1,500 DOE' 800 Permits Going Slowly At This Time

Issuance of doe tags has been going slowly — but is expected to pick up in Eastland County as hunting season approaches. Only 23 of the 800 tags sent to the county clerk's office had been issued at mid-week, but judging from last year's demand, the county may have to ask for more. Game Warden Maurice Dry estimates that there are only about 1,500 doe in the county, compared to approximately 400 bucks. Last year, 500 permits were issued by the clerk's office and there were a great number of calls after those were gone. The office had been sent 300 at the beginning of September last year. These were distributed and more ordered. Under the present arrangement, the county can apparently have as many as are requested. Many of the doe in the county this year are small, Dry reports, and shouldn't be killed. The permits may be bought for 50 cents each by anyone owning a current hunting license. The permits are free for persons under 17 years old, and land-owners who choose to use it on their own land only.

Throngs Expected For Peanut Festival Saturday

Thousands of people are expected in Eastland Saturday for the Fourth Annual Peanut Bowl Festival which begins at 8 a. m. and runs through a classic football clash that evening.

The Ranger Junior College Rangers will be attempting to "even the score" with the Cisco Junior College Wranglers, when the kick-off comes at 8 p. m. at Maverick Stadium. The Bowl standing now reads Cisco, two wins; Ranger, one. It will be the first game of the current season for both teams so very little "evaluating" is possible thus far. Both report strong, improved teams.

Festival Director Dick Johnson reports that plans are complete for the days activities and that record crowds are anticipated for each event.

To begin the day, a twirling contest will be held on the west side of the square, in which all area twirlers, and majorettes, official and unofficial, will compete for honors and gold medals. Eastland Band Director John Foster will be in charge and says that entries will be accepted up until competition time. The twirling show is a spectator sport and the admission for watching is free. Outstanding judges will pick the better performers.

At 2:30 p. m. the long-awaited Peanut Bowl Parade will begin its long trek through Eastland's streets, and this spectacle alone attracts record crowds along the parade route. Director Ben McKinnis reports that a bounty of bands, including Paschals 120 Fort Worth member riding clubs, and floats have already signed for participation. Feature of the Parade will be the appearance of Miss Texas (Miss Jeanne Amacker) who competed in Atlantic City, N. J., Saturday night. Sharing honors with Miss Texas will be Miss Peanut Bowl, who was selected from a bevy of beautiful county girls in a special pageant Tuesday evening.

The princesses of the Peanut Bowl Pageant will also be highlights of the parade, as will Miss Abilene, Miss Texas runner-up.

Putting military flavor and color in the parade will be the much-honored Armored Division Drill Team from Fort Hood, a five man team which will perform intricate maneuvers within the parade; members in flashy chrome helmets and using M-1 rifles with fixed bayonets. It'll be a "show within a show" on the parade route.

The hostesses for her party were Mrs. R. E. Stearns and Mrs. Don McClendon. Several friends came to the party, and shared punch and cake.

