MISSIONARY SAYS U. S. Under Communism? Statistically Possible

"If Communism and Christianity continue their present rate of increase, with no decline by either, statistically, America will live under Communism in our generation." This was the warning of the Rev. Webster Carroll, missionary to East Africa, and speaker at the Rotary Club Monday.

Speaking highly of programs such as the current Peace Corps, Rev. Carroll said, in his opinion, these do more good than all the money we "sprinkle" over the world. "The people resent our money," he said, "but respect and pattern after our people."

The speaker is currently conducting a revival at the First Baptist Church, and was introduced by that church's pastor, the Rev. Haston Brewer.

Carroll described the area known as East Africa and said that the area contains some 30 million people, with about 250 different tribes.

"The average income of Tanganyika (where he has lived since 1956), is 17 cents a day," he said, "and there are approximately 120 different tribes in that country." The country gained its independence in December of 1961, he explained, and added that it currently has what he considers very good leadership.

"Are these countries ready for independence?" he said and the question he is most often asked.

"There are two answers. 'Yes', in the sense that all are ready for freedom, but 'no' due to the lack of finance, experience and ability, in many cases."

In the past three years, 23 new nations have been born in Africa, he said.

Guests included Bill Wright of Cisco and Charles Tier of Breckenridge.

Ranger Beer Vote To Be Held This Saturday

Ranger citizens will exercise their right to vote for the first time this year when they go to the polls Saturday to vote on the proposition of legalizing the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premises consumption.

This will be the fourth trip to the polls during the past eight months for citizens to vote on the legal sale of alcoholic beverages within the city limits. All four ballots have had various combinations of beer, liquor and wine for on or off premise consumption. It will be possible for two more "wet" election to be held before the cycle is complete, observers said.

The three previous elections, all held during the year 1962, were defeated. The first election, held on June 9, was defeated with a total of 423 for votes and 506 against.

Voters going to the polls again on September 8, decided against the issue by a margin of 28 votes. Negative votes

amounted to 552 with 480 for legalizing the sale.

The third election was held on December 8, with a defeat by 198 votes, the most decisive defeat of the three elections. The vote was 523 to 325.

Petitions asking for the fourth election was turned in to the county clerk's office on Feb. 20. The petitions contained 335 signatures and only 294 qualified signatures were needed.

Polls will open Saturday at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Absentee voting ended Wednesday at 5 p. m. Calvin Brown is the election judge.

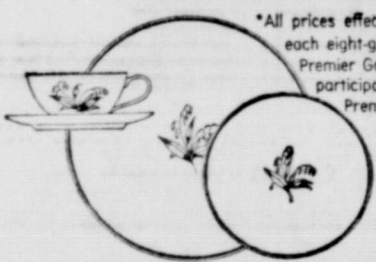

BY EASTLAND GRAND JURY 12 INDICTMENTS RETURNED

A 91st District Court grand jury returned 12 indictments Tuesday, six of which were for grass burning in the Cisco area and two others believed to be against a couple charged with robbing Worth Food Mart in Ranger.

Other indictments were: one for rape, one for failure to return to the scene of an accident, one for negligent homicide, and one for sale of whiskey.

A trio of Cisco youths were tried recently on an earlier indictment for grass burning, but were found "not guilty" on that count when the prosecution failed to present enough evidence.

Charges have been filed in Justice court naming a man and a woman in the Ranger armed robbery a week ago. Millie Jones, a native of Eastland County, and William Splawn (alias Bill Payne) an out of state resident, were charged with armed robbery.

Amount of money taken from the store was not revealed, according to Sheriff Lee Horn.

The pair had been staying at a Lake Leon cabin for about two weeks prior to the robbery, he said. Following the robbery they were traveling south from Ranger when their car had a flat tire in the vicinity of Lake Leon.

After changing the tire, they proceeded to the home of a nearby farmer. He was apparently leading the pair out of the community when their car had a second flat tire.

The farmer then took them back to his home where they spent the night. On the following the robbery, he reported the incidents to Sheriff Horn and stated, "The three days are up, now I can talk."

At the present time, the couple is believed to be in Idaho.

The grand jury had been recessed earlier this month and wasn't scheduled to resume their current session until March 26.

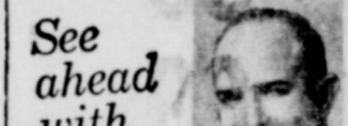

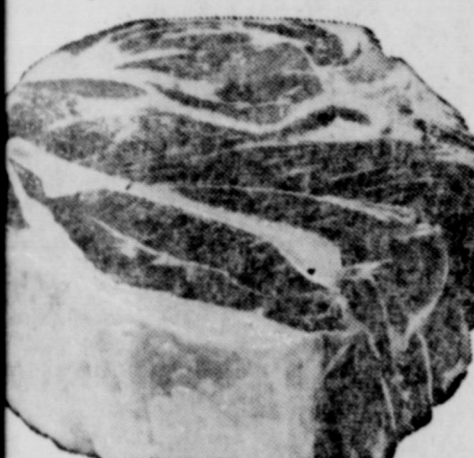

BY EASTLAND GRAND JURY 12 INDICTMENTS RETURNED

A 91st District Court grand jury returned 12 indictments Tuesday, six of which were for grass burning in the Cisco area and two others believed to be against a couple charged with robbing Worth Food Mart in Ranger. Other indictments were: one

for rape, one for failure to return to the scene of an accident, one for negligent homicide, and one for sale of whiskey.

A trio of Cisco youths were tried recently on an earlier indictment for grass burning, but were found "not guilty" on that count when the prosecution failed to present enough evidence.

Charges have been filed in Justice court naming a man and a woman in the Ranger armed robbery a week ago. Millie Jones, a native of Eastland County, and William Splawn (alias Bill Payne) an out of state resident, were charged with armed robbery. Amount of money taken from the store was not revealed, according to Sheriff Lee Horn.

The pair had been staying at a Lake Leon cabin for about two weeks prior to the robbery, he said. Following the robbery they were traveling south from Ranger when their car had a flat tire in the vicinity of Lake Leon. After changing the tire, they proceeded to the home of a nearby farmer. He was apparently leading the pair out of the community when their car had a second flat tire.

The farmer then took them back to his home where they spent the night. On the following the robbery, he reported the incidents to Sheriff Horn and stated, "The three days are up, now I can talk."

At the present time, the couple is believed to be in Idaho.

The grand jury had recessed earlier this month and wasn't scheduled to resume their current session until March 26.

Producers Must Decide Soon On 1963 Feed Grain

COLLEGE STATION — Grain producers have until March 22 to decide whether or not to participate in the 1963 Feed Grain program. The decision is sufficiently important, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, that all commercial growers should consider the

income possibilities of the alternative choices. Budget forms are available from the offices of county agents for use in figuring estimated returns under the program for both compliance and non-compliance. Bates suggests contacting the local county agent for assistance in using the forms.

In general the 1963 program is similar to the one in effect last year. The grower agrees to reduce his feed grain acreage, corn, grain sorghum or barley, by at least 20 percent; to comply with

the diversion as shown by his sign-up papers and add the acres taken out of grain production to conservation use. This acreage, explains Bates, is in addition to the farm's base acreage in conservation use.

The specialist notes a change in the substitute crop provision. A percentage of the minimum diversion payment is available when the diverted acres are planted to certain crops. These and the percentage of payment are: sesame, 40 percent; guar, 30 percent; castor beans, 30 percent and sunflower, 20 percent.

Feed grain producers having questions regarding any phase of the 1963 program are advised to contact their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service staff for detailed information. And, reminds Bates, the final date for making a decision on whether or not to participate is March 22.
