Over 62? Better Check Up On Social Security

January 1963 is the month for all persons past age 62 to take a quick look at their 1962 earnings and then apply for some social security benefits if they have not already done so, provided the following table applies to them, advises R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene.
"Regardless of the annual total for 1962, insured persons past age 62 may collect a social security check for any calendar month in 1962 that they neither rendered substantial services in self-employment nor earned over \$100 in wages," he added.
For those who worked all months in 1962, Tuley suggests they take a look at the following table to determine whether or not some checks might be due them.

If the wife is also past age 62, the figures in the right hand column can be as much as 10 percent higher and still leave some payments due for 1962, he went on.
"However, unless an application is filed in January 1963, or a letter requesting benefits is postmarked before February 1, 1963, the above table will not be accurate, as no claim can be back-dated more than twelve months before the month in which it is filed," Tuley added.

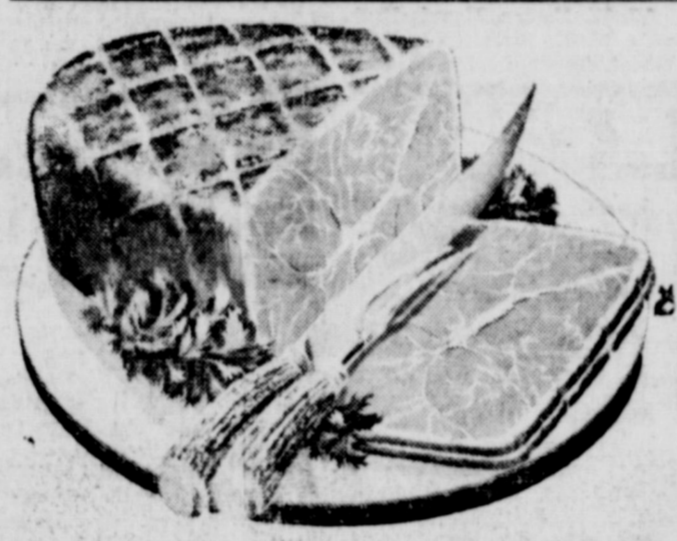

Local Schools Participating In National Lunch Program

Eastland schools are among the many in Texas participating in the National School Lunch Program and serving plenty of drumsticks, wishbones

and all other popular cuts of chicken.

Texas schools are receiving 97 carloads, about 2,910,000 pounds, of fresh frozen young chickens recently purchased by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

According to Superintendent Wendell T. Siebert, the local schools receive a shipment of USDA foods, frozen meats and dried staples, about once a month from their distribution point in Brownwood.

Under the School Lunch Act, USDA contributes cash and foods amounting for about one-fifth of the cost of the lunch program. Children's meal payments make up some 60% of the cost while local and state sources pay the remaining 20%.

NEAR RANGER

Two Boys Injured On Fossil Hunt

Five 12-year-old Ranger boys have decided that fossil hunting can be a mighty hazardous occupation, since two of the would-be explorers were injured Thursday afternoon while seeking fossils in the hills located north of Ranger.

The group, made up of Pat Miller, Jimmy Dumith, Phil Sanders, Bobby Sipes, and Floyd Parks, set out on the fossil hunting trip following school Thursday afternoon.

The boys hiked to the hills, taking about an hour to reach their destination. The boys were making their way up a fairly steep incline on the side of a hill, when a rock about the size of a baseball broke loose

from the hillside and started tumbling down toward the boys, who were climbing single file up the side of the mountain.

The rock first struck Phil Sanders in the head and then rolled on down the hillside to connect with Jimmy Dumith, hitting him on the hand. It was necessary to take five stitches in Phil's head to sew up the gash and seven stitches were required to close the wound on Jimmy's hand.

Pat Miller said that the accident happened about 20 minutes after they reached their destination. He said that the three uninjured boys helped Phil and Jimmy down the side of the mountain and took them to the home of W. P. Mena, who lives near where the boys were injured.

Mr. Mann rushed the injured youths to the Ranger General Hospital, where treatment was given. The boys are now resting well following the experience.

It was explained by the boys that no fossils were found and that they are not planning another expedition in the near future.

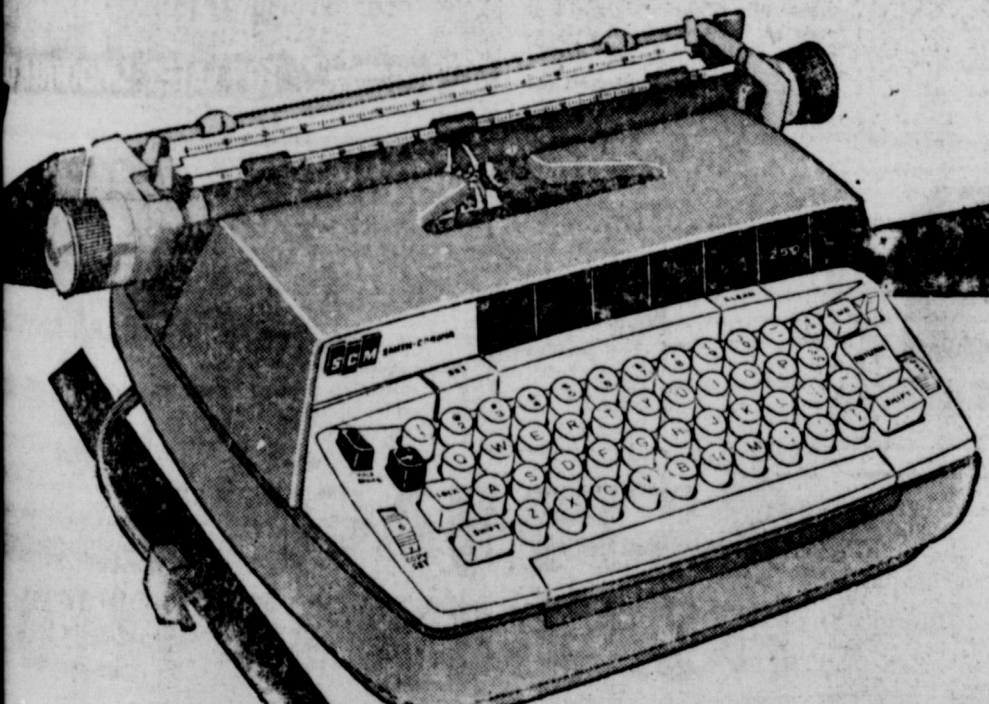
