AUSTIN — Representative Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge has been elected chairman of the finance committee of the Texas Legislative Council.

The Texas Legislative Council, composed of members of the Legislature, is a service agency for the Texas Legislature. The duties of the council are to investigate departments, agencies and officers of the state; and to study their functions and problems; to gather information and to make studies; and to report to the Legislature recommendations and to accompany such recommendations with drafts of legislation.

The finance committee to which Mr. Gibbens has been elected chairman is composed of five members of the council — three representatives and two senators — and its duties are to prepare the budget for the operation of the council, approve salary schedules and generally supervise expenditures and audits of the council.

Mr. Gibbens has also been designated to attend the 16th Annual Legislative Conference at Honolulu, Hawaii, during August of this year. Mr. Gibbens will serve on the national legislative finance committee.

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## County Oil And Gas Worth \$2.8 Million Dollars Yearly

With oil and gas production worth about \$2.8 million a year, Eastland County citizens have a financial stake in the worldwide demand for energy and the complex economic and political problems involving the petroleum industry, according to statistics released this week by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

"We have pulled together some figures from the most authoritative sources so residents of Eastland County can see how local pocketbooks are affected by some of the issues which involve our industry," said J. Clyde Tomlison, Association president. "Issues of current concern include the proposals to cut percentage depletion rates, extension of federal controls over prices at which Texas producers sell their gas, and development of laws and production methods that will help Texas compete with other states and nations for markets."

The latest year for which U. S. Bureau of Mines figures are available (1961) shows Eastland County producing more than 638,000 barrels of crude oil, valued at about \$1.9 million; and 7 billion cubic feet of natural gas, with a value of \$890,000. In 1961 there were 672 producing wells in the county — 541 oil and 131 gas, according to the Texas Railroad Commission.

Although its first field was discovered 46 years ago, Eastland County is the scene for the industry's continued search for oil and gas. Some 40 wells were drilled in Eastland County last year, with 5 being wildcat exploratory wells, according to the Oil and Gas Journal. The Association estimated that \$960,000 was spent on drilling in the county this past year and some \$480,000 of this went for dry holes.

Leasing adds many thousands of dollars to the county's economy. Tabulations by the International Oil Scouts Association show major companies in 1961 were paying rentals on about 11,000 undeveloped areas.

Royalty payments to Eastland County farmers, ranchers and other landowners are running at more than \$348,000 annually, the Association calculated.

Eastland County producers and royalty owners also made a sizable contribution to the support of state government, with production tax payments of \$150,000 a year — some \$87,000 from oil and \$63,000 from gas.

Industry taxes likewise are important to the county government and school districts in the county. For instance, 37 per cent of the local property taxes collected for the Eastland Independent School District comes from oil and gas operators; and 32 per cent at Cisco.

A sizable impact on the Eastland County economy has been registered by petroleum industry payrolls. About three out of every ten payroll dollars in the county are derived from employment in oil and gas work, according to figures from the Texas Employment Commission. The industry payroll is \$2.9 million a year.

Dr. J. Harold Farmer, governor of District 579, spoke at the Rotary meeting here Monday.

Penn McElroy and party of five from Fort Worth caught nine carp and two buffalo for a total of 49 1/2 lb. The largest fish in the string weighed 7 lbs.

This, the most successful week of the rodeo, brought the total for the first three weeks up to 274 lbs.

The first week 33 lbs were recorded by the lake custodian, 56 1/2 the second week and 184 1/2 the third.

The water board is conducting the tournament to try to decrease the rough fish population in Lake Leon, and during the second week of the tournament almost twice as many rough fish were weighed in as was weighed in the first week.

The tournament will continue indefinitely with a weekly prize of \$5 for the largest rough fish caught during the week and a \$10 prize for the largest one caught during the month. No entry fee is charged.

