GOT YOURS YET?

Only 16 Poll Tax Days Left

Only 16 days remain in which to buy poll taxes for voting rights in 1963.

At least one very important election is expected to confront Eastland voters during this year.

Tentative plans call for the school bond election for consideration of money for construction and repairs to be held early this year.

Jan. 31 is the deadline for getting new poll taxes and all elections after that date will require the new receipts for eligibility.

Persons over 60 years of age are not required in this county to get exemption certificates (because of the population), but may if they so desire.

Actually, the year 1963 is what is generally considered an "off" election year, but voters in Eastland County have learned that there are seldom really "off years." Most agree it's best to be prepared to vote.

Of course some people may hesitate to pay their poll taxes this year in view of the possibility of having voting tax "done away with" as is being considered by the state legislature.

But this hasn't been done yet and the poll tax is still very much in force. The state referendum vote at primary time which carried in favor of doing away with the poll tax, did not have any official function except to show the legislature that the citizens want to discard the poll tax.

The price is \$1.75. The state levies and gets \$1.50; 25% of which goes to build, maintain (Continued on page 7)

C. E. Smith of Rising Star Captures State Pecan Show First-Place Prize

SECOND BIG WIN FOR THIS COUNTY

For the second consecutive year, Eastland County won top honors at the Texas State Pecan Show held Saturday in College Station.

C. E. Smith of Rising Star won grand champion honors with the Wichita variety. Mr. Smith exhibited the reserve champion during last year's show.

Ben Freeman, of the Chaney Community, near Ranger who had the grand champion variety last year, also rated high during the annual show.

Earl Conner, Jr., of Eastland placed first with his exhibition of the Mahan variety. The Conner orchard is located about five miles south of Eastland.

First place winner of the Texas Prolific variety was W. V. Fenter of Rising Star. A retired building contractor, he moved to Eastland County from Montana and purchased the old Dr. Allen orchard two years ago.

Ellis Cooper of Ranger also placed with his entry of the Ranger variety which is named for the city of Ranger.

San Saba took first place among counties with 330 points, but unable to name its queen candidate as the 1963 Texas Pecan Queen.

The new queen was named from Hood County with 225 points. She is Miss Gwendolyn Massey, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. N. Massey of Granbury.

Bell County was third with 154 points and Eastland County fourth with 134 points.

The Col. P. L. Downs sweepstakes award went to Nelson Hander of Belton.

Eastland received a first place gold trophy for their winning time of 29.4 seconds in the six-men pumper races, and Breckenridge fell behind one-tenth of a second for second place. Weatherford with 32 seconds was third. Cisco as host town was ineligible for competition, but clocked a 30 second race with Kay Jackson, Gene Agnew, Vandell Weathers, Don Johnson, C. L. Historical Committee Will Meet Jan. 19th

The nine members of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee will be among the 2,500 state committee members who will meet with respective County Judges on Texas Historical Preservation Day, Jan. 19.

This day will be proclaimed by Governor-elect John Connally to kick off the year's work of historical preservation and marking in the counties.

The local committee will meet in the Eastland Court House with County Judge Scott Bailey.

Judge Bailey has appointed Mrs. Bernice McCrea of Cisco as chairman of the committee. Other members will include Joe Dennis, representing the local news media; Mrs. Lee White of Rising Star; a representative from the Business Men's Club of Gorman, the Chambers of Commerce of Eastland, Ranger

and Rising Star. J. E. T. Peters of Cisco was nominated by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and Charles Freysehlag by the Eastland Chamber.

Each member of the committee will receive a certificate from Governor-elect Connally. Each is appointed for a two

year term.

Thus far, three Eastland County sites have been declared eligible for plaques by the TSHSC: the Mobley Hotel in Cisco, site of Conrad Hilton's first hotel; the First National Bank of Cisco, scene of the famous Santa Claus robbery; and the Stubblefield Building, present location of the Corner Drug, oldest permanent structure in Eastland.

The Eastland plaque is being held by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Judge Bailey stated that there may be some 50 sites in the county which would warrant the historical plaques, since it is the home of Old Rip, the oil boom and the late Boyce House.

Delimitable aim of the committee will be to locate sites in the county worthy of the historical markers, for example the first church in Eastland.

Judge Bailey said that the committee would also undertake to find and mark all graves of Civil War Veterans in the state.