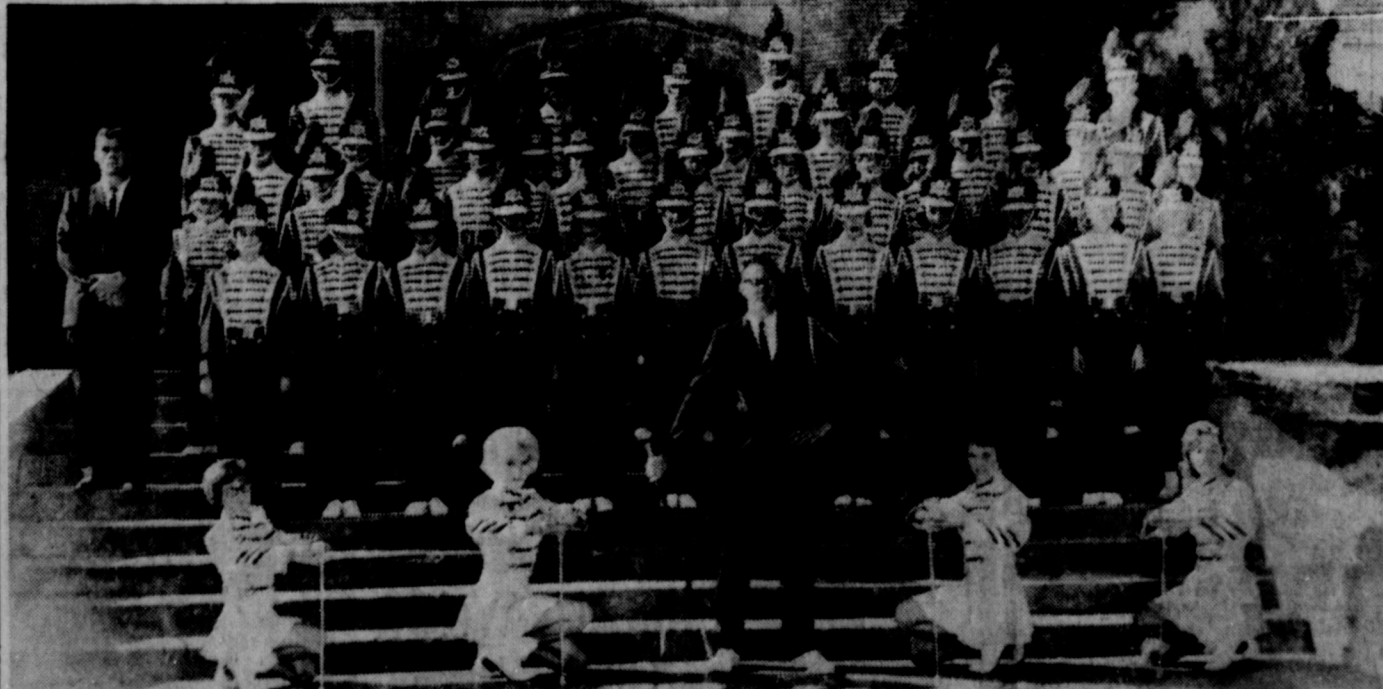
Mrs. Hatten is very active, and still reads her "Eastland Telegram" without the aid of glasses.

CJC Ready To Begin Football Season In Peanut Bowl Game

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College were ready today to open their 1963 football season in a game at 8 p. m. Saturday at Eastland as the annual Peanut Bowl meeting with Ranger Junior College.

Coaches Jim Puryear, Leeland Willis and Carroll Scott reported that the Wranglers would be at near full strength for the contest. Cisco won the 1962 game, 27-to-6, and they are expecting Ranger to be out for revenge.

The starting Cisco team will have Sophomore Phil Albert, 175-pound sophomore from Conesmaugh, Pa., as quarterback. With him in the backfield will be three of the following six men: John Love of Marlin, Herman Sloan of Abilene, Joe Faulkenberry of Seagraves, Bert McWilliams of Lubbock, Julius Guy of Lubbock and Guy Sims of Abilene.

Ends will be Sophomore David Barrera of Abilene and Freshman Harry Gunner of Port Arthur. At tackles will be Pete Matinkus, Chicago, and Henry Linton of Marlin, at guards are Ricky Thomas of Del Rio and Mike Vandeventer of Amarillo. The center will be Fred Washington of Marlin.

Coach Puryear, in his third season at CJC, uses a pro-

type offense. His line will average slightly over 200 pounds, and the backfield will be about 185 pounds.

The Wranglers looked good in a scrimmage last Saturday with Tyler Junior College. The team will depend more on speed this year than power as they have six backs who can run the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds or less.

A large delegation of Cisco fans will follow the Wranglers to Eastland for contest.

Also in a case heard Monday an all-male jury found F. G. Gilchrist of De Leon guilty on charges of driving while

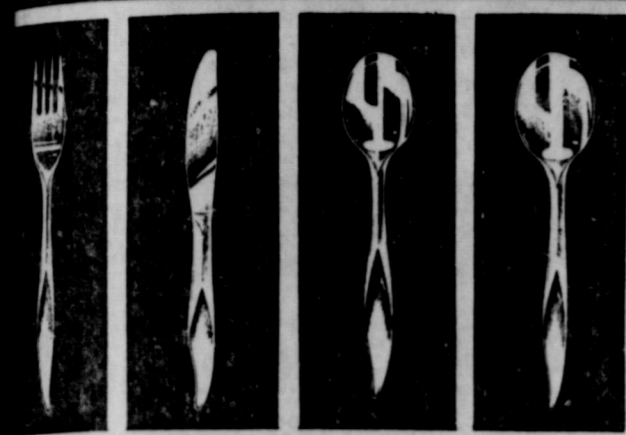
intoxicated on Dec. 22, 1962. Gilchrist was given a sentence of three days in the county jail and a \$50 fine.