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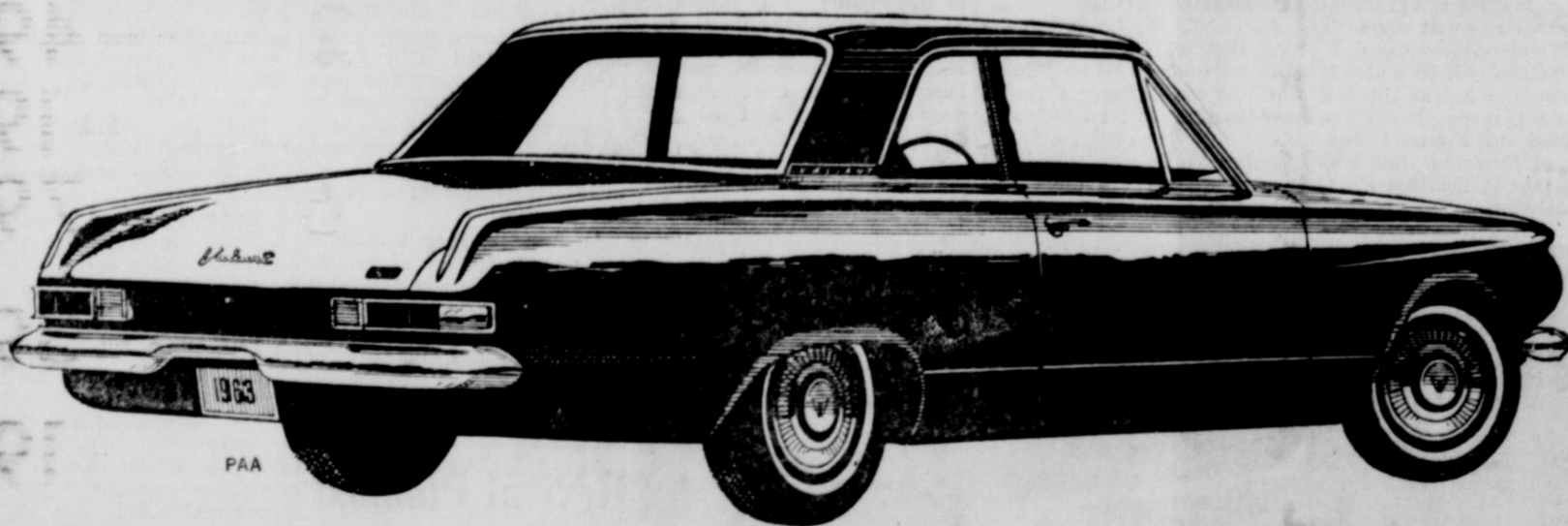
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**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individuals recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amounts for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds for such purposes; providing that the amounts expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); the amount of such assistance payments shall never exceed the amount provided for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; providing for the necessary election form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(2) Needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(3) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(4) Needy children who are bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have authority to accept from the Government of the United States any amount of federal funds available for such purposes; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance payments shall never exceed the amount provided for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; provided further, that the amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

"The Legislature may appropriate laws to make recipients of aid hereunder eligible for such assistance payments and restrictions as deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to the (1) needy aged persons, (2) needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled, and (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; orizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

**AGAINST** the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to the (1) needy aged persons, (2) needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled, and (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; orizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the same shall be published in the newspaper and for the length of time required by the Constitution of this state.

