## Man Struck By Patrol Car Reported 'Fair' At Hospital

A near tragedy was averted onto the highway from Jordan's Drive In, spotted a red, 1960 model Chevrolet traveling at an extremely high rate of speed.

Injured was James Willis, a 36-year-old Richmond Negro, who was reported in fair condition at Eastland Memorial Hospital at mid-week Willis lost his right leg just below the knee and received a head injury when he stepped in front of the speeding patrol vehicle about 11:15 p. m. Saturday some three miles east of Eastland.

Rogers was driver of the patrol car, accompanied by his partner, Jack Therwanger, and the two were chasing a speeding east-bound automobile.

"I saw the man in the middle of the highway," Rogers said, "and served to the left and had him missed by a good 15 feet, but for some reason he dashed directly toward the car."

The patrolmen had come

with no other vehicles in the immediate area. Willis stepped into the path of the patrol car near the first culvert west of the railroad tracks which cross U. S. 80, near Olden. His foot apparently was stuck by the light signal light, and his body struck the vehicle at two different points along the right side.

Willis said he is working his way to California, and had worked at a cafe in Ranger. Saturday, he said, he came to Eastland with a man whom he didn't know, and that the man had left him stranded here, and that he was walking back to Ranger. His car, an early model Nash, was left in Ranger, he said.

The patrol car barely missed several highway posts before being brought to a stop near the railroad tracks.

Willis said he wants to be transferred to a veterans hospital as soon as possible because he has been treated in one before.

Statements were being taken by the Department of Public Safety this week from people who said that they barely missed hitting a Negro man in Eastland Saturday night.

## District Play Opens Friday With Mavericks Facing Baird

The Eastland Mavericks plunge into district competition Friday when they go to Baird to do battle with the Bears.

The two will be hustling for "top contender," and the Mavs' pre-district record of

four wins, one loss, looks slightly better than Baird's three-two.

The Bears were beaten by Merkel (6-0) and Santa Anna (8-6). The Mavericks bowed to Cisco.

Game time Friday will be

7:30 p. m. at the Baird stadium.

Baird handed Eastland one of its few losses last year 38-14, so Coach Millard Glass and his Mavericks will be "wanting" this one.

In the five-game non-district play, the Mavericks racked up a total of 127 points, to their opponents' 55. In the first-down column the Mavericks show 83, exactly 50 more than their opponents.

Most yardage was gained by Eastland in hard-nose ground ball moving — 1,418 yards for Eastland, compared to 492 for the five opponenets. Passing was exactly o u t d a t e d either, with Maverick huris accounting for 368 yards in the five games. The opponents netted 218 against them. Eastland completed 22 of 58 attempted, and the opponents, 19 of 62. Since they are "in the air" more, Eastland lost 11 passes, and their opponents only 6.

In five games Eastland totaled 16 punts for a total of 153 yards — a nine yard plus average, against 32 for 159 by the opponents — a minus five yard average.

Penalties have taken their toll too. Eastland has had 36 for 200 yards loss their year, and the opposition, 18 for 110.

Fumbles have hurt too. Eastland lost 11; opponents, 8. Baird has beaten Gorman, 40-6; Wylie, 28-0; and Roscoe, 12-0.

# Selection of Jury Begins In Hussey Case At Palo Pinto

## Dual Plea Seen For Defendant

Testimony in the Nathan Curry murder trial was expected to begin by 1 p. m. Wednesday in the 29th District Court in Palo Pinto. The first two witnesses to take the stand for the state will be the Rev. Jesse E. Cassle, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cisco, who discovered the beaten and stabbed body of Mrs. Florence Hussey, church secretary, on the morning of June 29, 1961, and Dr. Charles L. Ballew, Cisco physician who performed the autopsy.

Defense Attorney John Watts of Odessa, in questioning members of the jury panel members of the jury panel, said that the defense would plead not guilty by reason of not having committed the crime or, as an alternative in case the jury does not agree, the defense will also plead not guilty by reason of temporary insanity.

Two prospective jurors were disqualified Monday because of prejudice against a plea of temporary insanity. One member of the panel was disqualified because of his prejudice against the law which allows a person to be tried as an adult for a crime committed as a juvenile.

When court adjourned Tuesday afternoon, 24 prospective jurors had been qualified. In accordance with a request by Mr. Watts, which was granted by Judge W. J. Oxford Monday morning, 32 prospective jurors will be qualified before state and defense will use their preemptory challenges to remove ten each from the jury panel.

