School Registration Set Friday, 8 'til Noon

First Graders Already Signed

Eastland Public School students in Grades two through eight will report to their respective buildings on Friday from 8 a. m. until 12 noon for the purpose of registering for the 1963-64 school year.

First grade registration was completed on August 16th with 61 students scheduled for first grade work this year. High school students registered for the fall session last spring, and only new students and those who wish to make a change in the courses they plan to take need report to school on Friday.

Students in grades two through five should register in the school they attended last year, and new students who have recently moved to Eastland should register at South Ward if they live east of Daugherty Street and at West Ward if they live west of Daugherty Street. Grades six, seven and eight should register at the Junior High School.

According to Supt. Wendell Siebert, it is extremely important that all students be registered on this date so final boundary lines for each grade may be drawn Friday night, and an announcement made in the Telegram's Sunday issue advising students which school they should report to on Tuesday morning.

School will officially open on Tuesday morning at 8 a. m. and the first day will be a full day of instruction with the elementary school concluding the days work at 3:15 p. m. and the Junior High and High School closing at 3:30 p. m. First graders will be dismissed at 2:30 p. m. Buses will make their usual runs on Tuesday morning beginning at 7 a. m. in order to arrive at school by 8 a. m. All school cafeterias will be in operation the first day.

Since several grades are essentially the same size, it will be impossible to determine the number of sections in each grade until registration is complete on Friday, Siebert said.

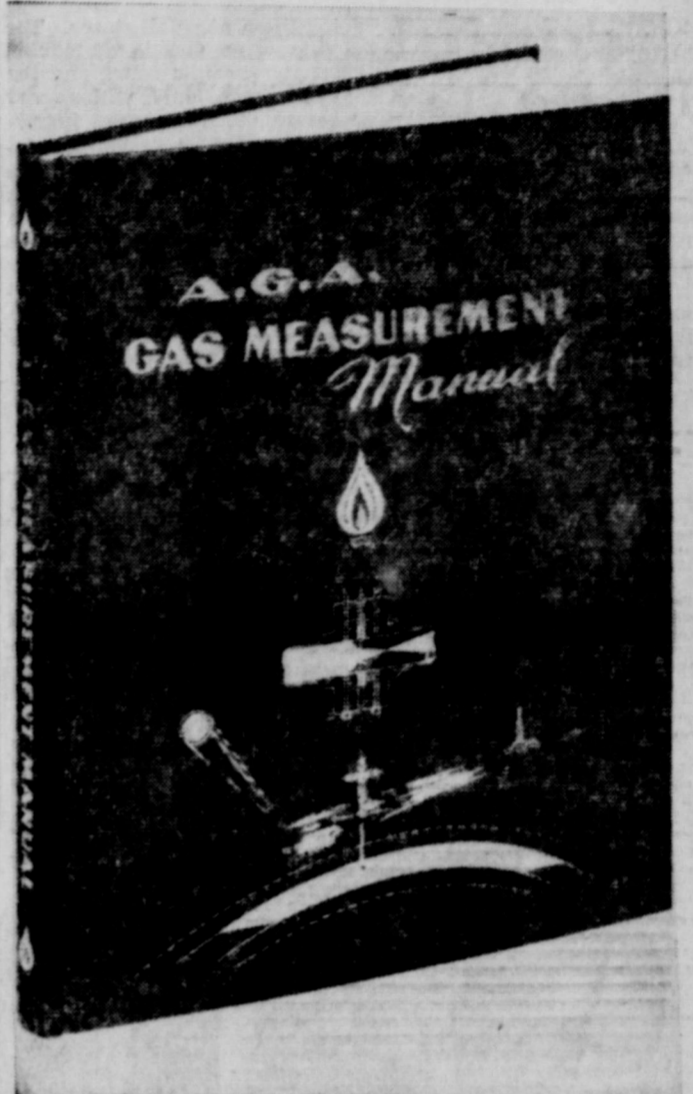

Gas Measure Manual by Eastlander Is Distributed

The American Gas Association has announced that the A.G.A. Gas Measurement Manual, edited by Eastland Charles Terrell, has been published and is now being distributed.

In preparation since 1956, the 300-page work is expected to be a vital tool for personnel in all phases of gas production, transmission and distribution.

Details of the manual — its value, development and authorship — were given in a address before the recent Operating Section Conferences by Terrell, who retired recently from the position of superintendent of measurement, Southern Natural Gas Co.

Now Eastland's chamber of commerce manager, Terrell reviewed the development of the manual since 1956, when the Gas Measurement Committee decided such a work was needed.