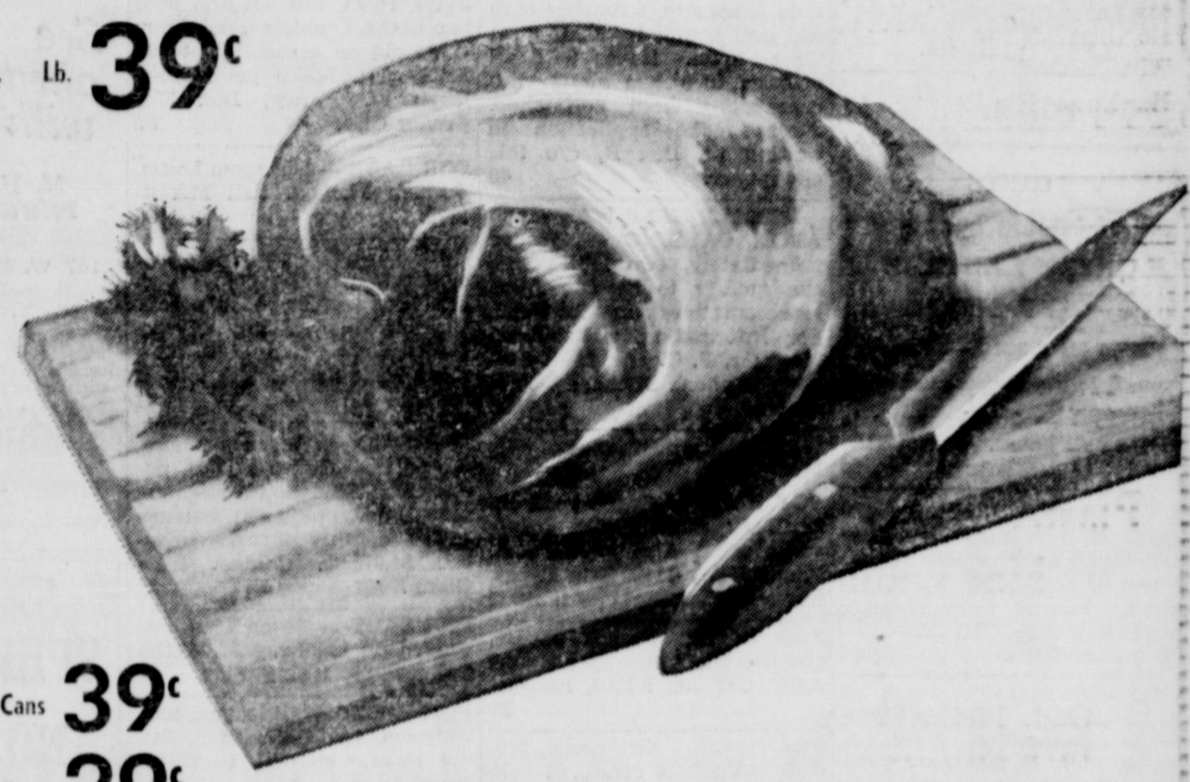

**CAREFUL OPERATION OF FOOD WASTE DISPOSERS PAY OFF IN CONTINUED OPERATION DURING RUSH PERIODS.**

There are many things which should not be put through the waste disposer. Some of these items are metal, glass, china, plastic, hard seafood shells, large bones, filter-tipped cigarettes, large quantities of raw dough, paper, or string.

Egg shells should be mixed with other types of waste, as they have a tendency to float on top of the water instead of going down the drain.

The filters of filter-tipped cigarettes have a tendency to mat over the cutting teeth and decrease the cutting efficiency.

A quantity of grease should not be poured into the disposer. The mixed load helps prevent grease-clogged drains.

Plenty of cold water should be used. The water should be allowed to run after all the food has left the disposer to be sure that it is flushed down the drain.

When lots of water is used, the disposer is self-cleaning and odorless. Do not use caustic cleaners.

Size and texture of the food waste affects the shredding time. A mixed load of hard and soft waste makes the shredding job easier. Bulky waste is ground more quickly if it is cut or broken into smaller pieces before it is placed into the disposer.

Proper use of food waste disposers saves time and energy and is the most sanitary means of garbage disposal.

