Hunters Out In Force For Opening Of '63 Deer Season

Saturday marked the opening of deer season in Eastland and adjoining counties with hunters from all parts of the state converging on the ranches of this area. The State Parks and Wildlife department estimates that there will be 400,000 hunters harvesting 225,000 deer in Texas this season. Out of this number the County will have a large share of the crowd. From County Clerk John S. son's office doe permits have been issued this year to Eastland County hunters totaling some 500. The acorn crop has been short due to the drought creating a need to harvest a many deer as legally possible from the county and counties north. the biologists, with a large fawn crop. Approximately 15 per cent of the deer in the area are bucks. Early Saturday morning, eating places along Highway 80 were crowded as the sportsmen, getting an early start, stopped for a quick breakfast before moving on to their selected hunting areas. Some important points for hunters to remember, in order that they may stay within the legal limits: Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. All hunters must have a license. Those 16 or under or 65 and older are exempt from the license fee but must have licenses. Those between the ages of 16 and 65 must purchase their license. The price is \$3.15 and may be purchased at many sporting goods stores. Before killing an antlerless deer, a permit must be obtained from the county clerk, for Eastland county, from the land owner on whose property the deer is to be killed, if you are hunting out of county. The deer tag on the license labeled "bonus" may be used for antlerless deer only. A legal buck is one having one or more points. All deer must be tagged immediately after being killed. A deer without a tag is considered to have been taken illegally. It is illegal to shoot deer with .22 caliber fire ammunition. It is unlawful to hunt at night with a headlight.

First Baptist Church Plans All-Church Dinner

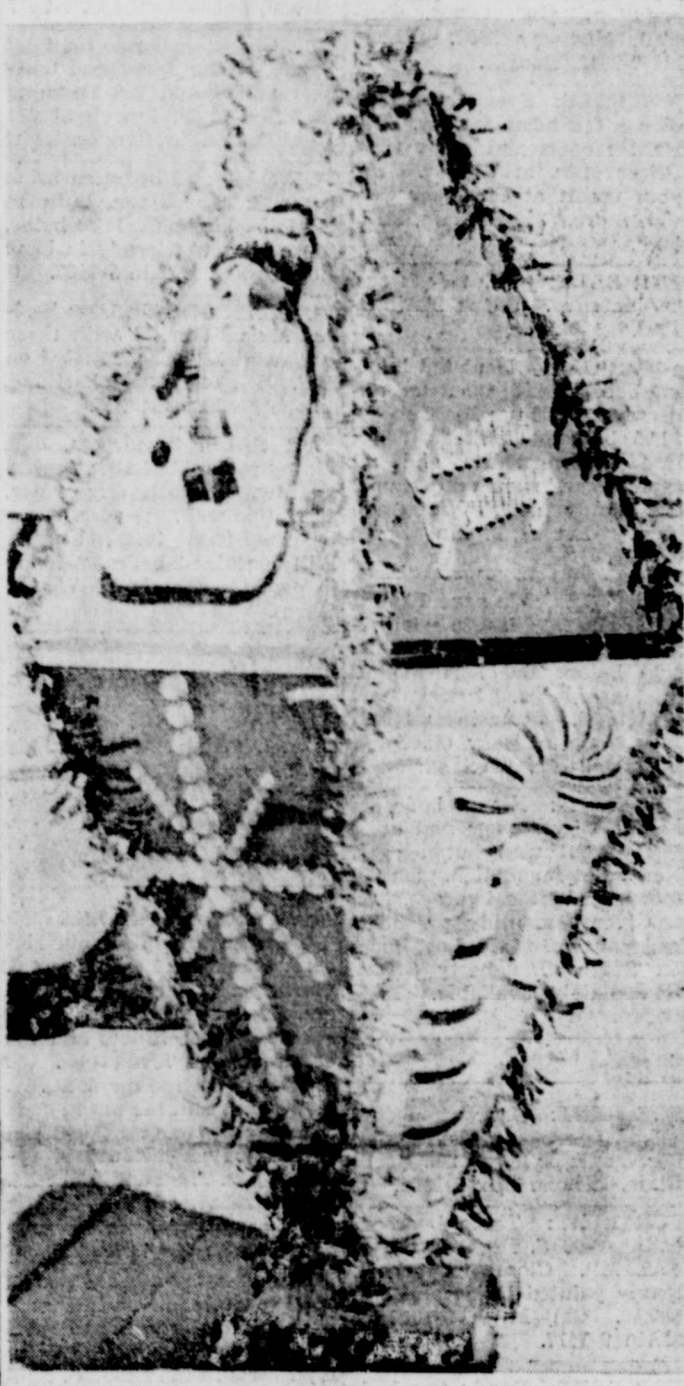

8 Big Lighted Displays Due

Something new in Christmas decorations will be added to other decorations for the Holiday. The new decorations will be placed on the street light poles and are prismoid shaped with four traditional panels to each model. Eight of these decorations were purchased by: the Rotary Club (two), the Jaycees (four), the Chamber of Commerce, (one), and Robertson TV and Eastland Auto Parts, (one). The prismoids are manufactured by Sparkle-Lite, Inc. of Winters, Texas. They are constructed of permanent materials of aluminum, fiberglass and plastic for years of practical use. The decorations are 6 feet tall and have an interior illumination in sufficient amount to provide sparkling colors at night as well as gay and glittering colors during the day. It also features the new lifetime plastic non-filament lens bulb. The new decorations are expected to be delivered the latter part of this month.

