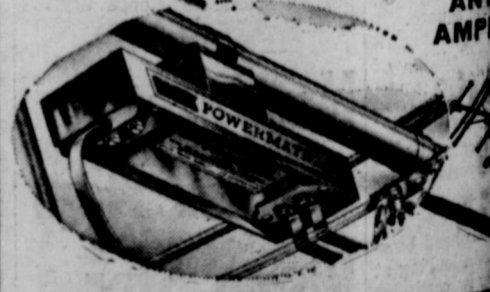

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION KEEP RECORDS!

Back in pioneer times our forefathers found they could keep track of the family history pretty well with a few notations on the flyleaf of the family Bible. But life's not quite that simple any more.

The point of this is that the average American today has a good many important papers to keep track of. There are birth certificates, receipts, copies of tax returns, sales contracts, and a host of other papers.

So why not make a New Year's Resolution to follow these suggestions:

- 1. Get a heavily bound notebook folder or file folder as a central collecting point for all the records of your affairs.
2. Put your especially important papers in your safe deposit box, but make a list of those

papers and a brief summary of their contents to put in your home file.

3. Get for your files copies of birth certificates for all members of the family, and add them to the file. Add your marriage license or at least a statement as to when and where you were married and by whom.

4. Insert your will or a copy of it. If your will is kept elsewhere, include a note telling where it may be found.

5. During the year, put into the file your income tax withholding statements and receipts for expenditures which may be deductible. Then keep a copy of each year's tax return in the file.

6. Make a list of all the stocks and bonds you own and where they are.

7. List all the places you have lived and worked and the names of persons there who you know. Include the schools you have attended and the dates you left or were graduated.

8. If you have benefits coming under a profit-sharing plan where you work, make a note of that too.

9. If you're in doubt about whether an item should be included, put it in.

This takes time initially but it will save you both time and worry in the long run.

The Arthritis Foundation, the National Foundation for the Rheumatism Foundation. Federal government research in this area is extensive.