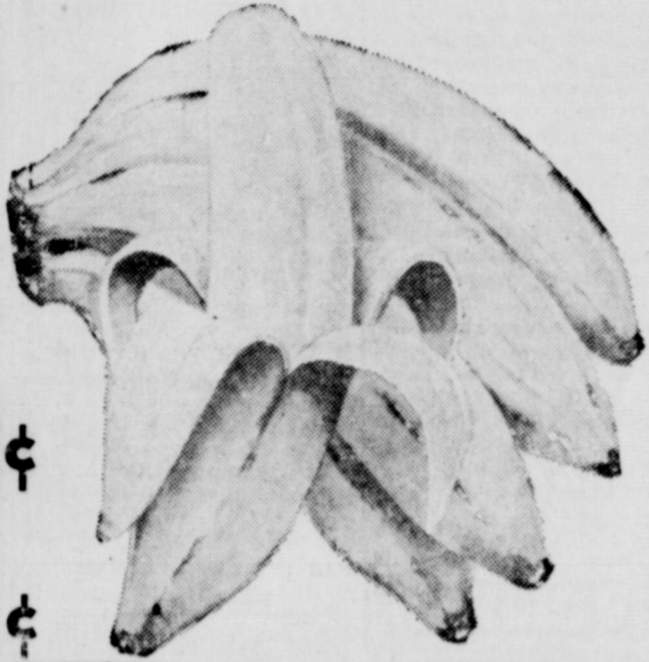

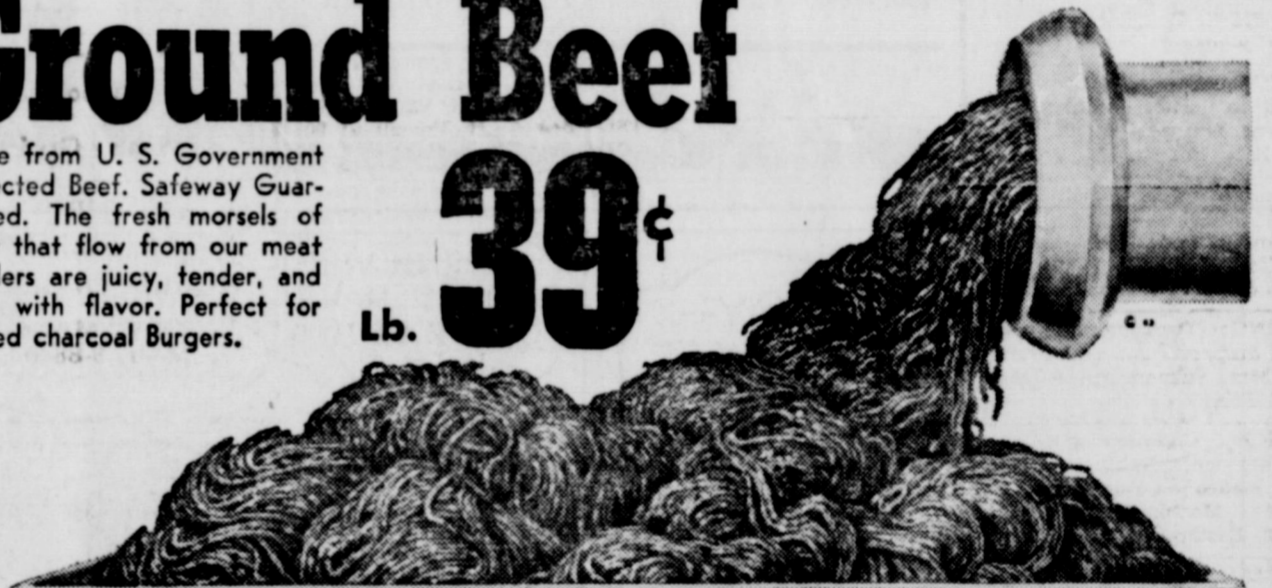

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## Browsing With Bev

Careful operation of food waste disposers pay off in continued operation during rush periods. There are many things which should not be put through the waste disposer. Some of these items are metal, glass, china, plastic, hard seafood shells, large bones, filter-tipped cigarettes, large quantities of raw dough, paper, or string.

Egg shells should be mixed with other types of waste, as they have a tendency to float on top of the water instead of going down the drain. The filters of filter-tipped cigarettes have a tendency to mat over the cutting teeth and decrease the cutting efficiency.

A quantity of grease should not be poured into the disposer. The mixed load helps prevent grease-clogged drains. Plenty of cold water should be used. The water should be allowed to run after all the food has left the disposer to be sure that it is flushed down the drain. When lots of water is used, the disposer is self-cleaning and odorless. Do not use caustic cleaners.

Size and texture of the food waste affects the shredding time. A mixed load of hard and soft waste makes the shredding job easier. Bulky waste is ground more quickly if it is cut or broken into smaller pieces before it is placed into the disposer. Proper use of food waste disposers saves time and energy and is the most sanitary means of garbage disposal.