He added that all local cooperation would be greatly appreciated and that old clippings

Rotary Hears About Spain


The Eastland Rotary Club took an "armchair" tour of Spain Monday when Miss Helen Crawford of Cisco described that country's history and culture for the club.

Using color slides and notes from her recent visit to the ancient European country, Miss Crawford described Spain's grandeur and its people.



777 People Checked SS Last Year

A total of 777 people in and around Eastland took time in 1962 to find out for sure about their rights and responsibilities under social security, according to H. L. Weatherly, field representative from the Abilene district office who visits Eastland regularly.

Weatherly knows the above because he had that many personal interviews on his 1962 visits, with 164 claims applications for retirement, disability, or survivor benefits being filed with him.

He suggests that every person past the age of 62 who has not already checked up on potential social security checks, as well as those of any age

under 65 who have become so severely disabled that they are unable to do any substantial gainful work, make certain to see him on one of his future visits here. He will be in Eastland alternate Mondays starting January 7, 1963, at 10 o'clock at the Court House.

Ruling Released By Judge Collie

The Cisco school board suffered another setback Monday when the district court overruled the board's exceptions to the proposed bond opponents' pleadings in their effort to force a new election on the bonds.

Judge T. M. Collie released his ruling Monday morning and announced that the mandamus case will be tried on its merits at a date to be determined.

"I have overruled the defendant's exceptions to the plaintiff's pleadings in the case of Bill Mitchum vs. Cisco Independent School District and have asked the lawyers to meet with me Friday," Judge Collie announced. Mr. Mitcham, a Cisco rancher, filed the mandamus case following

ing the Sept. 8 bond election, at which time \$700,000 in bonds was approved. He asked the court to force the board to call another election to determine if the voters in Cisco still want a bond issue of that amount.

The amended pleadings to which the board objected held that conditions had changed since the election and therefore a new election should be called.

The vote in September was 675 for the bonds and 508 against the bonds. Mr. Mitcham presented the board a petition on Oct. 16th containing 906 signatures, asking for a new election. The board voted on Oct. 30th not to call another election.

The 11th Court of Civil Appeals last Friday reversed a 91st District Court decision which had been in favor of the school board, in another case concerning the bond elec-

Park Plambeck, Cisco resident, had asked the court to declare the September election null and void because of certain voting irregularities which he claimed. The district court found in favor of the board, but the appeals court in its reversal of that decision, will cause the case to be tried on its merits.







Gibbens Gives His Views On Problems Facing Legislature

The 58th Texas Legislature will go into session this month as usual will have a great many problems facing it.

State Representative Wayne Gibbens who has been in the district for several days said that no one problem stands out above the others. There will be a great number of thorny problems to be resolved.

"Texans will see for the first time in many years an earnest and dedicated attempt by the legislature to cut state spending in some areas of duplication," Gibbens said, and added he thought there would be a "little Hoover Commission" created to study efficiency in state government.

In commenting on revision of the sales tax, Gibbens stated that he thought some inequities should be removed from the law. He cited the example of the problem of the retailer that must pay the tax on certain goods, but could not charge that tax back to his customers. Gibbens did not think he would favor a one per cent sales tax across the board because studies made by the State Comptroller show that that sort of tax would not raise the necessary revenue to operate the state with.

On education, Gibbens said that he had always supported improving Texas education at all levels and this year would be no exception. He will not favor adding any more junior colleges or four year colleges to the Texas college system at this time. Several are to ask for state aid this session. "We should upgrade the schools that we already have in the system before we add any more to it," he said.

When asked about expenditures for tourists attraction to Texas Gibbens said, "In recent years Texas has been losing an alarming amount of tourist traffic. Any money spent to inform and attract people about Texas can be considered an investment in the future of Texas."

I commenting on congressional redistricting that will be coming up this session, he said it is a matter of the legislature doing it or otherwise the Federal Courts would do it and he was inclined to think that the legislature should do it.

Gibbens did not see any increase in state spending other than that caused by the expanding of the population. No new taxes were foreseen because the sales tax has a growth factor in it that no tax law in the past has had.

The legislature probably will strive to make the expenditures fill the income of the state.

Gibbens said that he expected some corrective legislation to come out of the states investigation of the slant hole drilling in the states oil field, but since the investigation is incomplete he did not know what it would be.

Gibbens said he will keep in close contact with his district. "I have a responsibility to reflect the majority thinking of the district by the questions that come before the legislature during the session and it is always helpful to receive word to determine the opinion of the district. I hope my constituents will write to me regularly during the session." —Breckenridge American.






