



Vehicle Inspectors Briefed And Will Be Examined Soon

Approximately 40 mechanics and garagemen from the towns in Eastland County met Tuesday evening for a "first-hand" look at the vehicle inspection requirements for the coming year.

Patrolman Carl Boustead of Olden, area inspection supervisor, called the maintenance men and inspectors to meet in the County Commissioners Courtroom, for the purpose of reviewing the requirements, and to discuss the program in general.

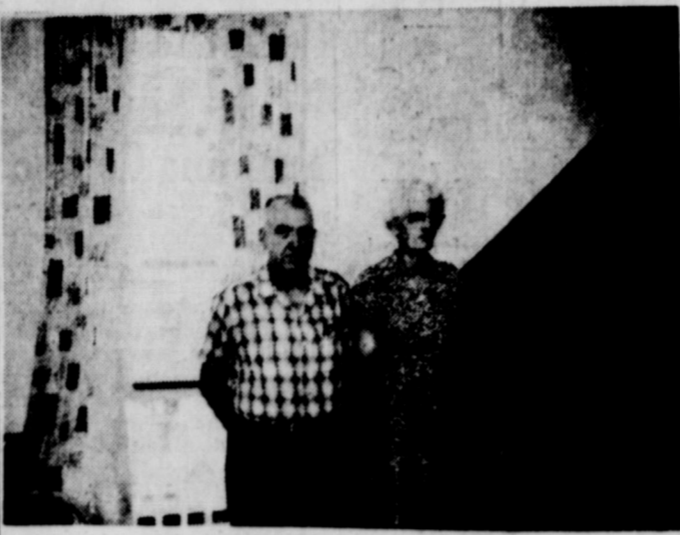
He was also to begin immediately examining the examiners to make sure that they meet the requirements for the state's inspection program.

It was pointed out during the meeting that the state's inspection program has resulted in a drop of about 250 fatalities per year in the Texas Accidents. Before the inspection program was instituted in 1951, Boustead said, about 14 per cent of all fatalities were attributed to defective equipment. Now the yearly average caused by bad equipment is only about four per cent, he said.

Inspection period for 1964 will begin September 1, and a deadline will be April 15.

Inspectors were briefed on requirements, and things to look for in determining if motorists' vehicles are in safe operating order.

Mechanics were present from Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, Gorman, and Rising Star.

It may not be often that the new county jailer, George Carter, has such well known guests in his establishments as William Slawn and Mrs. Millie Jones, who are believed to have robbed Worth Food Store in Ranger last March.

They recently were caught, escaped and were recaptured by authorities in Idaho.

Sheriff Lee Horn and Texas Ranger Stewart are expected to return today from Idaho with the suspects of the robbery.

Under Texas law, if they are found guilty they could be given the death sentence, it is reported.

Mr. Carter, formerly of Rising Star, turned in his letter of resignation as constable of Precinct Seven, effective July 1. Mr. Carter said, "I like Eastland very much and it's people."

He has been in the law enforcement business for about ten years and was a resident of Eastland county for over 30 years.

In its security cells the walls are made from quarter inch steel with two inch square openings around it.

County National Guard Units Off Today For Training Duty

Eastland County's Battery "C" of Texas' 49th Armored Division, joined by other units of the Lone Star division, will go by convoy down Texas highways Sunday morning to North Fort Hood where the national guardsmen will undergo two weeks of intensive training.

From 79 Texas cities and towns in almost every corner of the state members of the 49th, who were battle-trained during the Berlin crisis of 1961-62, will convoy to the vast Central Texas military post. More than 7,000 guardsmen will immediately step into their field fatigues and steel helmets and dig in for intensive combat training.

All areas outside the main camp area will automatically become "combat zones" for the guardsmen and conditions will immediately become tactical. This will mean movement at nighttime, passwords to get by rigid internal security guards — and the wearing of the protective steel helmet at all times.

Realism will be added with the use of "aggressor troops" during tactical exercises.

A new "combat course" for infantrymen of the 49th will be part of the rigorous training. Pop-up targets and simulated mortar bursts will make the platoon attack course "come alive" for riflemen who will be using live bullets as they advance through the "battlefield."

Due to the recent reorganization of the division (called by the Army the "ROAD" concept), units formerly infantry will be training as artillerymen, and former artillerymen in many cases are now tankers.

Weekend drills at their home armories have familiarized the Guardsmen with their new jobs. Now they will put their practice into practical use.

This 1963 encampment for the 49th Armored Division will mark its first return to the field since it was deactivated as a Regular Army outfit in August, 1962.