Attorney Watts also questioned prospective jurors to find if they were prejudiced against a suspended sentence being given on a murder conviction, and if they would be ruled by the law which says that if the state fails to prove even one element of the indictment, the jury must acquit the defendant.

Assistant prosecuting attorney Sam Cleveland reminded each member of the panel that the state is obligated to prove only the charge alleged in the murder indictment, and if the state should fail to answer every question in the mind of the jurors, still a verdict of guilty must be returned if the murder by the defendant is proved beyond a reasonable doubt.

The selection of the jury got off to a slow start Monday morning after Mr. Watts requested a recess to confer with Judge Oxford and the prosecuting attorneys in the judge's chambers, at which time motions by Mr. Watts for a change of venue and a continuance were overruled. District Attorney Earl Conner last week predicted that "Knowing John Watts as I do, he will throw the book at us. He will try everything."

The first three members of the jury panel questioned were disqualified, two when they testified that previously formed opinions might influence their verdict, and the other when he said he would find it hard to render a guilty verdict because of the defendant's age. At this point, Judge Oxford remarked to Mr. Watts who had previously expressed dissatisfaction at the trial being held in Palo Pinto, "This is a very conscientious jury panel. I thought you would find them to be so."

Mr. Watts repeatedly emphasized that the defendant did not commit the crime, but if he did, he is not guilty by reason of temporary insanity. There will be no contention, he said, that the defendant has not been sane ever since or that he is not now completely sane. Though it appears to be an inconsistent defense, Mr. Watts explained, the law allows the defendant to enter both pleas.

Ervin Morrow, groceryman and former school teacher of Graford, was challenged for cause by the defense, after he testified that he had served on the jury of the Dickie Don Wood murder case last year, and that he had read newspaper accounts of the Hussey slaying. Judge Oxford overruled the challenge.

Jury selection was expected to take another day or so, and when the trial gets underway, after the state presents its case, Mr. Watts said that Nathan Curry will take the stand in his own defense. Young Curry, a native of Cisco, is charged with the

murder of Mrs. Florence E. Hussey there June 29, 1961. His parents were with him at Palo Pinto. Spectators Monday and Tuesday morning were few at the Monday session.