Chapter headings in the manual are: history of gas measurement; fundamental gas laws; metering of gas and principles of measurement; orifice meters; displacement meters; regulation of pressure; determination of specific gravity; determination of heating value and analysis of gas; temperature recorders; design of meter and regulator.

Mr. Terrell indicates the scope and quality of the work as follows:

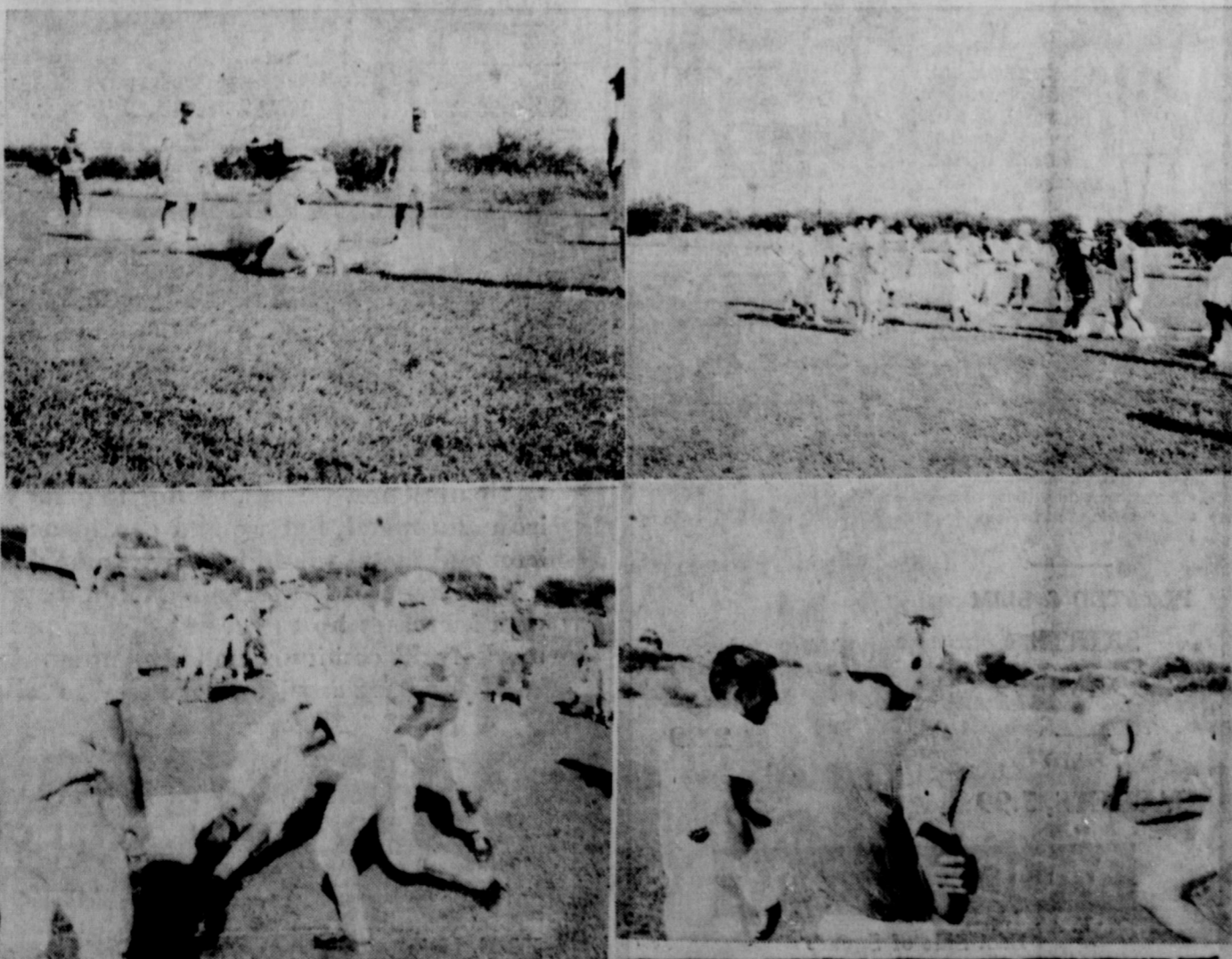

No Rotary Meet Monday

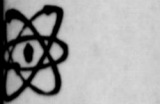
The Eastland Rotary Club will not meet Monday because of the Labor Day Holiday, President Gordon Goldston has announced.

sters had conditioned to the heat. By working later in the day, earlier, and gradually easing up into the hot part of the day, the team hopefuls braced with the heat.

Injuries so far have been relatively light, with a broken thumb, side lining Quarterback Hopeful Jerry McCullough. Jerry guided the B

team at that slot last year and bears promise in the eyes of the coaches for the same slot on the varsity.

