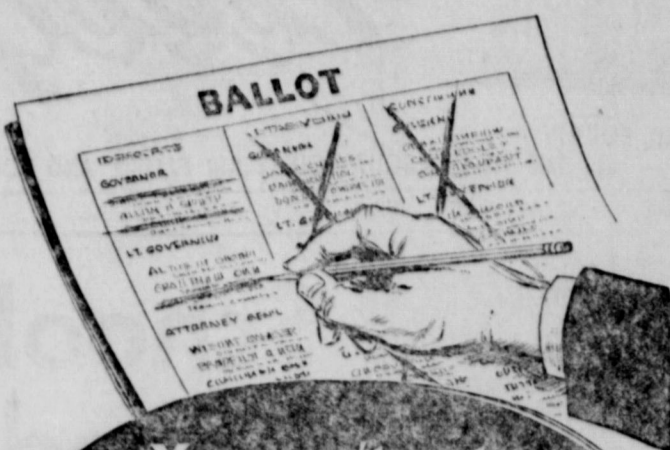

This newspaper joins his many friends throughout Eastland County in expressing the hope that the Commissioners' Court will be able to retain the services of J. J. Porter as administrator of the county's surplus food program until August 31, 1963 — the end of his current contract.

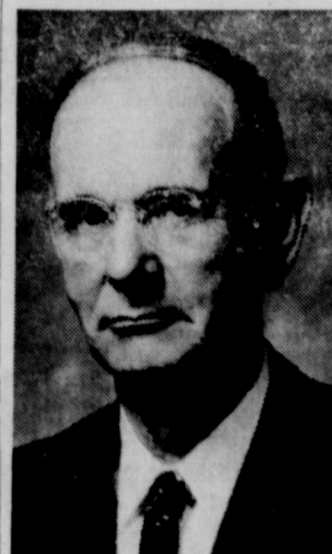
The court voted at its first January meeting to replace Mr. Porter with J. T. Elder of Ranger. Certainly, we have no quarrel with Mr. Elder and we hope he eventually gets the post. But we feel that Mr. Porter has the right to expect to continue in the position for the year of his appointment.

In view of his fine record as the food administrator, Mr. Porter is certainly due the courtesy of a bill of particulars in the event his services are terminated before the expiration of his contract and without cause. It is the considered opinion of this newspaper that he has done a fine job over several years in the position and that he deserves much better than to be discharged without cause and with very little notice.

It is gratifying to know that the court is re-considering its initial decision and it is hoped that a wrong will be righted.

COUNTY HISTORICAL SURVEY COMMITTEE MEETS FRIDAY

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson of Abilene, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and a former president of Hardin-Simmons University, will be the speaker at an open meeting of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee to be held on Friday, Feb. 1, at 2 p. m. in the County Courthouse, according to an announcement by Mrs. Bernie Chesley McCrea of Cisco, chairman of the county committee.

"The meeting will open to the public and everyone is welcome," said Mrs. McCrea, who is in charge of program arrangements for the meeting. An invitation to attend the meeting has also been extended to Governor John Connally.

Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey, acting in cooperation with county civic groups, has appointed a county-wide committee of individuals who are interested in developing and preserving the historic resources of the county.

Starting an Eastland County Historical Museum will be one of the first projects of the committee, according to Mrs. McCrea. A report prepared by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee indicates that local history museums, which help preserve the items representing the early arts, skills, and lives of the people of a community, are not only important to helping people to understand and get more from the present, but are also good business for communities. They help attract tourists and get them to spend more time and money in the locality and state. The 1962 report from 92 historical museums in Texas shows that they had 2 1/2 million visitors, spending over 2 1/2 million hours viewing exhibits, resulting in over \$500,000 extra tourist revenue from Texas.

Mrs. McCrea has invited persons with suitable items for such a museum to contact her or some other member of the committee. Two items have already been donated in order to help start the museum. Mrs. McCrea also donated a pair of horns from a longhorn steer that was part of the cattle herd of her father, the late John E. Chesley, a pioneer Eastland County settler, who arrived in the county in 1880, started a large ranch in the area north of Cisco, and played an active role in the affairs of the county. Mrs. Ed T. Cox of Eastland, who is also a member of the committee, has donated a book, "History of Eastland County," which was written by her late husband.

Other projects of the com-

mittee will include pacing measures, marking historic sites and landmarks, marking Civil War graves, collecting and preserving papers and documents of historical interest, and preparing histories of points of interest in the county.

Farm Bureau Membership Rallies Set

The Texas Farm Bureau will stage three big kick-off membership rallies Feb. 4 in Lubbock, Dallas and San Antonio. The triple kick-off, a departure from the tradition followed in the past years of staging one state-wide rally, is intended to make possible for every county Farm Bureau in the state to be represented in the official launching of the membership drive.

President C. H. DeVaney will address the Lubbock rally and then fly to Dallas and on to San Antonio for appearances at those two meetings, accompanied by Millard Shivers, TFB organization director, and TFB Information Director, Bill Hoover.