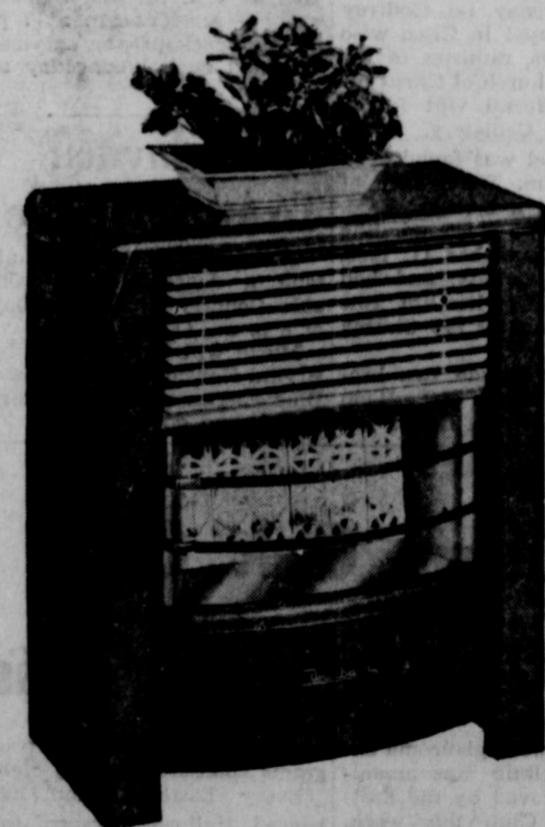

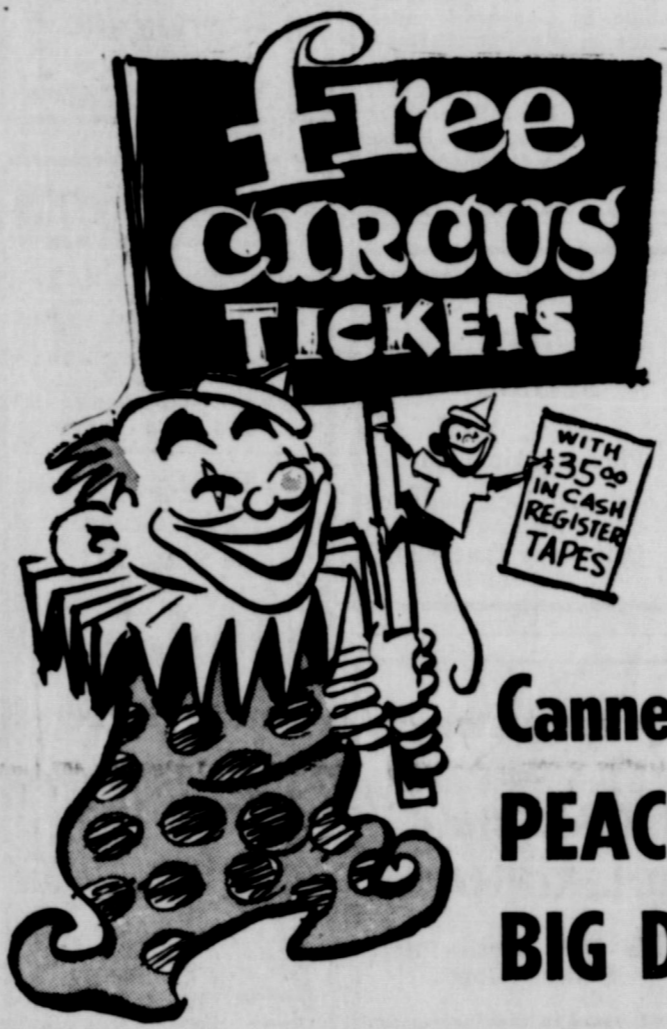

**OPEN HOUSE IS PLANNED ON OCT. 18 AT STATE SCHOOL**

The public has been invited to attend open house at the Abilene State School in Abilene which will be held all day Friday, Oct. 18, according to an announcement by L. W. Cain, superintendent.

One of six special schools operated under the authority of the States of Texas, the Abilene State School provides residential care and training for over 2,000 mentally retarded persons.

Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Nance of Cisco act as co-pilot parents for the school in this area, helping to place these children who need the care and training offered. There are 77 persons from Eastland County who are residents of the school at the present time.

Grouped according to age as well as physical and mental ability, the students are given appropriate training, Mr. Cain said, whether it be as simple as tying a shoe or as intricate as re-soling a pair of boots. Some 263 house-parents are employed to care for the students. An academic school program, employing 17 special teachers in addition to recreational workers and crafts instructors, is operated within the institutional community. Religious activities are supervised by a resident chaplain.

During the open house, personnel at the school will be available to provide information for visitors, and tours of the institutional facilities will be conducted both morning and afternoon. Short programs will be given by the children during both periods, Mr. Cain announced.

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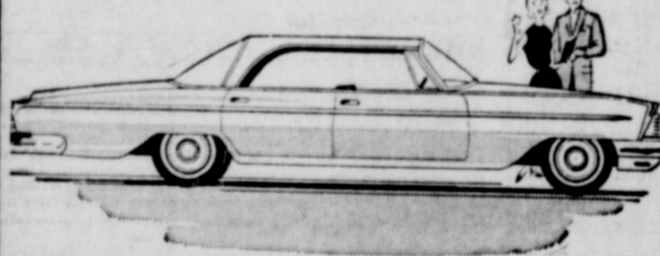