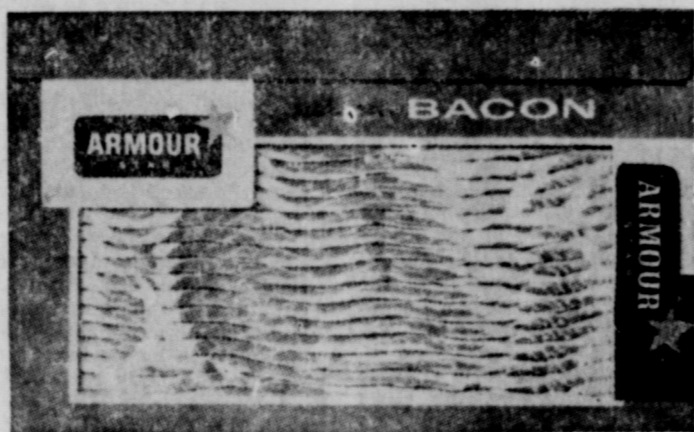

Accent on Health

AUSTIN — Good posture makes it possible to use the body in the simplest and most effective way — muscle contraction and relaxation, balance, coordination, rhythm, and timing makes all tasks easier.

Posture has a direct bearing on comfort, work efficiency and body functions. Poor posture can become a habit, like overeating. Poor posture reduces blood circulation, induces drowsiness and fatigue. Because breathing is shallow, abdominal organs sag and perform poorly.

Posture, some experts explain, is the end result of body mechanics. The human body is composed of many intricate and interacting components. Body mechanics might be defined as the functioning of the body parts.

Tension is a deterrent to good body mechanics. Relaxation is a lessening of tension. Learning to relax completely is an important aid to body mechanics. A person may lie down to rest but defeat his purpose by not relaxing.

For an example of how tension feels, contract a part of the body strongly. Clench the fist tightly then start releasing it gradually, taking a way more and more of the tension until there is a feeling of complete looseness. Another method is to close your eyes and, starting from the tip of the toes, fingers or scalp, let each muscle relax or go completely limp. After mastering these methods of tension relaxation, it becomes possible to locate tense areas within the body and relax them.

Aside from building good principles of body mechanics with the fundamentals of health — plenty of sleep, regular exercise, meals which keep up stamina and provide a supply of energy and atten-

tion to medical and dental needs — there are specific posture points to consider.

The most evident fact in a person with good posture is that the body is carried in a well balanced manner with the weight line of the body falling through the main midline joints of the body. Any posture in which the various segments or parts of the body assume a zigzag line, or in other words sag in one spot or bulge out in another, is apt to indicate poor body alignment. Good posture results in body movements of ease, grace and efficiency. Poor posture is usually awkward and inefficient.

A person with poor posture can get tired just sitting. It's worth learning the right way to sit, too, for it can save much fatigue and weariness. Try it, using these simple rules: Use a firm chair with a seat height equal to leg length from bottom of the heel to the back of the knee, minus 1 1/2 inches. Sit tall — on the back of the thighs rather than the end of the spine. Hold the head and trunk erect, centered over the pelvis or tilted slightly forward. Flex the knees at right angles.

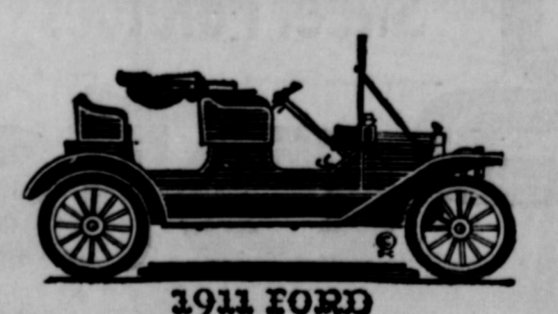


Winners in the senior division was Ruby Wende of Nimrod, first in the Safety Division. Her book was sent to the State Judging Contest.