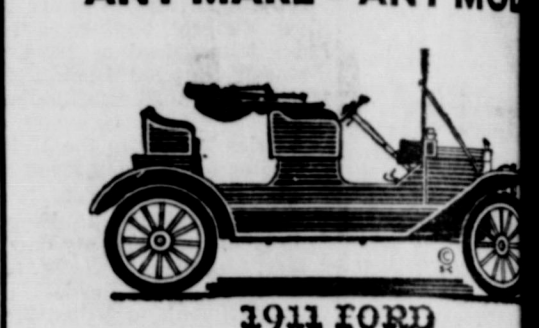

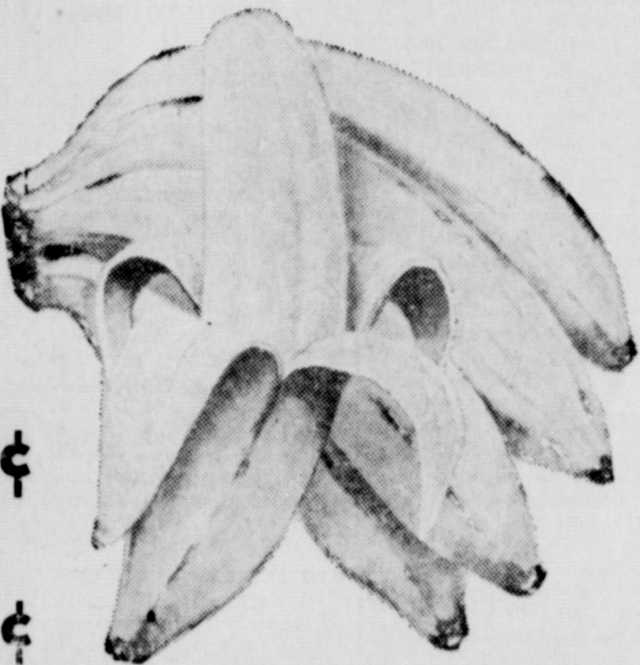

some form or other, it covers just about the four corners of the earth.

As has been the case throughout the history of foreign aid, it is based primarily on ideology. Actually, we are the only people anywhere in the world who are so deeply concerned with Communism. The vast majority of nations, including those of the free world, do not share our preoccupation with Communism, but rather devote their attention first to the cold economics of national life.

There has been a cliché for the last 15 years or so which refers to the "struggle for the hearts and minds of men," as a main selling point for foreign aid. Minds and hearts are important, but the stomach comes before either.

In the case of the split between Russia and Communist China, we are interpreting it to mean a disagreement in ideology. It is doubtful that it has much, if anything, to do with it. By the same token, Khrushchev's new attitude of sweet reason towards the West should not be interpreted as any change of feeling, but rather as a matter of political and economic reality.

In the first place, Khrushchev must have come to the conclusion that the Chinese Reds are not only willing to risk war, but want to promote it. The only winner in such a war, in which the industry of both America and Russia would be destroyed, would be Communist China. Her infer-

riority in industry would be relatively eliminated with nothing to stop her from expanding into Soviet territory and into Southeast Asia.

Khrushchev has now decided to accept the proposal made by the United States and Great Britain some months ago in Geneva. He is not doing so out of any change of economic necessity.

Following the signing of a nuclear test ban treaty, we can watch for overtures from Russia to ourselves and western Europe for increased trade. Since the warm wind from Moscow will touch Western Europe first, those who care less about ideology than they do enhancing their own economic benefits are likely to increase trade, even in strategic material. They are already doing a far greater business with the Soviets than our own Country, but the lessening of tensions will undoubtedly cause an increase in the present level. As the thaw progresses, look for requests from Russia for loans and grants.

The very nature of the situation strongly suggests the likelihood that Khrushchev hopes to get what he wants on the economic front by making a big show in agreeing to the Text Ban Treaty. Some of our own leaders and a great many Americans seemingly want to make a life-raft out of a single straw cast out by the Kremlin. When things are dark, a very faint glow makes a lot of light, but it should not be taken as a guiding beacon.

The aims of international communism have always been the same and can not be changed by the small gestures of its representatives. The giving of a little seems a lot when nothing at all is expected. If Mr. Khrushchev has now decided it is better to be agreeable until the economy of Russia can be improved, it is hardly justification for great jubilation.

While all this is taking place, we continue to pour out our resources in every corner of the earth. The threat of nations that they will look to the Soviet Union for assistance unless it comes from America will continue. The time for a real challenge to this situation is long past due.

