County Will Ballot On Four State And Two Local Matters

A comparatively light turnout of voters has been forecast Saturday as Eastland County take part in a state-wide constitutional amendment election and expresses opinions in two county referendum propositions. Polls open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. with regular election laws prevailing.

Be Sure To Vote Saturday

(An Editorial)

The voters of this county will participate Saturday, Nov. 9, in a state-wide election on four proposed changes in the Texas constitution and will make known their opinions regarding two matters that are purely local.

The important state-wide issues concern (1) the poll tax, (2) aid for needy aged, blind, children and disabled persons, (3) retirement funds in Jefferson County, and (4) the Veterans Land Fund revenue bonds.

The two local matters are:
1. FOR or AGAINST "continuance of unlimited doe permits issued in Eastland County."
2. FOR or AGAINST "spending public tax funds to hire a trapper and poisoner."

This newspaper believes that the best interests of the county will be served by voting against unlimited doe deer shooting and by voting for retaining the county trapper.

Eastland County could become more of a sportsmen's area if the deer population were permitted to develop orderly. Those few who might suffer crop damage from deer grazing can have relief by asking the game warden. The law that allows unlimited permits to shoot does was passed without general knowledge, and we believe that the will of the people should be expressed and followed.

The county trapper has been on the job for a dozen years or so just as the program works in 116 other Texas counties. Eastland County has seen its land values grow due to "brush goating" and the sheep and goat industry holds more promise than anything else in the livestock field, according to the county program committee.

The ballot is somewhat misleading by using the word "poisoner." While cyanide bait is used in some cases, the trapper never goes on anybody's property with his snares, traps or bait without the written permission of the land owner. Cost to the taxpayer for this program (\$185 per month) is less than one-half of one per cent of the money allocated for the county's general fund expenses.

The obligations of good citizenship call for you to vote in every election — city, school, county, state or national. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Saturday.

Voting will be at the Courthouse in Eastland, the City Hall in Cisco, and also at the City Hall in Ranger as well as boxing elsewhere in the county.

And it's one of those "for" and "against" ballots which can frequently be nightmares for both voters and vote counters.

The constitutional amendments will become "official" if carried but the two county issues are merely "samples" or straw votes to find out how the county residents feel about two issues — both concerning wildlife.

The first county referendum proposition deals with the issuance of doe permits in Eastland county, and asks the voter to decide whether he is "FOR continuance of unlimited doe permits issued in Eastland County," or is "AGAINST continuance of unlimited doe permits issued in Eastland County."

(A total of 800 permits have been assigned the county this year and 500 were issued last year by the county clerk's office.)

The other county proposition has to do with the employment of a trapper, and reads "FOR spending public tax funds to hire a trapper and poisoner," or "AGAINST spending public tax funds to hire a trapper and poisoner."

The county has for several years contributed to the salary of the trapper in association with the state and federal agencies.

Two large delegations, one representing the county livestock raising industry and another one made up of residents interested in the present and future wildlife control measures in the county have been active in seeking support in the election Saturday.

The livestock raisers are asking that the trapper be retained to assist in the control of predatory animals which

Swarms of Eastland fans are expected to make the nine-mile drive Friday to see the annual inter-city grid clash when the Mavericks take on the much-touted Ranger Bulldogs.

Boasting a "re-charged" team, the Bulldogs began the season slow, picked up steam with wins, until Albany did its brand of de-flating last week.

The Mavericks carry a better win-loss record (5-3) and had a real season going this year until injuries began to plague the squad. Ranger has a 4-4 for the year.

Game time will be 7:30 p. m. at Bulldog Stadium in Ranger.

There are several common yardsticks between the two teams. Cisco defeated Ranger, 16-0, and Eastland, 34-13. Eastland plastered DeLeon 30-8, and DeLeon laid a goose-egg on Ranger by beating them 6-0. Among the big surprises of the season for Ranger was their early win over powerful Jacksboro, 16-7.

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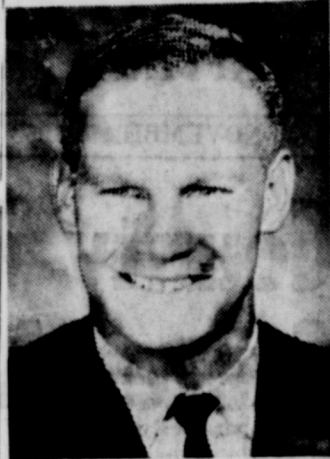

Mrs. Davis, who had been in ill health for the past few weeks, died unexpectedly at her home Saturday morning. The Eskimos have a very effective way of dealing with wolf packs. They embed razor-sharp knives clasp down in the ice and rub the blades with a little seal blood. The wolves, attracted by the blood, lick the knives, cutting their tongues. They are greedily delighted by the seemingly inexhaustible supply of nourishing blood they can lick off the knives. They stand there licking until they drop in their tracks from the loss of their own blood, and freeze to death in the snow.

In a less grisly way bag and unprincipled federal spenders are forcing American taxpayers into monied-bloodletting traps.

A harsh indictment? Not at all when you look into the facts. The only money the national government has is what it takes from the people in taxes. 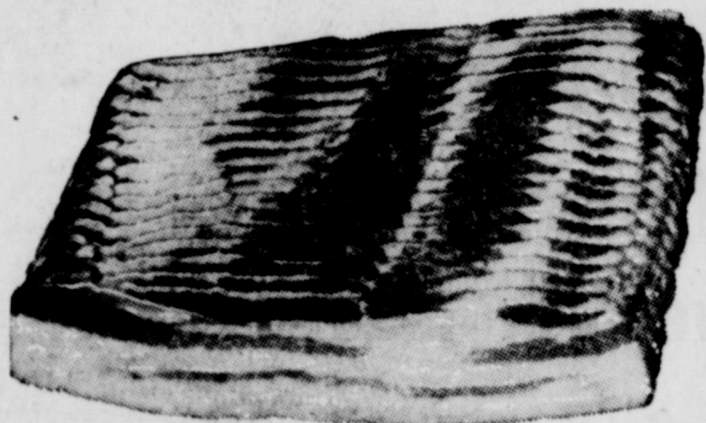

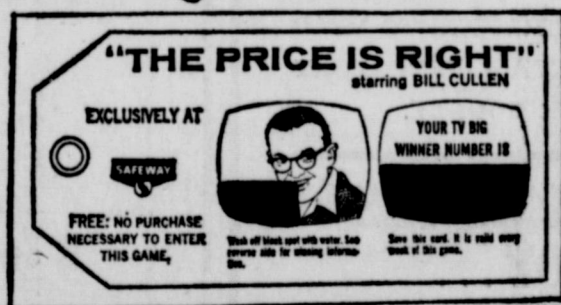

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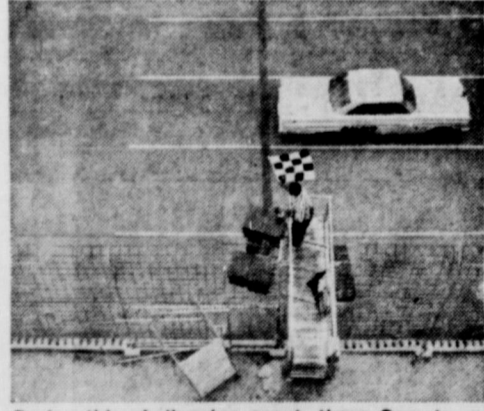
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
