UF Campaign Ahead of Thermometer

The Eastland 1963 United Fund Campaign has passed the \$5,000 mark and Chairman James Reid is still "looking" for the UF thermometer.

Farm Bureau Favors Poll Tax; Re-Elects Jack Cozart President

The Eastland County Farm Bureau voted to retain the poll tax — then voted to retain its leadership, with the re-election of Jack Cozart at the annual membership convention Monday evening in Eastland.

The poll tax matter was one of five resolutions adopted by the convention, during the meet at the West Commerce St. office.

Other new officers include Mitchell Campbell, first vice president; Luke Palmer, second vice president; and Ray Norris, secretary-treasurer.

New directors are Herman Schaefer of Cisco, Cyrus Justice of Eastland, Cozart of Cisco, Palmer of Gorman, Norris of Eastland, R. L. Ricke of Cisco, L. A. Harbin of Eastland, J. B. Anderson of Gorman, Jimmy Sparks of Desdemona and Howard Wade of Desdemona.

Delegates elected to attend the annual state Farm Bureau convention in Fort Worth next month are R. L. Ricke, Howard Wade, Mrs. Lena Jones of Ranger, Mrs. Henry Fry of Cisco, B. T. Graham of Cisco. Alternates are Aubrey Easter, Mitchell Campbell, Herman Schaefer and Ben Freeman of Chaney.

Other resolutions approved, included: 1. That all mineral and oil royalties be reverted to landowners after ten years following no production and taxes be assessed on pro rata basis during the 10-year period.

2. That the state legislature be asked to pass a law to prohibit independent school districts from raising school taxes more than 10 per cent per annum, either by per cent or dollar evaluation or by raising the evaluation of property except by vote of the people of said district.

3. That the FB opposes the proposed regulation of the '64 ACP program which would require 90 days deferred grazing following brush control work.

4. That the FB contact the Farm Bureaus of counties that are interested in pecans to consider feasibility of forming a marketing association to get a better pecan market.

Henry Fry said during the membership report, that there are now a total of 586 members, which is 11 over the set quota, and that 85 are new members.

Edwin Lepley Is New FB Agent

Edwin Lepley, formerly of Houston, has been named new service agent for the Eastland County Farm Bureau. This gives the Bureau a staff of three agents. Pat Mosley is general agent and Myrta Love is the other service agent.

Mr. Lepley is a 1960 graduate of South Houston Senior High and attended Sam Houston State Teachers College. He served as State Vice-President of Texas Future Farmers of America Association in 1961.

Mr. Lepley was reared on a dairy and ranch. He is married to Yvonne Lepley, who is Eastland County Assistant Home Demonstration Agent.

Contract has been awarded for design of air conditioning and lighting improvement for the Eastland Post Office, Mrs. Marene Johnson, postmaster, has announced.

The Eastland project is one of three to be designed in the area. Post Office buildings at Stamford and Colorado City were also included in the contract awarded to Tippet and Gee of Abilene.

The 5,935 square feet of space involved in the Eastland project and the 190 square feet of space in the Colorado City project will be occupied by the Post Office Department when work is completed. Both post office and Farmers Home Administration offices will occupy the 1,530 square feet in the Stamford project.

Contract for design was awarded by the General Services Administration.

David Phillips, Regional Administrator, GSA, Dallas, announced that the contracts for air conditioning and lighting of the three buildings will be awarded about July 15, 1964.

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Registration will begin Saturday morning at the Village Hotel lobby and exhibits and displays of citizen band radio equipment will be held in the hotel Roof Garden throughout the day.

City Charter To Be Reviewed; Other Council Business Routine

Eastland's aged city charter is to be examined in the light of this decade by a three-man committee, it was announced at the regular city commission meeting Monday evening.

The commission gave Mayor Don Pierson the go-ahead on a study by a committee to be named by him on the charter, with a view to up-dating

it. It was pointed out that a completely new charter can't be adopted as such, but that the present one could be amended.

Pierson indicated that he would like to have the vote on the revised charter at the April city election.

A discussion was also held on the proposed by-pass of

the commission agreed to further study the situation.

Tax valuation on the old Perry Building was lowered to \$5,650 at the request of Glyn Gilliam, representing the First Methodist Church, owner of the building. Appraisers had set the value of the building at \$1000, Gilliam said, and some \$5,600 in repairs have been added. Tax valuation is set at one-fourth of value.

