Lewis Tiner Named New City Manager

Will Assume Duties January 1st

Lewis Tiner, 39, was named city manager of Eastland Wednesday.

Tiner's name was chosen from a list of about seven applicants for the job, replacing James Young who resigned a month ago.

Operator of the Eastland Venetian Blind Manufacturing Co. here since he and his family moved to Eastland in 1947, Tiner and his wife live at Lake Leon.

K. B. Tanner has been acting city manager since Young's resignation.

Tiner is a native of Trent in West Texas, where he graduated from high school. He attended Tarleton State College and Cisco Junior College.

The new city manager's wife is business manager at Eastland Memorial Hospital and was acting administrator for almost a year recently.

The commission was unanimous in its appreciation to Mr. Tanner for his services as interim manager, and Council Chairman Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. said.

Tiner will assume his new post January 1st.

"The Commission was gratified to have an unusually large number of qualified applicants for the position and has requested that its appreciation be extended to all applicants," Virgil Seaberry said.

The Commission also expressed its deep appreciation to Mr. K. B. Tanner who has held the position since November 23rd while applications were being received.

Mr. Tanner will continue his position until Mr. Tiner takes office.

During other business Monday night, commissioners also:

* Considered three bids (one from Midland, one from Eastland and one from Cross Plains) for the demolition of the old city hall, but no action was taken.

* Gave permission to Mrs. McFatter to erect curbing around lots in the old part of the cemetery.

* Gave permission for the development of a complete city map, including the lakes, airport, creeks and city dump.

"Every day about five people come in wanting to know this, that or the other," Tanner said and without maps it's difficult to give much information.

Engineers have estimated that the cost of such a map would be about \$75, he said, and all information would be furnished.

* Named Milton Fullen to work with Tanner on heating the new city hall building.

Recent estimates reviewed by the council were for \$331 for heating equipment and some \$300 for necessary duct work.

* Authorized Tanner to interview and hire a woman for the city hall front office.

Mr. Tanner announced that he plans to treat the city employees at a Christmas party at the City Hall.

Commissioners also discussed painting the exterior of the new building and agreed to check costs of materials. And agreed to buy new fire hoses.

'TOO HIGH' School Board Sees Prelim Plans, Hears Estimates Of Costs

The Eastland school board Tuesday evening saw preliminary plans and learned that estimates on proposed school construction are in the neighborhood of \$574,600.

"Too high, was the unanimous response of the board and the architects were sent back to "sharpen their pencils" and present new estimates at a later date.

This week the Abilene firm showed sketches of a 16-teach-unit elementary building with cafeteria, cost of which is expected to be some \$353,000; a vocational shop for \$15,000 and a new gymnasium to cost \$156,600.

Total estimated building cost was \$524,300 with an additional \$15,800 as a three per cent contingency fund; \$31,500 for architects and engineers fees; and \$3,000 for furnishing six of the new elementary class rooms.

In explaining the preliminary drawings, Dan Boone pointed out that his firm had planned for the present load plus small additional facilities for the future.

Plan is in the shape of a

"Y", with the larger children in one point of the Y, and the younger one's in the other. The base of the Y would be taken up mainly with the combination cafeteria-auditorium, and completely equipped kitchen.

Area of the proposed elementary building was 32,100 square feet and cost was "guesstimated" at \$11 per square.

It would be of concrete slab, poured on located, with a brick exterior and flat roof. Inside partitions would be five-eighths inch sheetrock on two by four studs, with the lower walls further protected with plywood in the classrooms and tile in the corridors.

The inside walls would be equal in sound insulation, Boone said, to four-inch masonry.

Ceiling would be of acoustical tile, the auditorium would seat some 400 people, and the feeding capacity of the cafeteria about 260. The auditorium would make an ideal community meeting place, he said.

Board pretty well agreed that a proposed 35 by 30 music room probably wouldn't be

needed. Classrooms are 30 by 30.

Air conditioning would be blown air with about 25 to 30,000 ton to the unit, and "we've proven air conditioned building in Abilene," Boone said.

Cost includes some \$20,000 in kitchen equipment and about \$10,000 for site work.

The board began to "draw in their belts" here when they realized that the proposals before them would necessitate bonds totaling nearly the maximum possible under state law (10 per cent of the total evaluation; about \$650,000 based on Eastland's \$6,500,000 current evaluation).

Members really began to "put on the breaks" when they saw that the 14,241 square foot gym might cost \$11 per square and total out at \$156,200. It would seat 510 and have complete dressing room and P.E. room.

"How can we cut that cost," President M. H. Perry asked. Boone answered that he didn't feel that space could be trimmed anywhere because the

Ex-Mayor A. A. Tate Buried in Carbon Monday

A. A. Tate, 83, former Carbon mayor and ex-peace officer in Eastland, Comanche and Taylor counties and a resident of Abilene since 1926, died at his home, 302 Sayles Blvd., at 10 a.m. Saturday.

He had been in ill health many years.

Born Feb. 25, 1879, in Comanche County, he married Coyle Butler at Sipe Springs in Comanche County in 1906. The couple lived several years at Carbon, where he served as mayor and a school board trustee. Mr. Tate also was engaged in ranching and was a deputy sheriff in Comanche County.