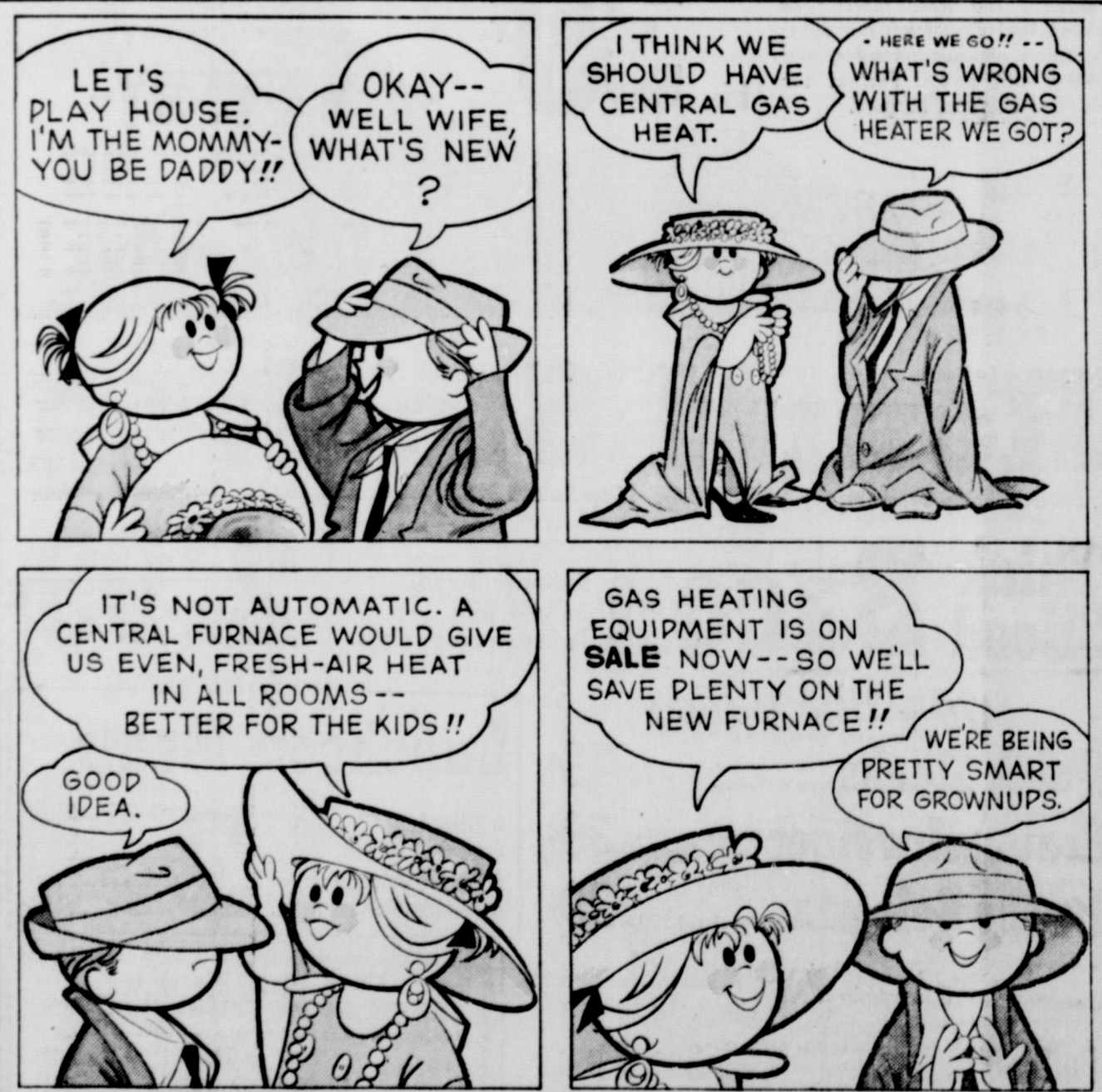

The four markers approved today make a total of eight purchased by the Highway Department this fiscal year. Markers approved earlier are to commemorate:

Guadalupe Peak in Culberson County, Texas' highest mountain at 8,751 feet; Galveston Island in Galveston County, whose varied history has

### Reports On Research Work Due At Annual Peanut Meet

Research findings will highlight the annual peanut growers' meeting to be held in the agriculture auditorium at Tarleton State College, Stephenville, on August 16 beginning at 10 a. m., according to Ross Wilson, Manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association.