Commissioner M. A. Treadwell Jr. was re-appointed city health officer.

Mayor Pierson announced that he would proclaim Nov. 2 as Southwest C. B. Radio Jamboree Day in Eastland, in connection with a convention to be held here on that day. He will also seek a governor's proclamation, he said.

Requests on delinquent tax and excessive water bill consideration by two citizens were denied because the commissioners said they did not want to set precedents.

City Manager Lewis Tiner reported:

The average monthly pay roll in the year 1962-63 was \$7,060.82. The average monthly pay roll in the year 1961-62 was \$6,362.20.

Accounting for the difference — All employees were granted a 10 percent increase in April of 1962. The average monthly cost of this amounted to \$636.22. Mrs. Young worked in the office and drew \$1200.00 average Mo. \$100.00. Henry Clay Moore added to pay roll — average monthly — \$186.00. These three factors added to the average pay roll for 1961-62 \$7,284.94.

Parking meter receipts were down \$524.19. Commercial parking permits were up \$270.00 for the same period. The City started granting free parking on Saturday in June of 1962. Only three months of this was reflected in the 1961-62 statements.

Listed under OTHER on the water and Sewer operating statement you will note a decrease of \$1,088.00. This figure is comprised of water and sewer taps. The only logical reason for this to be down is the decrease in new construction.

In March or April of this year The Eastland County Water Supply District had their meters checked and found that they were giving about 10 percent too much water. This correction reflects in the statement. At peak summer use we were billing only about 55 percent of the water we were paying for.

We started buying a bout twelve new meters monthly that are tamper proof and intend to use them in places that we feel they will serve our needs best. This is going to cost some money — \$28.00 Ea.

I met with the School Board one night last month and gave them a brief run down on what we were trying to accomplish in their behalf. Don McClendon and I went to the new school sight and discussed the location of the proposed sewer line with their representatives. They stated that they wanted to install it to the best advantage of the City so long as it was practical.

We recently completed a line to Texas Light Weight Aggregate Co. The line extends from Hollywood Vassarette, north to the Haydite

F. P. Curry Dies Five Days After Nathan's Acquittal

Eighteen-year old Nathan Curry of Cisco was acquitted of the murder of Mrs. Florence Hussey by an all male jury at 8:05 p. m. Saturday, Oct. 19, after four and one-half hours deliberation.

Immediately after the reading of the verdict by the district clerk, the courtroom became a scene of turmoil and

precipitate your feelings, but the court must have order. This is the first time in my 12 years on the bench that I have ever had to use my gavel to get order."

The boy's mother, Mrs. F. P. Curry, sobbed repeatedly, "Thank God," and "Thank you, Lord." Near collapse from the long ordeal, she had to be assisted from the courtroom.

Mr. Curry suffered from a heart condition, had made himself available for questioning during the trial, but he was never called to the stand. During the week-long trial, he had sat in the hall outside the doors of the 29th District courtroom. His frequent comment to reporters was, "That boy is innocent."

Stricken with a heart attack early Sunday morning, Mr. Curry was taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital shortly before noon, where he died early Wednesday morning.

A hushed atmosphere had prevailed in the dimly lit halls of the tiny courthouse preceding the return of the jury.

A knock on the door of the juror's room where they were locked for deliberation caused a stir of excitement in the halls. The first time the jurors wished to send an inquiry to Judge Oxford, and the second time they ordered supper to be sent up.

Optimism by the defense for an acquittal grew as time passed and a quick verdict was not returned. In returning a verdict of not guilty, the jury had two choices — not guilty by reason of temporary insanity, or not guilty by reason of not having committed the crime. They chose the latter.

Monday, Mrs. Curry and her daughter, Linda Townsend, attributed the victory to prayer. A group of both strangers and friends of the family had formed a prayer

Albany has tasted defeat only once this season — at the hands of Olney, 8-6. Eastland drew low scores against Cisco, 34-14, and again last week



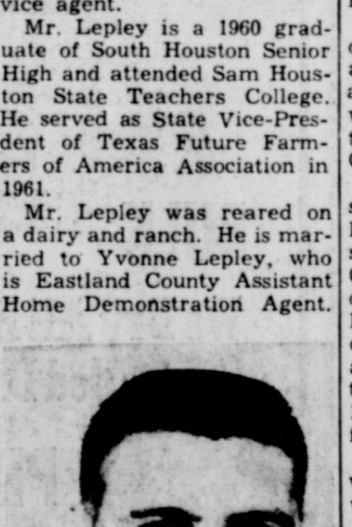
MISS JEANNE MORREN ...Nominee

first half of the state's closing argument, recalling to them the testimony of Dee Wheeler and the details of the confession.