He later moved to Amarillo to become maintenance foreman of a three-county area for the State Highway Dept. He also served six years there as a deputy sheriff.

Mr. and Mrs. Tate came to Abilene in 1926. A year later he joined the Abilene police department as a traffic officer. He remained on the force until 1933 when he was struck by a car while crossing a street in downtown Abilene. He was not able to continue working following the accident.

Funeral was held at 10 a.m. Monday at Elliott's Chapel of Memories with Dr. Elwin Skiles pastor of First Baptist Church, officiating. The body

was taken to Carbon where graveside rites were conducted at 12 p.m. Monday.

Surviving are his wife; two sons, George W. of the home and Don of Pecos; three daughters, Mr. J. R. Horn of 1525 N. 7th, Mrs. Imogene Knight of 1542 N. 7th and Mrs. D. B. Clements of Seattle, Wash.; four grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren; one brother, G. F. of Comanche; one half brother and three half sisters.

Funeral Services Held Wednesday For A. O. Cook

Funeral services for Mr. A. O. Cook, 75, were held Wednesday at 3 p.m. in the First Baptist Church. Interment was in the Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Hamner Funeral Home.

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JUDGE COLLIE TO RULE ON SCHOOL BOND PLEADINGS

Judge T. M. Collie agreed to rule on exceptions to admission in the Cisco School Bond Mandamus hearing Tuesday afternoon. Judge Collie, in his

court and dressing room needs are pretty well fixed. Then added that the present plans are based on what they believe to be needs, but if the board wants to decide what they can afford, then the firm could take that figure and do what they could.

Member Truett Gregory summed up the board's views by saying that they didn't want to cut quality of what they did, but they just wanted to provide the best facilities possible within the means of the district.

It was fairly well agreed that the vocation shop could be put into the present tin gymnasium building at a substantial saving.

Dr. James Whittington, leader of the unsuccessful county consolidation move last spring, was present and asked questions of the board and the architects, and generally joined in the matters under discussion.

He also proposed an alternate route for the consideration of the board.

His plan contained four points:

1. Get the federal court to amend its bankruptcy decree to read 25 cents for retirement fund instead of the present 50 cents or call in the bonds and pay them off at the end of the next year.

2. Build to and remodel your present system thus:
a. Purchase the land not now owned by the school between the present junior high school and West Ward.

b. Build a new gymnasium in that area which will be a multipurpose: gymnasium, cafeteria and city auditorium.
c. Remodel West Ward as was done at Grandberry, Arlington, and Breckenridge to take care of all grades one through five.

3. Issue \$200,000 — \$250,000 in bonds to take care of the above.

4. When the court order is satisfied, cut the tax rate 10 to 15 cents to be less than any adjoining school district.

Flanking cases on and the architects will return.

Mitcham and his attorneys lift 91st District Court, heard Bill their pleadings in the case and then heard attorneys for the school board, W. B. Wright and Virgil Seaberry, lift their acceptance of these admissions.

The Judge will rule on these pleadings Friday, Jan. 4, and will set a date at that time for the continuation of the mandamus trial. Both parties filed their amended documents Tuesday (today) just prior to hearing date and Judge Collie had not had an opportunity to review them. In fact, at the beginning of the hearing, he said that it was his understanding that the mandamus matter was to be decided today.

Mitcham and his attorneys alleged in their amended lift of admissions that the Cisco school buildings have been found not to require as much repair as had been thought earlier. The school board and its attorneys answered that this admission was not substantiated by fact and that there has been no change in conditions as stated at the time of the school bond election.

Mitcham and his attorneys also pointed out that the scholastic population had declined and is expected to continue to decline and therefore that the expenditure of \$700,000 is not justified. The board answered in its exception that this does not constitute a change of conditions.

Mitcham and his attorneys are asking the court, through the mandamus, to nullify the September 6 bond election, basing their case on a statute concerning change of condition.

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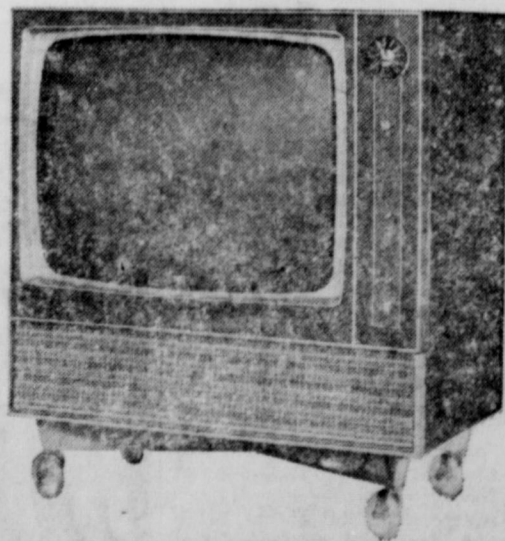