Peanut industry leaders, including grower representatives, continue to place emphasis upon the role of research in increasing quality and yield of peanuts, and personnel carrying on the programs of production research under the auspices of Texas A&M University and Oklahoma State University are doing an excellent job for peanut growers, Mr. Wilson said.

The extension division of the two colleges is always engaged in the process of getting information developed by researchers into the hands of farmers, and the meeting in Stephenville is an effort in that direction. It is hoped that one basic result of the meeting will be the strengthening of the educational link between the researchers and the farmer. Mr. Wilson stated that a similar program last year attracted several hundred interested persons and it is believed that this meeting can produce the same beneficial results as did last year's meeting.

John McHaney, economist and a member of the Texas A&M University staff, will speak on "Outlook for Peanuts." Other members of the staff will discuss seedling disease, peanut varieties, insects, weed control, harvesting and curing. Staff members from Oklahoma University will discuss soil management and irrigation.

The meeting will consist of two two-hour sessions. The

first will begin at 10 a. m. and conclude at noon. A complimentary lunch will be served in the college cafeteria, followed by the second session at 1:15 p. m. During the afternoon session a panel will be assembled to answer questions which may have come up during the meeting. Door prizes will be awarded just prior to the conclusion of the meeting.

The results also vary, but most commonly are sneezing, water eyes, runny nose and general miserable discomfort. Tolerance to pollens sometimes can be built up by injecting a dilute solution to them under the skin. These shots must be medically prescribed to meet individual needs. In some cases your doctor may prescribe one of the antihistamines for temporary relief. The most common preventive measures against hay fever are:

Get specific anti-hay fever shots well ahead of the season.

Avoid exposure to ragweed pollen by keeping away from areas where it is prevalent.

Air condition the home and work in air-conditioned surroundings, if possible. Antihistaminic drugs to lessen the nasal and sinus congestion.

Keep the home as dust free as possible during the height of the hay fever season and throughout the rest of the year.

## 7,000 GUARDSMEN ON DUTY TWO WEEKS AT FORT HOOD

NORTH FORT HOOD — Dusty tank trails, sun-scoured hills. Echoing valleys. This is the home — for two weeks — of Texas' 49th Armored Division. The 7000 National Guardsmen of the "Lone Star" Division moved in last Sunday and more than half have already pulled out again for the field.

With the mid-point to be climaxed this Saturday with a division review, the 49th will switch from their sweat-soaked field fatigues to clean crisp khakis and motor march before Gov. John Connally.

This will give Gov. Connally his first look at the 49th Armored Division, the Texas outfit which came off active duty at Fort Polk, La., exactly a year ago — serving 10 months during the critical Berlin crisis.

And this makes the 49th know — better than most National Guard outfits — the value of tough training during their two weeks here at camp.

When the motor convoys rolled in last Sunday, the famed "tent city" of North Fort Hood sprang alive. Dusty tent flaps were rolled up. Bunks

were issued and set up in neat rows under the sea of olive-green tents.

Trucks were unloaded at supply depots. Men moved about like working ants. Signal elements stretched wire from pole to pole, their men looking like grasshoppers as they climbed up.

Jeeps darting back and forth like busy beetles. Tanks, rolling out of their motor pools spewed gyser of dust behind them, their radio antennas bending like a lance of an armored knight heading for a joust.

More than 100 division tanks rumbled out into field training areas Monday, blanketing Fort Hood's hilly ranges with a fine coat of dust.

Motor convoys of trucks — carrying half of the division — moved out into the night for a tactical movement into forward field areas. They will remain in the field, sleeping under the stars, until Friday.

The remainder of the division will make a similar tactical move next Monday and stay for five days.

First units to roll out to the field were the 3d Tank Battal-

## SPEED LIMIT ON MOST HIGHWAYS GOES UP

AUSTIN — More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed today.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed August 23. This means that some 41, 500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission today passed a Minute Order which zone some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime

and 55 miles per hour for passenger cars. This will be restricted speed limit being studies inadequate to a 70-miles-per-hour speed limit.

The Commission allowed a series of traffic studies throughout the highway district.