A spellbound courtroom listened to a dramatic plea for justice by the defense attorney, John Watts, during which time he described the "tangled web" of lies that had been woven around an "innocent boy."

"Truth is just like a football," Mr. Watts declared. "You can take it out in the morning and kick it around all day, and when you bring it in at night, it's still just as smooth and unscratched as it was before it was kicked around."

Assistant prosecuting attorney Sam Cleveland re-enacted the details of the crime and how it was committed, recalling to the jury the cries of the beaten and stabbed woman as contained in the alleged confession — "Don't, Nathan, don't."

At 3:05 p. m. the jury retired behind locked doors with the pleas of all three attorneys— for justice to be done— ringing in their ears. They weighed the evidence and found Nathan Curry not guilty by reason of not having committed the crime with which he had been charged.

For the first time in over 27 months, 18 year old Nathan Curry was acknowledged by the law of the land to be innocent.

"He doesn't want the glory for it; we give the glory to God."

Mr. Watts said that a church denomination had offered to pay Nathan Curry's way through the seminary in preparation for his becoming a minister.

On the final day of testimony in the trial, the defense rested its case early Saturday morning after re-calling Wendell Sowell, from the Fort Worth crime lab, to the stand. When asked if he knew that footprints of Nathan Curry were taken after his arrest, and if he (Sowell) asked for footprints to be taken, he replied, "No sir," to both questions.

The witness also admitted that dog hair was found in Mrs. Hussey's home, but that he did not attempt to find out where it came from, and that he did not know why the matter was not pursued.

"The blood on Nathan Curry's trousers was of human origin, type B," he stated, "and not turtle blood." (Mr. Sowell had previously testified that both Nathan Curry's blood and that of the slain woman were type B.)

Called to the witness stand for the last time, Dee Wheeler of Fort Worth testified again that he had Dr. Addy to see Nathan and talk to him before he was given the lie detector test, and that Dr. Addy said he appeared to be all right.

Rebuttal witnesses called by

the state Saturday morning included Dr. W. P. Watkins of Ranger, Dr. M. A. Treadwell, Dr. R. C. Ferguson, and Dr. Bob Alexander, all of Eastland. All except Dr. Ferguson testified that they did not believe that "brainwashing" could be accomplished in a period of a few hours, and that they did not believe in the idea of "temporary insanity" as construed by the law. After contemplation, Dr. Ferguson said he did not believe that "same people kill people."

During the closing minutes of testimony, L. E. Sublett related that he and Sheriff Horn took Nathan Curry's footprints in the jail in Eastland but that he did not know what was done with them.