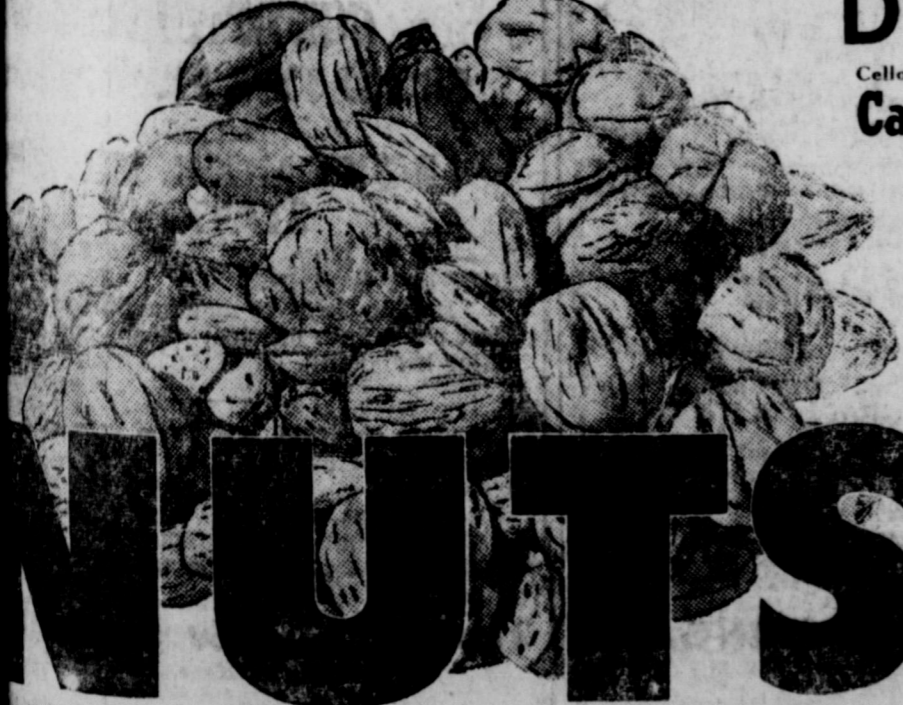

Progress Outlined On Screwworm Eradication

Mission—Sterile screwworm flies are currently being dispersed in 73,000 square miles of Texas, 7,000 square miles of New Mexico and 10,000 square miles along the international border in Mexico. Last week, 77,576,450 flies were distributed, of which about half were males.
The flies are reared in a huge "fly factory" built near here with funds collected from individual livestock producers. They are sexually sterilized by being subjected to cobalt-60, a radioactive material, and are then dispersed by air-drop.
Program officials are already making plans to extend the barrier of sterile flies that will stretch along the international border from below Brownsville to the New Mexico-Arizona state line. If weather permits, officials expect the entire barrier to be in place by February 15, 1963. This barrier is designed to prevent native screwworm flies from entering areas where screwworms have already been eradicated. It is anticipated that nearly 50 million sterile flies per week will be needed for this barrier.

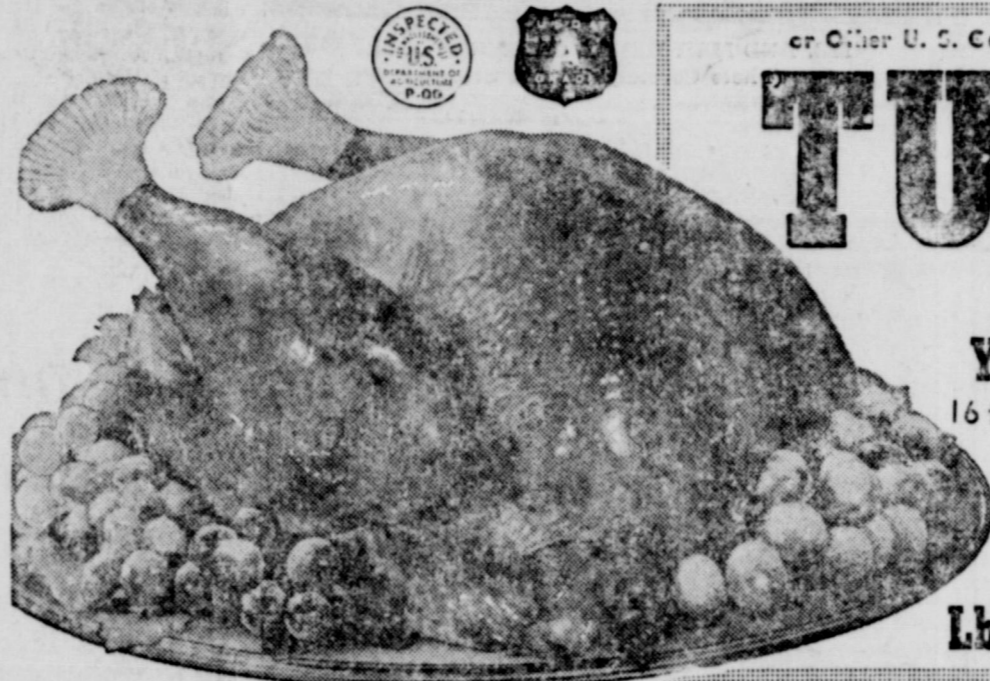