AREA MEN ARE APPOINTED TO REHAB CENTER AGENCY

Sam Kimmell and James McCracken of Cisco and Don Estes of Desdemona have been appointed to the Round-Up committee for the 1963 Cattleman's Round - Up for Crippled Children, according to a report from C. A. Morris, chairman.
The Round - Up founded in 1961 by Coke County Rancher Conda Wylie, is one of the main financial sponsors of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene.
Each year since its founding, Texas ranchers have donated livestock to the Round-Up which is sold for all profits going to the Center. It provides over one-third of funds needed by the Center.
The Center serves 724 patients with some 110 patients receiving daily treatment. It is a private, non-profit organization dedicated to the rehabilitation of the handicapped. Most of the patients are victims of polio, strokes, cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis and other neurological or orthopedic disorders.
The Center neither wants nor receives any government support, and the auction last year brought in \$53,890.46, almost half the Center's yearly budget. It gets help from the sale of Easter Seals, but according to Homer H. Scott, chairman of the board, it is the Cattleman's Round-Up that makes it one of the best rehabilitation establishments in the country.
The Round-Up sale, one of the most unique auctions to be found, will be held September 28 at the Abilene Livestock Auction in conjunction with the "Best in the West" stocker feeder sale.

Package Stores Due To Begin Sales By Aug. 5

Beer and package stores were expected to be operating by Monday, August 5, if not before in the City of Ranger after returns of last Saturday's election were canvassed and certified as correct at a meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners' court at the courthouse Thursday morning.
Residents of Ranger approved legal sales of beer and liquor by a 46-vote margin last Saturday — 653 for and 612 against.
All members of the commissioners' court were present except Glen Justice of the Gorman area.
County Judge Scott Bailey estimated that it would be August 5 before the legal machinery can run its course to approve licenses for the package stores. Legal notices were expected to be run in the Ranger Times Sunday and Thursday as prescribed by law, after which the liquor control board will inspect the premises and a hearing before Judge Bailey will consider the applications. When this is done, the permit applications go to Austin for final action by the Liquor Control Board.
Observers said that the legal requirements for beer retail licenses usually take longer than those for package stores. It was conceivable that liquor sales would begin before beer.
It was expected that all of the retailers who were in business for 60 days before the recent court action halted sales, resulting in the new election, would re-apply for store permits.



We then proceeded on to Abu Ghosh where according to I Sam. 6, 21 to 22, the story is told of how the Ark of Covenant rested 20 years 'til David brought it to Jerusalem. On the way to Tiberias, we saw the birthplace of John the Baptist, now called Bin Karem.

At Tiberias we stayed at a very nice hotel, which was right on the Sea of Galilee. This was a very beautiful place with many kinds of flowers and trees, among which were the eucalyptus. These grow very large and make beautiful shades. The shore came right up to the back door. The beach was particularly appealing inasmuch as it was very rocky and the water cold. We tried it anyway.

The first morning we were in Tiberias, we made a journey to the Mt. of Beatitudes. This place appealed to us very

much, and especially when one of our young ministers read the Beatitudes as found in Matt. 5. This seemed just the place for our Master to sit and teach the multitude. Near this place and closer to the Sea of Galilee, is where Jesus fed the five thousand. The place is now called Tabgha.

We traveled around the North end of Galilee, to the place where Capernaum once stood. In Matt. we read the scathing denunciation of our Lord against Capernaum. It must have been near here where Jesus walked upon the water. We crossed the Sea of Galilee by boat arriving at Bin Gev for lunch. This was a very beautiful place with many kinds of fruits and other trees growing from irrigation. In this general locality, Andrew and Peter once lived, also Matthew, the Publican. Jesus spent much time in this part of the country. After leaving Bin Gev, we returned to our hotel by bus. We had a wonderful driver named Isaac who spoke English, but true to his religion, when Friday came, he went home to Tel Aviv as this was the Jewish Sabbath.

It had not dawned on us that it was the Sabbath until we went to breakfast and found cold hard boiled eggs, hard rolls, jelly, butter, kippered herring, etc.

We reluctantly left Tiberias and this locality. Somehow we felt close to our Master as he loved Capernaum, and the Sea. Our emotions were always mixed, as we thought of the happy times he must have had and the sad ones as he mourned over people who rejected him.

After leaving Tiberias we passed by Cana of Galilee where Jesus performed his first miracle. We were also at Nain, where Jesus raised the widow's son to life.

On this way we passed by Mt. Tabor which is believed by some to be the Mt. of Transfiguration. It is a beautiful mountain but does not compare with our Rockies in height. This seems more logical for the Transfiguration to

have been here rather than Mt. Hermon which is much farther North and a long way from the place where Jesus healed the demoniac after returning to the other disciples. Mt. Hermon is the only snow capped mountain in the Holy Land. We arrived in Nazareth on Saturday, and this will be next.
