#### Is a By-Pass Inevitable?

(An Editorial)

Many people believe that the routing of Interstate 20 Highway has already been foreordained and that anything anyone may believe or do, will have no effect on the route or the situation generally.

Apparently the federal government has made money available and told the state Highway Department to pick the route. This being all neatly done, all that remained was to have the work carried out by the various department districts.

And so, as far as Eastland County is concerned, the Interstate Highway will enter, miss the three towns in a row, then exit. Certainly no one can argue the merits of good, safe highways. We'll concede that point. Then ask this one: "Shouldn't a community and, if necessary, a whole area rear back on its haunches and demand that its economic life-blood be protected?"

On the first count, this apparently will have to be done at the state or national levels. Like other bureaucratic mandates, these things are passed down. So the towns go to work making themselves heard by the upper echelon at the Highway Department, the state representatives, and anyone else who might remotely help the cause for Ranger, Eastland and Cisco.
Failing this, what? Worry about access to the

new highway. This, too, might be considered inevitable by some. Reports are that Cisco will have TWO entryexits; Eastland, ONE; and Ranger, THREE. That makes six in all, and anyone intending to stop in this county will probably have trouble finding a place to

We're not alone, of course. Consider Sweetwater. The new highway there wrecked enough economic havoc to incite the populace to loud and long squawks. They got results: the situation was "re-evaluated," and additional entry-exits were built.

In Abilene, the city pillars "back-slapped" themselves into signs along Interstate 20 reading "Food, lodging," not "Business Route," in order to lure passersby into town, not around.

And in Abilene, the Highway is called "Freeway" not "By-Pass."

#### Week Is Used To **Try Murder Case**

The case of the State of Texas vs. Nathan Curry was expected to go to the jury sometime Saturday in the 29th District Court of Palo Pinto County. Defense Attor ne y John Watts said late Friday evening that he could finish the testimony by the defense in about ten minutes Saturday morning, after which the defense would rest.

Both the state and defense rested in the Hussey murder case at 11:30 a. m. Saturday, and court was dismissed until was expected to get the case by 5 p. m. Saturday.

In a surprising series of developments Friday, Watts called to the stand first Dr. E. E. Addy, Jr., family physician of the Curry family for many years, who testified that he did not examine Nathan Curry before he was questioned on July 4, 1961, which refuted the testimony of Dee Wheeler on Thursday, who said he had Dr. Addy examine the Curry youth before questioning to see if he were in a condition to be question-

Dr. James D. Billo, psy chiatrist at the Gatesville State School for boys, said that in his opinion if Nathan Curry committed a crime like that, he would have had to have been temporarily in-sane, but that he did not be-lieve he could do so. His test-Houston, psychologist of Housafternoon that he had examined Nathan Curry on April 24, 1963, and on several fol-"a young man of bright, nor-mal intelligence, with an IQ somewhat above average, . . . he was extraordinarily stable in his emotional structure. . he showed some anxiety as depression during the days of examination, but under circumstances, he would have been psycopathic had he not shown these symptoms. He was remarkably stable and clear of any state of emotional disorder."







S. government show that electric drying produced the least color change of any method of drying. The same tests revealed significantly less yellowing of white fabrics and less deterioration of certain synthetic fabrics with electric drying than with other automatic methods.
