

# Selection of Jury Begins In **Hussey Case At Palo Pinto**

#### **Dual Plea Seen For Defendant**

By FAYE JOHNSON Testimony in the Nathan Curry murder trial was expected to begin by 1 p. m. Wednesday in the 29th District Court in Palo Pinto. The first two witnesses to take the stand for the state will be the Rev. Jesse E. Cassle, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cisco, who discovered the beaten and stabbed body of Mrs. Florence Hussey, church secretary, on the morning of June 29, 1961, and Dr. Charles L. Ballew, Cisco physician who performed the

autopsy. Defense Attorney John Watts of Odessa; in questioning members of the jury panel ing members of the jury pan-el, said that the defense would plead not guilty by reason of not having committed the crime or, as an alternative in case the jury does not agree, the defense will also plea not guilty by reason of temporary insanity.

Two prospective jurymen were disqualified Monday because of prejudice against a plea of temporary insanity. One member of the panel was disqualified because of h i s prejudice against the law which allows a person to be tried as an adult for a crime committed as a juvenile.

When court adjourned Tuesday afternoon, 24 prospective jurymen had been qualified. In accordance with a request by Mr. Watts, which was granted by Judge W. J. Oxford Monday morning, 32 prospective jurymen will be qualified before state and defense will use their preemptory challenges to remove ten each from the jury panel

Attorney Watts also guestioned prospective jurymen to find if they were prejudiced against a suspended sentence being given on a murder conviction, and if they would be ruled by the law which says that if the state fails to prove even one element of the in-dictment, the jury must ac-quit the defendent. Assistant prosecuting attor-

ner Sam Cleveland reminded member of the panel that the state is obligated to prove only the charge alleged in the murder indictment, and if the state should fail to answer every question in the mind of the jurymen, still a verdict of guilty must be re-turned if the murder by the defendant is proved beyond a reasonable doubt.


### **District Meeting** At Breckenridge



off to a slow start Monday morning, after Mr. Watts requested a recess to confer with Judge Oxford and the prosecuting attorneys in the judge's chambers, at which time motions by Mr. Watts for a change of venue and a continuence were overruled. District Attorney Earl Con-

ner last week predicted that "Knowing John Watts as I do, he will throw the book at us. He-will-try everything."

The first three members of the jury panel questioned were disqualified, two when they testified that previously formed opinions might influence their verdict, and the other when he said he would find it hard to render a guilty ver-dict because of the defendant's age. At this point, Judge Oxford remarked to Mr. Watts who had previously expressed dissatisfaction at the trail being held in Palo Pinto, "This is a very conscientious jury panel. I thought you would find them to be so." Mr. Watts repeatedly em-phasized that the defendant did not commit the crime, but

if he did, he is not guilty by reason of temporary insanity. There will be no contention, he said, that the defendant has not been same ever since or that he is not now completely sane. Though it appears to be an inconsistent defense, Mr. Watts explained, the law allows the defendant to enter both pleas.

Ervin Morrow, groceryman and former school teacher of Graford, was challenged for cause by the defense, after he testified that he had served on the jury of the Dickie Don Wood murder case last year, and that he had read news-paper accounts of the Hussey slaying. Judge Oxford over-ruled the challenge.

ruled the challenge. Jury selection was expected to take another day or so, and when the trial gets underway, after the state presents its case, Mr. Watts said that Nathan Curry will take the stand in his own defense. Young Cusry, a native of Cisco, is charged with the