Veteran Joe Cooper, who took on the signal-calling duties at mid-season last year, when Tommy Beck was put out with a broken arm, is filling in again.

Other possible changes see last year's center, 180-pound Jimmy Wright at an end position, with David Hazard and Garry Rollings hustling for the centering duties.

Jimmy Moylan, the back-field's spark last year, possibly will be working in the line this season, at a tackle spot.

With their brand-new coaching staff last year, the Mavericks pounced their way to a five-five win-loss record, and disappointed no one, except maybe for their loss to Cross Plains.

Their first game of the brand-new season will be against the Comanche Indians Friday evening, September 6, on the Indians own camping grounds.

A first-game 20-14 win against Comanche last year lighted the spark for the Mavericks.

Optimism reigns among the team — both veterans and newcomers:

"We'll win more than our share of the district games," says spunky Mike Jones, a 170 pound tackle, and adds that the team is going to look classy in their new uniforms, and "they're ready for the scrimmage Friday night." Mike adds that Coaches Glass, Denson Moody and Harold

Price "are teaching us good football."

Even more optimistic is Jim Wright, the 180-pound senior, who asserts, "We'll win state," then takes a chance with extra laps by adding, "we're not working too hard yet." Jim too, voices respect and admiration for the coaching staff and the spirit, and ability of the entire team.

On the other end of that Maverick line, Stanley Underwood, 150-pound junior, says, "There's very good material here, and we're learning football."

It was picture-taking time Wednesday for the Mavericks, when they suited out in their Friday-night bests for posing for local and area photographers.

An exceptionally large delegation of rooters are expected to follow the team both to the scrimmage Friday night in Hamilton, and to the first official game in Comanche the following Friday night. The team takes their "free date" early — on the 13th, and then puts on its first home performance in Maverick Stadium against the formidable Cisco Lobos on Friday, Sept. 20.

Lettermen include Gary Graham, Gaylon Griffin, Wayne Walden, Joe Cooper, John Moyla, Jimmy Moylan, Mike Jones, Jim Wright, Don Griffin, Bill Garner, Dan Phillips, David Taylor and Stanley Underwood.

Mrs. W. J. Greer of Carbon gave me the recipe for "5-Cup Salad," back in the spring, and I've enjoyed the recipe so much that I thought I would pass it on to you.

"5 CUP SALAD"
1 Cup small marshmallows
1 Cup pineapple chunks
1 Cup coconut (shredded)
1 Cup sour cream
1 Cup mandarin oranges

Mix all ingredients together. Chill overnight. Serve on lettuce leaf.

head lettuce salad will be delicious with sour cream thousand island dressing, and it's so easy to make.

Here's how you make it: Combine 1 cup dairy sour cream with 3 tablespoons chili sauce, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento, 2 tablespoons chopped sweet pickle and a dash of salt. Mix well and chill thoroughly before serving over head lettuce.

The next time you are looking for something different for a salad, try using sour cream.

The Age of Private Transportation

"Get the farmer out of the mud" was the battle cry of the highway program in the 1920's and 1930's. In the early days of the automobile age, a paved road outside the limits of a city or incorporated town was rare enough to be a curiosity.

Today, almost 70 percent of the 3,127,225 miles of rural roads in the United States have some kind of surfacing. A substantial amount of the remaining non-surfaced road mileage is so little traveled that paving is not justified; nevertheless, much remains to be done before we can claim a complete all-weather road system in the United States.

Nowadays, however, "getting the farmer out of the mud" is one among many objectives of the national highway program. The automobile and the truck have become such an integral part of American life that good highway transportation is essential to the success of almost every activity. Industries, schools, churches and shopping centers share the farmer's vital concern with the highway program. Commuters get stuck in urban traffic jams more often than farmers get stuck in the mud.

The essentiality of highway transportation to the national economy and the national defense is reflected in the Federal-

SLOW DRIVERS ARE ST TO FINE UNDER NEW L

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said today the new speed law effective August 23 specifically makes it a violation to drive a vehicle so slow as to impede traffic.

He said that before enactment of the new law it was necessary for a police officer to warn a driver impeding traffic to speed up or get off the road before filing a charge.

"Under the new statute, as we interpret it, whenever a driver is driving slower than the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and thereby impeding the traffic, he will be committing a violation for which he may be charged in court," Garrison said.

The DPS Director also pointed out that under the new law violation of these two provisions over various kinds of highways are authorized to zone roads for minimum speeds whenever they determine that slower speeds consistently impede traffic. Failure to comply with such minimum speed limits will be regarded as a violation, he added.

"It will be the policy of the Texas Department of Public Safety to stop and take enforcement action against any driver observed to be committing clear-cut and substantial