Eastland's Mavericks kicked to the Clyde Bulldogs Friday night to end the season with a 34-8 defeat. Jim Wright and Joe Cooper were captains and Jim Moylan kicked the ball deep to get the game under way. But Clyde returned to the middle of the field and then three first downs in a row. The Bulldogs received the first penalty for offside. John Walls trotted down the side line to tally up the first of several Clyde TD's.

Rick Dennis did the honors for the extra points. The kick cleared the goal post and it was good. Eastland got possession of the ball again and was moving it rapidly with Jim Moylan gaining about 10, Gary Graham gaining about 15, and Joe Cooper, about 40. At the end of the first quarter, the score was Eastland 0,

Clyde 7. Rick Dennis got the ball and rallied another Clyde TD. Cooper ran about 35 yards after taking a handoff from John Moylan on the return of the Clyde kickoff. Cooper completed a 40-yard pass to gain the only Eastland touchdown during the night. QB Jerry McCullough ran the extra points around the wide end.

With Eastland in possession on the 20, the ball was given to Cooper who struggled 15 solid yards with three large Bulldogs on his back. Graham had one of the better punts of the night — a 38-yarder. Clyde came through again with another TD, the conversion was good. This brought the score to 21-8. Graham received the kickoff to return the ball for 20 yards.

Eastland fumbled to have its own Jim Moylan recover. But Phillips made some key tackles during this series. Clyde dominated the ball most of the evening, running very hard all of the time. Cooper ran 21 yards to return the kickoff after the half. Mike Miller, Jim Moylan, Butch Daniels and Bill Garner had very good tackles. Clyde blasted through again with another TD, but the conversion was no good. John Moylan ran over 40 yards to almost score again for Eastland.

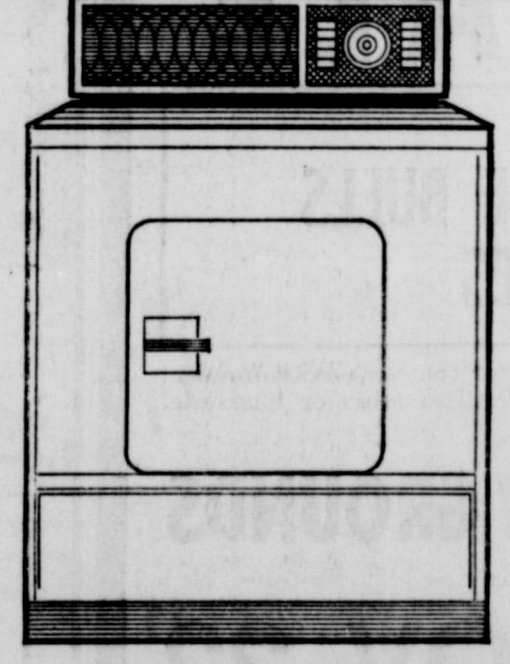

The Ten-Ten C. B. Club expressed their thanks to all of the participating merchants for the success of the Jamboree.

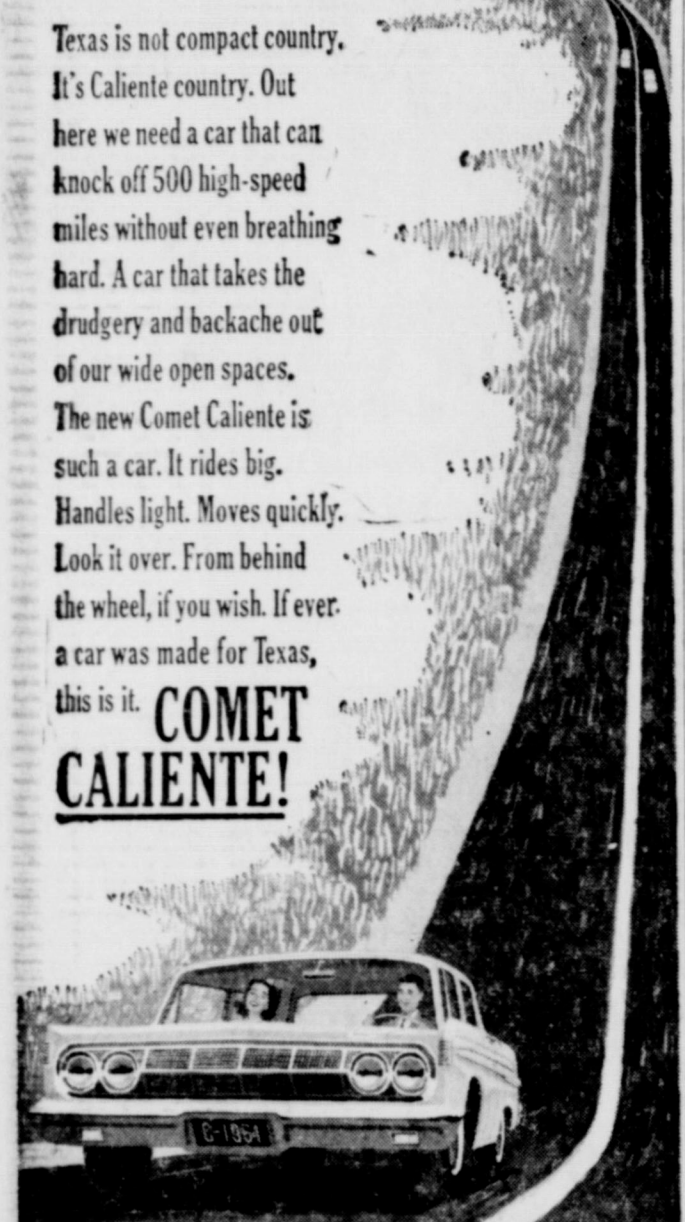
AUCTION REPORT