The Lubbock meeting will be held at the Holiday Inn and will begin at 10 a. m. The Dallas rally at the Adolphus Hotel and the San Antonio meeting at the Gunther Hotel will both begin at 2 p. m.

In addition to DeVaney's appearance, a guest speaker is scheduled to address each of the meetings. Warren Newberry of Vernon, Southern Region field service director for the American Farm Bureau Federation, will speak at a luncheon to be held in conjunction with the Lubbock meeting. Speaking at a banquet in Dallas will be Woodrow Luttrell of Chicago, director of the information division of AFB, T. C. Peterson of Chicago, director of the AFB's program development division, will be banquet speaker in San Antonio.

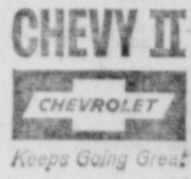

There Is An Eastland, and Its History Is Rich

and we have compiled the following information from "The History of Eastland County, Texas" by Edwin T. Cox and "The Story of Old Rip" by Bob Moore and O. H. Dick.

Eastland County was created February 1, 1858 and was organized December 2, 1873. The County was named in honor of William M. Eastland, the first man to draw a black bean at Rancho Salada, Mexico.

Mr. Eastland was born at Woodfarm, Woodford County, Kentucky on March 21, 1806. In 1834, he came to Texas settling near La Grange in Matagorda County.

Eastland County, in general, was too broke and heavily timbered to attract the buffalo, but a few were seen as far east as McGough Springs. The northwest part of the county was a part of their regular grazing ground. At present, a small herd of buffalo may be seen grazing in pasture land at Morto Valley, north of Eastland. Eastland is the county seat of the county.

The first white people who came to the County followed trails made by the Indians and wild animals which led to and by water-g places. Frank Sanchez, the first white settler in Eastland County, outlined the first known trail in this County.

Early in its history, the county contained Minute Men and Texas Rangers, the latter of which still exist in the state.

Products in Eastland County include cattle, goats, sheep, hogs, peanuts, cotton, grains and petroleum.

Since peanuts are the main crop, members of the Eastland Junior Chamber of Commerce, several years ago organized the Peanut Bowl, and annual football game between the Ranger and Cisco Junior Colleges. The Peanut Bowl is usually held in September of each year.

The Ranger township was the center of what was probably the most spectacular boom ever to have occurred in the United States. The oil boom commenced in the early 1900's.

In the early days, outlaw activities ranked high in Eastland County. The most famous was the Santa Claus bank robbery in Cisco. It occurred when four men, Marshall Ratliff dressed as Santa Claus, Henry Helms, Robert Hill and L. E. Davis, entered the First National Bank in Cisco on December 23, 1927 and robbed it of \$12,400 in cash and \$150,000 in non-negotiable securities.

After killing an Eastland Deputy, Ratliff was hanged by a multitude of men and boys.

Eastland County's most famous character is "Old Rip," a horned toad. Old Rip was placed alive in the Cornerstone of the Courthouse in 1887. Thirty-one years later, in 1928, the cornerstone was opened and the toad was found alive,

Election; Objections Head Nursing Agenda

Mrs. June Bunch, administrator of the Green Acres Nursing Home in Eastland, was elected chairman of the legislative board and public relations chairman at the first annual convention of the Texas League of Geriatric Nurses, Inc.

The convention was held Jan. 21-22 at the Stephen F. Austin Hotel in Austin.

Others elected were Mrs. Oscar Yellett of Beaumont, board member; Mrs. Jaddie Terrell of Dallas, board member; Ada Turner of Austin, board member; Mrs. Ida Mae Dentler of Houston, president; Ed Bissa of Fort Worth, owner of the Gorma Nursing Home, first vice president; Lela Horton of Temple, second vice president; Mrs. Kathryn Knight of Houston, secretary; and Amelia Ross of Houston, treasurer.

Highlight of the convention was the opposition of the professional Nurses Practice Act, which if passed by legislature, would create a work stoppage for some 50,000 people in addition to close hospitals and nursing homes of Texas.

The act, sponsored by the Texas Graduate Nurses' Association, will require that (1) any person practicing or offering to practice professional nursing in Texas for compensation shall be licensed and currently registered; (2) any person practicing or offering to practice professional nursing for compensation in Texas shall hereafter be required to submit evidence to the Texas Board of Professional Nursing that he is qualified and shall be licensed and registered; and (3) the registration of every person licensed under the provisions of this law shall be renewed annually. Any person practicing professional nursing for compensation during the time such person's registration has lapsed shall be considered an illegal practitioner and shall be subject to penalties provided for violation of this law.

In all, the act includes some 20 sections with subdivisions.

Objections of the Texas Hospital Association and its member hospitals to the proposed nursing law include the following: (1) a "mandatory" nursing law would make illegal use of many personnel in hospitals who are now valuable in supplementing the short supply of registered nurses; (2) A "mandatory" act would endanger the position of the no-profit hospital in lawsuits; and (3) the proposed definition of professional nursing is so broad as to include virtually all paramedical professional employees in the hospital.

The 4-H Council adjourned and retired to another room for recreation.

An election of officers was held by the Adult Leaders Association.