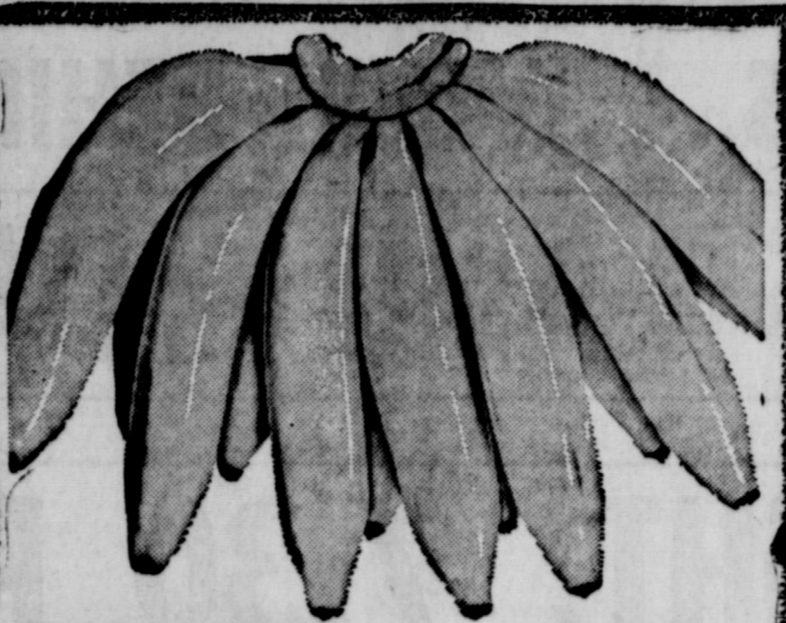

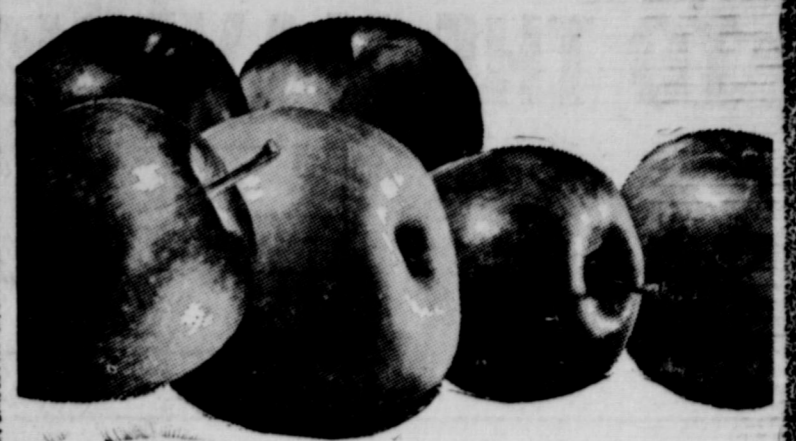

There are drawbacks and criticisms of the Committee system, but no one has devised a better plan. This is true with many of the procedures of any legislative body, but the very nature of our system of representative government causes the process to be somewhat cumbersome.

A committee passes upon a given subject, which either kills a bill or reports it out favorably. If reported out, it goes to the Rules Committee, which acts as the traffic cop to the Floor for debate.

Thousands of bills are introduced in every session of Congress. Many are never considered by a Committee at all and, in fact, some introduced are never intended for

passage.

There are procedures for bypassing both a Legislative Committee and the Rules Committee. One is by a process called "discharge petition."

When a measure is bottled up in a committee, any Member may file a discharge petition requiring the signatures of at least a majority of the entire membership. There being 435 Members of the House of Representatives, this means that it takes 218 signatures to bring out a bill under this procedure.

The rule for the discharge petition was enacted in 1910. Since that date only two measures brought up under this method have actually become Law.

At present a number of such petitions are on file. The best known is that which provides a \$100 monthly pension for World War I veterans. Many World War I veterans and their families write, urging the signing of this petition, since the Veterans Affairs Committee has not cleared it. Most recognize it to be the least desirable course of action but feel it is the only avenue by which the measure could be considered by the entire House of Representatives. Most Members, if not all, recognize the remote possibility of success by resorting to the discharge petition plan. For this reason, many who may favor a measure are opposed to giving their support to this procedure.

In this case of World War I veterans pension there is every indication that the Unit-

ed States Senate would not consider the measure, and second, should it be brought up and passed by both Houses there is virtual certainty that the President would exercise his veto.

As is the case of the House of Representatives, this does not mean the United States Senate or the President does not favor adequately caring for World War I veterans, or as to that matter, any veteran. From the standpoint of the Administration itself, the Budget Bureau advised that it would add \$1,266,247,000 to the present Pension Program, which is in the President's Budget at \$1,799,840,000. In other words, the total cost of pensions alone would be \$3,066,087,000.

From the standpoint of the executive Department, sums in this amount would almost have to be budgeted before approval could be likely. The 1956 fiscal year Budget is now in the process of being prepared to submit to the Congress next year. As is the case of any expenditure connected with a new program of such magnitude it usually starts with this process and although smaller items may be added as legislation finds its way through the many steps necessary to final enactment, there is no record to indicate expenditures this high, which have not been budgeted, have ever reached final success.

Many World War I Veterans feel that a flat monthly pension will be the only way they will ever receive benefits. There are, however, a number of measures pending which would amend existing Law and if finally approved would be of help to many who either do not now qualify for a pension or other benefits under present Law. Some of these are under active consideration and have a chance of passage.

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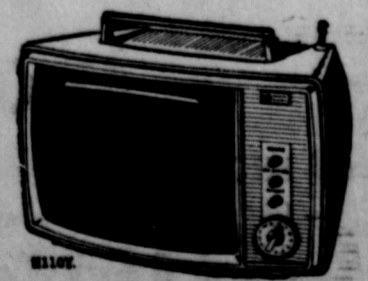