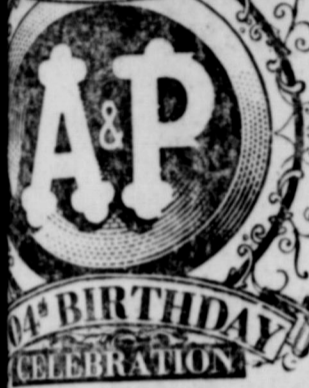

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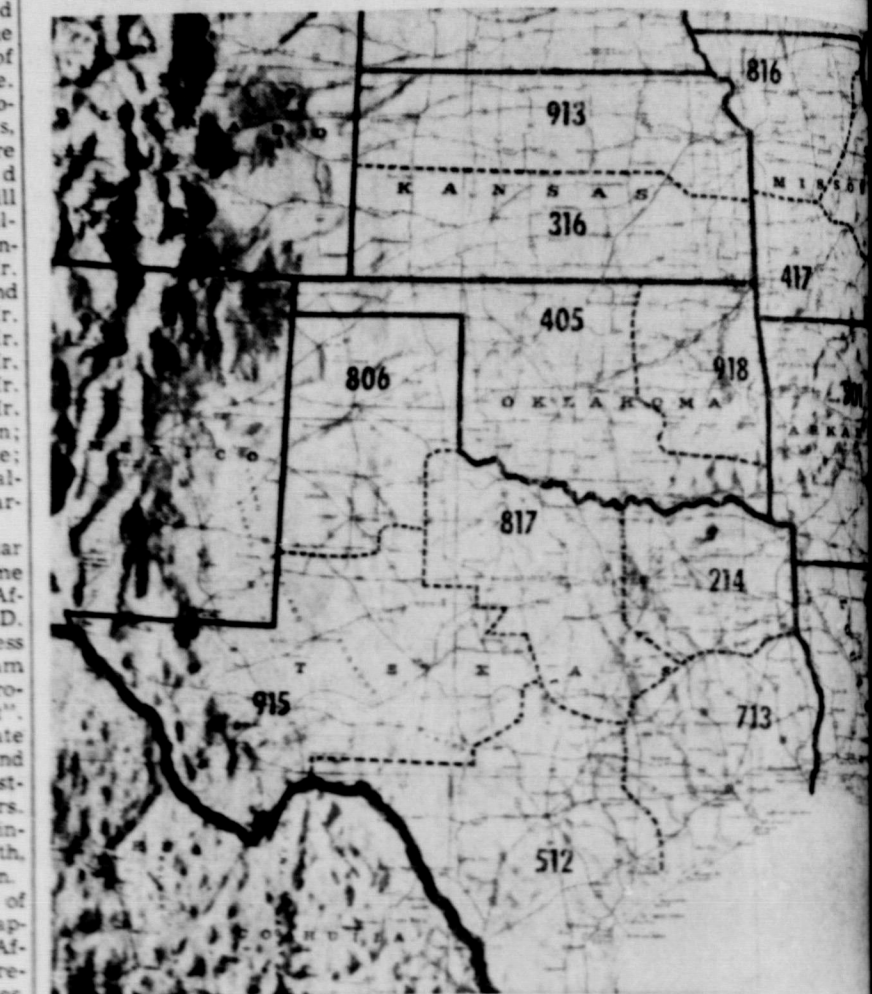

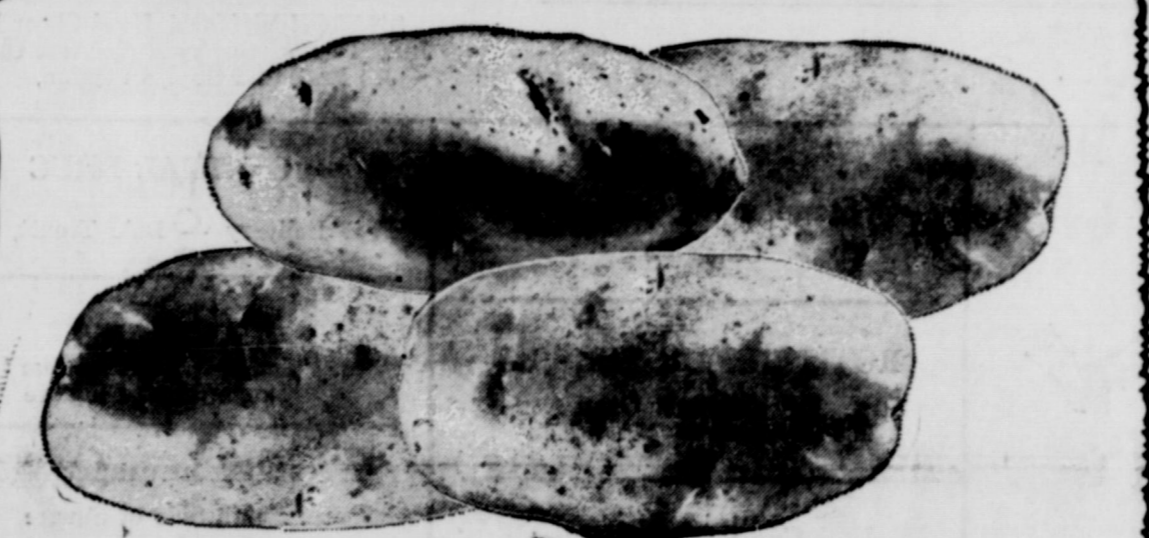
